Virtually every organization in the area, along with many church groups, have cooperated to make the annual event a success.

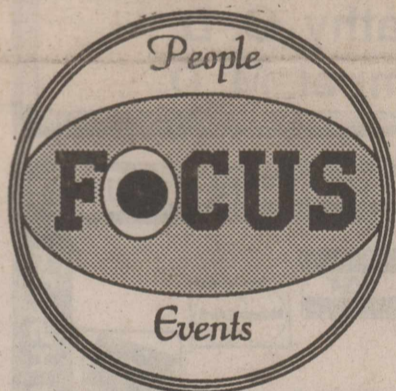
Clubs, organizations and church groups are invited to set up concession stands, games, and arts

4-H fashion show in Hamlin Saturday

Eight 4-H champions from Haskell County will model apparel they have created in the annual District Fashion Show Saturday at Hamlin High School.

Members from 4-H clubs in 21 counties will compete for honors and the right to represent their district in state competition next June in College Station.

Representing Haskell County will be Jennifer Comedy, senior; Amy Barbour, Shayne McKenzie and Nisha Patel, intermediates; and J. J. Comedy, Amanda Crawford, Kristin Cypert and Halee Walton, beginners.

Already these entrants have won in county competition. Contestants are judged on their sewing and construction skills, as well as overall appearance, quality of workmanship, wardrobe, coordination, appropriateness of care requirements, and use of comparison shopping techniques.

They will model their creations

in a public fashion show at 6:15 p.m. West Texas Utilities Company and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are the sponsors and WTU will host a luncheon for the 4-H participants.

Each senior contestant will compete in one of four categories in the construction division and four categories in the buying division: Casual, Dressy, Formal or Specialty Wear. Intermediate contestants will compete in the buying division in Casual, Dressy, Formal or Specialty Wear in the construction division.

Junior contestants will compete in the Popover Skirt, Dressy, Specialty or Casual Wear in the construction division or in the buying division. Special awards will be presented to the senior, intermediate and junior exhibiting the best cotton garment or ensemble and the one modeling the best wool or mohair outfit.

Some 85,000 Adopt-a-Highway and Keep Texas Beautiful volunteers around the state will unite Saturday for the eighth annual "Great Texas Trash-Off."

Several organizations in Haskell County will compete in the event, including the Weinert Homemakers Club, The Texas Chiefs Model Airplane Club and the Rule Lions Club. "We want to be a help in keeping our highways clean and do

our part to keep things going," said Ervin Frierson of the Texas Chiefs.

The event, sponsored by the Texas Department of Transportation in conjunction with the "Don't Mess with Texas" anti-litter program, is considered the largest one-day cleanup effort in the nation.

Haskell City Council unanimously adopted a resolution last Tuesday calling for a vote on a half-cent sales tax to promote economic development.

The proposition will be placed on the ballot for the May 1 city election.

School Board incumbents have opponents

Both incumbents seeking reelection to the Haskell School Board face opposition in the May 1 school election.

Danny Josselet is opposed by Nick Jimenez for position 1, and Roger Moeller is opposed by Lupe Guadalcazar for position 2.

A story in last week's Free Press erroneously reported that both Jimenez and Guadalcazar are opposing Josselet and that Moeller is unopposed.

For the first time, School Board candidates are running for particular positions, although they will continue to run at-large.

The Haskell Industrial Foundation, which requested the city to put the proposition to vote, informed the council that seven of every 10 dollars in sales taxes collected in Haskell are paid by those living outside the city limits.

If the sales tax proposition is passed, funds will be administered by an Economic Development Board which will be appointed by the council. It is estimated the tax would produce \$70,000 per year.

Proceeds could be used for such things as acquisition of land, buildings and equipment for industrial purposes; a small business revolving loan program; business incubator programs; venture capital; and creation of a reserve fund for infrastructure.

Prohibited uses would include

transportation facilities; sewage or solid waste disposal facilities; air or water pollution control facilities for furnishing water to the general public unless such facilities benefit property acquired for development purposes; more than 10 percent for promotional purposes.

The city sales tax rate presently is 1.5 cents, including a half-cent tax which reduces property taxes. In addition, the state sales tax is 6.25 cents, making a total local rate of 7.75.

This will be the third time the economic development tax has been voted on by Haskell voters. It failed narrowly in a May 4, 1991 election and then again last year by a wider margin.

Among the candidates are the three incumbents--Iva Lee Gipson, Kenny Watson and Tony Burson.

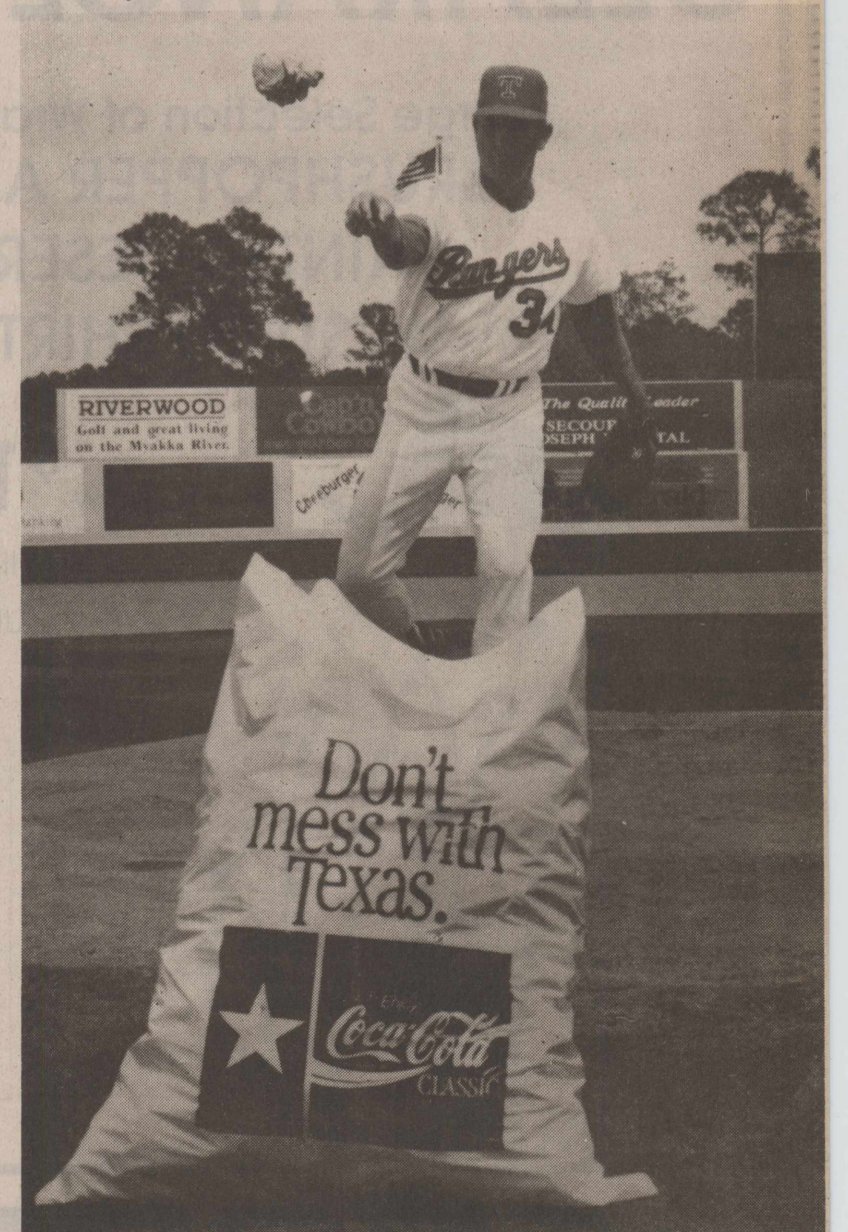

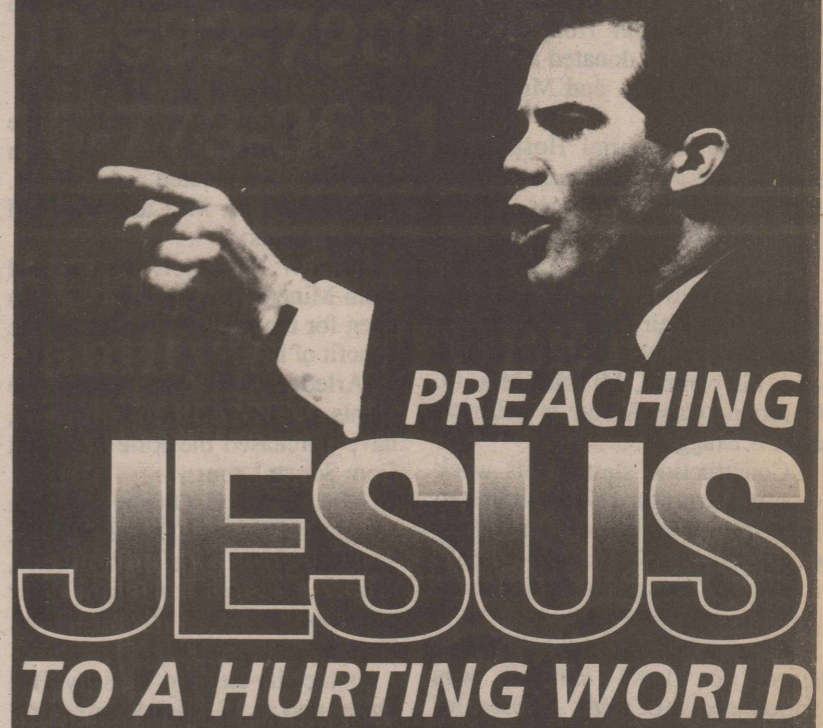

Adult Acne: More adults today are having acne breakouts. Doctors point to increased stress, which triggers the production of testosterone that stimulates the oil glands. Antibiotics are the first line of treatment to reduce bacteria, but retin-A also is prescribed for its pore wall strengthening ability. Estrogen, spironolactone, and prednisone all can reduce testosterone production. Finally, stresscoping strategies may be of some help.

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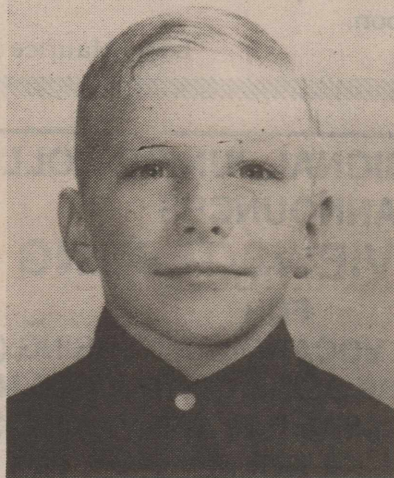
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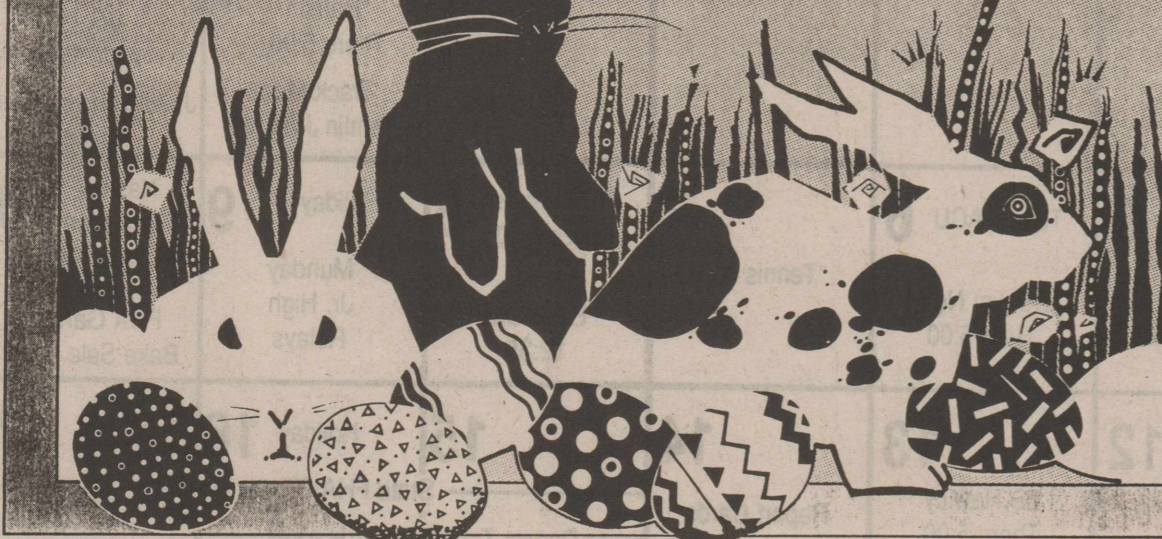

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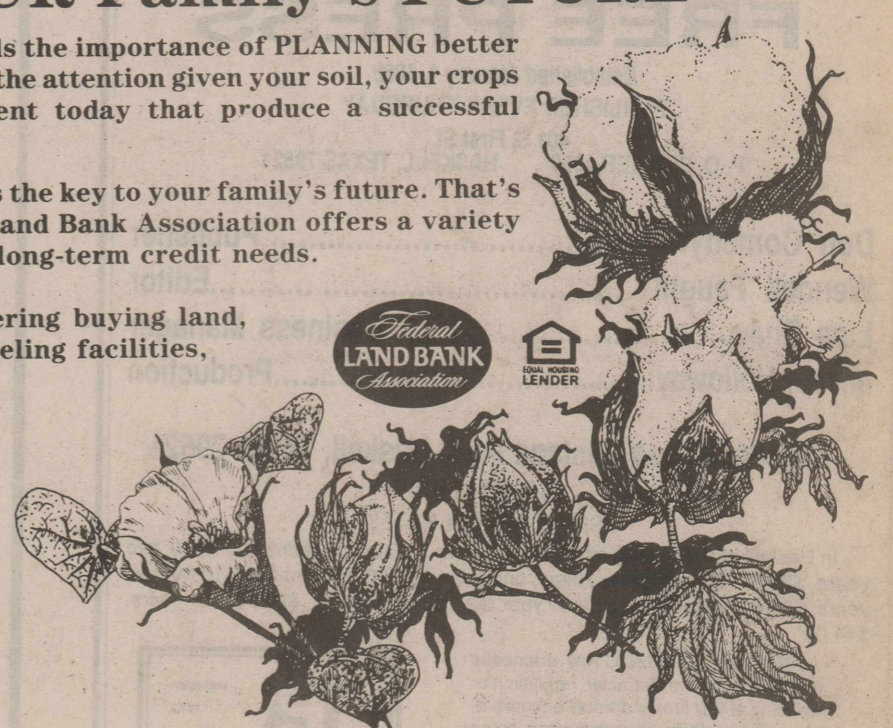
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Maidens take second in Aspermont meet

The Indians accumulated 92 1/3 points to finish behind Bangs (128 points) and Albany (114) in Division IV of the meet.

Gonzales got his first place in the 400-meter dash, clicking off the quarter in 53.4 seconds. Collins first-place finish came in the triple jump with a distance of 38-7.

The winning 1600-meter relay team was clocked at 3:39.2. Making up the team were Buckley Harvey, Casey Coleman, Quentin Billington and Gonzales.

Coleman took second behind Gonzales in the 400 with a time of 54.0, and behind him in third place was Billington (54.1). Also taking second was Robert Huff in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:06.2.

The Indians' 400-meter relay team came in fourth with a time of 47.04. Team members were Robert Johnson, Jonathan Tatum, Gonzales and Cody Josselet.

Frankie Masias won two fourth places, in the 3200 (11:34.3) and in the 1600 (5:06.6), and Patrick Billington had a fourth in the discus (134-4).

Winning fifth places were Josselet in the 100-meter dash (11.79), Huff in the 1600 (5:08.5), Deon Walker in the shot put (40-8), Collins in the long jump (17-8) and Michael Salinas in the triple jump

Greenbug survey conducted

Greenbug surveys were conducted March 18 in seven wheat fields in Haskell County.

Random counts were made in dryland drilled wheat, irrigated and volunteer wheat.

From 0 to 10 greenbugs were found per row foot in 6-10" dryland and volunteer wheat along with a few oat bird cherry aphids. These type of aphids are dark green with a reddish-orange spot at the rear end of the body.

Beneficial insects included lady beetles, both adults and larvae. Small shiny black parasitic wasps were also found in many fields checked.

Information in the following table may serve as a general guide in determining the need for treatment:

Plant Height (Inches)	No. Greenbugs Per Linear foot
3-6	100-300
4-8	200-400
6-16	300-800

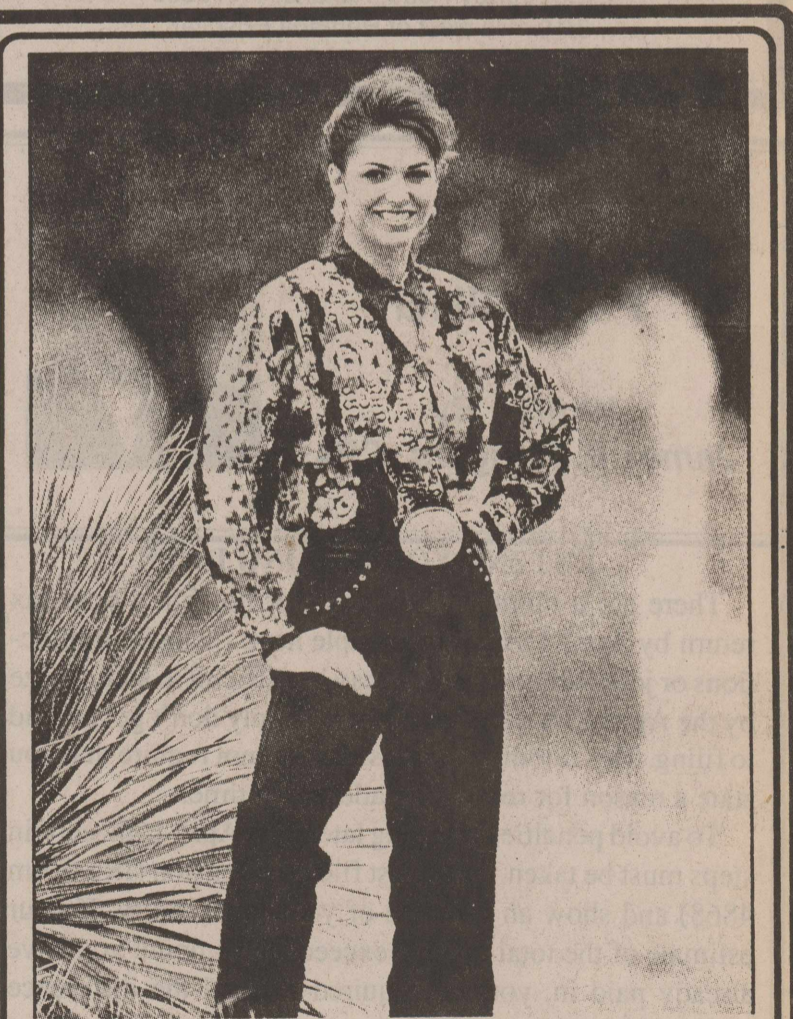
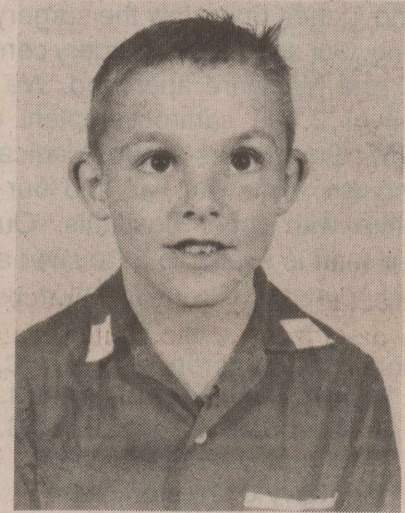

TAX PLANNING

EXTEND YOUR FILING DATE

There are a number of reasons for not filing your tax return by April 15th. Some people have financial transactions or joint ventures which may be difficult to summarize by the April 15th deadline. Others simply don't get around to filing. The automatic extension does not require that you state a reason for requesting additional time.

To avoid penalties for filing later than April 15th, certain steps must be taken. You must file an extension (IRS Form 4868) and show an estimate of your tax liability. If your estimate of the total tax due exceeds the amount you have already paid in, you are required to send the difference along with your extension request. If your tax estimate on the extension request is less than the tax on your final return, you may be subject to penalties.

The automatic extension period is from April 15th to August 15th (August 16th this year because the 15th falls on a Sunday). Additional time may be obtained by filing a request for further extension. This second extension requires that you state the reason for the delay.

If you are a U.S. citizen living abroad, you have until June 15th to file your return. This does not require the filing of an extension form. When you file your tax return, you attach a statement showing that you qualified for the extension. This two-month extension does not apply to taxpayers who are just traveling outside the U.S. on April 15th.
