Western Texas College to offer spring term extension classes

College classes will be offered in Haskell beginning in January with the start of the spring term by Western Texas College in Snyder,

announced Monty Mongtomery of the Development Corporation of Haskell. With the reopening of the

Haskell extension center, WTC will offer area high school students a double opportunity-the ability to gain credit toward their high school diploma and a chance to earn college credit. The double credit will be made possible through a new "concurrent enrollment" program offered by the college.

Under concurrent enrollment, a high school student can simultaneously fulfill both high school credits toward graduation and up to six hours of college credit per

Classes offered this spring will focus on college-level English, math, history and government.

For enrolled high school students, these college classes can be substituted for similar ones taught as part of graduation requirements. This classroom time will generate college credit transferable to any two-year or fouryear college or university.

"This is an excellent way for high school students to get a head start on their college careers," said Dr. Jim Palmer, who heads up the concurrent enrollment program at Western Texas College. Palmer noted that all extension center classes will be taught in the evening Monday through Thursday and are open to the general public as well as high school students opting for the concurrent enrollment plan.

Four classes offered this spring are among the required freshman classes for all public Texas universities and colleges. Classes are ENGL 1301, the first semester of freshman English composition; HIST 1301, a U. S. history class covering events up to the Civil War; GOVT 2305, which profiles how our federal government works; and MATH 1314, college-level algebra.

Class instructors will include Greg Melton, history; Terrance Stuart, government; and Jill Druesedow, English. The math class has not been staffed as yet, Palmer said, adding that all instructors must meet the state standards to teach at the college level. These standards include a minimum of a master's degree and at least 18 hours graduate school credit in the field they are instructing.

Concurrent enrollment is available to high school students who have completed their sophomore year and passed the TAAS test.

Permission from the student's parents and high school principal is required to be admitted. Students cannot take more than six credit hours (two classes) per semester.

WTC started the concurrent enrollment this past fall with classes available in Snyder, Hamlin and Crosbyton. Haskell and surrounding communities is the latest addition to the list.

Cost for the classes to all students is based on WTC's out-ofdistrict tuition plus a \$25 extension center fee. For one class involving three semester hours, the total registration cost is \$137; and for

six semester hours, \$224. Textbook costs for classes offered at Haskell range from \$34 to \$62.

All tuition and fees are payable at registration and may be made with VISA, Discover or MasterCard.

Haskell classes begin Jan. 15 with official registration on Jan. 9 at Haskell High School from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Students must be present to enroll.

To register, a student is required to have a driver's license, Social Security card, and ACT/SAT or TASP scores if available. High school students enrolling must complete an early admissions form and provide a copy of their high school transcript.

Students not having an ACT/SAT or TASP score or who cannot provide a high school transcript, will be required to take a placement test. Placement tests will be administered during registration beginning at 6:45 p.m. and will

Persons completing college-level work prior to fall 1989 are exempt from the TASP requirement.

KNOW THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN **CASH AND PROFITS**

If you started a business last year, and it now has more cash than you put into it, is it profitable? If your business has less cash, has it suffered a loss? The answers to these questions aren't as easy as you might think.

According to the way accountants measure things, you have a profit for a given period if you add up your sales, subtract your expenses, and end up with a positive number. If you end up with a negative number, you have a loss.

Unfortunately, adding up your sales is not the same as adding up the cash that came in, and your expenses won't always equal the cash that went out. For example, you have sales without receiving cash by making a sale on account, and you receive cash without having sales when you borrow money or receive a customer payment on account. Likewise, you incur an expense without spending cash when you make a credit purchase or when you record depreciation on the books. You can also spend cash without incurring a current accounting expense when you buy an asset such as a building or a computer.

So which do you want-cash or profit? Well, you want both. To keep your business afloat for the short-term, you need cash to pay suppliers and employees (perhaps even yourself). In order to obtain that cash, you may have to expedite collections from your customers, stretch out payments to your suppliers, or borrow from your bank.

Over the long-term, however, you will need to show a profit. In other words, the sales that you ultimately realize in cash must exceed the expenses that you ultimately pay in cash in order to maintain a successful business.



Republicans won a majority in the state Senate last week when state Rep. Robert Duncan of Lubbock was elected to a vacant seat representing 21 counties in West Texas.

"West Texas made history tonight," Duncan told supporters at a post-election rally.

The Dec. 10 runoff victory gave the GOP its first majority in a Texas legislative chamber since 1872, and a 16-14 seat edge.

Sen.-elect Duncan will fill the seat vacated by John Montford, a Democrat who left the Senate to take a position as chancellor of Texas Tech University.

One seat remains to be filledthat of Sen. Jim Turner, D-Crockett. Turner won a U.S. House seat in November, so a special election will be held next year to carry concealed handguns have had fill his state Senate seat.

While the new majority gives the GOP power in numbers, the Senate is still ruled by Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, whose authority it is to appoint committee chairmen and make committee assignments.

In welcoming Duncan to the Senate, Bullock said, "The most the state's business in the upcoming session without regard to political party labels or party agendas."

Brown Files No-Reversal Bill

Texas appellate courts would not be able to use technical errors as the basis for throwing out valid criminal convictions under a bill filed by state Sen. J.E. "Buster" Brown, R-Lake Jackson.

Brown's bill would prohibit convictions from being reversed for so-called harmless errors. He filed similar legislation in 1995 that died in the House.

John Boston of the Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association called the bill unnecessary, saying less than 1 percent of criminal convictions are overturned on appeal.

Bomer Blasts Settlement "Consumer rip-off" is what Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer called a proposed classaction settlement for millions of Allstate and Farmers insurance policyholders who were overcharged for automobile insurance.

Bomer asked Attorney General Dan Morales to intervene in a lawsuit against the two companies because a settlement resolving the suit gives nothing to millions of policyholders who are entitled to compensation, The Dallas Morning News reported.

And, while the settlement in October totaled \$35.7 million,

Mauro also said he had "no plans to go to Washington," downplaying speculation that he might seek a post in the Clinton administration or as chairman of the Democratic National Committee.

Legal Matters

by Dan Morales, Attorney General

We all have received offers in the mail to join CD and tape clubs. Many people find them to be bargains when they shop wisely and take advantage of sales and promotions. Others like the convenience of shopping at home and having new music delivered directly to them.

But some Texans report problems to us at the Office of the Attorney General.

The most common complaints against these clubs involve bills for items the consumer did not order. This often happens when a club uses what is called a "negative option" ordering system. Under this arrangement, the club sends out a catalog listing each month's featured CD or tape, together with a set of order cards. You will receive each month's feature in the mail, unless you send in a card saying you do not want it. Once you get the item, you can return it, but if you do not do this promptly, the company will assume you are keeping it and will send you a bill.

The cost of forgetting

Problems arise when consumers forget to mail in the cards, or send them in too late to stop delivery, and then get billed for unsolicited albums they did not want. Often, this can take some time to sort out. In the meantime, your unpaid bill may be referred to a collection agency, potentially putting your credit rating at risk. Similar problems arise when people cancel their memberships but keep receiving CDs or tapes and billing statements.

Most clubs have a toll-free customer service number you can call for more information.

Before you join

If you are considering joining a CD or tape club, be sure to ask the following questions before you sign up:

•Do items purchased in two-forone or half-price sales count toward your required purchases? You are usually required to buy a certain number of tapes or CDs in a set time period. Purchases made through special promotional or discount sales often do not count toward that requirement.

·What happens if you do not buy the required number of tapes in the specified period? In many cases, you will still be billed for the required minimum purchase amount, even if you do not actually order the minimum number of

·How much is the shipping and handling charge for your introductory tapes of CDs? This will add to the cost of joining the club, and reduce the amount of money you save.

·Can you change your membership status so that you only receive the selections you specifically order? Some clubs offer this option, but it is usually not advertised and is generally available only after you have met your initial purchase obligations.

•What is the return policy? Can you return a CD or tape after you have played it, and do you have to pay return postage?

Contract law

Joining a CD and tape club is the same as entering into any other consumer contract. You should ask for written answers to any questions you may have, and carefully read the fine print before agreeing to join.

Remember to tally up the hidden costs to make sure you are really getting the bargain you expect. This will help you avoid costly misunderstandings later on, and let you make the most of your membership in the club.

Sharp announces increase in city, county sales tax receipts

John Sharp, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, recently delivered a total of \$158.9 million in December sales tax payments to 1,084 Texas cities and 117

counties. This month's payments to Texas cities and counties include sales taxes collected by monthly filers in October and reported to the Comptroller in November.

"Total city and county sales tax rebates for calendar year 1996 are 9.2 percent higher than total rebates for 1995, as the Texas economy continues its healthy upward trend," Sharp said.

Sharp delivered city sales tax rebates totaling \$144.9 million, 25.9 percent above last year's December payments of \$115 million, the larger amounts due at least in part to several days of additional processing time this year. Rebates of \$13.9 million to Texas

counties were 20.7 percent above the \$11.5 million allocations in December 1995.

Haskell County had a 57.67 percent increase in sales tax rebates of \$25,285.74 for December, 1996 in comparison to \$16,036.91. 1996 payments to date of \$336,379.21 reflect a 5.30 percent increase over 1995 payments to date of \$319,441.93.

The city of Haskell had a 49.07 percent increase for December, 1996 of \$22,882.98 in comparison to \$15,349.84 for December, 1995. 1996 payments to date of \$306,801.02 reflect a 6.10 percent increase over 1995 payments to date of \$289.156.16.

O'Brien had reported a payment of \$247.85 for December, 1996 in comparison to no payment reported for December 1995. 1996 payments to date of \$1,595.82 reflect a 26.71 percent decrease over 1995

payments to date of \$2,177.68.

Rochester had a payment of \$630.97 for December, 1996 in comparison to no payment reported for December 1995. 1996 payments to date of \$7,080.63 reflect a 1.71 percent increase over 1995 payments to date of \$6,961.48.

Rule had a 118.73 percent increase for December, 1996 of \$1,502.84 in comparison to \$687.07 for December 1995. 1996 payments to date of \$19.604.74 reflect a 2.24 percent increase over 1995 payments to date of \$19,174.36.

Weinert had a payment of \$21.10 reported for December, 1996 in comparison to no payment reported for December 1995. 1996 payments to date of \$1,297.00 reflect a 34.23 percent decrease over 1995 payments to date of \$1,972.25.

If these is a gardener or flower lover on your Christmas list, shopping should be a snap. Garden tools are always welcome. Wind chimes, bird houses and ornamental flower pots are a joy year round. Garden books, calendars and magazines offer a wealth of information.

It is now time to plant the bulbs you have had in the refrigerator. Tulips and Hyacinths have had their cold period; so it's time to put them in the ground. Plant the bulbs in masses to obtain the best effect. Choose a sunny area with good drainage.

Pansies, larkspur, sweet peas and other hardy annuals need to be given a dose of 20-20-20 liquid fertilizer. If a freeze is likely in the forecast put a two to three inch layer of mulch around each plant.

When putting away your tools for winter, wash or scrape off soil, remove rust with a file or steel wool. Then wipe with an oily rag or spray with cooking spray to keep the steel surfaces from

Cool season grass such as fescue need about an inch of water per week to continue looking its best.

Put one or two garlic cloves into your rose bushes. They will never be bothered by aphids or other insects.

Now for a few good tips and ideas. Seal the cut ends of Poinsettia stems by passing them through a candle flame right after cutting. It stops the flow of sap and leaves the water channels open.

After the holidays are over, do not discard your tree (if it is a live tree). Turn it into a backyard bird feeder by trimming branches with bread, orange slices and suet.

For extra shine on cones and nuts, dip them in varnish. Clusters of berries or fruits you intend only for decorative use may be dipped in clear floor wax for extra shine.


