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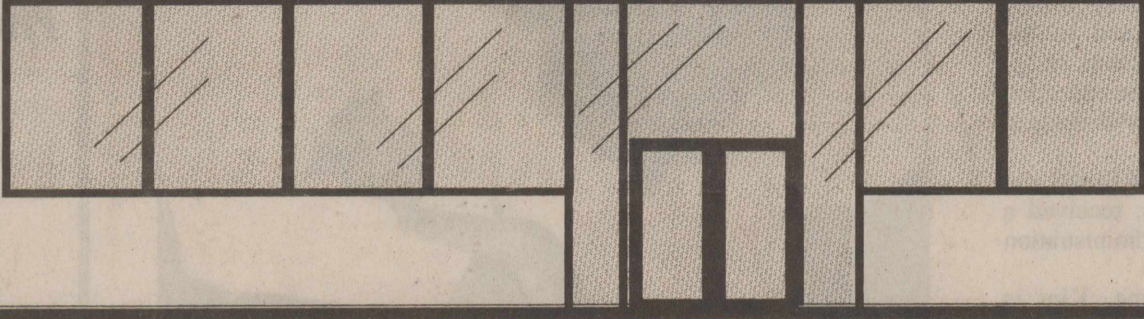

## City may have way to re-open landfill

The possibility of re-opening the city landfill arose Monday when the mayor and city administrator reported to the City Council they had learned of an exemption for arid landfills.

Mayor Ken Lane and administrator Sam Watson, who met earlier this month with the Texas Natural Resources Commission in Austin, said an arid landfill exemption removes the requirement of lining the landfill.

An arid exemption is available to counties west of a north-south line designating the state's counties of less than 25 inches annual rainfall.

The council voted to make application for the arid landfill, and will study the feasibility of re-opening the local facility. An arid landfill is allowed to process up to 20 tons daily.

Haskell's landfill has been closed since April and the city trash has been delivered to Abilene. The landfill was ordered closed by the state for failing to meet a number of requirements, most notable of which was the lining.

The council also instructed city attorney Bill Jones to prepare the by-laws for an Economic

The remodeling is expected to be completed within eight to 10 weeks.

## Free immunizations during summer

The Texas Department of Health has announced that there will be no charge for immunizations this summer.

All shots from June through Aug. 31 will be free of charge, regardless of income.

Next immunization clinic in Haskell will be June 21, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the American Legion Hall. Another clinic will be June 28 during the same hours at the Haskell County courthouse.

## City, sales tax rebate shows sharp decline

A sharp decline in local sales tax collections was reflected in the City of Haskell's rebate check this week from the state comptroller.

The check, in the amount of \$9,493.90, was 41.62 percent lower than the \$16,265.02 received in June of last year. It included taxes collected on April sales and reported to the comptroller in May by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

It brought the 1994 total to date to \$104,236.84, down 12.44 percent from last year's rebates of \$119,056.66 for the first six months of the year.

Rebates are the city's portion of the sales taxes collected by the state, based on Haskell's 1.5-cent sales tax rate. (The local sales tax rate is scheduled to be increased to 2

percent when the new half-cent tax goes into effect.)

Only one other county municipality received a rebate check this month. It was Rule which got a check for \$590.78 this week, about half what it got at this point last year when the rebate was \$1,189.94. For the year, Rule's rebates have totaled \$10,285.92, compared to \$11,200.93 for the first half of 1993.

Three of the four cities in neighboring Jones County also experienced declines in rebates this month. Hawley's rebate was down by 35.93 percent from last year, Hamlin's decrease was 14.33 percent and Anson's 13.45 percent.

Only Stamford showed an improvement---a whopping 31.74-percent increase.

He was presented the Eagle award by his father and scoutmaster, Waller Overton. His mother, Steffi Overton, pinned the award on his chest.

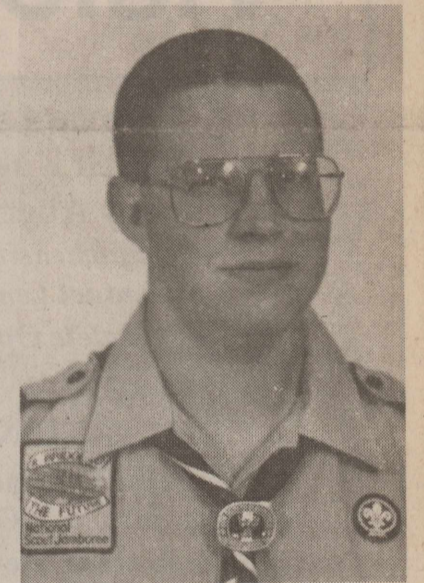

## Marsha Whittemore article published

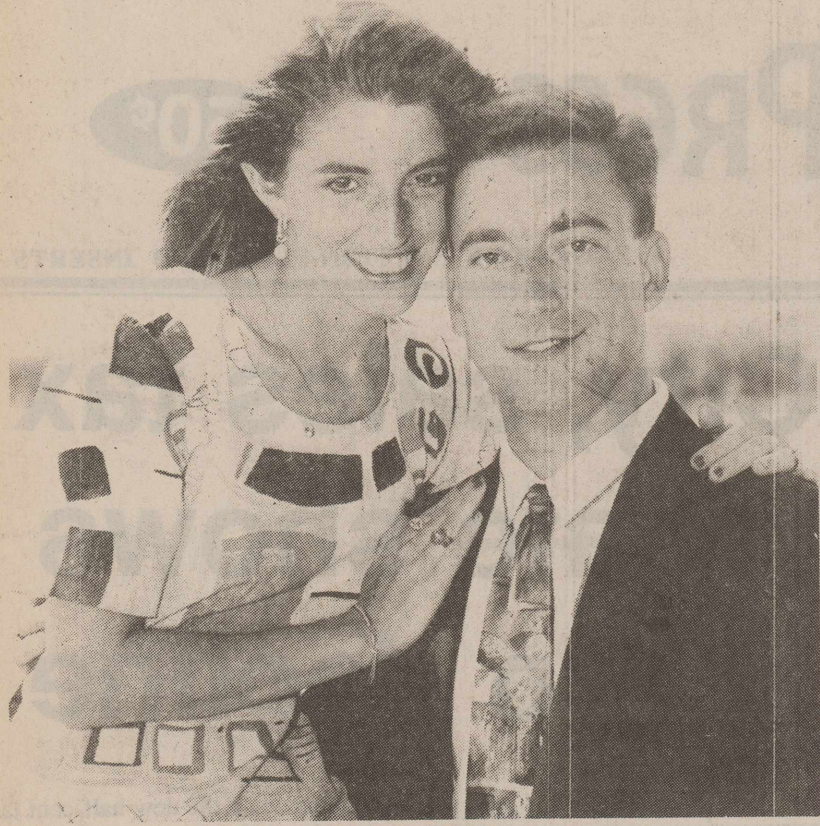
Marsha Whittemore is author of a daily devotional in the current issue of *The Upper Room*.

**Attacking Asthma:** Aggressive monitoring and treatment are important in asthma. Peak-flow meters are inexpensive, hand-held devices that measure how fast air can be blown out of the lungs. With regular use, they may signal the need for increased medication to prevent an attack. Children can be taught easily how to use them. Newer medications now are advocated to stop the underlying inflammation of asthma rather than just treat the symptoms. Steroids are the most effective, although they can have severe side effects.

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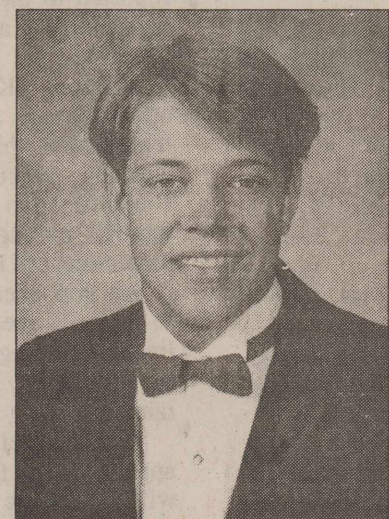

The Weinert Family and Community Education Club met for its regular meeting Tuesday, June 7, in the home of Agnes Winchester for a program entitled "Make a Difference With a Renewable Home for the Handicapped."

Mrs. LaRue Reeves of Munday was guest speaker, and she based her talk on some of her own experiences when her husband went from a healthy person to a wheelchair patient, because of an accident.

She demonstrated how to lift an invalid from a wheelchair into the car, using a belt, and that she had to learn the technique before he could be dismissed to home care. And since home health has specific requirements, many things in the home had to be altered and changed.

Mrs. Reeves showed photos of

her home and some of the changes that were made, beginning with a ramp they put in under the patio-carport which was the first necessity. It was built with a hand rail on each side of the ramp which is an aid to the patient in helping himself, going into the house, or leaving it.

Another requirement is a door into the bathroom wide enough for a wheelchair, a shower stall which will accommodate a shower chair, with hand-held bars inside and outside the stall.

Other things she mentioned were an elevated commode seat, a firm mattress, a "touch" lamp by the bedside (or a light switch by the bed).

She had to remove all the lounge chairs, the throw rugs and other furniture that would hinder the wheelchair. They now use the

high-backed Queen Anne chairs which are easier to get off of, and floor covering a chair can maneuver on.

They installed parallel bars and exercise pulley-sets and also an exercise bicycle, because after just three days in bed a patient loses much of his muscle tone and must regain his strength.

After Mrs. Reeves' very informative talk, the club members answered roll call with "What I need in my home right now." Things mentioned ranged from a hand-rail on the porch to a step-in shower.

The president announced that there will be no council meeting in June, and that July will be the vacation month the club elected to use.

Mrs. Yates announced that the Weinert 4-H Club will disband and will merge with the Haskell and Munday 4-H clubs. The club regrets the decision, but appreciation for the dedication of Mrs. Yates and Mrs. Murphy through the years as 4-H leaders was expressed.

Next meeting will be Aug. 2, with Jimmy Weinert as hostess.

Mrs. Winchester served delicious refreshments of finger sandwiches, ice-box cherry pie, "veggie" plate with lemonade.

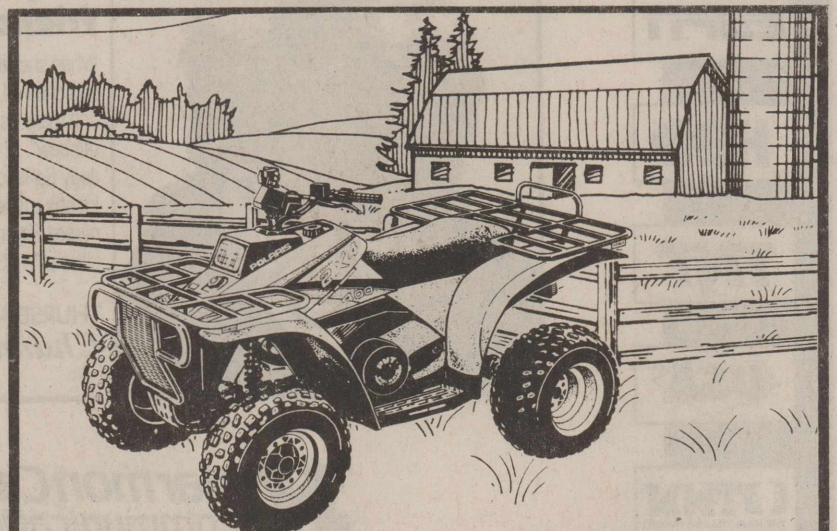

### Tax Changes Likely If Health Care Passes

Congress is working on health care legislation, struggling to craft a package that can win a majority of votes in the House and Senate and meet President Clinton's approval. Using President Clinton's 1993 health care proposal as a starting point, Congress has already made it clear that any final bill is likely to differ-perhaps significantly-from the President's plan. Clinton's plan calls for universal coverage with mandatory employer-paid health insurance, mandatory consumer-alliances, and cost controls.

Clinton's health care proposal also included a number of tax provisions, including the following:

- increasing to 75 cents a pack the federal excise tax on cigarettes, with comparable tax increases on other tobacco products.
- giving the IRS broader authority to issue regulations for determining whether a worker is an employee or an independent contractor.
- specifying a standard package of health benefits and treating as taxable income to employees benefits provided beyond the basic package.
- allowing self-employed individuals to deduct 100% of their health insurance costs.
- allowing a tax deduction for long term care expenses and long-term care insurance.
- pulling state and local government employees into the Medicare program and requiring them to pay the Medicare tax on their wages.
- providing tax credits to doctors and other health care providers for working in areas where there are shortages of health care professionals.
- requiring more-than-2% shareholders in service industry S corporations to pay self-employment tax on nonwage income from the corporation, with similar rules applying to limited partners in partnerships.

Remember, these are only proposals. Many changes are likely to be made before any final health care reform legislation is passed. You should, however, keep the possibility of some tax law changes in mind as you do your 1994 individual and business tax planning.

## No reduction in wheat acreage

The 1995 wheat program contains a zero percent acreage reduction, the same as in 1994, according to Glenn Brzozowski, county executive director of the Haskell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Producers who participate in the 1995 program will not be required to reduce their plantings to qualify for price support loans and deficiency payments.

"This means that there is no requirement to place eligible crop land into an Acreage Conservation

Reserve," Brzozowski said.

He said the zero-percent acreage reduction continues to be the best choice because it provides the highest income for producers, the greatest economic activity for rural communities and the highest quality grain for processors. This level was chosen from the statutory range of zero to 15 percent to allow wheat growers to produce sufficient wheat supplies for domestic and export needs.

As in 1994, the wheat program offers target price protection at \$4 per bushel. No paid land diversion will be implemented.
