Services were held Tuesday, Jan. 31, for Friedrich Wilhelm Buerger, 89, of Stamford at the Bethel Lutheran Church in Ericksdahl, with Kent Wallace and Stan Leaf officiating. Burial was in Highland Memorial Cemetery under the direction of Kinney Funeral Home.

Buerger died Saturday, Jan. 28, in Teakwood Manor Nursing Home in Stamford. He was born March 28, 1905, in Oppenwehe, Germany and immigrated to the United States in Sept., 1923 at the age of 18. He became a citizen of the United States.

He married Selma Thane on Dec. 31, 1925, in Sagerton. They settled on a farm in the community of Ericksdale and lived there until 1955, when they moved to Stamford. **Adult foster care providers needed**

Adult Foster Care (AFC) is a Texas Department of Human Services program promoting the availability of appropriate services for elderly and persons with disabilities in a home-like environment. This program is designed to enhance the dignity, independence, individuality, privacy, choice and decision making ability of the participant.

AFC provides a 24 hour living arrangement in a DHS enrolled foster home for persons who, because of physical or mental limitations, are unable to continue independent functioning in their own homes. Up to four residents may be served in a foster home, though there are limitations as to the number of participants that may require certain tasks be performed with them.

AFC homes must be enrolled by DHS, pass inspections for fire safety and health conditions. AFC requires the Foster Home to provide each participant enough living space to guarantee their privacy, dignity, and independence.

Responsible, mature, healthy adults capable of meeting the needs of the participants in the home are needed as providers. They must be physically and mentally able to perform all the required duties and tasks delegated to them. The provider must live in and share the same household with the participants. These individuals need communication skills to exchange ideas and directions to the participant and the participant's family.

Other considerations for becoming an AFC provider must include evidence of testing for tuberculosis, providing three references from persons not related to the applicant, and demonstrate financial stability. The applicant must own or lease the

home to be considered for enrollment, have a substitute provider and not have a felony record.

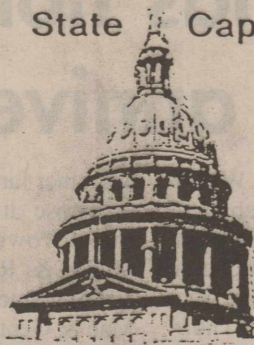

## HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — Insurance Commissioner Rebecca Lightsey resigned Jan. 27, making way for former state Rep. Elton Bomer, who is Gov. George W. Bush's nominee for the post.

The day before her resignation, Lightsey postponed a hearing on auto insurance rates that she had scheduled against the wishes of Bush. Earlier this month, however — in defiance of Bush — Lightsey adopted rules that end "red-lining," a practice in which insurers discriminate against consumers based on where they live.

Bomer, a Montalva Democrat, once he is confirmed by the state Senate, will be responsible for balancing the interests of insurers and consumers in revising the benchmark rate for auto insurance.

A judicial panel has recommended that the benchmark be jacked up from 5 to 9.75 percent. Insurance companies base their individual rates from 30 percent below to 30 percent above the benchmark.

Meanwhile, Bomer said he wants to beef up fraud-fighting efforts in the Texas Department of Insurance. "Fraud is very definitely a major problem," Bomer told a Senate Finance Subcommittee.

Bomer also said he plans to meet Feb. 8 with a Travis County grand jury that accused the department of failing to investigate fraud and cited "undue influence from the insurance industry," in a letter to Bush.

### TexPool: Live or Die?

Texas Treasurer Martha Whitehead says she will oppose legislative efforts to kill the state's Tex-Pool investment fund.

In December, depositors who likened TexPool to the bankrupt investment fund of Orange County, Calif., withdrew \$2.3 billion from the \$3.7 billion fund.

State Rep. Bill Siebert, R-San Antonio, said he is considering a bill that would shut down TexPool and privatize it.

Whitehead, who campaigned to abolish the Treasury and cede its functions to the comptroller's office, said TexPool should remain state-run, and pointed out that the fund has grown back to \$2 billion since the December run by depositors.

Since December, however, competing private funds run by former state Treasury officials have swelled.

### No More Laptop Games

Texas House members are just as likely as anyone else to suffer from human frailties.

And so, John Bender, House director of communications, ordered the Texas Legislative Council to remove all games from the laptop

computers assigned to every state representative.

"It seemed somewhat of a distraction," Bender explained.

Speaker James E. "Pete" Laney told the *Austin American-Statesman* he never knew the games were loaded into his computer, and admitted that he hasn't yet learned to switch on the unit.

Bans on games in state computers already exist in Virginia, Kentucky, West Virginia and Pennsylvania.

### Ticket Scalping Targeted

Sen. J.E. "Buster" Brown, R-Lake Jackson has introduced a bill that would outlaw ticket scalping.

The measure would prohibit the resale of event tickets for a price higher than that offered to the general public by the event sponsor.

This is the sixth time such a bill has been filed. A similar bill passed the Senate two years ago but died in the House.

### Other Highlights

Gov. Bush tentatively is scheduled to deliver his first State of the State address to a joint session of the Texas House and Senate on Feb. 7.

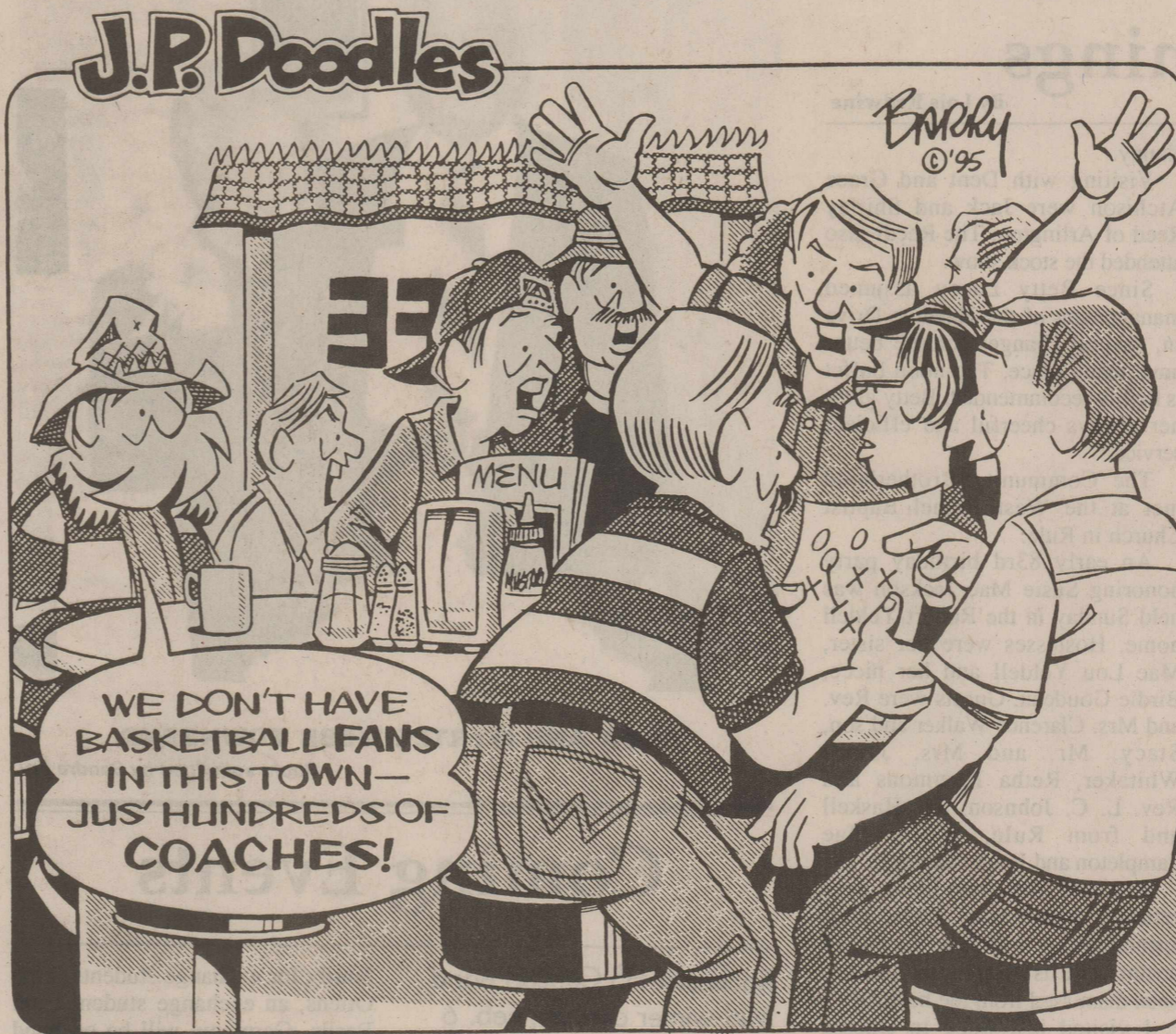
The Texas Senate has confirmed Gov. Bush's choice for chairman of the State Board of Education, Houston chiropractor Jack Christie.

The Texas Trial Lawyers Association is supporting legislation by Sen. Eddie Lucio, D-Brownsville, to toughen the penalties for filing frivolous lawsuits. And prisoners who file frivolous lawsuits could lose their good conduct time under a separate proposal by Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston.

While discussing his support for legislation allowing Texans to carry concealed handguns, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock said, "I have no reason to believe that my fellow Texans are cave men and women who are going to go out and shoot everybody walking up and down the street."

Gov. Bush last week said he would support legislative efforts that would abolish most public funding of abortions and require mandatory notification of the parents of minors seeking abortions. He also poo-pooed a bill sponsored by Rep. Debra Danburg, D-Houston, that seeks to increase penalties for criminal trespassing at clinics where abortions are performed.

Nine Texans who earlier filed a successful challenge to the state's congressional districts have filed a similar suit in a Houston court against the Texas Legislature in efforts to prevent future elections under the current election plan for state legislators. Plaintiffs say the districts are "racially gerrymandered."



## From Out of the Past

From the files of The Haskell Free Press

### 20 Years Ago Jan. 30, 1975

A four day trial ended late Thursday and was declared a mistrial by District Judge William P. Ratliff. The trial was declared a mistrial because the jury could not agree on a verdict. It was the trial of Johnny Smoot of Houston, who was charged with the July 15, 1974 shooting death of James Windeburn. The declaration of mistrial came after nine hours of deliberation.

Calvin Wilfong was judged champion at the Odessa Stock Show and reserve champion at the State Fair Stock Show and the Fort Worth Stock Show.

Super Stooges vs. The Wonder Women was the featured cinema at the Texas Theater in Haskell.

### 30 Years Ago Feb. 4, 1965

Joe Josselet, all-district 5-AA as an offensive end in 1963 and defensive halfback in 1964, was awarded two of the five trophies bestowed at the annual Haskell Booster Club's All-sports Banquet on Thursday night. Other award winners at the banquet included Jesse Priest, Gary Conner, Joe Josselet and Carolyn Fischer.

Two members of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department received injuries while fighting an early morning fire which gutted a five-room house near downtown Haskell early Friday. All but four of this town's 32-member Volunteer Fire Dept. fought the stubborn blaze three hours in 20-degree temperature before subduing it.

Mrs. Arlos (Hazel) Weaver, a teacher in Haskell County, Weichert and Haskell Schools for 40 years,

was one of only three persons awarded doctorate degrees at the Winter commencement of North Texas State University in Denton on Monday.

Felker's Cafe was advertising a 1/4 fried chicken or a catfish steak dinner, with snow-flake potatoes, green salad, hot rolls, butter, ice tea or coffee, for 60 cents on their special Friday night menu.

### 60 Years Ago Jan. 31, 1935

### 70 Years Ago Jan. 30, 1925

F.A. West opened his new grocery store, located in the Pierson Building, last Saturday, and reported good patronage each day since the store opened.

Jim Fouts, living just outside of the city limits, had a cow which

was a record-breaker in butter production. From Dec. 24, to Jan. 24, Fouts sold 57 pounds of butter from this cow after supplying his own table. He received 35 cents to 40 cents per pound for a total of \$21.15 for the months sales.

A permanent organization of the Haskell Hotel Company was formed Tuesday at a meeting held in the Public Library club rooms. A building committee was named, comprised of John W. Pace, J.U. Fields, R.C. Montgomery, Courtney Hunt and Oscar Oates, and they were instructed to secure a site, have plans drawn, and proceed with construction. A modern hotel of at least 35 rooms was planned.

### 90 Years Ago Feb. 4, 1905

At a mass meeting of farmers and others interested in the prosperity of this section, held last Saturday, a resolution was adopted asking all farmers to reduce their cotton planting this year by 25 percent from last year. Also, that all cotton be held where possible for a higher price than is being paid today.

The community was experiencing a week of unusually disagreeable weather for this country. It set in with a mist and drizzle the first of the week, and it froze as it came in contact with the ground. Turning colder, a light snow fell on Wednesday and it snowed and sleeted at intervals for the rest of the week. Saturday afternoon, about two inches of snow was on the ground and light sleet was falling. The temperature dropped to its lowest point, 5-1/2 degrees above zero on Friday night.

Dormitories are located on the capitol grounds. Pages are supervised while in their quarters, which are guarded by the Capitol Police, 24-hours-a-day.

Congressman Stenholm will not be the page's employer, nor will he have daily contact with the page. Pages all answer directly to the Director of Page Services.

The deadline to apply for a page position is February 14, 1995. Application will be forwarded to a Selection Committee who will notify finalists by March 8, 1995. Interviews will be conducted in Abilene on March 18, 1995 and pages will be selected on that date.

For many gardeners, this is a slack time; no beast is working its way through the peppers or tomatoes and no deadlines are looming.

It is a time that you may be thinking about what kind of a gardener you want to be this year. Do you want to be more creative or just be better organized? You may be asking what can I do?

First, keep a journal on paper or your calendar of what you planted, when and the results.

Resolve to try something new, weird or just different. I think every garden deserves at least one oddball plant. Resolve to succeed with something that stumped you. If broccoli or begonias failed you, study their culture in detail to prove you can overcome failures with successes in the future.

Of all the things that enable you to have a successful garden, the soil is most important. It must be loose, cultivated and fertile. Be sure the soil is dry; so it can be turned, loosened and free of hard clods. It needs sphagnum peat, compost, chopped leaves to loosen the soil.

For you who are wanting to know what to plant in the shade, I think of Azaleas first. But our summers are too hot for them. Our hot dry winds they cannot stand. Rhododendrons like shade and coleuses and others do also. I have grown oakleaf hydrangeas in the shade and they did well. The denseness of the shade is important. A filtered shade is better for more blossoms. Shade does cool the air which is very important.

When all danger of freeze or frost is over, now is the time to plant or set out caladiums, dahlias and gladioli. If you choose to sow seeds in doors, it is time to plant seeds of marigolds, zinnias, coleus, scarlet sage or salvia and other warm

season annuals in our area.

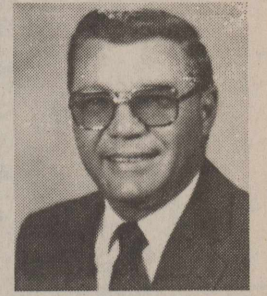
For you rose growers, you should prune roses after all danger of frost or freeze is over. Proper pruning makes more compact bushes and nicer blooms. If the bushes are well-established, prune about 12 to 20 inches from the ground. Prune out all dead wood and canes growing toward the center of the bush for better air circulation. Cut about 1/8 of an inch above an outside bud. Cut on the slant using sharp shears and seal all cuts with a rose sealer.

To water and indoor hanging basket without excess water dripping on the floor, put a few ice cubes on top of the soil; but do not touch the plants. As the cubes melt, the water will reach the roots slowly enough to be absorbed.

### Tax-Cutting Moves For 1994

Even though 1994 is history, there's still time to cut your 1994 taxes. Here are some of the best strategies.

- Contribute to an Individual Retirement Account (IRA). IRA contributions come in two varieties: tax-deductible and non-deductible. An IRA contribution is deductible if you didn't participate in another retirement plan during 1994 or, if you did, you met certain income requirements. But even a non-deductible IRA can make sense. That's because IRA earnings grow tax-deferred, which can help cut your taxes in the future. You must make either type of IRA contribution by April 17, 1995.

- Review your tax documents. Banks, brokerage firms, and employers sometimes make mistakes, and they may have reported too much income on your 1099 and W-2 forms. You should also check Form 1098, which reports your mortgage-interest payments.

- Review your activities during 1994. Unusual or nonroutine events sometimes create tax deductions. For example, you may be entitled to a tax break if you moved, searched for a new job, refinanced a mortgage, suffered a casualty loss, or incurred large medical expenses during 1994.

- Consider a multiple support agreement. You may be able to claim a parent or other relative as a dependent in 1994, even if you provided less than 50% of that person's support. The key is whether you provided at least 10% of support, and total support by all people exceeded 50%. Certain other rules apply, so get details if you're helping to support a relative.

- Get organized. Good financial records usually result in a more complete and accurate tax return. If you didn't keep up with your paperwork during 1994, it's not too late to start.
