### Indians win two in district

After two games in the second half of the district 7-2A round-robin, the Haskell Indians find themselves tied with Hamlin for first place. Haskell and Hamlin have 2-0 records.

The Indians won their second game in the second half against Hawley here Friday, 80-36. Haskell burst to a 15-3 lead in the first period and was never threatened.

Brian Brzozowski scored 19 points and Cody Cooley and Jonathan Tatum had 17 each to lead the attack. Casey Coleman's 11 points also put him in double figures.

At Winters last Tuesday, the Indians withstood a fourth-quarter onslaught by the Blizzards to escape with a 60-57 victory. The Indians led 45-32 at the end of three quarters, but the red hot Blizzards scored 25 points in the final period while the Indians were getting 15.

Casey Larned led the scoring with 18 points. Brzozowski and Cooley had 12 each.

The Indians were to meet Rotan there Tuesday night and will be at home against Jim Ned on Friday. Next Tuesday, they will be at Hamlin.

Leading scorer for the Maidens was Betsy McDermott with 12 points.

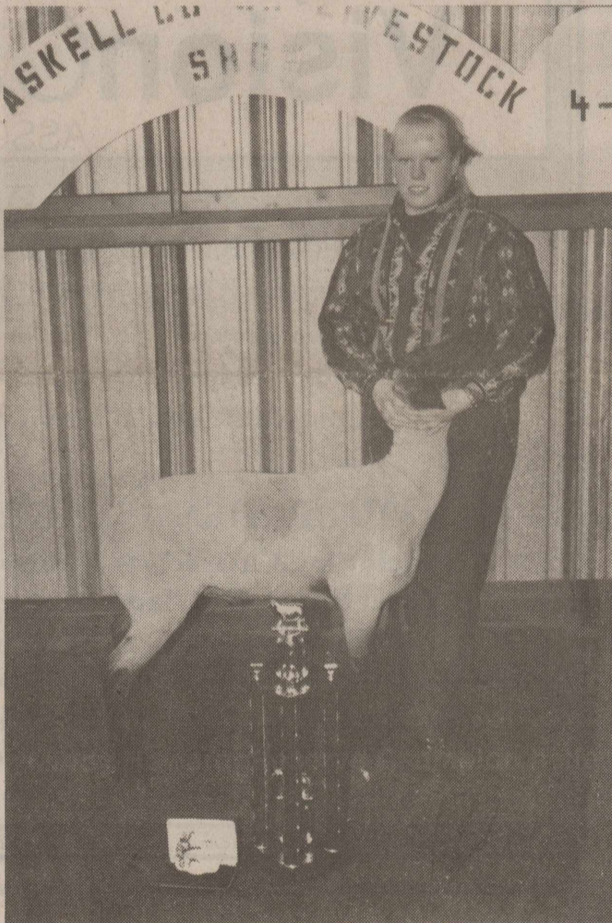

Teresa Diaz led the scoring with 15 points, followed by McDermott with 12.

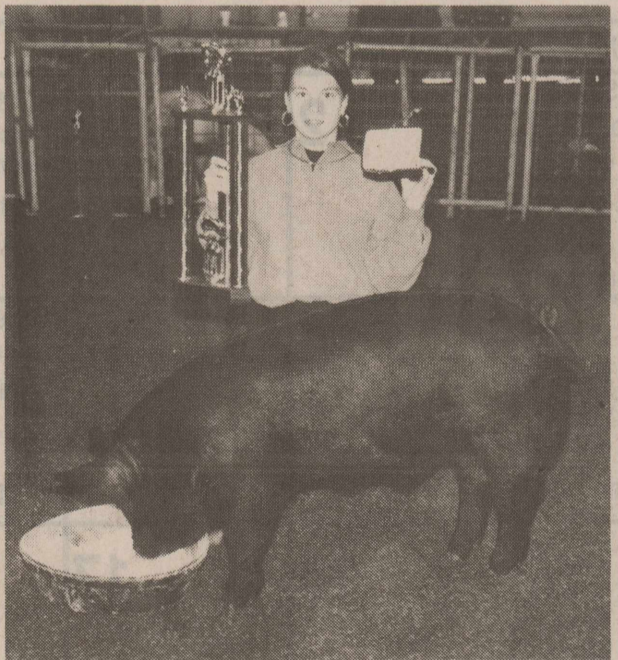
The Maidens were to play Rotan there Tuesday and will host Jim Ned Friday.

Such complaint must be filed not later than 180 days after the alleged discrimination by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the rules and regulations of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

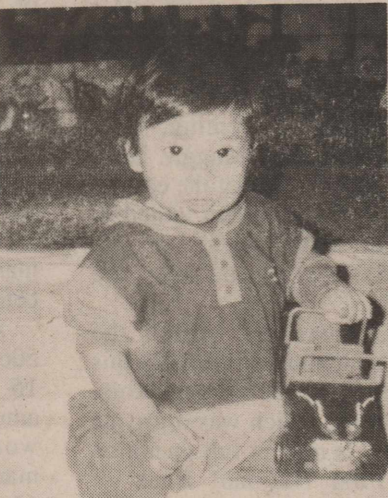

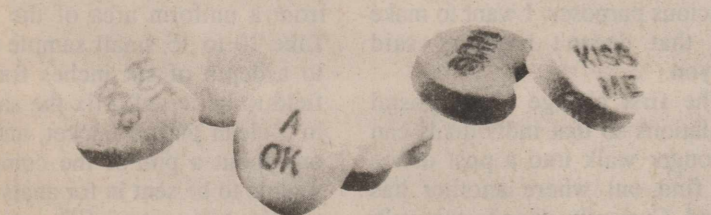

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## Christopher, Ashley most common names

Of all the tables, graphs and lists combined in the annual report of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of Vital Statistics, perhaps the item most of interest to new parents is the list of most popular baby names.

Richard Bays, chief of the Bureau of Vital Statistics, said that since 1990, the list of most frequently given names of newborns from the previous year has been a standard entry in the report. The list and other data are compiled from birth certificates filed at the bureau.

Bays said that some names recur every year on the list. "Only their rankings among the top 10 ever change," he said.

"However, sometimes we see celebrities' names appear," Bays said. "We suspect that ideas for some names, particularly those of girls, are inspired by popular movie and TV stars, and sometimes by soap opera characters."

In the order of most often chosen, the 10 most popular names for boys born in Texas during 1992 were: Christopher, Michael, Joshua, Matthew, David, John, Justin, James, Daniel and Jonathan.

For girls born during the same period, the 10 most frequently given names were: Ashley, Jessica, Amanda, Brittany, Sarah, Stephanie, Samantha, Elizabeth, Lauren and Jennifer.

The rankings of both lists varied slightly from the lists of 1991, but the names remained the same, with one exception: Jonathan replaced Jose on the 1992 list for boys.

Besides compiling separate lists for all boys and girls born during the previous year, the report also provides similar lists representing ethnic groups. Although those lists contain many of the same names as the overall roster, there are some exceptions.

Among children of white parents, the most popular names for

boys were: Michael, Christopher, Matthew, Joshua, James, John, Justin, William, Jacob and Cody. For girls, they were: Ashley, Sarah, Brittany, Lauren, Amanda, Taylor, Shelby, Chelsea, Elizabeth and Courtney.

Black parents chose Christopher, Joshua, Michael, Brandon, Anthony, James, Jordan, Robert, Darius and Xavier for boys, and Jasmine, Ashley, Brittany, Jessica, Taylor, Amber, Danielle, Alexis, Briana and Courtney for girls.

Hispanic parents chose Jose, Juan, Luis, Jesus, Daniel, Michael, David, Christopher, Jonathan and Joshua for their sons, and Jessica, Ashley, Stephanie, Maria, Amanda, Samantha, Jennifer, Vanessa, Crystal and Elizabeth for their daughters.

Your kids want to be cool, part of the "in" crowd?

Then tell them, "Kids who use their brains use their bodies."

To be sure, an effective health education program in childhood may improve cardiovascular health in adult life. These are the assignments: Get lots of exercise, eat right and don't smoke.

Unfortunately, statistics show that many American children are making poor grades with their health. And that may result in more deaths in decades to come from heart disease, the nation's No. 1 killer.

For example, prevalence of obesity among children aged 6-11 has risen 54 percent since 1966. Obese children are more likely to be obese adults. And obesity contributes to increased risk of heart disease.

So does smoking, an act more than 3,000 young Americans every day try for the first time. More than 3 million American children under age 18 smoke 947 million packs of cigarettes a year.

Furthermore, studies show that more than half of today's youth don't get enough regular exercise and many don't eat properly.

To help your kids take care of their hearts, the AHA encourages these health habits:

- Regular walking, bicycling and outdoor play,
- Participation in age-appropriate sports, lessons or clubs,
- Regular participation in household chores,
- Family outings that involve walking, bicycling, swimming, etc.,
- Positive role modeling by an active lifestyle by parents, teachers and other caretakers,
- A diet low in fat and high in complex carbohydrates.

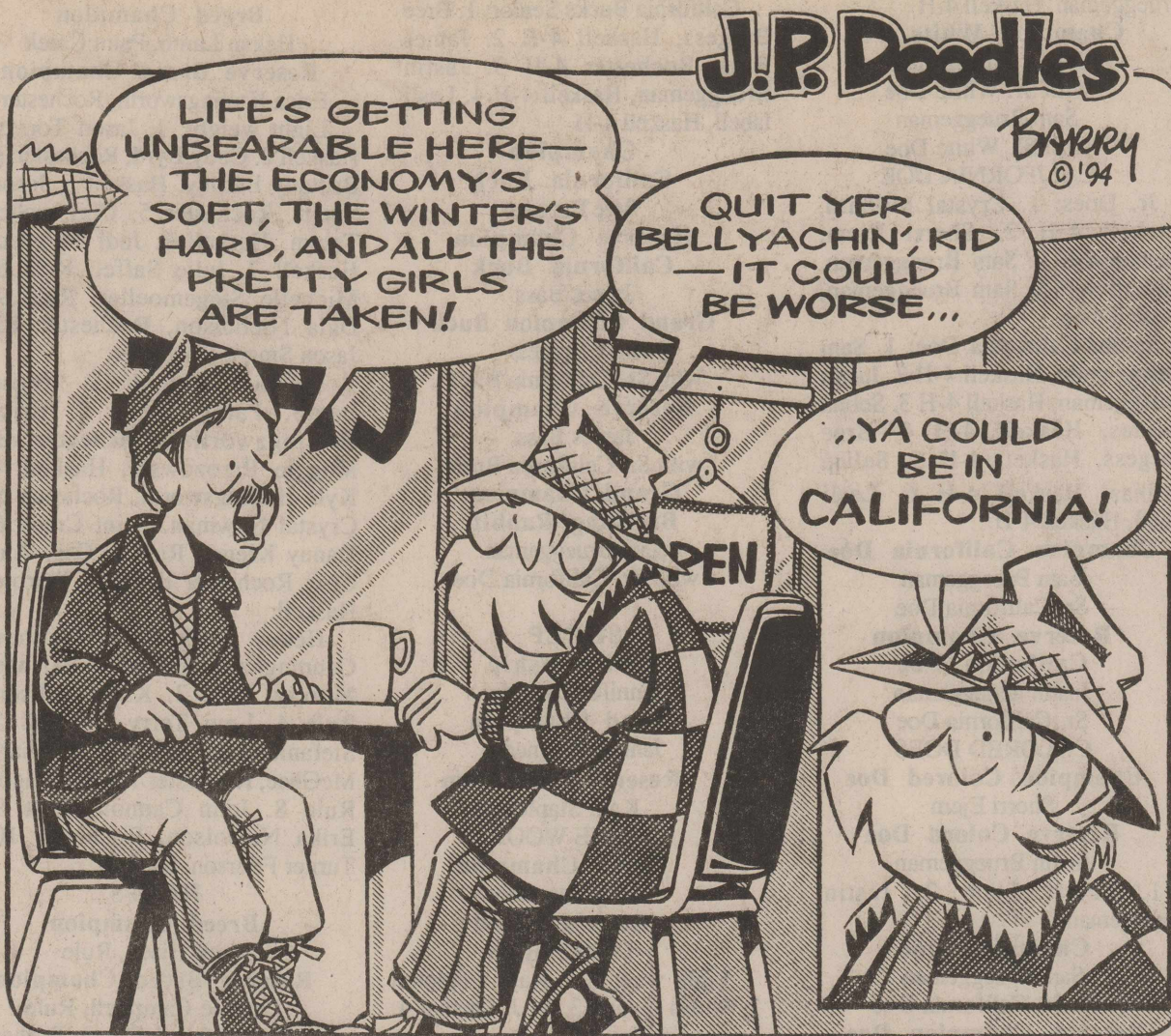
## Lawyers

As a trial lawyer, my life and work are affected by the image of the "ambulance chaser" and other legal lowlives portrayed in living color on the show.

We in the legal profession must police ourselves more effectively before the matter is taken out of our hands by government. It is every state bar's obligation to develop tighter regulations for legal practices and stiffer penalties for those who disregard them and to enforce these structures in a meaningful way. There must be consequences, stiff ones, for the deceitful and unethical lawyers among us who tar the reputation of the honest and honorable.

In Texas, an anti-barratry bill instigated by me and others has recently passed the legislature. It makes lawyers' unsolicited calls or visits to an accident victim a felony. Moreover, the State Bar's committee on advertising, of which I am a member, is formulating more stringent guidelines for lawyer advertising.

## Post office to change system

Recognizing the growing concern in society about disclosing new address information on battered individuals, the U.S. Postal Service is making two major changes in its mail forwarding system, Postmaster General Marvin Runyon has announced.

"Clearly there are troubled individuals who could use our system of address changes for malicious purposes. I want to make sure that doesn't happen," said Runyon.

The first change alters postal regulations so that individuals can no longer walk into a post office and find out where another has moved. Currently, anyone can walk into the post office where an individual formerly lived and, after presenting the old address and paying a fee of \$3, receive the new address, Runyon explained.

In the second change, Runyon said the Postal Service will amend its mail forwarding system so that new address information of court order protected individuals, such as battered women, is blocked from inclusion in its address corrections services. The information, however, would still be used for forwarding purposes.

Or at least, I think that's what it says with this statement:

"Signage has been placed throughout the mall advising shoppers that by Feb. 1, 1994, the mall will be smoke free."

If you want to make your marriage successful, you might consider moving to El Paso.

Of the six largest counties in Texas, El Paso County has by far the lowest divorce rate.

In 1992, there were 7,617 marriages in the state's largest border county and "only" 2,049 divorces. That's 27 percent as many divorces as marriages.

If you think that's high, consider that Travis County ranks second with 52 percent (3,566 divorces versus 6,853 marriages).

Dallas County has the highest divorce-versus-marriage rate among the state's largest counties with 67 percent (11,850 divorces versus 17,773 marriages).

Right behind Dallas, comes Tarrant County at 64 percent (7,976 divorces, 12,416 marriages) and Bexar County at 63 percent (7,418 vs. 11,746).

Harris County had more divorces, 16,508, and more marriages, 29,593, but percentage-wise, it ranked only fifth with 56 percent.

El Paso's 27 percent rate is exactly half of the state's rate of 54 percent for 1992 (96,629 divorces and 178,070 marriages).

These figures come from the Statistical Services Division of the Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Vital Statistics.

And don't think Texans aren't consistent in their marrying and divorcing. The records for 1992 are virtually the same as in 1991 when there were 96,878 divorces and 178,640 marriages for the same 54-percent rate.

The state report gave breakdowns only for the state's six largest counties, but it did include some interesting figures for the state as a whole.

The most numerous age group of both men and women who married in 1992 was 20-24 years. Divorces were most common among the 25-29 age group for women and among the 30-34 age group for men.

The largest number of divorces concluded marriages of less than five years (35,542). Some marriages lasted less than a year before divorce (4,475).

Among adolescents and teens, 506 girls and 55 boys younger than 15 were married. Meanwhile, among those 65 and older, 1,881 women and 3,483 men were married. Divorces involving those 65 and older included 1,019 women and 1,897 men.

Almost half of the divorces in 1992 involved no children, while 23,461 involved one child. The total number of children involved in divorces was 89,936.

## Free soil tests now being given

The Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are sponsoring a free soil testing program for farmers, ranchers and gardeners in the Seymour Aquifer Water Quality Project area.

The program will extend through March 31.

The soil sample should be taken from a uniform area of the field. Take 10 to 15 small sample cores to a depth of six inches for each field to be tested. Mix the samples in a clean plastic bucket, and take out about a pint of the composite sample to be sent in for analysis.

Be sure to fill out an information sheet to send in along with the sample. The information sheet asks about the type of crop to be grown and the yield goal of the crop.

Soil sample bags and information sheets may be picked up at Allison Farm Supply in Rule, Farmers Gin or Lone Star Peanut in Rochester, O'Brien Co-op Gin in O'Brien or the local ASCS, SCS or county extension service office.

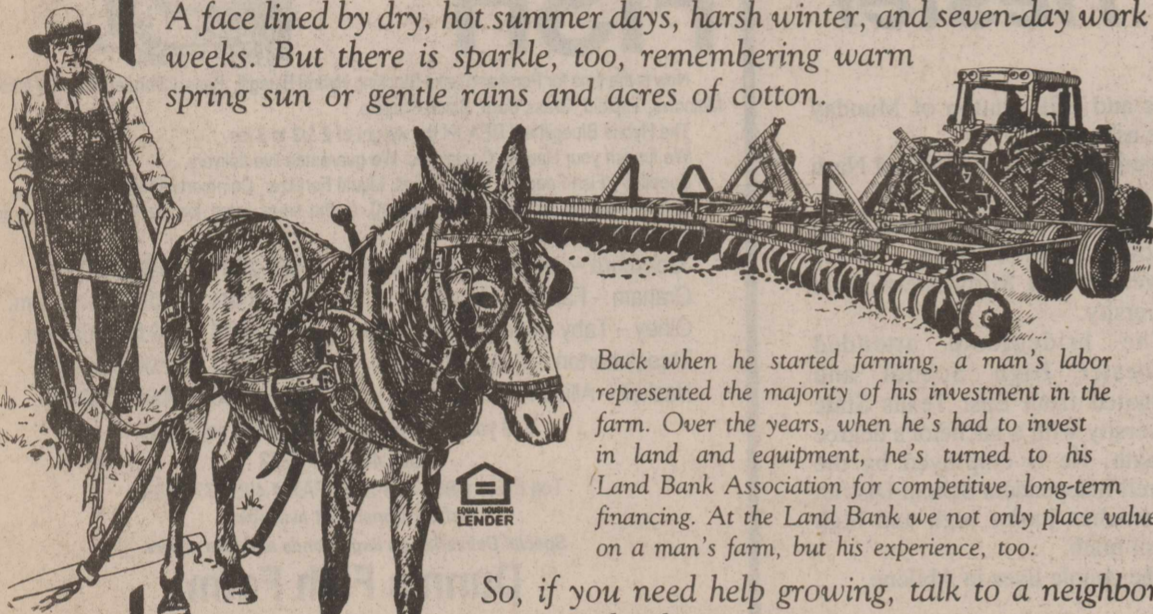

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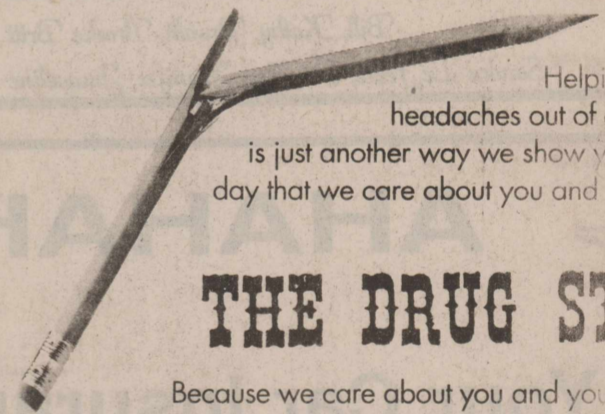
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# FCE Council has first meet of year

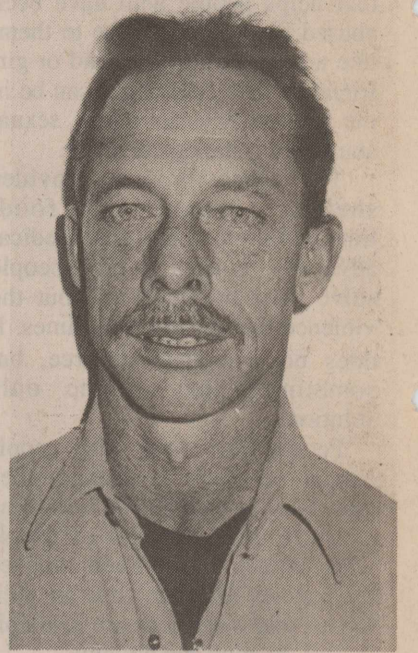

# Students see sights, compete in Houston

Students from Haskell High School traveled to Houston last weekend to attend the Science Olympiad.

Those attending were seniors Wayne Hodgin, Janeen Jordan and Andy Martin; junior Randall Martin; sophomores Tonya Burson, Aaron Earles, Heather Guess and Charissa Huff; and freshmen Sarah Cothron, Wendy Dulaney, Lyle Fouts and Mary Kay Watson.

Sponsors were Haskell High School science teacher Jo McGuire and husband, Mike McGuire, and junior high math teacher Bonnie Fouts and husband, John Fouts.

Olympiad students left early Thursday morning. Their first stop was Austin, where they toured Ag Commissioner Rick Perry's office in the Stephen F. Austin building. Commissioner Perry talked to them about the duties and responsibilities of the ag commissioner.

Then they walked across the street to the Texas Capitol. Although the capitol could not be toured due to renovation work, they toured the underground annex,

which holds offices for state workers.

The students continued on their way with the next stop---Houston's Nassau Bay and Marina Hotel.

Friday morning they toured San Jacinto Monument and the Battleship Texas. After an eventful morning, the students traveled across town to tour Space Center Houston and the Johnson Space Center (NASA). While at NASA they toured the Mission Control Center and the Apollo 18 spacecraft.

At Space Center Houston, the students got to experience what it feels like to be an astronaut. They also toured a mock replica of the Space Shuttle, and see how to land a space shuttle or retrieve a satellite via computer simulation.

Students also watched the film, "To Be An Astronaut," a 25-minute film that not only shows what astronaut training is like, it puts the viewer through it.

Students also toured the Starship Gallery which featured "On Human Destiny," a riveting 15-minute film

created from actual NASA footage. They traced the historical progression of the space program by seeing some of its artifacts such as the actual Mercury, Gemini and Apollo space capsules, along with the Sky Lab trainer.

The Starship Gallery also featured the lunar rover trainer and moon rocks, including one that could be touched.

Saturday morning, they awoke early to travel to San Jacinto College to attend their main objective for the weekend, the Science Olympiad.

At the Olympiad, students competed in events ranging from bridge building contests to biology lab competitions, to pentathlon competitions. Although three students that were to attend the Olympiad weren't there due to flight cancellations, the participating students ranked among the top 10 in every event that was entered. Over 30 different junior high and high schools were represented.

After the Olympiad, the students traveled across the bay and ship channel to Galveston where they went to the seawall and walked on the beach and collected shells and sand for later experiments. That night the students toured Moody Gardens at Galveston, which included the 3-D movie, "The Last Buffalo."

"Sunday morning came too early for us," said Janeen Jordan. "Leaving the excitement of

Houston, NASA and the beach was disappointing.

The group made on more side trip before returning to Haskell. They toured the site of the dismantled Super Conductor Collider.

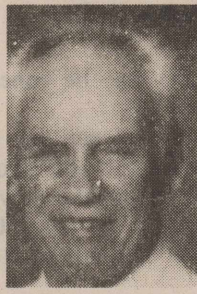

### IMPORTANT TAX DEADLINES - 1994

Important tax filing deadlines are approaching. Cut and save this checklist of the most common filing requirements for businesses and individuals.

•February 28 - Businesses must file information returns (such as 1099s) with the IRS; employers must send W-2 copies to the Social Security Administration.

•March 1 - Farmers or fishermen who did not make 1993 estimated tax payments must file 1993 income tax returns and pay taxes in full.

•March 15 - 1993 calendar-year corporation income tax returns are due.

•April 15 - Individual income tax returns for calendar year 1993 are due unless you file for an automatic extension.

•April 15 - 1993 partnership information returns are due.

•April 15 - 1993 annual gift tax returns are due.

•April 15 - This is the deadline for making a 1993 IRA contribution.

•April 15 - The first installment of 1994 individual estimated tax is due.

•June 15 - The second installment of 1994 individual estimated tax is due.

If you can't file a tax return on time, you may request an extension from the IRS. The extension request must be filed by the return's due date. An extension gives you more time to file a return; it does not give you additional time to pay any taxes still owed.

## Roy Swink gets release from prison

Convicted murderer Roy Swink of Aspermont was to be released from prison Wednesday, but it was not known where he will be living.

Swink, 32, was convicted in December 1978 of the shotgun murder of his 14-year-old brother, Royce, at their Aspermont home. His father and stepmother also were shot to death in the same incident, and Swink later pleaded guilty to those murders.

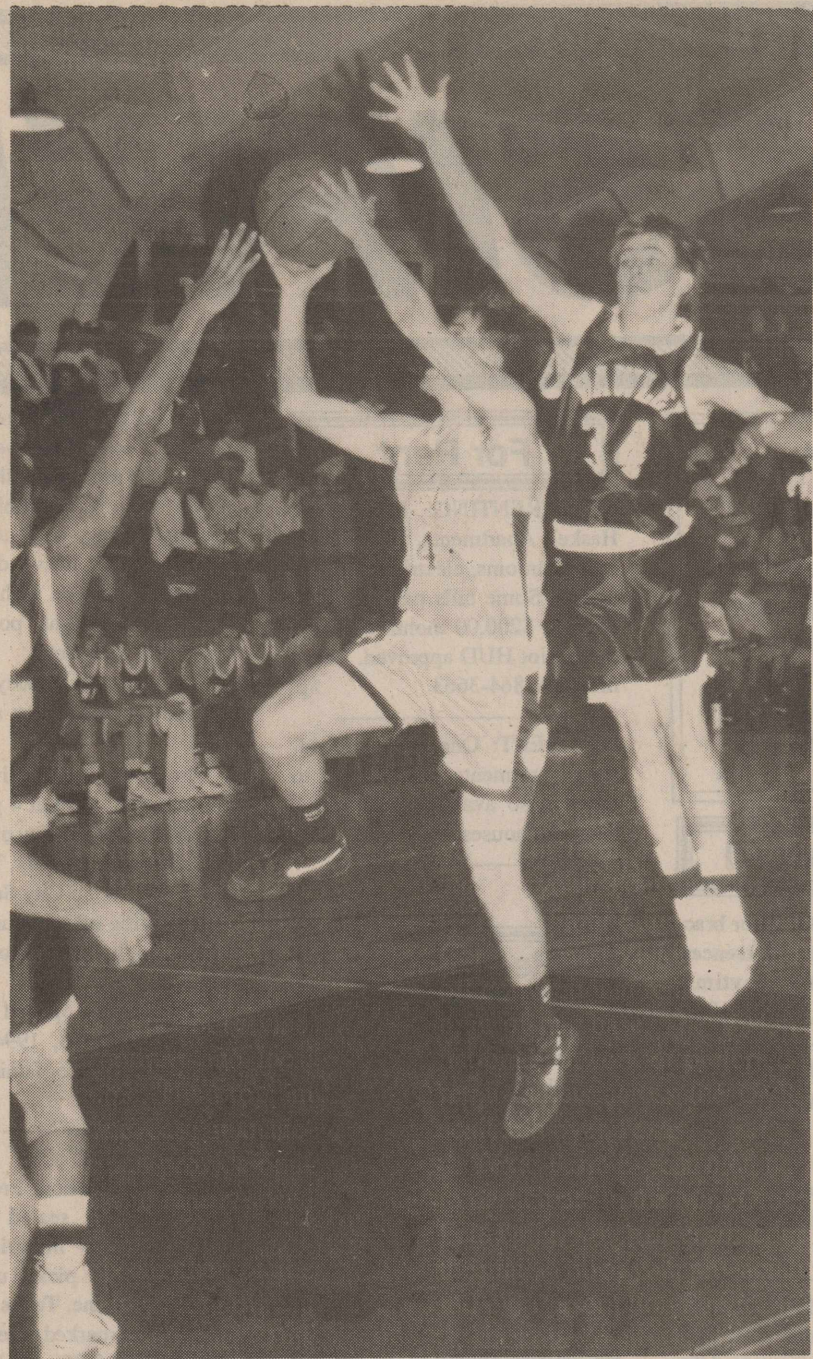
A spokesman for the Division of Pardons and Paroles of the Texas Department of Justice in Austin said Friday that Swink's destination could not be revealed until he is released.

Swink has been in prison in Cleveland, Texas. He was sentenced to 45 years in prison but is being released after serving 15 years because of "good time" and other bonus time.

Swink's release under mandatory supervision differs from parole in that no one has to be notified.

In November, Troy Swink and his wife, Juanita, started a petition drive to keep Roy Swink out of Stonewall, Haskell, Kent, King, Fisher or Jones counties. More than 2,900 signatures were gathered and sent to the parole board.

Under a state law that went into effect Sept. 1, all people released under mandatory supervision are required to be returned to their county of residence, an Abilene attorney and member of the State Board of Pardons and Paroles.

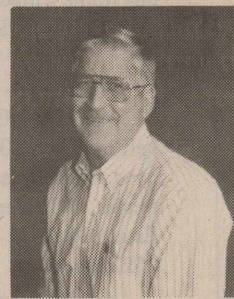

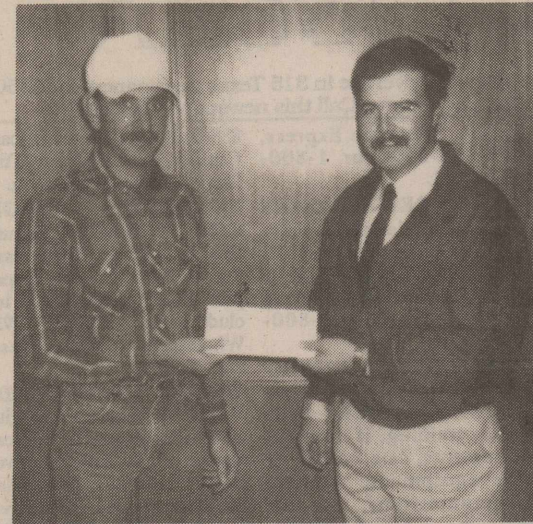
Scholarships worth \$40,000 are awarded annually to youths of Farm Bureau families who compete in other various youth competitions.

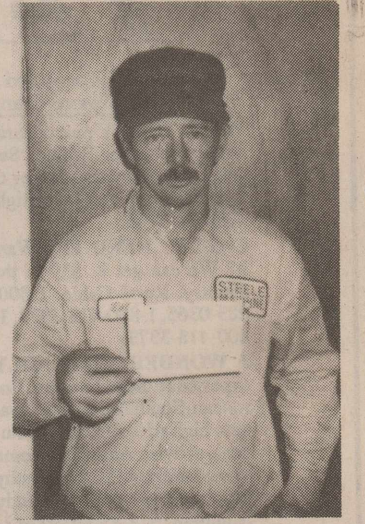
