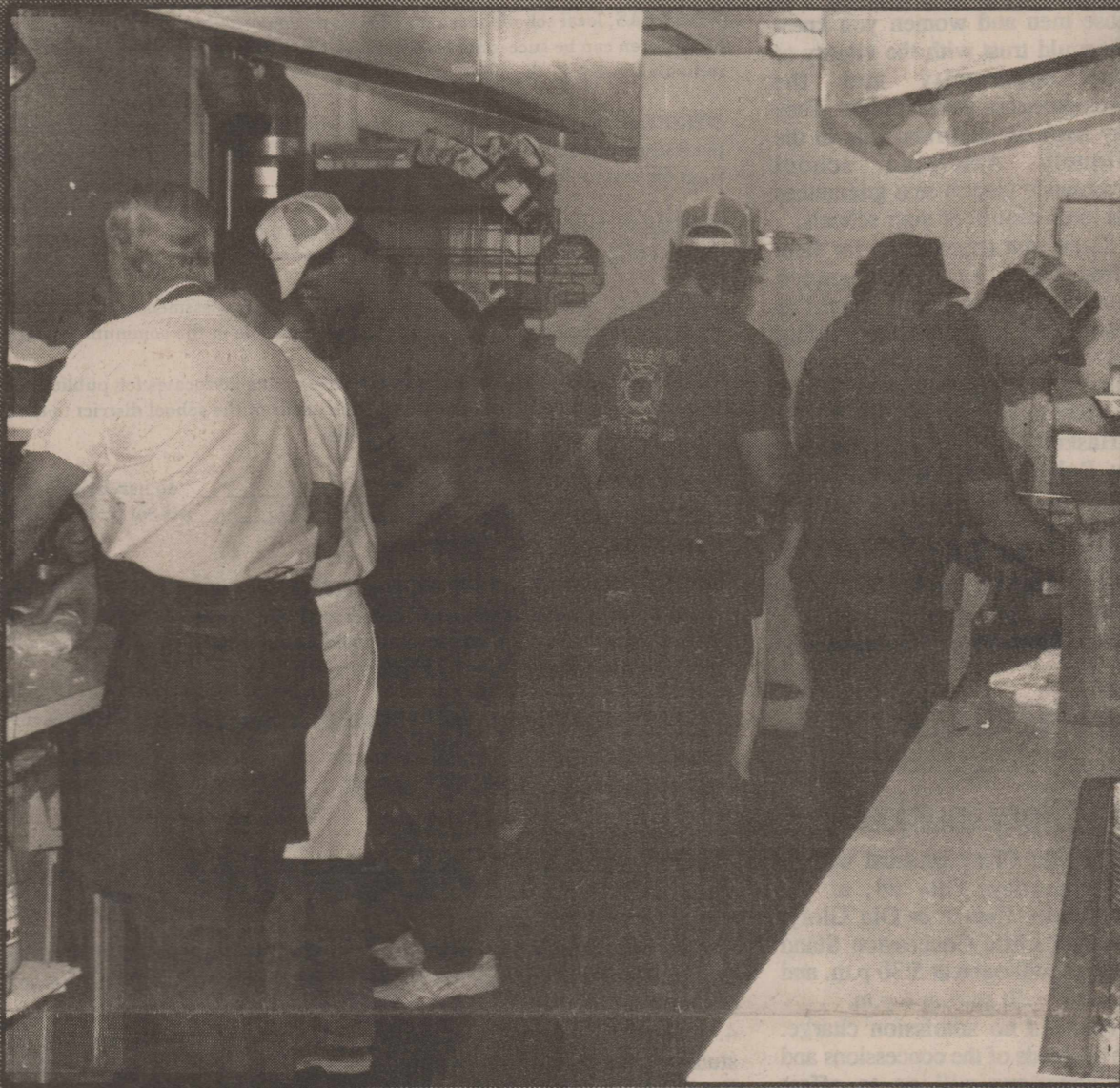

Maidens are Bi-District champs

Area girl's basketball teams were busy this past weekend with playoff games, resulting in one Bi-District win. The Rule Lady Bobcats lost to Throckmorton, 58-49, in a Friday night game at the Kimbrell Arena in Abilene. Denise Wilson, the senior guard who led the Lady Bobcats in scoring, rebounding and steals this season had suffered a dislocated elbow in a game Friday and was unable to play Friday night. Amy Hisey was top scorer with 17 points with Lisa Macias scoring 12 points. Paint Creek's Lady Pirates suffered a 64-32 loss in Bi-District play with the Lady Jays from Jayton on Friday night at Kimbrell Arena. At halftime, the Lady Jays

were 26 points ahead of the Lady Pirates and continued to keep a strong lead for the rest of the game. Leigh Ann Reel, who was strong on both ends of the court, was top scorer for the Lady Pirates with 19 points. In Saturday night play at Mabee Complex on the Hardin-Simmons University campus in Abilene, the Haskell Maidens defeated De Leon 43-40 in Bi-District play, advancing them to the area round of the Class 2A playoffs against the defending state champions, Ozona at Big Spring Tuesday night. The Maidens had a 23-18 lead at halftime but De Leon forged ahead in the third quarter to finish it out

with a 33-32 lead. But the Maidens rebounded back in the final quarter to win the Bi-District Championship game. Veronica Gonzales and Betsy Coleman led the Maidens in scoring with 11 points each. The Maidens lost their bid for the Area Championship after being defeated by Ozona 56-39 Tuesday night at Big Spring. The Haskell Indians will play Ranger in Bi-District play at 8 p.m. Friday night in Mabee Complex in Abilene. District 20-A Champions, the Paint Creek Pirates, will meet the Rochester Steers, District 19-A Runners-up, in Bi-District play at 8 p.m. Friday night at the Wylie Gym in Abilene.

City Council sets order of election

The Haskell City Council set the May 4, City order of election at last Tuesday night's City Council meeting. Filing for the election began Monday, Feb. 19 and will continue through Wednesday, Mar. 20. The City race includes two council seats and the mayor. In other business, Haskell CISD

Superintendent Bob Pheil, approached the Council regarding the traffic problem on Ave. D behind the main high school building. Superintendent Pheil suggested the possibility of speed bumps to slow traffic down or any other alternatives that the city might consider.

Several alternatives were discussed, with the Council asking City Administrator Sam Watson, to study the problem and report back to the Council with his recommendations. One of the alternatives suggested was to have a patrolman there during the lunch hour.

Three Paint Creek seniors participated in a regional TEAMS (Tests of Engineering Aptitude, Mathematics and Science) competition Saturday, Feb. 10, on the campus of Texas Tech University. The contest was sponsored by the state chapter of JETS (Junior Engineering Technical Society). The Pirate team, consisting of Marcus Overton, Leigh Ann Reel and Capella Tsoodle, placed second, being bested by Frenship, a 4-A school. Other team members who were not at the competition are

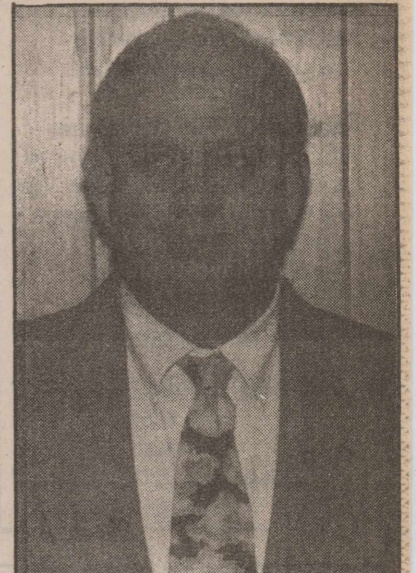
Josh Howard and Casey Thompson. The competition consisted of two parts. The first part included ten separate problem scenarios and each situation had ten additional multiple choice questions. A few of the topics included were indoor air quality, building a recreational pond, flood analysis and lunar stations. The second part of the contest involved an in-depth study of five of the problem situations to formulate a plan and a solution to the problem. Only one answer per team was accepted. Because of the

cooperative learning activities these students are involved in at Paint Creek, the team of three was able to successfully compete against schools much larger who competed with teams of eight students. The Paint Creek students will be notified in March as to whether they scored high enough to be eligible for national competition. John Doerschuk, the Paint Creek School sponsor, and Kenneth Patton, Plant Manager, for West Texas Utilities, assisted the group with their preparation and accompanied them to the meet.

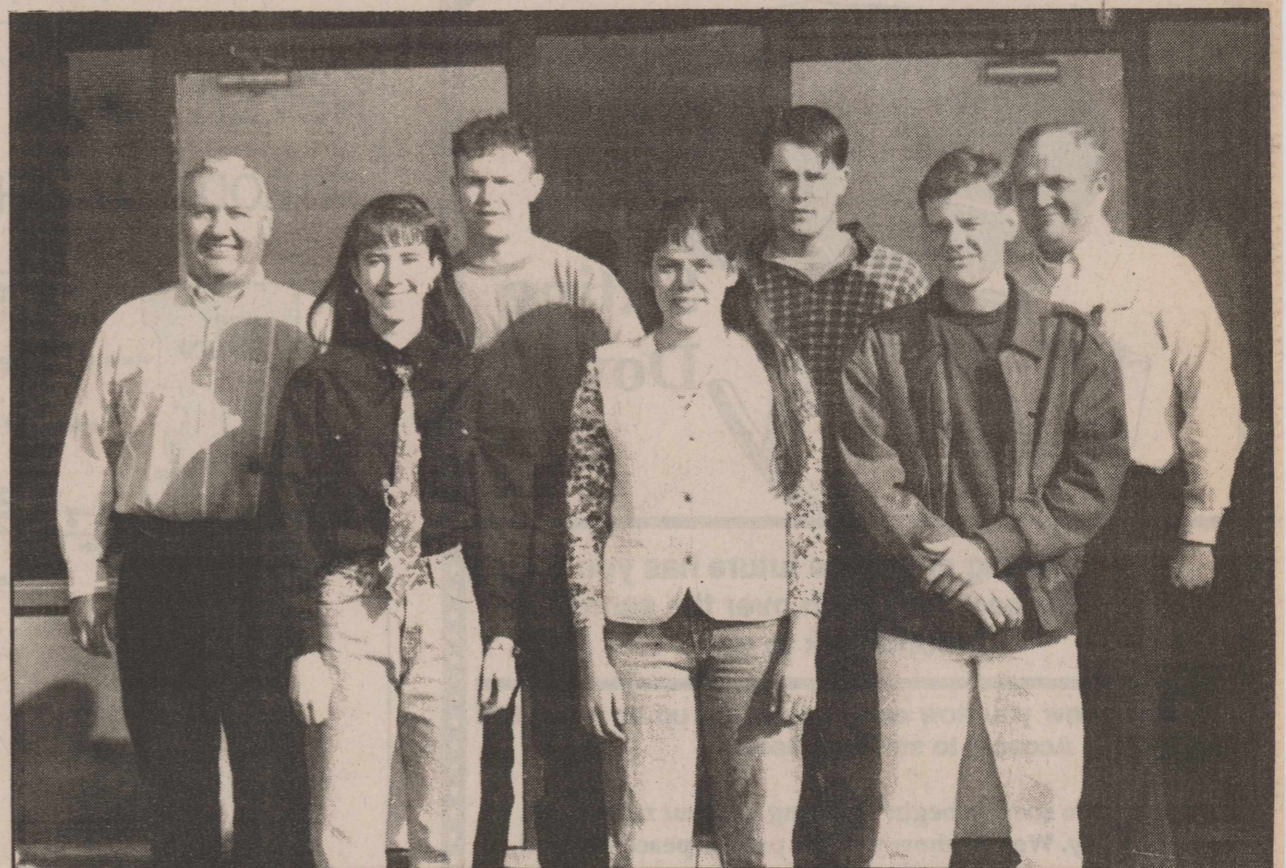

AUSTIN—Texas House Speaker James E. "Pete" Laney voiced his desire to improve health care access for the Texas' burgeoning population of uninsured children and took action to change.

"Tragically, 1.2 million children (from birth through age 18) have no private health insurance or Medicaid coverage. This reality points to the pressing need for a comprehensive review of health care options for Texas children, their families and employers," Laney said at an Austin news conference earlier this month.

He directed the House Public Health Committee, chaired by Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, to see that the study is conducted.

"We have too many families falling through the cracks," Laney said. "I want the Public Health Committee to search for creative, innovative ways to work in partnership with the private sector to close the cracks. Let's get the children treated."

Berlanga said about 23 percent of uninsured children come from families with at least one parent who is insured. "What parents are finding today is that health care coverage is more expensive, is harder to get and often covers a lot less than they expect," Berlanga added that major problems include extremely high deductibles and policies that cover only the worker and not their dependents.

Dr. David R. Smith, commissioner of the Texas Department of Health, said the bottom line is that "unhealthy children cannot grow into healthy adults" and he praised Laney for drawing attention to the issue.

Laney suggested that the committee work with the private sector to make recommendations that don't cost the state more money.

TCADA Criminal Cases Possible

Members of the state House and Senate investigating committees questioned officials last week with the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse about their continued funding for contractors who allegedly overcharged the state.

The contractors provide services for the state's social service agencies. TCADA was placed in conservatorship last summer after state investigators concluded the agency was mismanaged.

Committee members said it hadn't been easy to explain to contractors in their districts who lost contracts but were not accused of overcharging.

A task force appointed by the committee and headed by Col. James Wilson, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has reported that it will complete audits of TCADA and its contractors by April 1, and is preparing possible criminal cases against 23 providers.

State Auditor Lawrence Alwin said his office has found \$2.7 million in questionable expenditures during a review of 20 contractors.

Bingo Halls Wish to Advertise

Commercial lessors who provide halls for charities to operate bingo games protested state regulations that prohibit them from advertising.

At a public hearing in Austin, lessors told the Senate Interim Committee on Charitable Bingo that barring them from advertising gives an unfair edge to their competitors — the state lottery and pari-mutuel racing, which are allowed to advertise.

Sen. Frank Madla, D-San Antonio, a member of the committee, agreed, saying it's "ridiculous" that bingo hall owners are not allowed to advertise even when charities — who are allowed to advertise — can't afford to.

"These charities can't go out and advertise that they have \$5,000 in jackpots that night. To me that doesn't make sense," he said.

And Madla also agreed with the lessors' complaint that the licensing procedures they must follow to rent their halls to charities are too complicated.

"It bothers me that if you own a hall, you can't lease it to a charity to play bingo unless you meet and comply with all these guidelines. ... They don't do that when you run a law office or Senate office," Madla said.

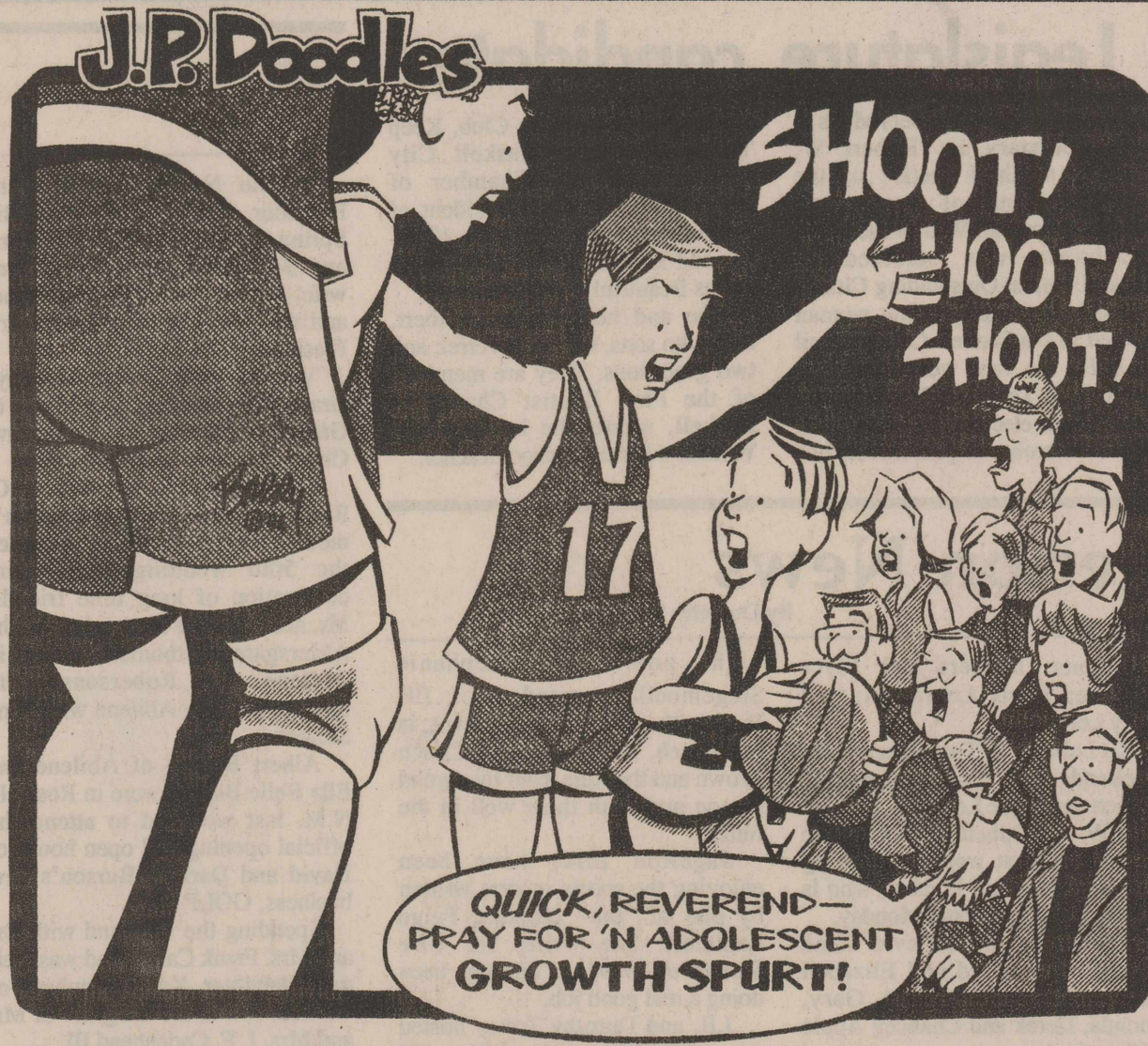
The Texas Department of Public Safety has released its first report on the number of concealed handgun licenses it has issued since the concealed handgun bill took effect Jan. 1. Overall, 10,043 permits have been issued with more than 40,000 applications pending. White men and women account for 97 percent of all permits issued, and Texas residents age 40 to 60 are the most likely to have a permit.

Dry, windy weather conditions prompted the Texas Forest Service to issue a wildfire warning after several large blazes erupted around the state. The forest service advised landowners to postpone all outdoor burning until more rainfall is reported.

New Mexico House members voiced their opposition to Gov. Gary Johnson's decision to transfer state prisoners to Texas. Members oppose separating prisoners from their families. The House voted 36-25 to approve a memorial opposing the transfers. Memorials express the sentiment of the Legislature but have no legal weight.

- Rally businesses, congregations, schools and agencies to focus on the importance of fathers in children's lives.

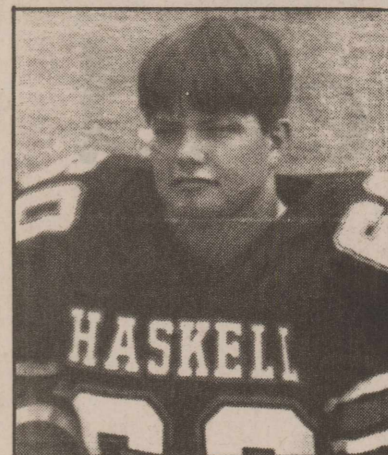

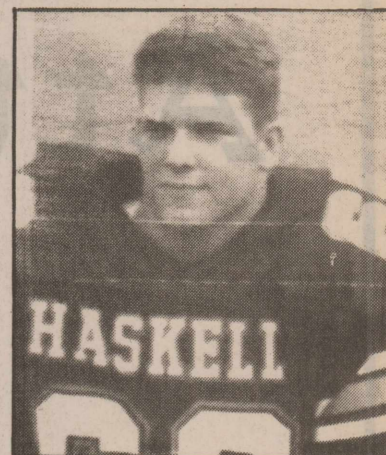

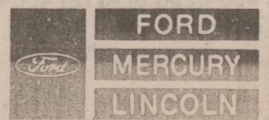

At the Tuesday, Feb. 6, Rule City Council meeting, Rule Fire Chief, Jeff Sorrells presented the council with the fire department activity report for the quarter. 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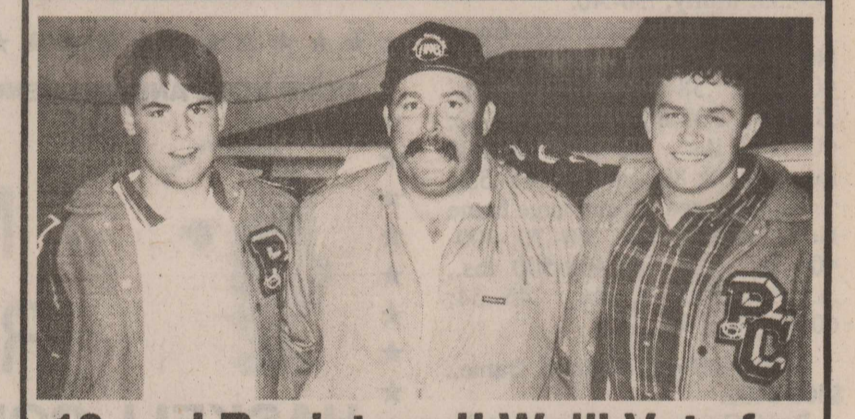

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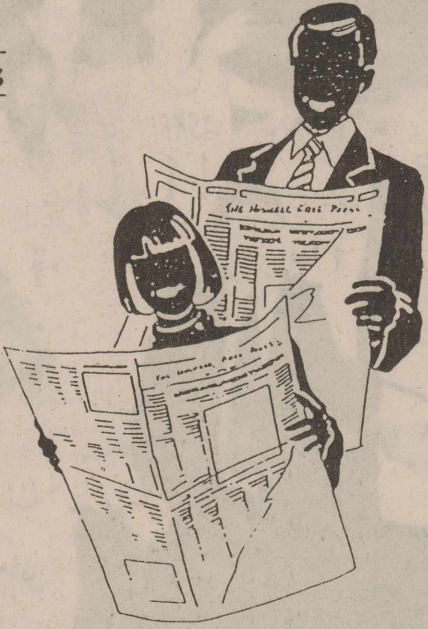

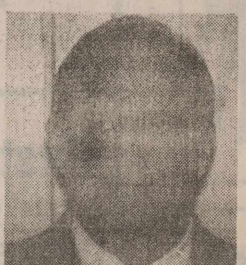
