FSA election December 2

The Haskell County FSA Committee election will be held this year on December 2, 1996. Eligible voters have the right to nominate candidate(s) of their choice by petition. Blank petitions (FSA-669A's) may be obtained at the County FSA Office. Each petition submitted must be:

- limited to 1 nominee
- if the form is completed by someone other than the nominee, the preparer must sign
- signed by the nominee, indicating willingness to serve, if elected

- postmarked or delivered to the County FSA Office no later than October 28, 1996.

Local Administrative Area 1 is as follows: O'Brien, Judd, Rochester area going to approximately 2 miles north of Rule to 1/2 mile west of Weinert. Stop by the County Office to see detailed map.

Person nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch and be well qualified for committee work. A farmer is eligible to be a County FSA Committee member if the farmer lives in the LAA and is an eligible voter. County FSA Committee members may hold positions in certain farm and commodity organizations, if these positions pose a conflict of interest with FSA duties. These positions include functional offices such as president, vice president, secretary, and positions on boards or executive committees. Additional information of eligibility to hold office may be obtained at the County FSA Office.

The duties of County FSA Committee member include:

- informing farmers of the purpose and provisions of the FSA programs
- keeping the State FSA Committee informed of LAA conditions
- recommending needed changes in farm programs
- participating in county meetings as necessary
- performing other duties as assigned by the State FSA Committee.

This program or activity will be conducted on a nondiscriminatory basis without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, age, sex, marital status, or disability.

Thursday, Perry addressed about 40 people in support of Republican candidates running for office.

Perry said that Haskell has come from a one-party county to a two-party county, and he credited his Mother, Amelia Perry, with founding the Republican Party in Haskell.

Perry said that government does not offer all the solutions for people's problems and that less government would be desirable for business in this state.

He blamed trial lawyers, unions, and regulations for keeping businesses from moving to Texas.

"Trial lawyers and unions are why I switched from the Democratic to the Republican Party," he added. Frivolous lawsuits are too expensive for businesses and everybody.

We need to go further in addressing this issue, he said, by putting in place a "loser pays" rule.

In other words the loser in a court case would pay all court and attorney costs for the opposing side.

"I believe that I am where I am today because of the teachers at Paint Creek," he noted. However, teachers today cannot teach what they believe kids need, and the teachers' unions have "no regard for my children's education."

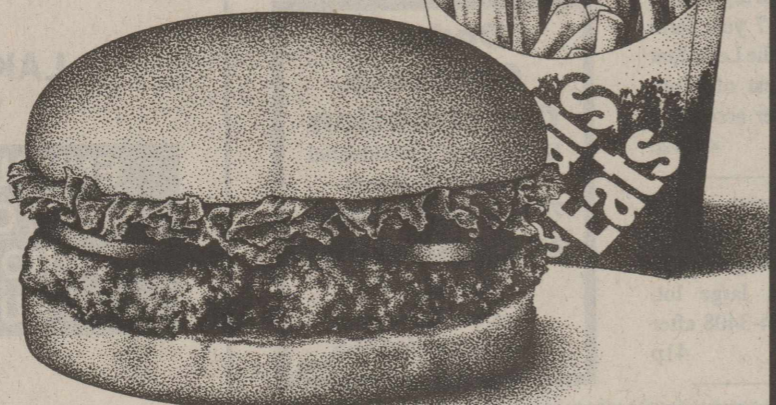
As to the third factor, he blamed too many regulations as a deterrent to both agriculture and business and noted that his department had streamlined regulations in agriculture.

The only local republican candidate who spoke was Duward Campbell who is running for constable. In his brief speech, he stated that he would appreciate everyone voting for him and that he, in turn, would try to be "fair and impartial to everyone."

Fall is time for landscaping

Cooler temperatures are easier on us and our plants. So get out in the yard and do some landscaping.

Extension Horticulturist Dr. Doug Welsh says September, October and November are the prime times for transplanting. Plants are less stressed and the root system has time to get established before

spring growth.

Welsh says there are four to five trees that are best suited to Texas. The most popular are red oak and live oak. He also recommends some newer varieties called lacy oak and Monterey Oak. And he says more people are discovering cedar elm because it is resistant to


oak wilt. Bald cypress and Montezuma cypress also grow well in Texas.

For smaller, flowering trees Welsh suggests the redbud and the crape myrtle. The Texas redbud is the choice for most of the state. Look for crape myrtle hybrids that are resistant to mildew.

Keep school lunches safe and nutritious

Most kids like sandwiches, but you have to be careful what you pack. Don't pack anything that will spoil unless you have a way to keep it cold.

Family and Consumer Science Specialist Carolyn Nobles says lunch meats hold up well in a lunch box. Include cheese for a dose of calcium.

She suggests packing the lettuce and tomato separately and including those little packets of mustard and mayonnaise instead of putting it on the bread. And she says by all means, add chips.

Children need a certain amount

of fat. Children also need fruits and vegetables. Send them whole or cut with ranch dressing for dripping. Nobles says most children aren't getting the five recommended daily servings.

To help keep sandwiches and yogurt cold, you can freeze juice boxes and include them in the lunch box. Or you may want to invest in one of the new insulated lunch boxes.

Keeping the lunch box clean is just as important. Wash it daily, and once a week give it a really good cleaning with water and baking soda.



The Chamber participated and organized over twenty ribbon cuttings and welcomed new business to our city.

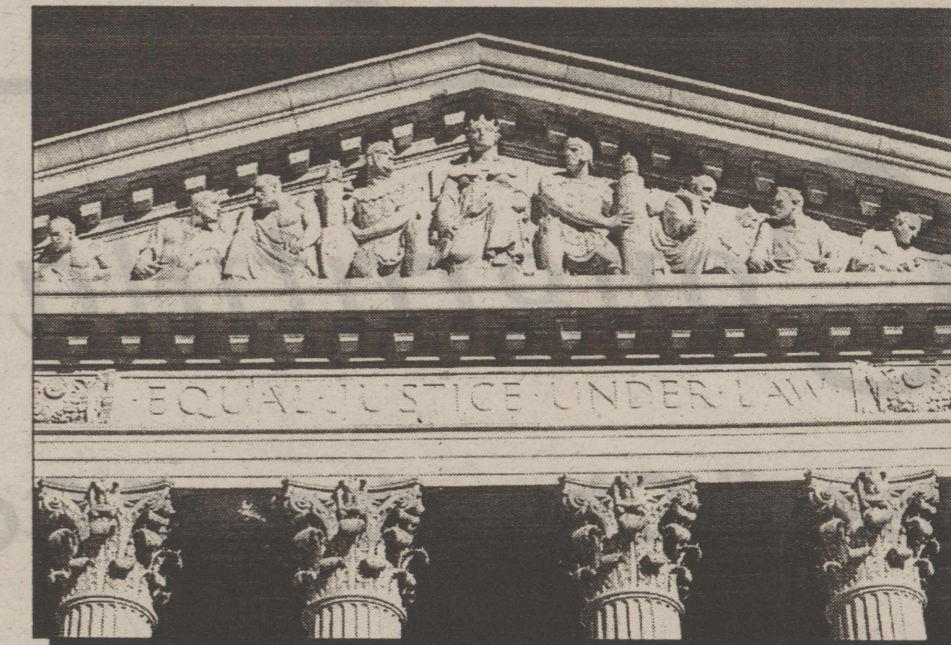
