career as weather observer

By Jerry F. Wolfe National Weather Service The National Weather Service was charged by Congress to record and maintain climate data of the United States.

The genesis of organized weather reporting and archiving the information was Feb. 2, 1870, when Congress passed a resolution directing the Secretary of War "to provide for taking meteorological observations at the military stations in the United States and Territories."

The resolution was signed into law on Feb. 9, 1870, by President Ulysses S. Grant. The new agency was called the Division of Telegrams and Reports for the Benefit of Commerce, formed under the Signal Service.

This agency was frequently called the general weather service of the United States National Weather Service. This was later formed as the Weather Bureau and finally the National Weather Service.

Documented weather records for Haskell began in 1890 by Judge P. D. Sanders and are still continuing. Sam (Samuel P.) Herren started

taking observations in 1941 and continued as the official weather observer for Haskell for more than 51 years, more than half a century of data. Until his health failed, he was noted as one of the most dependable and reliable observers by the National Weather Service.

For his many years of unselfish and diligent efforts the National Weather Service presented Sam with the John Campanius award in 1977, the Thomas Jefferson award in 1983 and the Ed Stoll award for 50 years of service in 1991.


The National Weather Service provided a walnut plaque with inscriptions for over 100 years of data for Haskell.

Sam Herren was to present the

award to the City of Haskell; however his health failed and he passed away March 27. Thus, the award was presented to the Haskell Chamber of Commerce last Tuesday by his wife, Ernestine Herren

The Ed Stoll 50-year award was named for Mr. Stoll upon the completion of more than 75 years as a volunteer observer on his Nebraska farm. When President Jimmy Carter asked Mr. Stoll why he did this for over 75 years, he replied, "We should do a public service to help pay the rent for occupying our space in this country. I've just been paying my rent.'

Sam Herren paid his rent in Haskell.

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

Mrs. Sanders read the minutes, the treasurer's report was given and Estalynn Liles gave the council report.







Last year, 243 individuals from Haskell County were served by Rehab outpatient facilities. With average treatment costs estimated at \$769 per patient, Haskell County residents received approximately \$186,867 worth of care.


"Even if you've already visited the center in the past, the recent expansion/renovations in physical therapy, industrial rehabilitation, the shop and the addition of a covered entrance are something exciting to see," Snowden added.

WTRC board members and staff will be available to assist with tours, answer questions and visit with those in attendance.

An encore presentation of Rehab's television special, "How Far Is Tomorrow?" also is slated to air on Abilene's KTXS-TV from 1 to 2 p.m. and KRBC-TV from 2 to 3 p.m. on Sunday. Featuring original script and songs by Denton writer Donna Trammell, the production focuses on the development of West Texas and ultimately WTRC.

The Rehab Center opened in temporary quarters in Abilene in 1953 and moved two years later into its first permanent building which today serves as the corporate offices. A second facility opened in San Angelo in 1977 following a merger of WTRC and the West Texas Therapy Center. San Angelo's present facility opened its doors in 1982.



KNOW THE ESTIMATED TAX RULES AND AVOID A PENALTY

It hurts to pay taxes, but tax penalties hurt even more. The penalty for underpayment of estimated tax can be especially painful since it's often quite easy to avoid.

To keep from being slapped with an underpayment penalty, you generally must prepay at least 90% of your current-year liability. Many taxpayers can also avoid a penalty by paying at least 100% of their prioryear tax liability during the current year. Under either method, required payments and tax liabilities are measured quarterly.

Most employees prepay their taxes through payroll withholding. But if you have substantial income that isn't subject to withholding (such as dividends and interest), or have more than one job, your regular withholding may not be enough.

If it looks like you're headed for an underpayment penalty, consider asking your employer to withhold more from your remaining 1993 paychecks. Besides eliminating future underpayment, additional withholding can eliminate an underpayment that occurred earlier in the year. That's because the IRS treats withholding as being paid equally throughout the year, even if you make larger payments at year-end.

If you have too much income not subject to withholding, you are required to pay your 1993 income tax liability by making quarterly estimated tax payments. Remaining due dates for 1993 are September 15 (for the third quarter estimate payment) and January 18, 1994 (for the fourth quarter estimate).

If you paid less than required for a previous quarter, and your income isn't subject to withholding, consider making a catch-up estimate payment. Unlike withholding, an estimated tax payment can't eliminate an underpayment that's already occurred, but it can keep the penalty from getting any larger. You can make a catch-up payment immediately, or include it with your quarterly estimate.

The new two-sided footballbasketball calendars were displayed. Distribution to advertisers will begin this week.


An inner-squad scrimmage will be held at 9 a.m. Saturday at the football field.


On Aug. 6, the family of Connie Belle Liles helped her celebrate her 80th birthday with a delicious meal at the Cliff House.



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



This notice concerns 1993 property tax rates for Haskell County. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's *effective* tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's *rollback* tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.
