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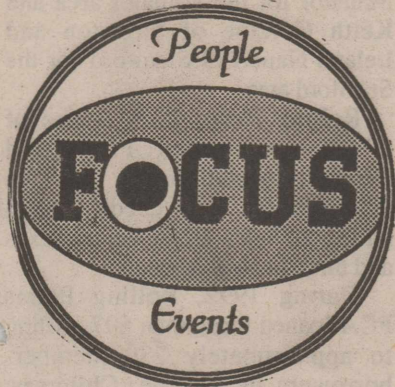

## Granado receives 25-year sentence

Benino Granado was sentenced to 25 years in prison Monday morning after pleading guilty to a charge of murder with an affirmative finding of a deadly weapon. His guilty plea came just before a jury was to be empaneled for a trial in district court.

The 30-year-old Haskell man was charged with the July 3 fatal shooting of Fermin Cruz O'Con, 29.

# Youngsters register for Bicycle Rodeo

Registration is now underway for a Bicycle Safety Rodeo for Haskell youngsters, sponsored by State Farm Insurance and the Haskell Lions Club.

Children are being given registration forms through the school and must be registered by May 7. The course will be held from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on May 22 in the Haskell High School parking lot.

Enrollment will be limited to 150 children.

State Farm Insurance has developed the bicycle skills course for use with kindergarten through sixth-grade students.

Children will bring their bikes (no training wheels) and bike helmets for a bicycle inspection, a bike safety video and an obstacle course. They are tested on mounting and dismounting, straight line control, weaving and maneuvering, short radius turning, breaking, slow speed control, circling and changing direction.

# Indian baseball team in thick of district race

Slowly, but surely, the Haskell Indian baseball team has climbed into the thick of the district 7-2A baseball race.

Going into this Tuesday's game with Hawley here, the Indians boasted a 4-2 district record, good enough for second place behind Rotan (5-0) in the district standings. Haskell will then complete the first half of the district schedule with another home game against Winters Thursday. The Indians will be at Hawley next Tuesday for the first game of the second half.

The Indians opened district play back on March 9 when they lost, 5-2, to Stamford. That game came just one day after several players joined the team following an extended basketball season.

A week later, Haskell beat that same Stamford team, 18-8. This was followed by victories over Hawley, 24-1, and Anson, 11-4. Then the Indians dropped their second district game to unbeaten Rotan, an 11-8 decision in eight innings. Last Friday, the Indians measured Hamlin, 3-0.

Haskell, which boasts a team batting average of .311, is led by pitcher-first baseman Brian Brzozowski, whose 11 hits in 21 at-bats gives him a .524 average. Included in his statistics are five doubles, a triple, a homerun and 12 runs batted in. As a pitcher, Brzozowski is 2-1 in district.

Catcher Chucky Castillo and second-baseman Casey Larned each is batting .412, while pitcher-first baseman Shannon Meeks has a

.300 batting average and also is 2-1 on the mound.

Other starters and their batting averages are left fielder Chris Silvas, .273; shortstop Cody Cypert, .235; third baseman Stacy Walker, .222; right fielder Eddy Gonzales, .167; and center fielder Jonathan Tatum, .077.

Other members of the squad are Shawn Sanford, Joseph Rodriguez, Matt Perry, Patrick Billington and Mart Guess.

Unlike basketball play, the district race in baseball is not divided into halves. The team with the best record against league opponents in the round robin will be the champion. The champion and runnerup will advance to the playoffs.

Rolling Plains Production Credit Association's 59th annual stockholders meeting will be Thursday evening, April 15, in Childress and Friday evening, April 16, in Stamford. Registration and the meal will begin at 6 p.m. at both sessions. A short business session will follow.

The City Auditorium will be the site of the Childress session and the high school cafeteria will be the Stamford meeting location.

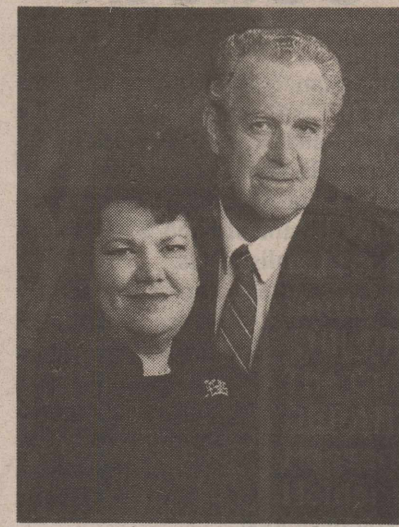

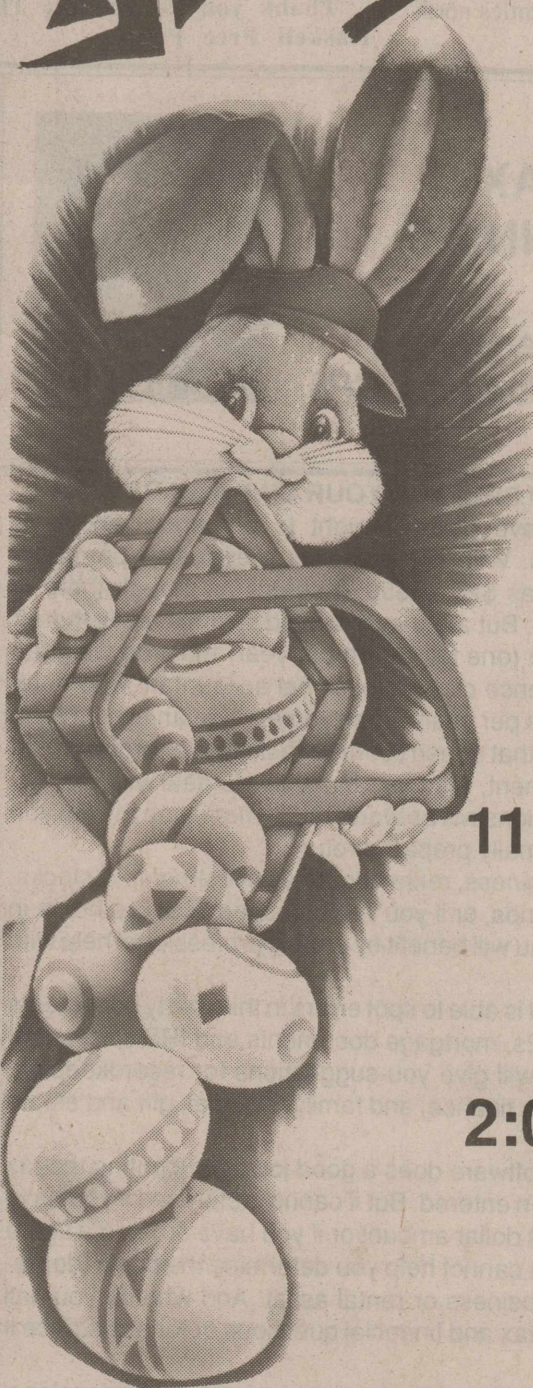

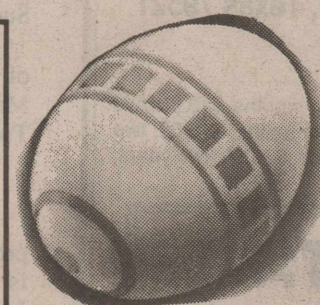

# Army increases money for college

The Army has increased to \$30,000 the maximum amount of money for college available to qualified applicants who enlist for the new Army College Fund, or ACF, according to Lt. Col Brad Beasley, Army recruiting commander for New Mexico and West Texas.

The substantial boost from the previous maximum of \$25,200 for a four-year enlistment was initiated by Congress to restore the fund's buying power to its original fiscal year 1985 level, Beasley said.

Annual college costs have been rising since the start of the ACF program in 1985. A year of college then was about \$5,000 for public colleges and nearly \$10,000 for private institutions. Currently, a year of public college costs about \$6,300 while a private institution costs about \$16,300, and by 1995 these expenses are expected to jump to \$11,000 and \$23,700 respectively.

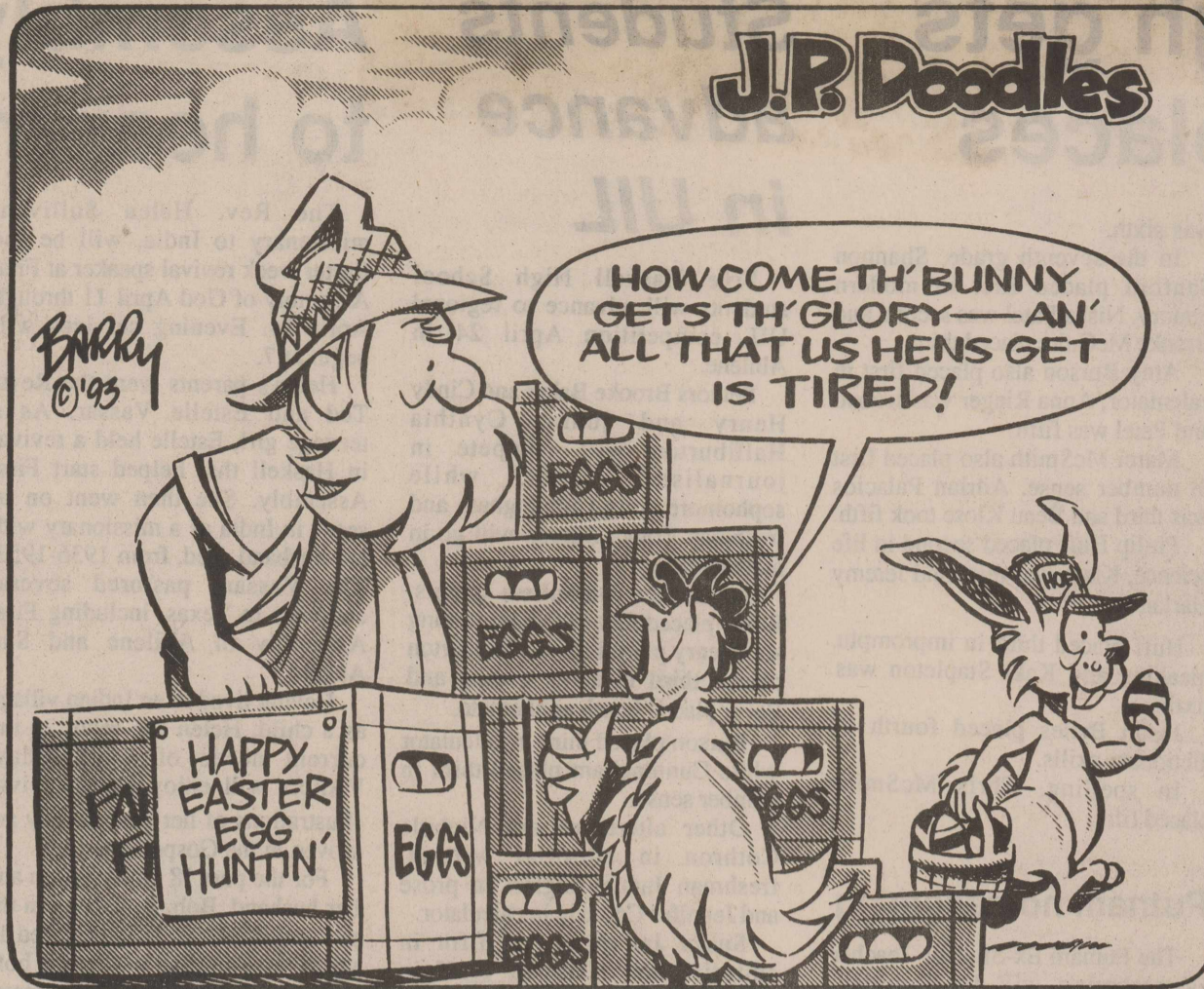
The \$30,000 ACF amount is a special incentive which is created by combining \$13,200 from the

Montgomery GI Bill with a one-time \$1,200 contribution from the soldier and \$15,600 provided by the Army. Similar increases have been made to provide \$25,000 for three-year enlistments and \$20,000 for two-year enlistments.

A soldier who successfully completes a four-year enlistment with the money for college option would have \$833 a month for each of four years of college, based on a nine-month academic year. The money may be used at any school approved by the Veterans Administration.

To qualify for the new Army College Fund amounts, applicants must have a high school diploma and score at least 50 on the entrance aptitude test. They must also enlist in a designated critical job skill, have no prior military service, and meet the normal enlistment eligibility requirements.

When it comes to the risks they take, Texans differ from the U.S. population.

They are more likely to drive after drinking (5 percent of Texans, compared to 2 percent nationally) but also are more likely to use their seat belts (95 percent, compared to 88 percent nationally).

Texans are only slightly less likely to be smokers (22 percent vs. 23 percent), but dramatically more of them lack health insurance (22 percent, compared to 15 percent nationally). Many Texans (15 percent) say they can't afford medical care.

These facts are contained in the Texas Department of Health's annual Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance report.

Of the 1,499 respondents to a 1991 questionnaire, about one fourth were overweight, and more than half had sedentary lifestyles, both of which increase risk of heart disease.

An accountant's judgment, wisdom, and ability to deal with the IRS and all of its regulations will be worth much more than the fee you pay for a professionally prepared return.

If you have a business, rental property, investments in stocks, bonds or mutual funds, or if you've purchased or sold a home in the current year, you will benefit by getting professional help with tax preparation.

Your accountant is able to spot errors in third party documents such as 1099s, W2s, mortgage documents and IRS correspondence. He or she will give you suggestions for recordkeeping, home and business finance, and family financial, gift and estate planning.

Computer tax software does a good job of computing the tax from the information entered. But it cannot determine if you have entered the correct dollar amount or if you have entered a figure in the wrong box. 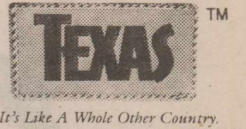

**Balloons to Treat Enlarged Prostates:** Transurethral resection of the prostate (TURP) to relieve pressure on the urethra is a common procedure, but an alternative may be balloon dilation of the prostate (BDP). A catheter is inserted into the urethra, and a balloon is inflated to stretch the urethra and compress the prostate. However, longer-term studies have shown that the beneficial effects of BDP do not last much beyond a year, and the best candidates are younger men with mild prostate enlargement.

## Fruits: A natural sweet

### 4th in a Series

Fruits, often called nature's sweet, are an important part of a healthy diet. According to surveys, most people eat fresh fruit for snacks; and the banana is the most popular fruit in America, followed by apples and seedless grapes.

The USDA Food Guide Pyramid recommends two to four servings of fruit each day. For most, that's easy to do because fruit is so popular and makes such a handy snack when eaten fresh. Because it's also naturally sweet, it can serve as a dessert, substituting for higher fat and calorie-laden desserts.

Fruit gives a quick source of energy in the form of carbohydrate. Fruits and fruit juices also provide important amounts of vitamins A and C and potassium. They are low in fat and sodium. Some fruits provide a good amount of fiber, including apples, berries, figs, pears, peaches and prunes.

Serving sizes are important when interpreting the Food Guide recommendations. A serving size is a particular amount of a food, not just the number of times it is eaten per day. For example, a serving size of fruit would be a small to medium orange or banana, or half of a large banana; one-half cup chopped, cooked or canned fruit; and three-fourths cup juice. When selecting juices, only 100 percent fruit juice products are considered a serving. Other products such as fruit punches, ades or sodas contain only a little juice and added sugar. Fruit jellos also do not qualify.

Other tips for including fruits in the diet follow:

¶ Include many forms. Choose fresh fruit, fruit juice or frozen, canned or dried fruit. Go easy on fruit canned or frozen in syrup or sugar. Read the labels for content.

¶ Include whole fruits. They are

higher in fiber than fruit juices.

¶ Include citrus fruits, melons and berries because they are rich in vitamin C. Vitamin C is needed each day because the body does not store it.

¶ Always wash fresh fruits before preparing or eating to remove any surface dirt, residue or bacteria.

Capitalize on the richness and versatility of fruits by including them in meals and snacks. For more information on specific fruits, contact Lou Gilly, Haskell County extension agent/home economics.

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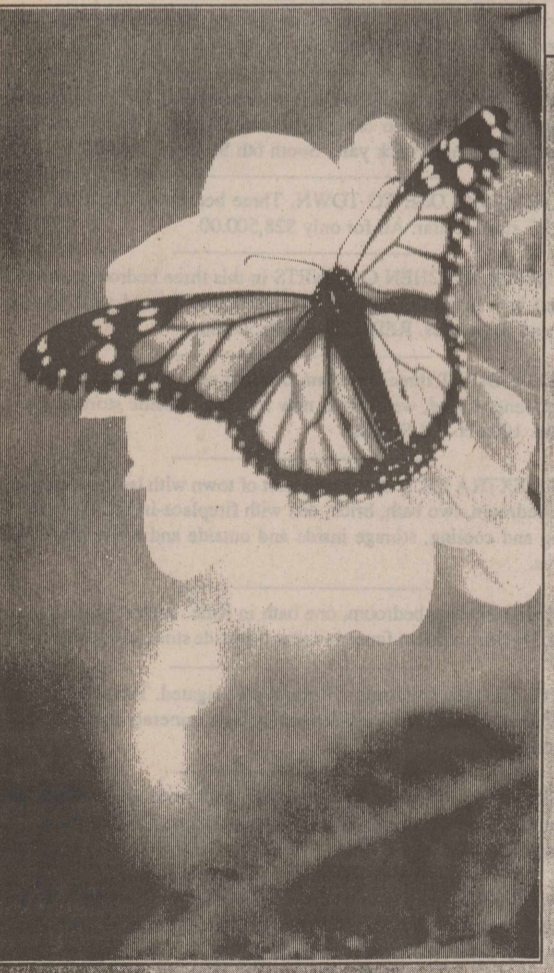
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# EASTER
