

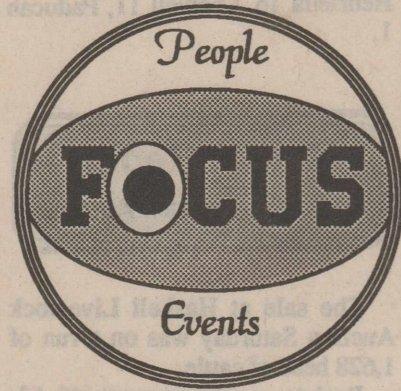

Ken Lane, David Davis seek city offices

Ken Lane has filed as a candidate for mayor in the May 7 city election.

Also filing last week was David Davis as a candidate for City Council.

They join Ruby Turner, a present council member who filed earlier for re-election, as announced candidates for the city election.

City voters will elect a mayor and two council members in the May election. Neither Pat Henry, incumbent mayor, nor Kim Nemir, whose council term is expiring, had filed as of noon Tuesday.

The filing period will remain open through March 23.

Middleton files for school board

David Middleton has filed as a candidate for the Haskell School Board, Position 5, bringing to four the number of candidates for the three board positions to be decided in the May 7 election.

Middleton will seek the position now held by Tiffen Mayfield, who filed earlier for re-election.

Other candidates include incumbent Tom Hairgrove for Position 4, and Randy McLelland for Position 3.

March 23 is the last day that candidates may file.

Steve Barbour and Vern Howard have filed as candidates for re-election to the Paint Creek school board.

The filing period will remain open through March 23.

The school election will be held May 7.

HHS baseball team runs over Rotan

The Haskell Indians upped their district baseball record to 2-0 Friday with a 19-5 victory over Rotan in a game called after five innings under the 10-run rule.

Haskell was leading 8-5 after four innings, but sent 15 batters to the plate in the fifth, scoring 11 runs on 7 hits, 5 bases on balls and two hit batsmen.

Shannon Meeks went the full 5 innings for the Indians, striking out 6 as he boosted his record to 2-0.

As a team, the Indians collected 14 hits in 26 official at-bats. Leading hitters were Chris Silvas, who went 4 for 5 and drove in 2

runs; Jonathan Tatum, who was 3 for 4 with 2 RBIs; Casey Larned, 2 for 3 with 3 RBIs; and Jason Torres, 2 for 3 with 2 RBIs. Silvas, Tatum and Larned each had a double.

Haskell is now 5-1 for the season.

On Tuesday of this week, the Indians were to meet Winters in only their second home game. They have a non-district date in Archer City Friday before resuming district play at Anson next Monday.

Tax help available to seniors

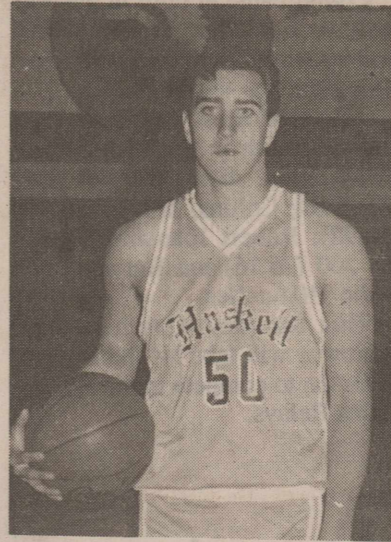
Income tax counseling and preparation of returns will be available again this year at the Experienced Citizens Center in Haskell on March 23 and April 6.

Hours will be from 10 a.m. through 2 p.m., but will be expanded if necessary.

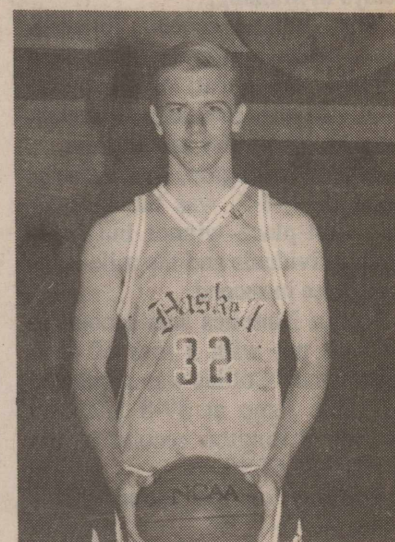
On alternate Wednesdays, the service will be offered at the Stamford VIP Senior Citizens Center.

Assistance is available to persons 60 years or older with low or moderate incomes.

Those seeking the service are asked to bring a copy of last year's tax return, Social Security benefit form SSA-1099, W-2 forms and other income records, plus records of expenses such as interest paid on a home mortgage, property taxes paid, medical expenses, contributions to church and charity, and any other expenses that might be deductible.

Brian Brzowski and Mart Guess of the Haskell Indians were named to the all-district 7-2A basketball team announced by district coaches last week.

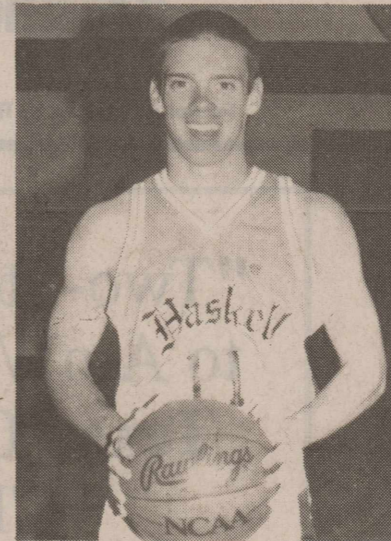
Teresa Diaz of the Maidens was named to the all-district girls' team and Veronica Gonzales was placed on the second team.

Tax deferral available for elderly homeowners

Texans age 65 and older can postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homes by taking advantage of a tax option called "over-65 deferral". This may be done by signing an affidavit at the Haskell County Appraisal District office.

This special form of tax relief also can halt a lawsuit filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's home, according to Jamie Weaver, chief appraiser of the Haskell County Appraisal District.

"To stop a delinquent tax suit," Mrs. Weaver said, "the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending."

"If the affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a

homestead because of delinquent taxes," Mrs. Weaver added.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that home.

Mrs. Weaver stressed that tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the home; it does not cancel them. During the deferral time, taxes and interest of eight percent continue to add up. When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns and lives in the house, the taxes become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred taxes

and interest. There is no penalty on the delinquent taxes during the deferral time. However, filing the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties that were already due. Also, if the taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends, a taxing unit may charge an added penalty if the account goes to a delinquent tax attorney.

Tax deferral forms are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," Mrs. Weaver said.

Indians take third in Mogul Relays

The Haskell Indians opened their 1994 track season Saturday by coming in third in the Mogul Relays in Munday.

The Indians scored 73 team points to finish behind Holliday and Hamlin, and ahead of Seymour, Spur, Petrolia, Henrietta, Munday, Paducah, Knox City and Electra.

Patrick Billington, with a discus throw of 138-5, was the Indians' only first-place winner but three other individuals and the mile relay team came in second.

Martin Limones was second in the shot put with a toss of 48-5 1/2, Richard Collins was second in the triple jump at 39-8 1/2, and Quinten Billington second in the 400 dash at 55.36.



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ATTENTION PROPERTY OWNERS

Property owners should be aware that they have certain rights which may reduce their property tax burden. A pamphlet published by the Comptroller's Property Tax Division, which details all taxpayer's rights, remedies, and responsibilities is available free of charge at the Appraisal District Office. The Appraisal District or the Comptroller's Property Tax Division will be happy to answer your questions and to provide any forms necessary for filing.

Persons who own their residence on January 1, 1994 may claim their home as a homestead. This filing of homestead is only necessary if the homeowner has not previously filed a homestead, or if the homeowner has moved or become 65 during 1993. Disabled Veterans should bring or mail the letter they received from V.A. to the Appraisal District to receive proper tax credit if the percentage of disability has changed.

1. All annual applications must be filed prior May 1 with the Haskell County Appraisal District.
2. Any property ownership change that has occurred since January 1, 1993, requires a new application.

PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS. "RENDER" YOUR TAXABLE PROPERTY BY APRIL 14TH.

Businesses must render their property with county appraisal districts by a new deadline--April 14th. To "render" means to list the taxable property that the business owned or managed as of January 1, 1994.

While state law requires business owners and operators to render, any property owner--including homeowners, farmers and ranchers--may render their property with county appraisal districts. By filing a rendition, property owners are ensuring that the appraisal district has their correct address so they will receive notices of any actions that affect their property or tax bills.

ATTENTION: FARM AND RANCH OWNERS

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber--not on its value on the real estate market. If your land has never had a productivity appraisal, you must apply to your appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1994 property taxes.

1994 TAX NUMBERS ADJUSTED FOR INFLATION
The IRS makes an annual inflation adjustment to the tax brackets, the personal exemption amounts, the standard deduction amounts, and certain other tax numbers. Clip and save these 1994 tax numbers so that you can use them in your 1994 tax planning.

The income tax brackets for 1994 have been adjusted as follows:

The new 36% and 39.6% tax rates established by the 1993 Tax Act will not be adjusted for inflation until 1995.

The deduction for each personal exemption increases in 1994 to \$2,450. The tax benefit of personal exemptions is phased out for higher-income taxpayers.

Standard deductions have been increased for 1994 as follows:

Joint returns & surviving spouses	\$6,350
Married filing separately	3,175
Head of household	5,600
Single	3,800

Higher standard deductions are provided for blind and elderly taxpayers. Married taxpayers who are 65 years or older or who are blind get an additional \$750 of standard deduction (\$1,500 if both 65 and blind). Single taxpayers who are 65 years or older or who are blind get an additional standard deduction of \$950 (\$1,900 if both 65 and blind).

The amount of unearned income that children under the age of 14 may have before the "kiddie-tax" kicks in remains at \$1,200 for 1994.

The maximum payment that can be made to a 401(k) retirement plan in 1994 increases from \$8,994 to \$9,240.
