Abilene to be capital

Gov. Ann Richards has selected Abilene as the site for her fourth "Capital for a Day" program on

The program, designed to bring state government to the people of Texas, is the first one to be held in the western area of the state. The first three were in Carthage, Paris and Clear Lake, respectively.

"We are delighted that the first West Texas 'Capital for a Day' program will be in Abilene," said Mayor Gary McCaleb. "It is an honor for us to host the governor and state agency heads and a unique opportunity for Abilene to play a small role in helping government reach the people in a personal and meaningful way."

Virtually every major state agency will set up shop from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Abilene Civic Center to answer questions and address specific concerns of local citizens. "Our goal is to listen and to make ourselves available to the people of Texas," Gov. Richards said. "Local participation is critical to the success of the program. I encourage the citizens of the Abilene region to come to the Abilene Civic Center and personally tell those of us in government what's on their minds."

The day's events will culminate with a Town Hall meeting beginning at 7 p.m. in the Civic Center. The governor will make brief comments, then she and the agency heads will answer questions from the audience. Participants will be admitted on a first-come, firstserved basis.

LULAC challenges school board voting

The League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) has filed suit in U.S. District Court charging the Haskell Consolidated School District with unlawfully diluting the voting strength of minority voters in its method of electing members of the Board of Trustees.

The complaint charges that the political and electoral process used by the school does not afford minorities an equal opportunity to participate in the political process.

A similar suit was filed against the City of Haskell, as well as Stamford, Anson, Hamlin school districts and numerous other school

districts across the state.

LULAC charges that whites vote sufficiently as a bloc to enable them, in the absence of special circumstances, such as the minority candidate running unopposed, usually to defeat the minority group's preferred candidates.

LULAC asks the court to issue a declaratory judgment finding that the existing method of electing atlarge members to the board of trustees is unconstitutional.

The Haskell School Board has engaged the services of attorney Judy Underwood of Austin to file an answer to the complaint and to

do a demographic study of the school district.

Superintendent Bill Stewart said Tuesday that the Haskell CISD could fight the suit, but indicated that it would be expensive.

Another alternative faced by the board would be to change its method of electing board members by creating single-member districts. Under this scenerio, the superintendent said Haskell could have five single-member districts and two at-large districts, six single-member districts and one atlarge district, or seven singlemember districts.

Stewart disturbed by LULAC suit

I am sure that the school employees and community are aware by now that the League of United Latin American Citizens, District 5, has filed suit on our school district.

The suit claims that the at-large method of election of trustees prevents Hispanic representation on the Haskell CISD Board of Trustees.

It disturbs me greatly, not so much that suit has been filed, but that it has been filed by an attorney from San Antonio who knows absolutely nothing about the status of our community, on behalf of an organization, not on behalf of a

local plaintiff. This same attorney has filed the same suit on the City of Haskell, Stamford ISD, Anson ISD, Hamlin ISD, and numerous other school districts across the state.

There is a very slim possibility that the suit will be dismissed for various reasons. If not, the Board of Trustees will have to decide whether to fight the allegations in court or to agree to develop and alternate plan for the election of trustees. This would generally guarantee representation of the Latin American population.

Either decision will cost the district thousands, perhaps hundreds of thousands, of dollars---dollars which, in my opinion, people of our district (including members of all ethnic groups) would rather spend on educating our children.

It seems to me that there is something wrong with a system which allows an attorney some 500 miles away to come in and disrupt a school and community which to my knowledge has no racial problems.

I know that students of all races serve or have serve in most all areas of responsibility in our school. These would include cheerleaders, class officers, club officers, etc. I guess what offends me most is that an outsider seems to have the right to possibly totally disrupt a stable situation in our school and

community. It is my desire that the community as a whole will unite and work together to put this, another disruption, behind us and move on to work again to do what we are really here to do, and that is to give our kids the best education and community life we can provide

I will strive to help maintain a positive attitude and not lose sight of our true purpose.

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



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

TAX SHELTERS: WHAT'S LEFT AFTER THE 1993 TAX ACT?

Even after the 1993 Tax Act, there are still a number of ways to effectively shelter your income from taxes - or at least to defer your tax liabilities. Here are some ideas that still work.

Buy a Home. In most cases, you can fully deduct the mortgage interest on your principal residence and on a second home. In many areas, house payments will not be significantly more than the cost of renting. The difference is that your rent payments are

Invest for Long-Term Gains. Long-term capital gains are taxed at a maximum rate of 28% - versus up to 39.6% on ordinary

Max Out Your Retirement Plan Contributions. If your employer has a 401 (k) plan, contribute the maximum deductible amount. Your employer may match at least part of that and your earnings accumulate tax free until retirement. If you're self-employed, see us about setting up a Keogh or SEP plan.

Employ Your Children. Children under 18 employed in a parent's sole proprietorship or family partnership are not subject to social security tax on their wages - and neither is their parent/ employer. (This exemption does not apply to corporations owned by the parent.) In many cases, employing children during school vacations is possible. The combined self-employment and income tax savings could be as much as 36.3% if the parent has a 36% marginal tax rate and the child's rate is 15%. (Remember - \$3,800 of the child's income can be sheltered with his or her standard deduction, and another \$2,000 with an IRA deduction.)

PCA reduces stock requirement

The Board of Directors of Rolling Plains Production Credit Association has reduce the stock requirement for borrowing from the association, effective Jan. 1, 1994.

The stock purchase requirement, which has been 10 percent for a number of years, now will be reduced to 5 percent.

This means that the borrowers' required investment in the association will be just 50 percent of what it has been in the past, and the PCA will return some \$3 million to 730 borrowers in 109 counties of the Rolling Plains.

Rolling Plains PCA serves its borrowing members from six branch offices and a central office. Its Board of Directors is elected by the member-borrowers, and its staff of 24 employees were all raised on farms, ranches or in farming communities of the Rolling Plains.

As of the close of business Dec. 31, 1993, the association enjoyed a net profit after taxes of \$980,000 with a loan volume of \$57 million and total capital accounts of

\$17,050,000. The entity has been selected as a Tier I PCA for the sixth consecutive year based on safety, soundness and financial strength.

The association was originally chartered as Stamford PCA on Jan. 10, 1934. In 1965, Stamford PCA merged with Memphis PCA to form Rolling Plains PCA. The association celebrates its 60th anniversary this month.




