## DPS offers safety tips for Halloween

The month of October, cooler weather, leaves falling; all reminders that Halloween is just around the corner. For many, private parties have become the tradition, but for many others, Halloween is an opportunity to visit our neighborhood door to door.

For those who will be out collecting candy this Halloween, Trooper Bobby Hart, with the Texas Dept. of Public Safety offers these following tips.

**For Kids:**  
•Wear light colored clothing or reflective tape so you can be easily seen.

•Make sure your costume fits well.

•Face makeup is preferred, but if you wear a mask, make sure that you can see through it.

•Small children should be accompanied by adults or older

children.

•Trick or treat with friends. It's fun and safer, too.

•Carry a flashlight, it helps others to see you.

•Trick or treat in a familiar neighborhood.

•Only visit homes with porch lights on.

**For Parents:**

•Motorists should drive slowly in residential areas.

•Be alert, watching for kids darting into the street between parked vehicles.

•If you participate in Halloween, leave a porch light on.

•Remove obstructions in the walkways.

•Instruct your children in traffic safety, such as using sidewalks whenever possible.

•Advise your children not to eat the candy until you have had an opportunity to check it out.

## Bridge replacement discussed at Commissioner's meeting

The Haskell County Commissioners Court met in regular session Tuesday morning with a short agenda.

Commissioner Hester reported that the work being done at the county jail—moving a fence so that a generator could be put in place—was progressing and was almost finished.

Joe Higgins with the Texas Dept. of Transportation had submitted a map of the county, with bridge locations on it, to County Judge Roberson, regarding the proposed building of a new bridge, over Turkey Paint Creek in Precinct 4, by the state. Commissioner Turnbow recommended accepting the proposal as the existing bridge was unsafe.

Commissioner Perry said that a bridge was needed over the California Creek in Precinct 3

much more than the creek in Precinct 4, because of the higher traffic in that location. California Creek does not have a bridge, only a low-water crossing. Judge Roberson said that the state is just replacing substandard bridges that need to be replaced, not building new ones, however that he would talk to Higgins about the matter.

Commissioner Perry suggested appointing Bob Baker as the county's representative on the Appraisal District Board. The Court was unanimously in agreement. Perry said that he would talk with Baker regarding the appointment before the next Commissioner's Court meeting.

The Courthouse will be closed Tuesday, Nov. 7, for the general election. Absentee voting began last Wednesday, Oct. 18, with a few votes being cast already.

## Student Code of Conduct to be updated per Senate Bill 1

The Haskell CISD board met Tuesday night, Oct. 17, for their first regularly scheduled meeting with new Superintendent of Schools, Don Pheil.

City Police K-9 Officer, Joe Ray Torres appeared before the board to thank them for their

contribution in helping to obtain the K-9 drug dog and to update them on the recent working of the dog at border checkpoints in El Paso. Torres said that the trip to El Paso was made so that the dog could keep up his work, "The dog needs to work continuously and has

to be recertified every six months."

Only one bid was received on the new suburban that the board is planning on purchasing, so the issue was not acted on. The board authorized Superintendent Pheil to check on some used suburbans at the local Chevrolet dealer.

A motion for a school calendar amendment was presented, but after much discussion, a motion was approved to leave the calendar as amended in September.

In other business: a motion was approved to update the Student Code of Conduct as presented in Senate Bill 1 which went into affect Sept. 1; a motion was approved to hire a Records Consultant firm to get stored school records in compliance; and a

motion was approved to include unexcused absences as well as excused absences on the test exemption waiver. The waiver had to be approved by the local school board before going to the state for approval.

Superintendent Pheil reported to the board on his trip to Weinert to check out the possibility of using the Weinert School building as a location for an Alternative Education Program to be implemented by the Haskell CISD. Pheil said that he is investigating the cost of starting the school and dividing the expenses per each school district that will be involved.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the board is set for Tuesday, Nov. 21.

## Spooktacular Halloween planned

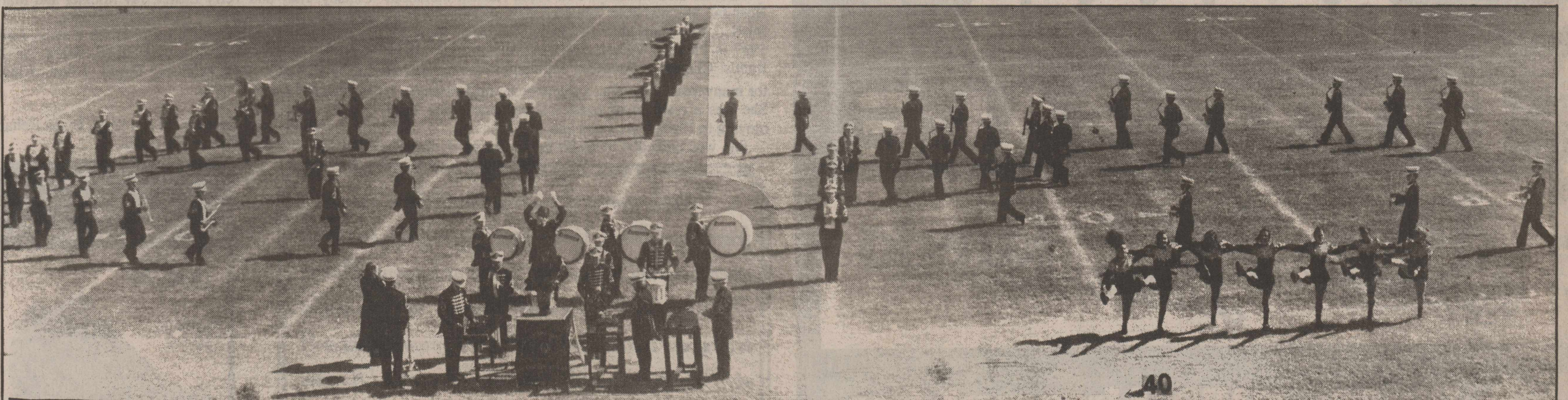

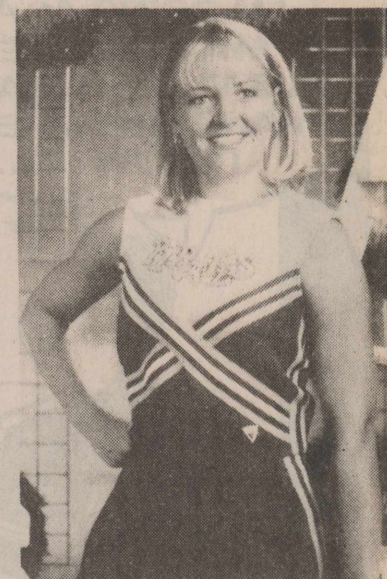
The conference is a unique leadership development program for high school students who have demonstrated leadership potential and scholastic merit. Watson will be among 350 attending the conference from across America.

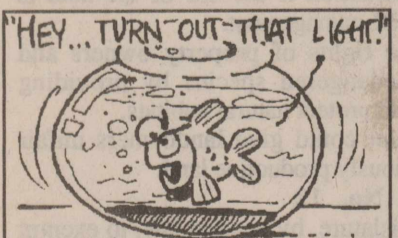

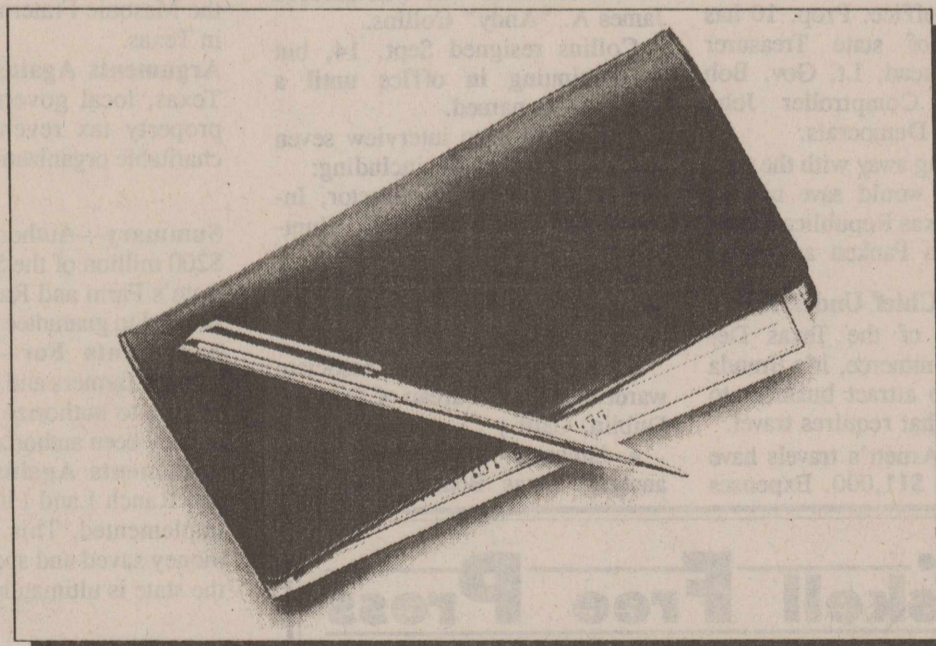

Trick or treating can be safe and fun if you follow these simple but important tips.

- Keep children away from lit jack-o'-lanterns.
- Make sure costumes are not so long that your child could trip on them. Reflective tape should be put on all costumes—especially dark-colored ones. Also, painted faces are better than masks since masks almost always affect vision.
- Instruct children not to eat any treats before you have inspected them.
- Trick or treat only in well-lighted neighborhoods—preferably only at homes where you know the occupants personally.
- Carry a flashlight and walk on sidewalks, not on streets. Warn children not to run between parked cars to cross the street.
- Inspect treats closely. Candy with torn wrappers or any packaging that looks like it has been tampered with should be immediately thrown away.
- Fruit should be washed and cut into small pieces before eating.

## Indians lose to Hamlin

Despite Indian player, Justin Lisle scoring a touchdown and kicking the extra point in the first two minutes of the game Friday night at Hamlin, the Pied Pipers gained a seven point lead over the Indians by the end of the first quarter and continued to hold and advance their lead all through the game.

Mik Everett scored the second touchdown on a pass from Cory Green during the second quarter. But the Pied Pipers scored two touchdowns which gave them a 14 point lead at the end of the quarter.

Haskell went scoreless in the third quarter and Hamlin scored their last two touchdowns of the game. The score was 42 to 14 at the end of the third quarter.

Lisle scored on a 1 yard run and kicked the extra point in the fourth quarter to give Haskell their final touchdown of the night. Hamlin did not score in that quarter, but won the game 42-22.

Leading the Indians in individual rushing was Justin Lisle with 17 runs for 120 yards. On the defensive side, Turner Frierson led the team with six solo and ten assisted tackles; Jace Yates had four solo and six assisted tackles; and Harrison Druessedow had three solo and six assisted tackles.

The Indians are 0-2 in District 7-2A play and 2-5 for the year. They will play Anson here Friday at 7:30 p.m.

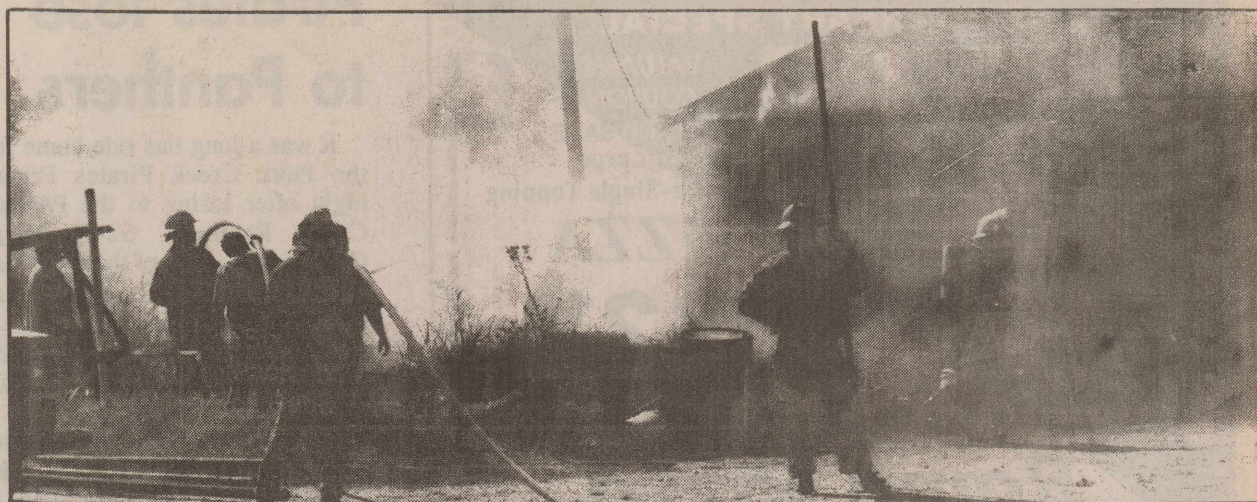

## Halloween candy alternatives

This year when trick-or-treaters come to the door, they should be given something more nutritious than candy. Extension nutrition specialist, Dr. Dymple Cooksey, says there are some great alternatives. She suggests individually wrapped packages of crackers, plain cookies, raisins, nuts or sugarless gum. She says this would be substituting more healthful snacks with foods children still love.

The key also is that the snacks be wrapped. Lots of parents will throw out homemade goodies and fruit because there is no wrapping to tell if they might have been tampered with. All this stems from scares in Halloween's past with poisons and dangerous objects hidden in candy and snacks.

Cooksey recommends telling children not to eat their treats until they bring them home and examine them. She says parents should accompany children, especially small children on their Halloween routes. She also recommends setting a curfew of nine o'clock for older children to be home from trick-or-treating.
