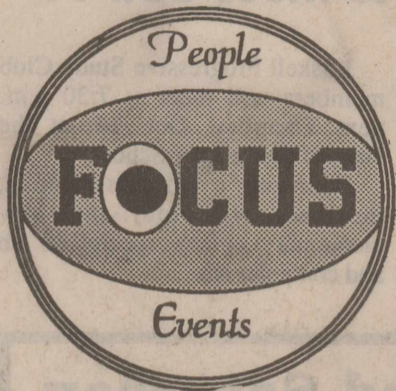
Chamber greets new businesses

Stewart re-elected to state committee

Indians seek 7-2A victory at Hawley

The Haskell Indians hope to get back on the winning track at Hawley Friday night when they take on the host Bearcats in a district 7-2A contest.

And if the real Indians show up for the contest, they should be able to do just that. Hawley, winless in five games, including two district contests, was crushed by Hamlin, 67-6, last week.

But the Indians, who have tied two of their last three games and lost the other since opening the season with two impressive victories, have learned not to take any opponent lightly.

Coach Walter Hargrove warns that the Bearcats could be a formidable foe for his team. Several injuries have kept them from reaching their potential.

The Bearcats' offense is led by a trio of experienced seniors, quarterback Willie Walker, 175, and running backs Kevin Leathers, 190, and Corey Chitum, 160. Walker, who started the season as a tackle, was moved to quarterback a week ago when the regular quarterback was injured.

Following last Friday's 0-0 tie with Winters, the Indians stand 2-1-2 for the season. Their strong point has been a defense which has yielded only 39 points in five games, 24 of them to Anson. The Indians have held their opponents scoreless in 17 of 20 quarters, including the last six.

At the midway point of the

season, the Indians' leading tackler has been sophomore linebacker Martin Limones, who has been in on 71 tackles. Matt Perry, with 55 tackles ranks second, followed by Ryan Olson with 46, Deon Walker with 34, and Brian Brzozowski, Keiland Riley and Casey Larned with 32 each.

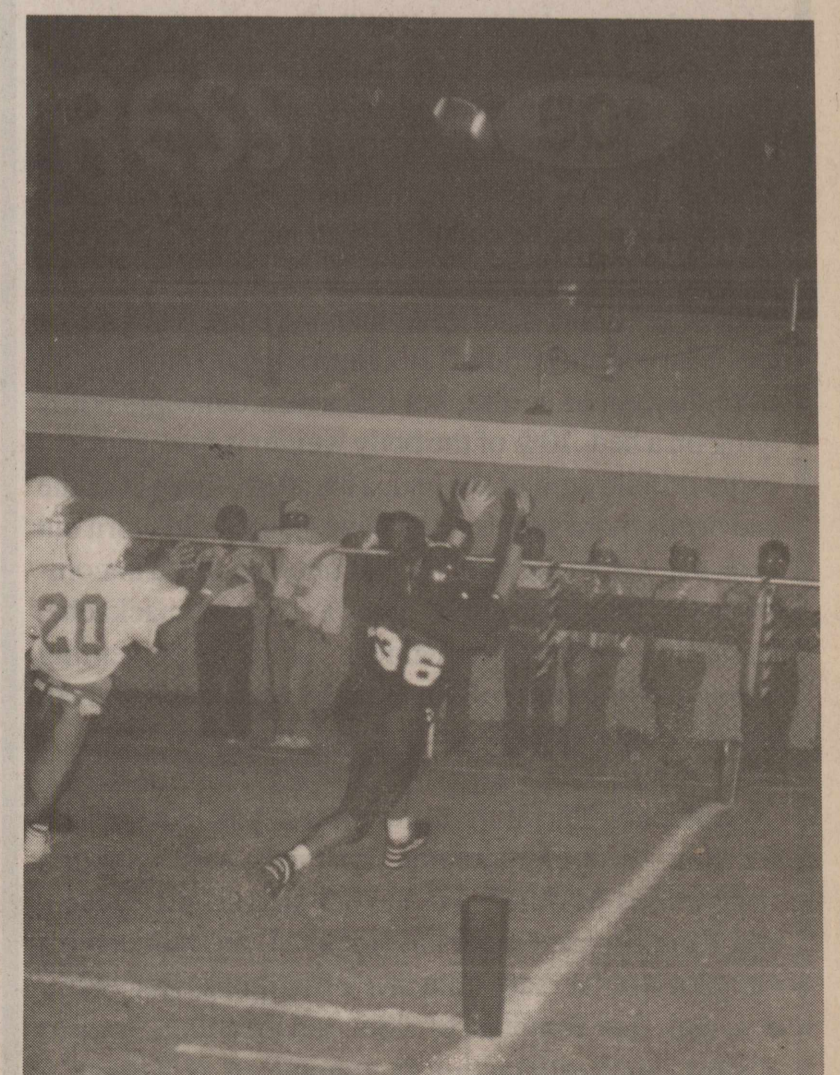

BUSINESS TAXES AND THE NEW LAW

The new tax law contains some tax incentives for businesses. Review them to see where opportunities exist for cutting your tax liability.

- Businesses can write off up to \$17,500 of equipment purchases a year, effective for years beginning after December 31, 1992. For highest total depreciation for 1993, expense assets bought late in the year, and depreciate those purchased early.

- The tax treatment of buying a business was changed to allow amortization of goodwill over a 15-year period. Previously, goodwill couldn't be written off. The new law also applies to certain other intangibles that were previously written off over less than 15 years, making this provision a mixed bag for new business owners.

- Several expired tax breaks were reinstated retroactively. The 25% deduction for health insurance costs of self-employed was reinstated from July 1, 1992, through December 31, 1993. An amended return can be filed to claim the deduction for 1992. The income-exclusion for employer-paid education assistance to employees and the targeted jobs tax credit were both extended.

- Restaurants and bars will get a business tax credit for the social security tax paid on certain workers' tips.

- Starting next year, business entertainment and meals will be only 50% deductible, instead of the current 80% deductible.

- No deduction for business, social, or athletic club dues will be allowed, starting next year.

- No deduction can be claimed for a spouse or other family member on a business trip unless the family member is an employee of the company and is along for a valid business purpose.

- Employer contributions to retirement plans can't be based on earnings over \$150,000, beginning next year.

From Cyprus

Dear Haskell: For those of you who don't know, I'm writing you from a small island in the Mediterranean Sea called Cyprus. It is located in the Middle East and I'm staying with my aunt, uncle and two cousins.

Cyprus is about 1/50th the size of Texas, and a little bigger than Rhode Island. The weather here is about the same as Texas--warm and dry.

This island has a long history; some ruins on the island go back about 4,000 years. The price of everything here is about twice what it would be in the States.

The police have the weekends off because there really isn't much crime. Police also have an interesting style of catching speeders. They stand along the side of the road and wait. When they see someone speeding, they jump in front of the speeding car and wave at the driver to stop.

One nice thing about the location of our apartment is that the beach and skiing slopes are both just an hour away. Much of Cyprus' population does without several things we Americans take for granted, such as dryers, air conditioning and even our own homes. Almost everyone in Cyprus lives in apartments. I see now how blessed I am to live in America.

I attend school at the American International School of Cyprus, or AISC. The school has a very good educational program but its athletic department is lacking. School hours are from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. After school, I sometimes play basketball until about 4:30. Then I am usually busy with homework until about 7 p.m. The rest of the night I spend lifting weights and playing ping-pong, or piano.

On the weekends, we go to

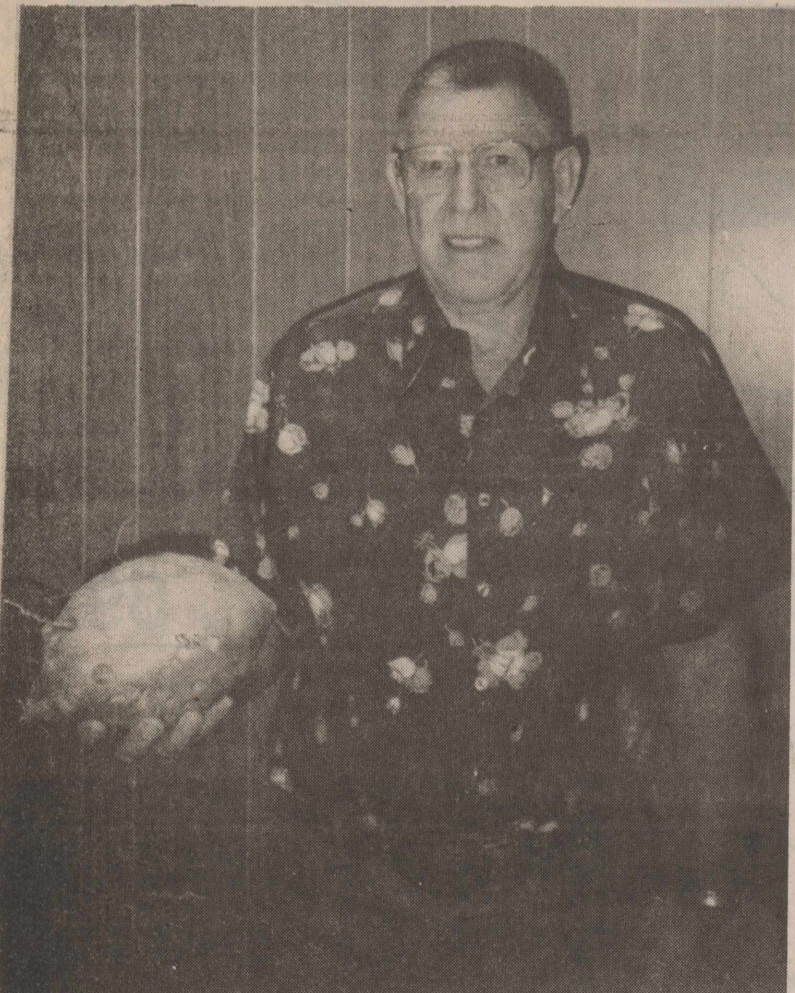


Casey Burgess, standing on the original city wall in Jerusalem on a recent weekend trip from Cyprus.

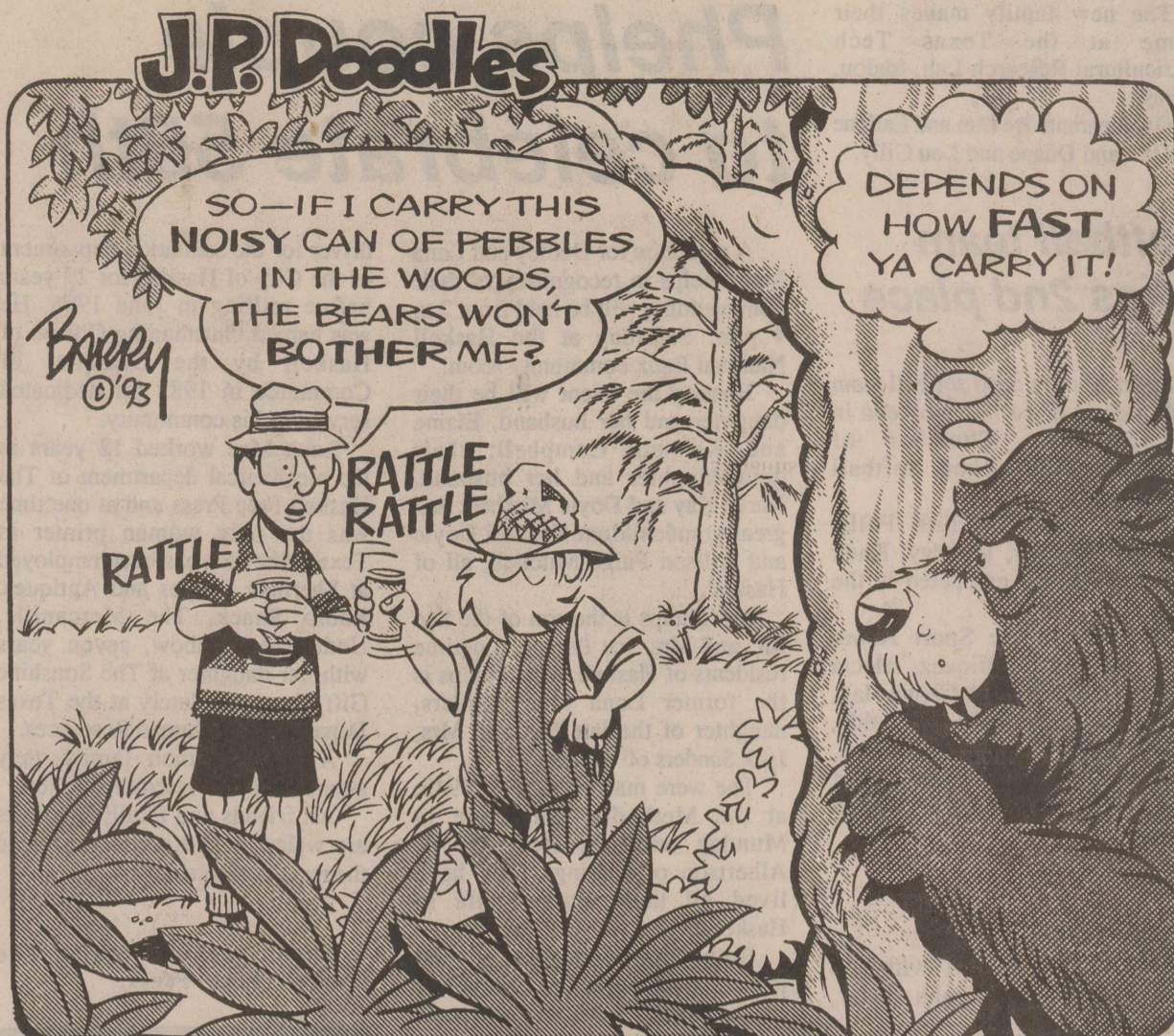
I miss everyone back home, and I hope you all are having a good time and enjoying yourselves while I'm gone, because it won't last long.

In a news release to The Free Press, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock says that by the year 2000, one out of every 21 adult Texans will be in the criminal justice system--in jail, in prison, on probation or on parole supervision.

That's roughly one of every five. If Haskell has 2,000 adults, our "quota" will be about 400.

If I had copies of all the "goofs" in news stories I have written since I penned my first newspaper piece, I probably could turn them into a book.

But I have a lot of company. In the current issue of American Journalism Review come these gems:

•When John Davis school named a new superintendent, the St. Joseph (Mo.) News-Press headlined the story: "John Davis will get a new head."

•The Citrus County Chronicle in Inverness, Fla., quoted police as saying the "rape victim was brave, astute and lucky."

•The Vinita (Okla.) Daily Journal had this piece: "He was transporting an open container of beer, speeding in a posted zone, transporting a loaded firearm."

•And the Twin Cities (Minn.) Reader reported: "The clinic is downstairs, tucked into the basement at the end of a tendentious one-floor elevator ride."

It's interesting how some newspapers handled the no-no word in reporting last summer of a Virginia woman who cut off her husband's you-know-what after he allegedly raped her.

From the same issue of American Journalism Review come these headline variations:

Washington Post: "Va. Woman Tells Police She Mutilated Husband After He Raped Her."

Potomac News (Woodbridge, Va.): "Man Mutilated in Domestic Dispute."

Fredericksburg (Va.) Free Lance-Star: "Claiming Husband Raped Her, Woman Severs Offending Organ."

Orlando (Fla.) Sentinel: "Wife Claims Self-defense in Virginia Mutilation Case."

The Guardian (London): "Errant Organ Refixed After 'Raped' Wife's Do It Yourself Snip."

Not so modest were the Washington Times, Toronto Star and Associated Press, all of which used the P-word.

At the other extreme was the New York Daily News which didn't even use the story, saying it had more important stories to run that day.

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Indians, Winters battle to 0-0 tie

Haskell and Winters battled to a scoreless tie in Haskell Friday night, leaving both teams winless after two district 7-2A contests.

The tie, Haskell's second of the season, left the Indians with a 2-1-2 record (0-1-1 in district). Winters, 0-4-1 for the year, also is 0-1-1 in district play.

For the second week in a row, the Indians were unable to get their offense clicking. They managed only 132 yards in total offense, 78 rushing and 54 passing. Winters accumulated 234 yards, 146 rushing and 88 passing.

Only once did the Indians penetrate the Blizzards' 20-yard line. That came at the 8:15 mark of the fourth period after Jason Torres intercepted a Winters pass on the

Winters 43. Justin Lisle's 20-yard run, longest gainer of the night, gave the Indians a first down at the 23. Lisle then picked up 3 yards, 2 yards and 1 yard to bring up fourth and 4 at the 17. A field goal attempt by Casey Larned was aborted when Mart Guess had to stand to handle the snap, and then threw an incomplete pass.

The Indians' longest sustained drive occurred in the third period as they picked up three first downs while moving from their own 44 to the Winters 21. But with a first down at that point, Lisle lost 4 yards and Guess was sacked for a 6-yard loss to the 31. Guess then threw incomplete before passing 7 yards to Larned to the 24, which left the Indians 13 yards short of a

first down.

Winters had two second-quarter penetrations. After Robert Silva intercepted a Guess pass that gave the Blizzards the ball on their own 42, the visitors' John Belew passed 10 yards to Zane Guy, Belew then ran for 11 yards before hitting Guy with a 9-yard strike to the 28. Belew picked up another 8 yards and then ran for 10 to the 10 where he fumbled and Torres recovered to kill the drive.

Earlier, the Blizzards had marched from their 40 to the Haskell 15 where a procedure penalty turned a fourth-and-one situation into a fourth-and-six, and was followed by an incomplete pass.

Lisle was the night's top ground-gainer, getting 77 yards on 23 carries. Guess was 6 of 24 in passing for 54 yards, while Larned threw once for an incompletion. Larned carried twice for 8 yards and Keiland Riley once for 7. Guess carried one time for 4 yards, but suffered three sacks for 18 yards in

losses.

Jonathan Tatum caught three passes for 24 yards and Larned had two receptions for 20 yards. The other reception was by Robert Huff for 10 yards.

Martin Limones was the leading tackler with 16, followed by Ryan Olson with 12, Matt Perry and Larned with 9 each, and Chris Silvas and Deon Walker with 8 each.

Torres, Larned and Huff each had an interception, and Torres recovered a fumble.

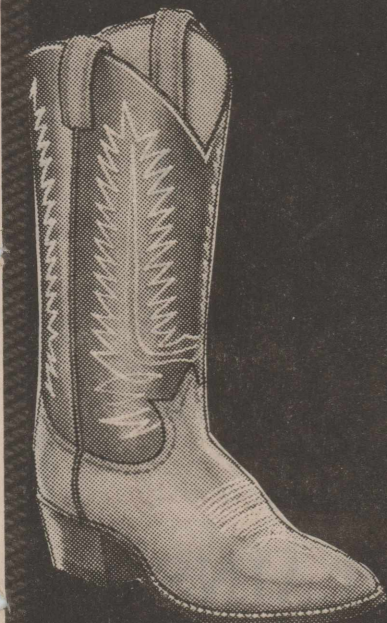
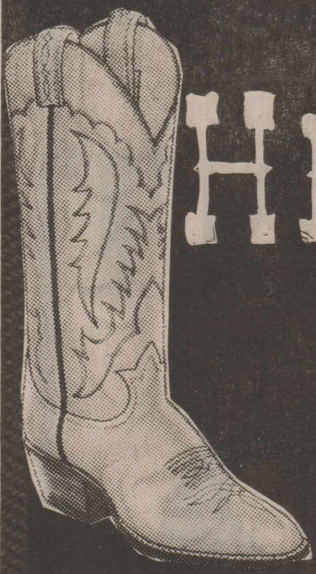

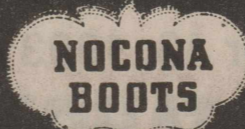

Homemakers adopt new club name

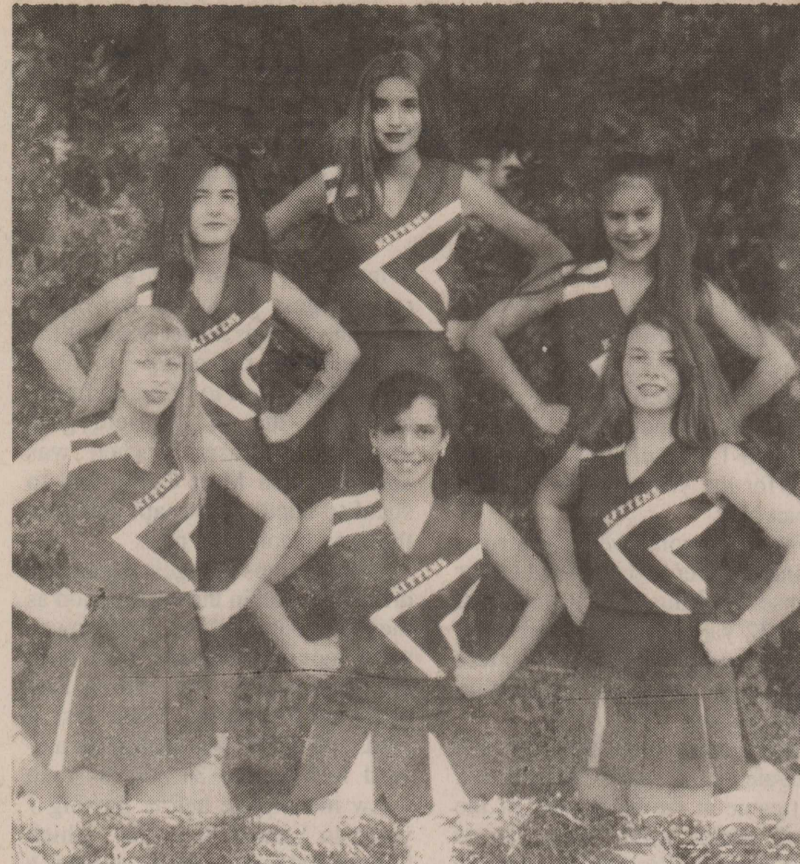
The National Extension Homemakers Council, Inc., changed its name in February 1992 to become the National Association for Family and Community Education (NAFCE).
