





AUSTIN - Gov. George W. Bush ordered the Department of Public Safety to dispatch 100 more troopers and narcotics agents to an 80-mile-long sector of the border with Mexico.

In August, the DPS beefed up its numbers around Eagle Pass, to stop the flow of illegal drugs. Ranchers in that region have complained that armed drug smugglers are invading their property. The smugglers are bringing in at will huge cashes of heroin, marijuana and other drugs from Colombia and Mexico.

State officials say the magnitude of the problem warrants immediate federal assistance, but the federal government has not met requests for more agents and air surveillance.

Public Safety Commission Chairman James B. Francis Jr. of Dallas told the Dallas Morning News that foot-dragging by President Clinton's drug czar, former Gen. Barry McCaffrey and other federal officials, has slowed the interdiction effort.

"All we have gotten is one excuse after another when we asked them for help. What you get is a bunch of lip service and no action," Francis said.

McCaffrey said it will be two years before enough U.S. Border Patrol agents will be available. Texas will be assigned 100 of the 1,000 agents who are being trained, while California will be

#### assigned the other 900 agents.

Francis criticized the apparent inequity. "We've got 700 miles of border and (California has) 100 miles. It's completely irrational rationing manpower according to need," he said.

#### Traffic Death Toll Leaps

Traffic deaths have increased 17 percent across Texas and 30 percent on rural interstate highways since

veyed - 64 percent of Republicans, 52 percent of Independents and 47 percent of Democrats - say Gov. Bush should run for president some day.



**Bush Submits Welfare Plan** 

Meanwhile, last week, Gov. Bush sent to U.S. regulators a plan implementing federally mandated changes to the welfare system, while incorporating reforms passed during the 1995 Texas Legislature.

Although states have until July 1997 to submit such plans, Bush submitted Texas' plan months ahead of the deadline to retain an additional \$72 million in federal funds for the "Texas for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families" known as the Aid to Families with dependent Children program before the new federal welfare overhaul.

Bush made the decision to send the plan to Washington after Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and House Speaker Pete Laney said they were

ICTURE YOURSELF sitting in a hotel room late one evening. Exhausted after a long day of travel and work, you look forward to a restful night's sleep. Suddenly, you hear a knock at the door, and someone asks to enter. Do you answer or roll over?

Your answer might depend on the following fact. Increasingly, business and vacation travelers are becoming the targets of thieves, robbers, and thugs.

#### Safety a top priority

In a recent survey of American households, the safety of one's destination ranked as the top travel worry when people contemplated their business or vacation travel. In fact, four out of five respondents ranked safety concerns at the top of their list. That's why we at the Office of the Attorney General have put together these travel safety tips.

#### How to protect yourself

The first common-sense rule of travel is not to answer the door in a hotel or motel room if you do not know who is on the other side. If the person claims to be a hotel employee - and you didn't expect him or her --- call the front desk to verify if the hotel sent someone to your room.

Dev Tulsiani, an engineer for the Texas Department of Transportation, said his agency hasn't yet pinned the blame for double-digit increases in traffic deaths on the higher speed limits. The fact that

If you have a purse, tuck it tightly under your arm, and never hang it on a restaurant chair or in a restroom stall. If you are carrying a wallet, tuck it in your front pocket instead of the traditional back pocket.

#### **Common sense rules**

The best way to stay safe is to think ahead and use common sense. Ask the people at your hotel desk or the local chamber of commerce what places or areas of town to avoid. Leave all unnecessary credit cards at home and divide up your travelers checks between your family members or travel companions.



qualified for committee work. A farmer is eligible to be a County FSA Committee member if the farmer lives in the LAA and is an eligible voter. County FSA Committee members may hold positions in certain farm and commodity organizations, if these positions pose a conflict of interest with FSA duties. These positions include functional offices such as president, vice president, secretary, and positions on boards or executive committees. Additional information of eligibility to hold office may be obtained at the County FSA Office.

The duties of County FSA Committee member include:

- informing farmers of the purpose and provisions of the FSA programs

- keeping the State FSA Committee informed of LAA conditions

- recommending needed changes in farm programs

participating in county meetings as necessary

- performing other duties as assigned by the State FSA Committee.

### **Protect trees from first** generation fall webworms

First generation fall webworms were apparent in trees in the eastern part of the Rolling Plains during the summer. Pecan, mulberry, and elm are prominent host. The fall webworm has been found to attack over 120 trees and shrubs, but evergreens are not infested. The larval stage is the damaging stage and larvae complete their development in four to six weeks. The second generation larvae are now active.

The fall webworm overwinters in the pupal stage under debris or in loose soil. Moths which are white with black dots on the front wings, emerge in May or June. The eggs are deposited in clusters of 400 to 500 on the leaves. The larvae upon emergence from the egg begin to enclose the leaves in a web. The hairy, light tan larvae when full grown are about 1 inch long.

unnoticed. However, that was not the case this year. In parts of the area, first generation fall webworms

not that long until the trees will begin dropping their leaves.

The larvae begin feeding at the end of a branch, and they progressively expand the web enclosing more leaves. The web provides protection from insect predators, parasites, and birds. When only a few branches are infested and the web is within reach, remove with your hand the webbing and the mass of fall webworms. If the webbing is beyond reach use a stick or pole for removal. By putting a nail through the end of the stick and rotating it, the webbing will be wound around the stick. Pruning out the infested limb is another option. Insecticidal applications must be

applied with considerable pressure to penetrate the web and provide effective control. The insecticides that are suggested for fall webworm control are Diazinon, Malathion, Dursban, Orthene, Sevin and The first generation often goes several Bacillus thuringiensis products such as Javelin, Biotrol, Dipel, and Bactur. Make sure that the insecticide that you select is stripped most of the foliage from labeled for fall webworm control on the plant that you plan to treat. pecan trees. ## Fall is time for landscaping


Cooler temperatures are easier on us and our plants. So get out in the yard and do some landscaping.

Extension Horticulturist Dr. Doug Welsh says September, October and November are the prime times for transplanting. Plants are less stressed and the root system has time to get established before spring growth. Welsh says there are four to five

trees that are best suited to Texas. The most popular are red oak and live oak. He also recommends some newer varieties called lacy oak and Monterey Oak. And he says more people are discovering cedar elm because it is resistant to oak wilt. Bald cypress and Montezuma cypress also grow well in Texas.

For smaller, flowering trees Welsh suggests the redbud and the crape myrtle. The Texas redbud is the choice for most of the state. Look for crape myrtle hybrids that are resistant to mildew.
