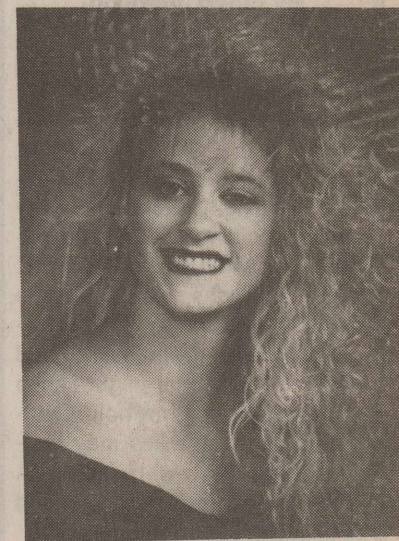
She announced that Erma Liles of the Haskell club is to be Mesquite District's representative to the TFWC centennial celebration planning committee.

Their journey began June 13 in San Francisco and will end Aug. 12 in Washington, D. C. The trip goes through 21 states and the District of Columbia, averaging 75 miles per day. The bikers enjoy a day off every 7 to 10 days.

All undergraduate members of Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity, the "Journey of Hope" team is reaching out to

people in cities and towns from coast to coast to join them in their efforts.

The bicycle team which came through Haskell was one of two being sponsored by NationsBank to bring the message of "PUSH America", a national organization serving people with disabilities in unique and inspiring ways. Their mission is to educate the leaders of today and tomorrow on how they can make a positive impact on the lives of some very special people.

Both teams began by crossing

the Golden Gate Bridge in San Francisco. After the first week, the teams separated, one taking a northern route, the other a southern route. They will reunite to ride the last day into Washington.

A national network of more than 400 volunteers assists in the planning and implementation of events along the Journey of Hope.

Pi Kappa Phi has raised more than \$3 million since 1977 for PUSH America from 145 chapters nationwide.

Preventing and Treating Hemorrhoids: Hemorrhoids may be prevented by avoiding constipation with a high-fiber diet or having a doctor treat constipation, keeping the anal area very clean, avoiding rough toilet paper, and avoiding heavy lifting. Warm sitz baths and bed rest are helpful treatments. Taking frequent breaks from sitting and avoiding foods that might cause constipation also may help. Over-the-counter remedies may temporarily relieve external pain. A last resort is surgery, but second opinions should be sought.

Things Change-Including Tax Returns

After you finally send your tax return to the IRS, you probably don't want to think about it again. But there may be good reasons to consider filing an amended return.

Probably the most common reason for amending a return is to correct an error or omission on your original return. But you should also be aware of other reasons to amend.

If you suffer a loss in a federally-declared disaster area, you can amend last year's tax return and deduct this year's disaster loss. By doing so, you may be able to pick up an immediate tax refund. But note: Depending on your income and tax bracket in the year of the disaster, you might actually get a bigger tax break by waiting and taking the loss in the year it occurred.

If your business suffers an operating loss that exceeds your other income for the year, the excess loss can be carried back three years for a refund of taxes paid in those prior years.

From time to time, Congress makes retroactive changes to the tax laws. The IRS and the courts also periodically reinterpret tax rulings and cases. When these changes or reinterpretations occur, you may be able to recover some of the tax you've already paid. For example, Congress's retroactive reinstatement of certain deductions and credits in the 1993 Tax Act may qualify you for a refund.

In general, you must amend your tax return within three years after you filed your original return, or within two years after you made your tax payment to the IRS, whichever is later.

An amended return doesn't necessarily increase your chance of being audited. But you should assume that your amended return, as well as your original return, will be reviewed by a living, breathing person at the IRS. So amended returns should include all required attachments, and all calculations should be carefully checked for accuracy.

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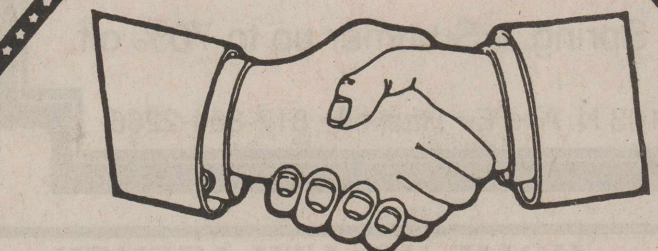
