It's the biennial Homecoming and hundreds are expected in the city to participate in the many activities planned for Friday and Saturday.

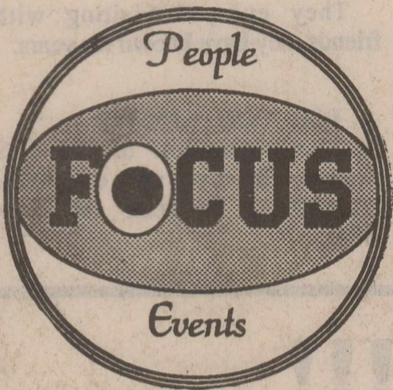

Many after-the-game parties are scheduled Friday night.

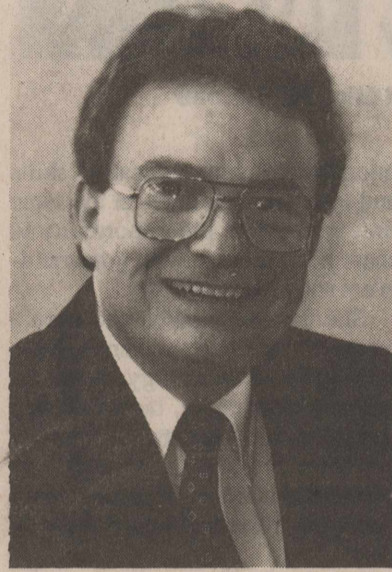

Back on the victory trail after last week's big win over Hawley, the Haskell Indians will entertain the Rotan Yellowhammers in a crucial 7-2A contest before the old grads in a homecoming game here Friday night.

The Indians are 3-1-2 for the season and 1-1-1 after three weeks of district play and will need a victory to stay alive in the championship race.

Rotan is 2-4 for the year and 0-3 in district, but Coach Walter Hargrove predicts a tough game against his alma mater.

In pre-district play, the Yellowhammers lost to Seagraves and defeated Coahoma and Olney. Their three 7-2A losses have been to the district's three top teams, Stamford, Jim Ned and Hamlin.

They played Jim Ned on even terms and kept the game close

against the team that last week beat previously unbeaten Stamford. "They have a lot of speed and quickness, and have as much talent as Jim Ned," the Haskell coach said.

Fullback Steve Warren, 160-pound senior, was a starter last year. Temple Daniel, 150, is the quarterback and Curtis Huit, 175, is another running back.

A pair of twins, Mitchell and Michael Montez are the split ends and also defensive standouts at end and cornerback. Lee Yanez, 190, is an outstanding guard.

The Indians hope to gain revenge from last year's defeat at Rotan when the Yellowhammers overcame a 20-14 Haskell lead with two late fourth-quarter touchdowns. The loss knocked the Indians out of the playoffs.

Heather Stewart and Michael Salinas are recipients of the 1993 Gold Star award, presented annually to one or two deserving county 4-H members.

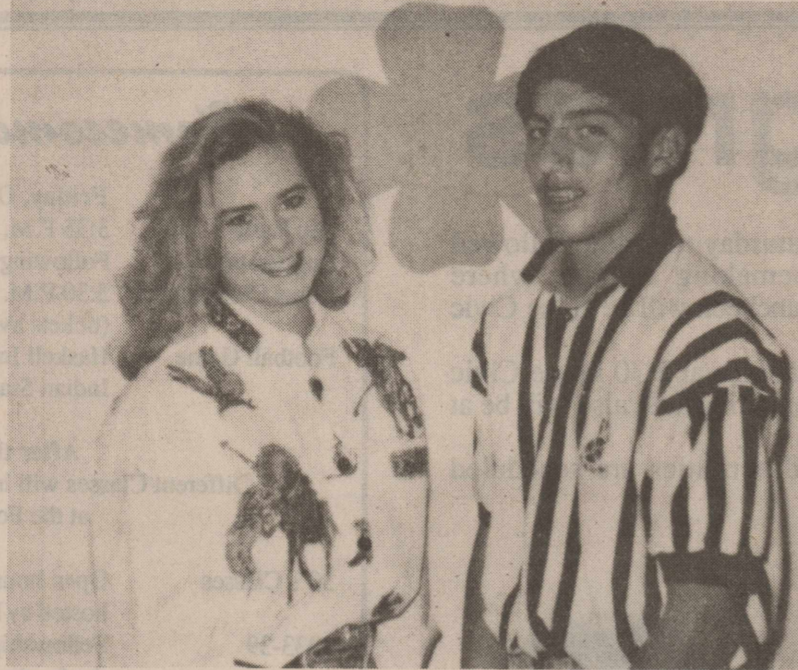
Heather is the daughter of Danny and Sue Stewart. Michael's parents are Fidel and Abigail Salinas.

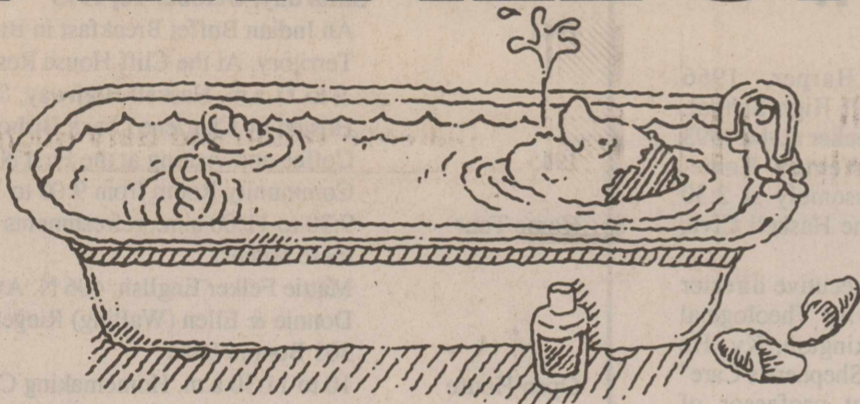

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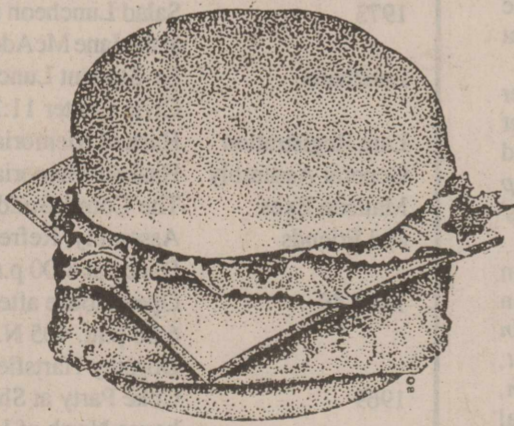
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Advances

Teen sexuality focus of workshop

"Choices for Change," a symposium to address the critical issue of adolescent sexuality, will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. next Wednesday (Oct. 20) in the Haskell Civic Center.

With alarming statistics showing the rising incidence of teen pregnancy, the Rolling Plains 4-H Program Development Committee outlined plans to bring together professionals who are trained to deal with this issue.

An overview of the problem will be presented by Dr. Marianna Rasco, professor and chair of the Department of Home Economics and Family Studies at Abilene Christian University.

The symposium will feature four concurrent workshops. Each participant will attend two of the following:

- AIDS and sexually transmitted diseases will be addressed by Dr. Wayne Cadenhead medical doctor in Haskell, and Eloise Garcia, LVN and health educator with the Wilson Family Planning Clinic in Wichita Falls;

- Abstinence Education will be the topic of D'Ann Pierce, Texas consultant, Teen-Aid Sexuality Education Program in Spur;

- Responsible sexuality is the topic Janet Yeates, professor and 4-H and Youth Development specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station. Her workshop will show

curriculum and teaching aids to build self esteem;

- Communication and collaboration will be addressed by Dr. Martha Couch, professor and Extension 4-H and Youth Development specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Lubbock.

Keynote speaker during the catered luncheon will be Dr. Terry Urnosky, Life Changes Ministry, Lubbock. Then a panel of speakers who have had success with local programs will share ideas. Dr. Lynne Thibodeaux, assistant director for 4-H and Youth Development with the Extension Service in College Station, will moderate the panel and summarize the symposium.

Registration forms for the program, sponsored by the Extension Service, are available at county extension offices. The \$10 registration fee includes the luncheon and a resource guide.

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Meaningful signs identify school landmarks

Because of the freshman class homecoming project, getting lost on campus has become less difficult. The freshman class made signs identifying the new band hall, fine arts building, home economics building, junior high field house and high school field house, which has been named the "Indian Power House."

These signs, in the shape of teepees, are now in front of each building to help visitors and new students find their way around campus.

Although parents Doris Mae

Watson, Marijane Cunningham and Steve Cothron helped the freshmen organize the project, the majority of the work was done by students. The teepees are about 4 feet tall with large letters and stencilled designs. Each teepee received at least three coats of paint. A ruler became a handy companion for the freshmen as they carefully measured and lined up the designs.

"The stencils were cut from monocoat, then ironed on and painstakingly painted," Mary Watson, project co-chairman, said. This allowed the painting to go quicker.

"It's taken a lot of time and patience," Kelli Cunningham, co-chairman, said.

"But it's been fun," Watson added.

The designs on each teepee have an Indian meaning. The bird on the Indian Power House is a Thunderbird, which was a respected spirit warbird. The arrow on the right stands for *swiftness*, and the arrow on the left means *fast*. The sun symbol shows *strength*.

"We used the sun because our athletes are strong and powerful," Ember Josselet said.

The angles at the top of the home economics sign mean *bright future*.

"Bright future was used because home economics helps you learn things you will need in the future," Monique Farris explained.

Muchfood is represented by the tear-drop shaped designs, and the cloud design gives hope for a *good future*.

The fine arts sign has a butterfly

to show *beauty* as well as a *cactus flower*. The footstep means *good sign* in Indian.

"We used the butterfly because art teaches us about beauty and to appreciate the beauty of the world around us," Wendy Dulaney said.

For the junior high field house, an arrow meaning *protection* was used. The mountain-like design means *plenty*. Also, the sign has a sun and a bear track.

"The sun represents that the junior high has lots of *energy*, and they are very spirited," Jacy Cypert said.

"The bear track represents us stomping, or *dominating*, the other teams," Michelle Green explained.

The band hall teepee has a sun at the top to show *strong hope*. The three diamonds stand for *joy*. *Peace* is shown by the zig-zagging line going by the door. The half-circle and half-moon designs mean *bright song*.

Shelly Palacios said, "We used the sun because we have strong hope that the band can improve throughout the year."

Class members formed a committee to organize the project.

Cunningham and Watson chaired the committee. Workdays were set up each week on Mondays and Wednesdays from 4:30 to 6 p.m. since Labor Day. The project was done in the Watsons' garage.

"Painting the teepees after school has been fun," Dacia Phemister said.

The freshmen believe the signs will be an improvement to the school.

When asked why she wanted to help, Betsy McDermett said, "It makes me feel like I'm doing something for our school."

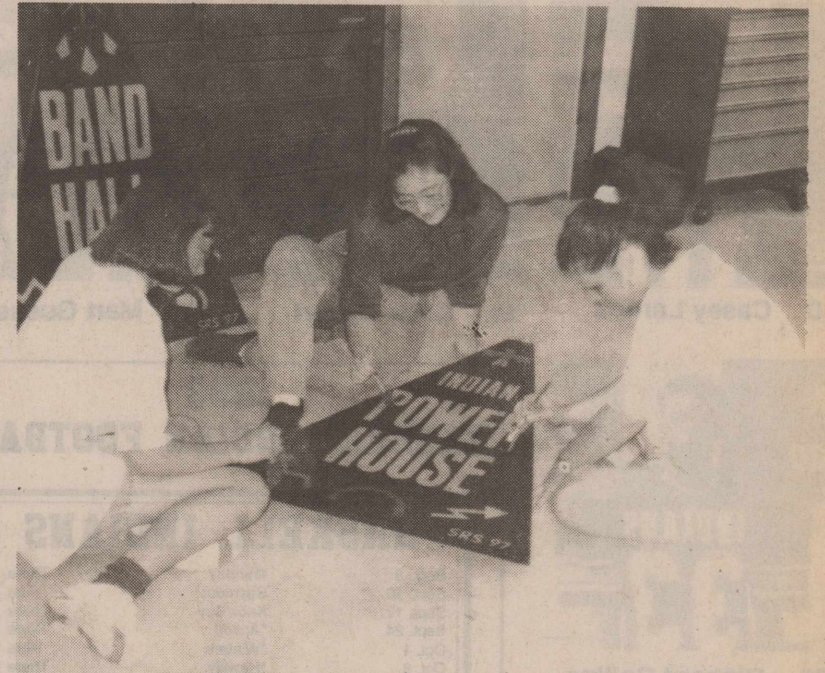
Farris said she wanted to help "because I figured it would be fun and challenging. It will show how much we care for our school."

Indians race past Hawley; defense records third shutout

Haskell's long-slumbering offense came alive at Hawley Friday night as the Indians handed the Bearcats a crushing 40-0 defeat.

Five different Indians crossed the goal line and the Haskell defense held its opponent scoreless for the third time in six games.

The Indians chalked up 299 yards rushing and another 82 yards through the air, while holding the Bearcats to a meager 37 yards rushing and 65 passing.

Justin Lisle, who scored two touchdowns and rushed for 122 yards in 24 attempts, had plenty of help this time. Tony Sessions, elevated from the junior varsity a week earlier, made a sparkling debut with the varsity, rushing for 82 yards on 9 carries.

And that wasn't all. Mart Guess rushed 4 times for 35 yards. Cody Cypert carried 4 times for 31 yards, Casey Larned 3 times for 16 yards and Chris Silvas 3 times for 13. Guess was 7 of 12 in passing.

On their first possession, the Indians moved from their own 40 to the Bearcat 18 before the drive bogged down. A 10-yard penalty wiped out a 23-yard scoring run by Guess shortly before the drive folded.

But they were back in business at the 18 moments later when Brian Brzozowski intercepted a pass, which had been deflected by Jason Torres.

Lisle carried it over in three rushes, for 1 yard, 14 yards and then 3 yards for the score. Larned's extra point made it 7-0 with 4:48 left in the first period.

Another interception, this one by Robert Huff at the Hawley 26,

set up the Indians' second touchdown. Eight plays later Lisle plunged over from a yard out. The extra point attempt failed but the Indians were out front, 13-0, with 46 seconds to go in the opening period.

A minute later, Huff made it 20-0 when he intercepted Willie Walker's pass on his own 40 and returned it 60 yards for a touchdown, and Larned booted the extra point.

Torres got the Indians' third interception by stealing a Walker pass on his own 24 and returning it to the Bearcat 49. Sessions scored six plays later on a 22-yard run, which came just two plays after his 26-yard scoring run had been nullified by a holding penalty. A 2-point conversion attempt failed, leaving the score at 26-0 at the 4:38 mark of the second quarter.

On their next possession, the Indians took over on their own 42 and moved to the Hawley 18. On a fourth down from that point, Larned's field goal attempt sailed wide.

The third quarter was scoreless and the Indians had only one possession until the final minute when they took over on their 32. Highlighted by runs of 17 and 11 yards by Guess and a 21-yard Guess-to-Torres pass, the Indians moved to the Hawley 3, from where Larned took it in for the score and then kicked the extra point to make it 33-0 with the fourth period less than 3 minutes old.

Next time the Indians got the ball, they pulled off a classic 7-play, 85-yard scoring drive. Cypert,

The Bearcats' deepest penetration came in the third period when they reached the Indian 30 after recovering their own punt at the 37.

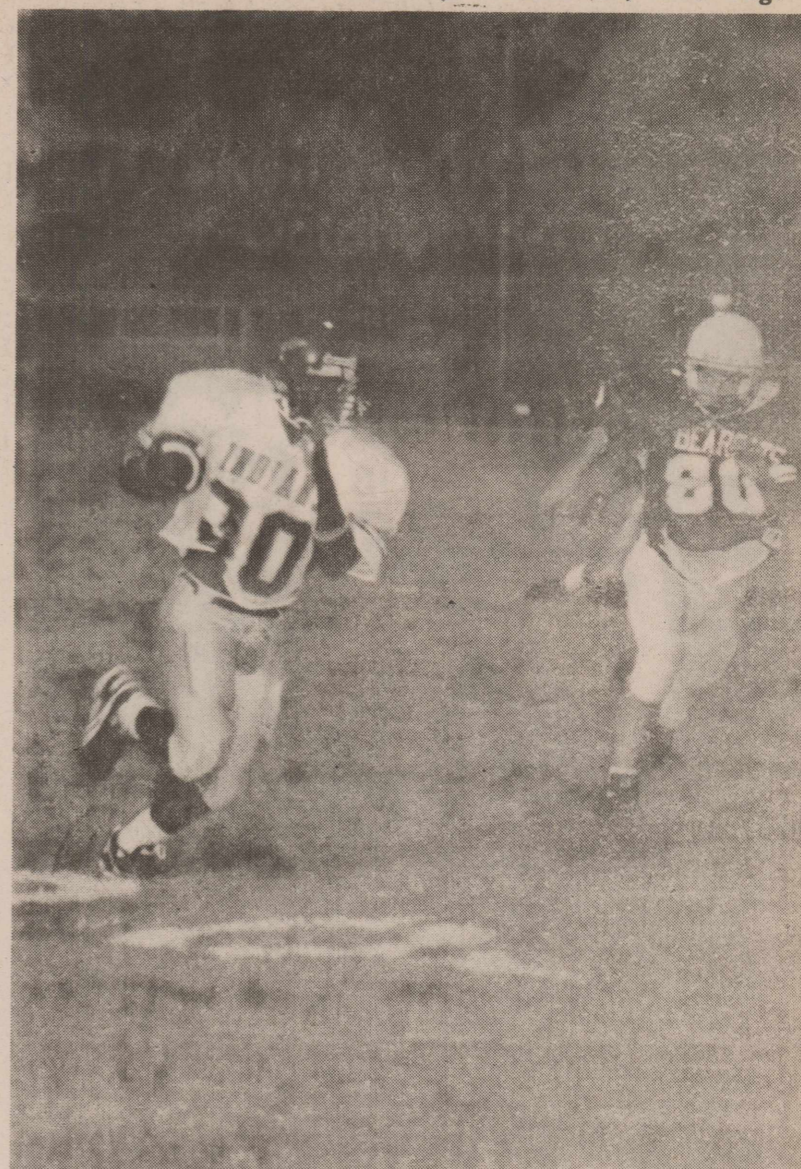
Coach Walter Hargrove, rejoicing in the offensive output, was even more pleased with the

BUSINESSPEOPLE AND THE NEW LAW

Even though most taxpayers will feel little direct impact from the new tax law signed by President Clinton August 10, 1993, many businesspeople will be affected. Take a few minutes to see how you'll be affected and where your tax planning opportunities lie.

- The 25% deduction for health insurance premiums paid by the self-employed has been restored through 1993, retroactive to July 1, 1992. Those affected may want to file an amended 1992 return.
- The expensing deduction for business property is increased to \$17,500 from \$10,000, retroactive to January 1, 1993.
- Acquired goodwill and related intangibles can now be amortized over fifteen years.
- Food and beverage establishments will get a tax credit for their share of FICA paid on reported employee tips, effective January 1, 1994.
- The nonresidential real estate depreciation period is increased from 31.5 years to 39 years, generally effective May 13, 1993.
- Effective in 1994, you cannot deduct dues for country clubs, luncheon clubs or any other club organized for business or pleasure.
- Only 50% of business meals and entertainment expenses will be deductible versus 80% under prior law, effective January 1, 1994.
- Personal service corporations (PSCs) have a new flat rate of 35%. The new 35% rate also becomes the top rate for corporations with incomes above \$10 million, retroactive to January 1, 1993.
- Starting in 1994, all wages will be subject to the 1.45% Medicare tax, and the self-employed will pay 2.9% on all net earnings.
- The new law has made it easier to avoid the underestimated tax penalty for higher-income taxpayers. Beginning in 1994, high-income taxpayers can use 110% of prior year tax liability as a safe-harbor estimate for current-year payments.

Sudden infant death remains mystery

Despite efforts of medical researchers, sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) remains a medical mystery.

The syndrome is defined as the sudden, unexpected death of an infant, which often cannot be explained, even after an autopsy. Such deaths, sometimes called crib deaths, typically occur in apparently healthy babies who seem well when put to bed, but later are found dead.

While the medical community cannot predict which infants will be SIDS victims, or what causes one child and not another to die from SIDS, many researchers through years of work have determined some factors that are not causes of SIDS:

It is not hereditary, is not contagious, is not caused by external suffocation, is not caused by vomiting, is not caused by choking, cannot be predicted, cannot (in most cases) be prevented and is not anyone's fault.

Researchers now have determined some basic facts about SIDS. These include:

•SIDS is a definitive medical entity which can only be determined by a medical investigation and a detailed autopsy.

•SIDS is the major cause of death in infants after the first month of life.

•SIDS occurs very rapidly and silently, usually during periods of sleep.

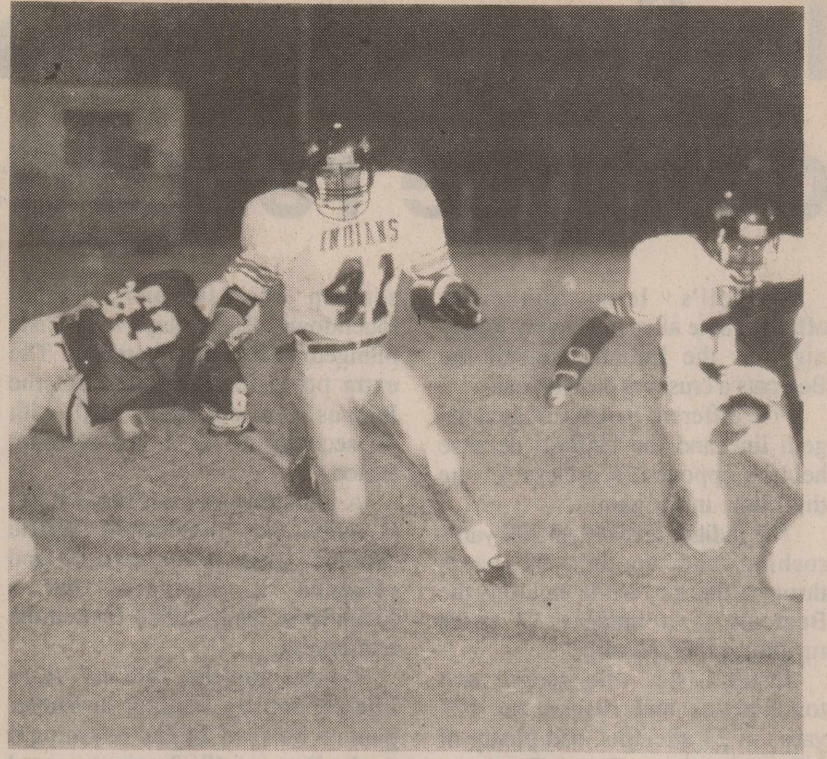
•SIDS infants do not suffer, •SIDS can strike any family. It does not respect race, nationality or geography.

•SIDS is at least as old as the Old Testament and seems to have occurred as frequently in the 18th and 19th centuries as it does now.

•SIDS is a phenomenon which is not predictable nor completely preventable, even by a physician.

Constant worrying about the possibility of SIDS and constant checking on the baby will not safeguard a child from SIDS. Parents should remember that SIDS is not a common occurrence. Of every 1,000 babies, 998 will not become SIDS victims.

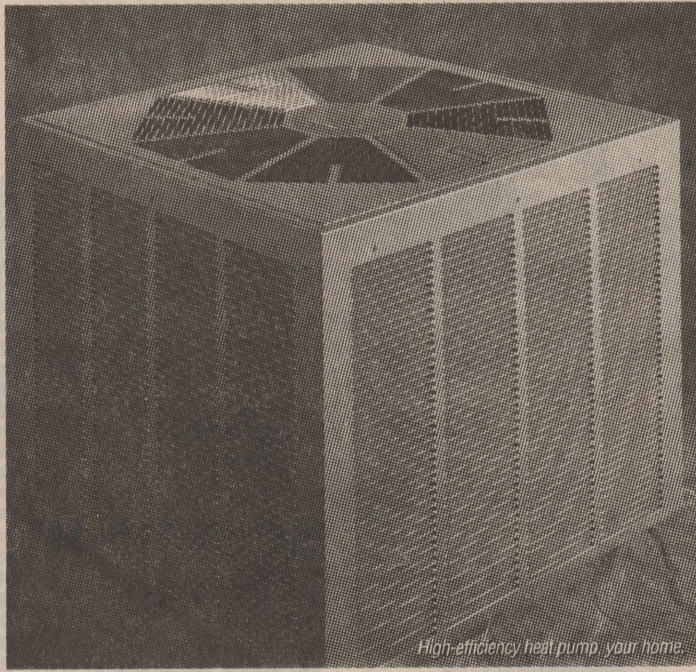

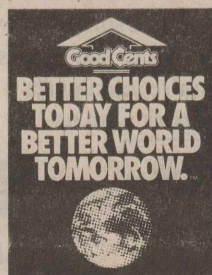

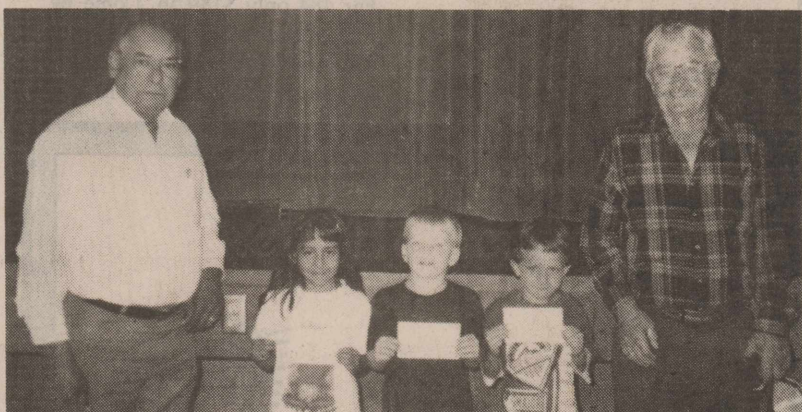

Haskell Soil & Water Conservation District

The Seymour Aquifer Water Quality Project is a collective effort of Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, and Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

The goal of the Seymour Aquifer Project is to help producers with water quality practices that lessen the possibility of nutrient or pesticide leaching into the groundwater. The project area covers the northwest part of Haskell County and the southern part of Knox County.

During the past year, water quality work was supported by producers in the project area through soil testing, irrigation scheduling, water testing, pesticide management, irrigation efficiency testing and fertilizer demonstrations.

Two free soil testing programs were offered in the project area in 1993. Four hundred and fifty-two soil samples were submitted during these sampling periods.

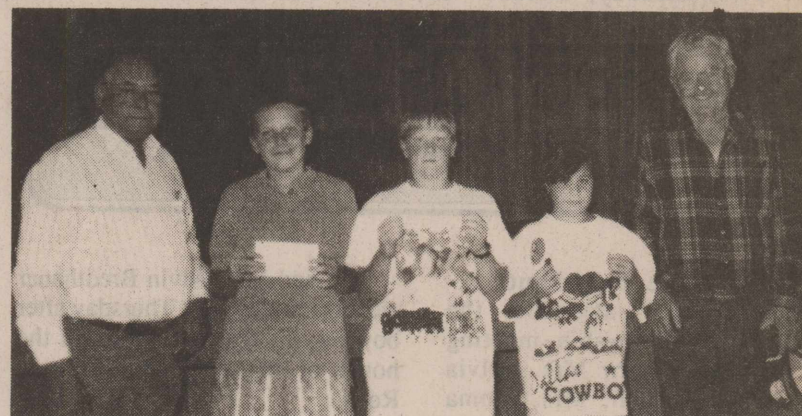
Irrigation scheduling work

performed in the area during 1993 included installing gypsum blocks and tensiometers on 60 fields. The gypsum blocks and tensiometers provide producers with information on the amount of moisture in the soil at 1, 2, and 3 feet.

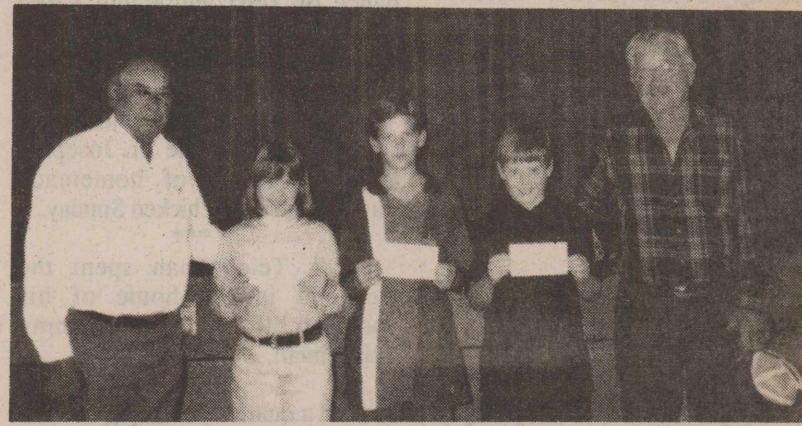
Water tests for nitrates were carried out on 285 samples during 1993. Drinking water too high in nitrates is a health hazard and nitrates in irrigation water can be credited for fertilizer use.

Budworm moth, bollworm moth and boll weevil traps were established in the area during 1993. By knowing the activity and numbers of the pests, producers can emphasize field scouting.

Irrigation efficiency tests were carried out on 15 center pivot systems this year. Application efficiencies averaged 80 percent on the convention pivots systems. Three Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot irrigation systems were checked. The LEPA systems had application efficiencies averaging 98 percent.

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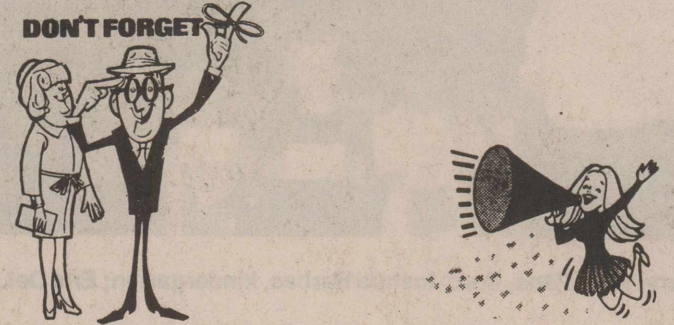


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
