The meeting will begin at 7:30 at the Masonic Lodge and is open to the public. Refreshments will be served.



by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents to receive the organization's Distinguished Service award.

The highly prestigious award, the highest given by the organization, is awarded annually to less than 3 percent of the agricultural agents in the nation.

Neinast will officially receive his award at the NACAA annual meeting in Baltimore, Md., during the week of Aug. 22-26. He also will be recognized, along with the six other Texas recipients, at the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association annual meeting in Galveston Aug. 1-4.

Neinast began his career with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service as an assistant agricultural agent in Bowie County in 1971. Two years later he was promoted to county extension agent-agriculture and placed in charge of the 1890

Extension program in Bowie County. The 1890 program is a federally funded program designed to assist small farmers and ranchers who don't always have access to financial resources and necessary technical skills to develop a profitable farming and ranching operation.

In 1976, Neinast was named county extension agent for Rains County. During his tenure in Rains County, he has provided leadership to the annual county fair. Under his leadership, additional acreage has been added to the fairgrounds and numerous improvements have been completed. He is probably best known during the county fair for his tasty barbecue which he personally prepares over hickory wood to be served in the 4-H concession stand.

## Free soil testing available

The Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are sponsoring free soil tests for producers in the Seymour Aquifer Water Quality Project July 25 through Aug. 14.

Soil sample bags and information sheets can be picked up at the local SCS, ASCS or county Extension Service offices in Haskell and Knox counties.

Sample bags also are available at Benjamin Fertilizer and Terra in Knox City; Allison Farm Supply in Rule; Zeissel Brothers Fertilizer, Quality Implement, Parker Implement, Farmers Grain Co-op and Knox Prairie Co-op in Munday; Farmers Gin and Home State Bank in Rochester; and at O'Brien Co-op Gin and Rhineland Co-op Gin.

Soil samples may be returned to any of the participating businesses, the SCS or Extension Service. Results will be mailed to the producer.

Each soil sample will be tested for nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, calcium, magnesium, sodium, sulfur, salinity and pH.

Participants should write their name and sample number on both the sample bag and the information sheet. The type of crop to be grown and expected yield also are needed on the information sheet.

In addition to the free soil test program, the Seymour Aquifer Project gives free water tests. The water sample will be tested for nitrates. Water samples can be left at the Soil Conservation Service offices in Knox City and Haskell.

Irrigation water, as well as drinking water, should be tested annually for nitrates. High nitrates in drinking water can be a health risk and encourage growth of algae and other organisms which may produce undesirable tastes and odors in water.

Nitrate levels in irrigation water can be credited as fertilizer for crop production.

## City targets 34 blocks for seal coating

The Haskell City Council last week approved 34 city blocks of city streets for seal-coating.

They include:

•North Avenue C from North 1st Street to North 11th Street (11 blocks),

•North 5th Street from Avenue E to Avenue H (3 blocks),

•North 4th Street from Avenue E to Avenue H (3 blocks),

•North 3rd Street from Avenue E to Avenue H (3 blocks),

•North 2nd Street from Avenue D to Avenue H (4 blocks),

•South 3rd Street from Avenue D to Avenue H (4 blocks),

•South 4th Street from Avenue D to Avenue E (1 block), and

•South Avenue F from South 2nd Street to South 6th Street (5 blocks).

The city will advertise for bids on the paving project, which should be completed in August or early September.

Approval of the streets to be seal-coated came during the regular monthly meeting of the council.

The council also approved temporary salary increases for the three office employees, as recommended by Mayor Pat Henry.

City secretary Ann Young, who is fulfilling the duties of the vacant city administrator's position, will receive a \$250-per-month salary increase. Loretta Gray was granted a \$150-per-month raise and Andrea Kinzy will get a \$100 boost.

The council voted to vacate a portion of North 2nd Street at the request of attorney Art Williams, representing Ervin Unger, who has maintained the abandoned street for several years.

Council members also heard a report from a representative from Harmon Cable who said his company is interested in beginning negotiations for a new 10-year franchise. He explained that the present franchise agreement expires in 1995 and the company is interested in starting negotiations so it can carry on with plans to upgrade the system in 1995.

Mrs. Brown succeeds Roy T. (Buck) Everett, who died July 13.

Her appointment is until the November 1994 general election.





"And by the way---also in the story I said the animals were kept in a shed approximately 10' by 15". It was supposed to be 10' by 15'.

"Also, Sheriff Overstreet pointed out to me that the rodeo picture on the front page was of team roping instead of breakaway roping. You can just guess which one I put.

"I called Mrs. Galloway of Lockney to apologize and she said she wasn't too worried about it. She said, 'Anyone who knows us will know that there has been a mistake. We only have two dogs and they are treated better than me.'

We oblige: The state FFA convention meeting here is more than a generator of money for the local economy. It's also a chance to see first-hand what's right with American young people.




