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

Superintendent discusses amendments

On Saturday, May 1, you and I have some important decisions to make. I am not going to tell you how to vote, but simply give you the facts as I see them.

No one is sure exactly how schools will be affected if the propositions do not pass. I believe either way that your and my taxes will eventually go up. It has become quite clear that the Legislature is not really serious about solving the school funding issue, and they have continued to

pass more and more of the school funding requirements on to you and me as taxpayers.

There are several things which could occur if Proposition 1 fails. They are as follows: 1) Schools could close, 2) Massive school consolidation, 3) State income tax.

Looking at these possibilities, Proposition 1 is probably the lesser of two evils. Personally, I will probably vote for Proposition 1, even though it angers me greatly that our so-called trusted elected officials put us in this position in the first place, and I have little confidence they will rally promptly

to solve the problem.

Proposition 2 will probably help schools more than the other two propositions. It does put some hold on the Legislature in terms of passing laws which make us, at the schools, spend considerable amounts of money and then not funding the mandates or laws. Proposition 2 is a step forward in the fact that it begins to put, in the future, the burden of funding back on the Legislature. I can, without too much reserve, support Proposition 2.

I have a great deal of trouble supporting Proposition 3. The

taxpayers in Haskell CISD have been very tolerant of all the renovation and expansion necessary to make our district what we want it to be. We are basically through with major construction and it is all debt free, thanks to our gracious

Proposition 3 will allow the sale of \$750 million in revenue bonds to loan schools for construction projects. However, the school probably will not pay the money back fully. This means that you and I as taxpayers will do so. As far as I am concerned, we paid for our renovation and construction of our

facilities, and so can the other districts.

I hope this information and opinion will help you decide for yourself how to vote. If you have questions or want more information concerning the propositions please call me at 864-2602 or come by. I will gladly give you the information I have.

Whatever happens, thank you all for supporting our school and for putting our school children first. Our legislators seem to have forgotten that their children and grandchildren go to school also.

Early voting by personal appearance opened Monday for the three separate elections to be held May 1. The early voting period will remain open through April 27.

Early voters may cast ballots in city, school and state elections.

SCHOOL ELECTION

Those voting early in the School Board election may cast ballots between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. at the school administration office.

There are two candidates for each of two positions to be decided: Incumbent Danny Josselet and Nick Jiminez are candidates for position 1, and incumbent Roger Moeller and Lupe Guadalcazar are candidates for position 2.

CITY ELECTION

Early voters may cast ballots between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at City Hall.

There are 11 candidates for three City Council positions. Candidates include three incumbents, Iva Lee Gipson, Kenny Watson and Tony Burson, along with Todd Barnes, Marvin Letz, Tim Larned, David Davis, Mary Lowe, Kay Bagot, Gaston Tidrow and Jerry Stocks.

In addition, Haskell voters will vote "Yes" or "No" on a proposed half-cent sales tax to be earmarked for industrial development.

STATE ELECTION

Early voters may cast ballots for U.S. Senator and for or against three proposed constitutional amendments between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at the county clerk's office in the courthouse. (Applications for absentee voting by mail must be received by April 23 and returned prior to the election.)

There are 24 candidates for U.S. Senator in this special election for the unexpired terms of Lloyd Bentsen who resigned to become Secretary of Treasurer.

Robert (Bob) Krueger, Democrat, who was appointed by the Governor to serve until the election, is among the candidates. Others are:

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
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

commonly called "flags." The Greeks called them rainbows. They are the royal flower of France. They are grown worldwide and require easy care. The soils should be slightly damp, fed and fertilized.

Molly Carlisle gave new ideas for using roses in the garden. Use rose hedges for spectacular landscaping. "True" roses come back from their own roots, rather than a graft. They are easily cared for and disease resistant. Tree roses may be planted in pots and they are a "showy accent specimen." Floribundas grow well in "whiskey barrels." For small areas, miniature roses are compact and very pretty. Climbing roses required support and should be cut back after blooming.



City sales tax rebate takes dip

The City of Haskell saw its sales tax rebate check from the state comptroller take a dip this month, but the city is still ahead of last year's pace.

The check received this month was in the amount of \$14,136,05, which is 7.27 percent less than last year's check of \$15,243.94 for the same period.

But for the four months so far this year, Haskell has received rebates totaling \$73,901.47, or 4.46 percent more than the \$70,746.54 received in January, February, March and April of 1992.

Haskell's decrease followed a

statewide trend. This month's rebate was from sales taxes collected on February sales and reported to the comptroller in March by businesses filing monthly returns.

Rule's rebate this month was \$1,453.55 and Rochester received \$761.07. Neither O'Brien or Weinert received a check this month.

For the four months of 1993. the five cities of Haskell County have received \$84,595.75 in sales tax rebates. Last year's rebates for the same period totaled \$81,682.05.

Haskell's rebate is based on a 1.5-percent local tax.

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Green Thumb-

By Gladys O'Neal Haskell Garden Club

April is vine month: plant vines. Plant caladiums and elephant ears where they will not be exposed to hot afternoon sun. Remember they need watering, almost every day during the summer. Lilacs need a feeding of superphosphate with a little lime.

The irises are beginning to bloom, and they are so beautiful. Shallow cultivation is necessary as irises are a very shallow-rooted plant. Keep well weeded and remove leaves that have been diseased with leaf spot. When they case to bloom, the green leaves are a source of plant food and the production of flower buds for next season's blooms. Do not over-water, heavy wet soil, old crowded plants, and the presence of bores may cause the development of root-rot.

Commercial fertilizers recommended for our area are 16-20-0 instant Vigoro, 10-10-5 and 6-10-4. Plants need nitrogen for growth and color, phosphorus for root development, maturity, fruit and flowers; potash for strength and vigor. The first numeral in a commercial fertilizer designates the nitrogen, the second the phosphate, and the last the potash. Our area needs more nitrogen, most phosphorus and least potash.

Now many plants can be put directly in the soil, some for this area are zinnias, cosmos, marigolds, sunflowers and morning glories.

When you are hanging baskets for spring and summer, consider different kinds of flowers or foliage to give variety in color, texture and form. For example, narrow leaf zinnia, white petunias make an attractive color combination; also purple-leafed jew and ageratum, or ornamental kale and sweet alyssum are nice.

Cannas, dahlias, gladioli and tuberoses can be set out now.

After Easter lilies fade, plant the bulbs in a sunny, well-drained spot. Let the foliage remain all summer; then cut it back with the perennials as they die next fall. The probably won't bloom next year for Easter, but should bloom by late spring or early summer. (Mine did bloom, but I was surprised.)

Some time this April or May, you may find your perennial flowers are doing well, and you'll have an excess of nice plants. That's the time to share a cardboard box full of some of those plants for your friend or new neighbor who just moved in down the street. Some people think that well-kept stone walls and fences make good neighbors. But I belive sharing perennial flowers do an even better job. "Enjoy and Share!"

HOME IMPROVEMENTS, REPAIRS, AND TAXES

Generally, the costs of improvements and repairs to your home yield no current tax benefit. But such costs can reduce the amount of gain which could be taxable when you sell your home.

What is the difference between an improvement and a repair? An "improvement" prolongs the life of your home or adds to its value. The costs of improvements are added to the basis (tax cost) of your home, thus reducing any potentially taxable gain if you sell. A "repair" serves merely to maintain your home in operating condition and is not added to the basis of your home.

Examples of improvements include substantial landscaping, installation of central air conditioning, remodelling the kitchen, or installing fire or burglar alarms. Painting, cleaning the furnace, refinishing floors, and filling cracks in the driveway are typical repairs.

Repairs, or "fix-up" expenses, provide a tax benefit to you only if the expenses are incurred in connection with the sale of your home. Such expenses reduce the amount which you must reinvest in a new home in order to defer the recognition of any gain from the sale of your old home.

If you have deferred gains on the sales of prior homes, you should keep good records of improvements to every home in order to verify the basis of your present home. Good records are necessary because the basis of each home you buy is reduced by the amount of gain deferred on the sale of the prior home. The IRS may ask you to document your basis in a home sold many years before to
