Bakers harvest first grape crop

The fruit of four years of hard labor was finally reaped last Thursday by Bob and Lowell Anne Baker, co-owners of LoBo Vineyard.

Over 15 people, a combination of paid workers, family members and friends, participated in this first annual grape harvest, held from 1 to 6 p.m. The two-acre vineyard yielded approximately 4,000 pounds.

The following day, the Bakers transported the grapes to Hill Country Cellars in Austin. The wine master there, Peggy Adams, is the only female wine master in Texas. Upon arrival, the berries were crushed and made ready for

fermentation.

"Participating in the crush at the winery was a new and exciting experience for both Lowell Anne and me," Baker said.

The Bakers purchased their vines the last load to be received this year by Hill Country Cellars.

"It probably will be next year before the wine is ready for consumption," Baker said.

The Bakes purchased their vines from Ralph Amberg's Grafted Grapevine Nursery in New York state.

This is their first year of commercial production.

"The vineyard has not reached its maximum potential yet," Baker said.

Indians host Munday in 1992 season opener

The Haskell Indians open the 1992 football campaign at home Friday night, playing hosts to their long-time rival, the Munday Moguls.

Coach Walter Hargrove's crew will be attempting to do something no Indian team has done in nine years—defeat the Moguls.

But it will take some doing on the part of the Indians. Munday, unrated in the pre-season for the first time in years, returns a solid nucleus from the 1991 Mogul team.

While the Moguls don't appear to have the great individual stars of past years, they have plenty of experience, including 10 offensive and eight defensive starters from a year ago. About the only noticeable absentee from last year is the heralded Dockins who was the big offensive gun last year until he was suspended.

At the same time, Haskell will field the most experienced team it has put on the field in several years. The starting lineups list two freshmen and a JV grad on offense and two JV grads and a frosh on defense. All other starters are lettermen.

Mart Guess will open at quarterback in the Indians' I formation. Hargrove was not sure Monday of the starting running backs, but will choose from Keiland Riley, Jason Torres, Justin Lisle, Cody Josselet and Leon McBee. Josselet, a starter last year, has been hampered by injuries during the pre-season and did not see action on offense in either of the team's scrimmages.

Edgar Nava will start at center on the offensive team, which also includes Brandon McFadden and Matt Perry at guards, Martin Limones and Shawn Sanford at tackles, Jonathan Tatum and Joseph Rodriguez at split ends, and Tommie Isbell at tight end.

On defense, the Indians will line up with Nava and Deon Walker at tackles, and Josselet and Isbell at ends. Linebackers will be McFadden, Brant Breeden, Torres, Riley or maybe Limones, and defensive backs will be Jonathan

Tatum, Robert Huff and Casey Lamed.

Several Indians have been nursing injuries. In addition to Josselet, Kevin Conner has been hurt and won't start. Breeden and Shawn Jordan also have been hobbled with injuries.

Haskell was outgunned in the scrimmage at Quanah last Friday. Hargrove said the team didn't play well during the first half of the scrimmage, but did much better in the second session. Quanah outscored the Indians 5-3.

Offensively, coaches were pleased with the passing of Guess. His receiving targets were Tatum,

Isbell and Rodriguez.

On the ground, the Indians didn't move the ball as consistently as they had earlier against Roscoe. The defense gave up several long runs in the first part of the scrimmage.

"I believe we can be a good football team," Hargrove said. "It will take a lot of hard work on the part of the players, but if they decide they want to win, I think they can."

Hargrove is beginning his third season as head coach of the Indians. His assistants are Alan Phillips, Richard Holloway, Mark Coffman, John Foster, Johnny Kinzy and Kerry Gartman.

Rochester woman dies in accident

A 22-year-old Rochester woman's body was found in an overflow tank at the town's water treatment plant Saturday afternoon after her car apparently went off the road by the plant.

Janet Deanne Quade was driving north on SH 6 when her car went off the left side of the road about seven-tenths of a mile north of Rochester, said County Sheriff Johnny Mills.

The body was found in about three feet of water in a tank about 40 or 50 yards from her car, Mills said. He estimated the car was about 20 yards from the highway.

Quade was last seen at a residence in Rochester about 1 a.m. Saturday, but her car was not found until almost 1 p.m., Mills said. Tall weeds hid it from the road.

Investigators were not sure whether Miss Quade died from injuries sustained in the wreck or from drowning. An autopsy was performed in Dallas this week, but results had not been announced as of Tuesday afternoon.

Miss Quade was the daughter of Dean and Patsy Quade of Rochester. She graduated from Rochester High School in 1988 and was a student at East Texas State University.

GIFT GIVING: KNOW THE RULES, AND BEWARE OF THE TRAPS

If you plan to share your wealth with others, now or in the future, it pays to know the basic gift tax rules -- and a few traps to avoid.

The Basics. In general, the IRS imposes a tax whenever you give property to another person. But there are two major exceptions: you may give up to \$10,000 per year to any number of people without triggering gift tax. In addition to this annual gift tax exclusion, the first \$600,000 that you give away during your lifetime is gift tax-free. As you use this \$600,000 gift allowance, you reduce the amount that may be distributed tax-free from your estate. Even so, lifetime gifts can make good tax sense.

Some gift tax traps to avoid:

- **Cut the strings.** For a gift to be valid, you must really part with ownership. For example, if you give away a residence, you can't continue to live there rent-free. If you give away stock, you shouldn't continue receiving the dividends. Also watch for "incomplete" and "future" gifts, and gifts in trust for your children (especially if you are the trustee).
- **Track your gifts.** Remember that holiday and birthday gifts count toward the \$10,000 per person annual gift tax exclusion.
- **Watch your timing.** A gift made by check is not complete until the recipient actually cashes the check. Plan accordingly at year-end, especially if you want your gift to be counted toward the current year's \$10,000 exclusion.
- **Keep your perspective.** Don't make a gift unless you can afford to. If you might need money or property to cover future health care costs or to protect against future inflation, don't give it away in the first place -- no matter what the tax benefits.

From the Inside Out

First thing we noticed last Wednesday when we walked into the Experienced Citizens' Center was the fresh, exotic scent of muskmelon.

Homer Josselet had been there unloading the gift of enough gosh-awful sized melons to generously serve several hundred senior citizens who regularly eat there, plus several dozen shut-ins to whom the meals are delivered. By the time we finished delivering the north side group their lunches, the Bronco was filled with the nectarous scent of this curious-looking, new (to me) melon.

Fortunately for us, Homer came to town Friday with a new truck-load and a new list of giftees. We couldn't believe the odd-looking, bowling-ball size fruit. We became believers when it converted breakfast from routine to remarkable.

Called Israel melon, it has the outside color of a pumpkin, webbed, scaly rind of a cantaloupe, the white meat and delicate, sweet taste of a honeydew melon. Some called it a cantaloupe. Although the name cantaloupe is loosely applied to several horticultural varieties, such as *Cantaloupensis*, which was first grown in Cantaloupe, Italy, the Israel melon probably falls under the general class of *Cucumis Melo*, or muskmelon.

As the County Extension office spokesperson said when I inquired about the name, "Whatever it's called, it's good to eat and maybe that is all we need to know." I agree.

Giving the fruit away by the

hundreds for several seasons now, Homer Josselet says his little sandy loam melon patch (covering much less than an acre) just re-seeds itself, and amazes even him with its bounty. It keeps on putting on melons the more he harvests.


Considering the size of the family tree, I figure that he could really mop up if he just sold exclusively to Josselets and Turnbows, but when asked if he ever sells this crop he said, "Heck no! It's too much fun to give it away." Jerry Josselet said she lost count when it got past several hundred. "But sometimes we nearly run out of people to give it to."

De Leon has its watermelon queen, Sweetwater has its rattlesnake queens, but for a lot of Haskell residents (such as I), Homer has to be the "Israel Melon King" just for the sheer volume of his melon crop and the volume of his generosity.

But being acclaimed Israel Melon King is not the only title Homer can boast (although he probably doesn't). The grandson of early pioneers Victor and Catherine Josselet, who settled in 1900 on the same land he farms north of Haskell, he lives near the site of a switching point which the Wichita Valley Railroad established and named after his grandfather in 1908 when it crossed his land. According to John Sam Rike III, Homer is the mayor of Josselet Switch.

Let's give His Honor a great big hand!

If the Lord loves a cheerful giver, He's got to love Homer Josselet.

What two major cities of Texas are farthest from each other? If you say El Paso and Texarkana, you're close but you get no cigar.

Although those two cities are 820 miles apart, that's a little less than the 860 miles between El Paso and Orange and the 834 miles between El Paso and Beaumont.

And Brownsville is farther from El Paso (812 miles) than it is from Amarillo (792 miles).

The longest straight line you can draw on a Texas map would run from Dallam County (Dalhart) in the northwest to the southern tip of Texas in Cameron County (Brownsville).

And in case anyone is interested, the major city farthest from Haskell would be Brownsville (575 miles).

Oklahoma schools will have a two-year moratorium on corporal punishment, after which results of the ban will be assessed.

School boards and administrators are being encouraged to identify new ways to discipline.

"I feel strongly about this issue," said State Supt. Sandy Garrett. "We should not use violence as a problem solver in our schools where violence itself is a growing problem. Corporal punishment merely reinforces the behavior we want to eliminate."

Garrett said modern classrooms are different from those where corporal punishment evolved as a once-standard means of discipline.

"We no longer insist that children sit rigidly in rows and absorb a teacher's lecture, and that if they don't they get swats," she said. "Today's students are apt to work in groups, to move from computer stations to desks to reading areas. Discipline remains important, but it should be discipline that holds a child accountable for his or her actions and relates to the problem it seeks to solve."

No surplus

Editor: At a press conference earlier this month, Comptroller John Sharp announced that the state will have a \$529 million positive cash balance by the end of this fiscal year. Almost before the end of the day, the fund balance became a "surplus." Just as quickly, Austin interest groups were dividing up the cash and lawmakers were crossing their fingers hoping the "extra money" was a sign Texas was past its biennial budget woes.

So is the \$529 million cash balance a sign that the state is out of the financial woods?

Hardly.

A cash balance is a long way from a budget surplus. The state's cash balance is like a checking account. The middle of the month may show extra money. But that balance does not always include incoming bills or checks outstanding.

Indeed, Comptroller Sharp's \$529 million balance is subject to some outstanding bills and restrictions that dramatically reduce the actual, unobligated size of the state's cash balance. \$77 million of the \$5209 million balance must be plowed back into the lottery. A one-percent state employee pay raise, certified by Sharp last month, restricts another \$46 million.

The fund balance total also

includes \$260 million in oil overcharge funds which are obligated by court order. Once these dedicated, obligated or restricted funds are subtracted, Texas is actually \$146 million in the black, not the \$529 million showing on the books.

By all accounts, \$146 million is still a healthy balance, but what does it really mean?

For one thing, it means Texas Legislators have already made tough choices--choices that have allowed the state to do a better job of managing its money. And that's especially true when Texas is compared to other states like California. But \$146 million is less than one percent of this state's \$60 billion two-year budget. And as for the 1994-95 budget, it can't make a lot of difference when compared to billions in projected state shortfalls due to ever-increasing demands in education and criminal justice spending.

That is not to say \$146 million won't help. It will. But it won't keep lawmakers, who return to Austin in January, from having to make more tough decisions about what other state services must be reduced or eliminated to keep Texas in the black.

Unemployment rate 4.4 percent

The unemployment rate in Haskell County in July was listed a 4.4 percent by the Texas Employment Commission.

The commission listed a Haskell County work force of 3,900, with 3,727 employed and 173 unemployed.

The unemployment rate locally contrasted with the 7.4 rate for the state as a whole.

Of the state's 27 Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) the lowest unemployment rates in July were Bryan-College Station with a rate of 3.9; Austin with 4.9, Amarillo with 5.3, San Angelo with 5.6 and Victoria with 6.1.

Highest unemployment was found the MSAs of McAllen-Edinburg-Mission (16.4), Brownsville-Harlingen (12.0) and El Paso (10.6).

Unemployment rates in counties bordering Haskell County included Baylor, 2.9; Knox, 3.0; Throckmorton, 3.5; Shackelford, 4.8; Jones, 6.1; and Stonewall, 11.3.

Millions served school lunches

For the 1991-92 school year, Texas public schools served a total of 334 million school lunches, along with 100 million breakfasts, making it the second largest school food service program in the nation.

Approximately 62 percent of the lunches and 89 percent of the breakfasts served daily are provided free or at a reduced price to low income students through the National School Lunch program and School Breakfast program. There are about 1.5 million students eligible to receive free or reduced price meals.

Eligibility requirements for free or reduced-price lunches are based on a sliding scale tied to household size and income. For example, during the 1992-93 school year, public school children in a family of four would qualify for free lunches if the family income is \$18,135 or less.

The same children would qualify for reduced price lunches if the family income is between \$18,136 and \$25,808.

Applications for free and reduced-price meals can be obtained the local school district.

A lunch eligible for reimbursement from the federal program must meet a meal pattern requirement and must provide one-third of the daily nutritional needs for a student.

It is comprised of two ounces of cooked lean meat or a meat alternate, milk, bread, and usually two vegetables or a fruit and a vegetable.

The meal pattern requirement for the breakfast program is milk, fruit or vegetable juice, or fruit or vegetables and a bread or meat

product. As often as practical and possible, an item that will yield protein, such as bacon, sausage or eggs, should be served.

According to John Perkins, director of child nutrition programs for the Texas Education Agency, the agency is working with local school districts to meet the new national dietary guidelines adopted in November 1991. "We are working with the local programs to improve the nutritional value of the foods served," Perkins said. "The districts have been very cooperative in working towards the new goals."

More than 95 percent, or 1,030 of the state's 1,057 school districts, participate in the lunch program and more than 94 percent, or 1,021 districts, participate in the breakfast program.

Approximately 5,800 schools operate the school lunch program and approximately 5,600 schools operate the breakfast program.

The School Lunch Act was enacted in 1946, making it one of

the oldest federal programs in existence. For the 1992-93 school year, officials have projected federal reimbursement in Texas to be at least \$500 million for the child nutrition programs.

Haskell Soil & Water Conservation District

The most important consideration of your gasoline or diesel storage tank location is how close it is to your water well.

State well regulations require that petroleum storage tanks be at least 100 feet from a water well. This minimum separation distance applies only to new well installations. Existing wells are required by law to meet separation requirements in effect at the time of well construction.

Even a small gasoline leak of one drop per second can release about 400 gallons of gasoline that has the potential of reaching the groundwater each year. A few quarts of gasoline or diesel in the groundwater may be enough to severely pollute a water well. At low levels of contamination, fuel contaminants in water cannot be detected by smell or taste.

Preventing tank leaks is especially important because of how rapidly gasoline and diesel can move through the soil into groundwater.

If your underground storage tank is more than 20 years old, especially if it's not protected against corrosion, the potential for leaking increases dramatically.

If you have an above ground tank, follow existing regulations for underground storage tanks as a guide.

For additional information on gasoline or diesel storage, contact the Seymour Aquifer Project, Soil Conservation Service at 864-3334 in Haskell or your county extension agent.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.


