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



Early voting for the Aug. 9 constitutional amendment election began July 21 and runs through

Aug. 5. A low turnout at the polls is expected but Gov. George W. Bush and Secretary of State Tony Garza are touring the state, doing their best to urge Texas' 11 million registered voters to get out and vote.

It's a challenge to interest the electorate in a ballot that has no candidates on it.

"Constitutional elections are uphill battles in terms of getting people out to vote," said Garza, the state's top elections official.

On the ballot is a single yes or no question for voters to answer: whether homestead property tax exemptions should be increased from a minimum of \$5,000 to a minimum of \$15,000.

Ann McGeehan, elections director for Garza, estimated that the turnout would be about 10 to 15 percent of the state's registered voters.

Should the tax exemption amendment pass, the state will lose about \$1 billion in revenue.

In the long run, however, the exemptions may cause school districts to lose more and more money as property tax rates and appraised values continue to increase.

Meanwhile, lawmakers will have to find ways to compensate for the lost revenue in the state budget over the next two years.

Gingrich Episode Piques Pauken

Texas Republican Party Chairman Tom Pauken said the recent, failed attempt to oust U.S. House Speaker Newt Gingrich hurt the GOP image.

Pauken, who stepped down from his post last week to seek his party's nomination for the office of the state attorney general said, "The timing was terrible."

"I think there's a frustration on the part of a lot of Republicans at the grassroots level...a feeling we were so close to winning a majority and now we're slipping backwards."

He called for an end to the party's "internal bickering" and concentrate on the 1998 election

During Pauken's tenure as state GOP chairman, Republicans won a majority of seats in the state Senate, swept all statewide offices on the 1996 ballot and won majorities on the Texas Supreme Court, Court of Criminal Appeals, State Board of Education and the Texas Railroad Commission.

Raymond Seeks Land Office State Rep. Richard Raymond,

D-Benavides, last week became the only Democrat to formally enter the race for land commissioner. Incumbent Garry Mauro, who is

considering a race for governor, hasn't announced his plans. Three

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Republicans already are in the race: Secretary of State Tony Garza, Sen. Jerry Patterson of Pasadena and Tim Turner of Houston.

Raymond, 36, a former special assistant to U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas and U.S. Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill. is serving his third term in the Texas House.

He spent 30 months as Mauro's executive assistant and in 1990 managed Bob Krueger's successful campaign for Texas Railroad Commissioner.

Raymond outlined a four-point plan for the General Land Office:

· Expanding college opportunities for Texas veterans at no additional cost to the state.

•Developing partnerships with communities to make the most efficient use of underutilized state

•Ensuring that Texas public beaches remain public by passing a constitutional amendment banning private ownership of beaches.

·Continuing to preserve and protect Texas public lands.

Holzheauser Is RRC Candidate

State Rep. Steve Holzheauser last week told The Victoria Advocate he will seek the Republican nomination to succeed Barry Williamson on the Texas Railroad Commission.

Holzheauser, who has represented House District 30 since 1985, said last month he would seek the commission post only if Williamson did not seek reelection. Williamson has announced for attorney general.

State Settles With Testing Firm

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales and lawyers for a nowdefunct emissions testing firm settled a 1995 lawsuit last week.

Taxpayers will have to pay the \$140 million settlement. The money will come from the state's general fund beginning Aug. 31 with a \$70 million payment.

Tejas Testing Technologies, which spent millions of dollars setting up inspection stations in designated urban areas, filed the lawsuit after the state curtailed the firm's seven-year auto emissions testing program.

Federal officials had ordered the program, but state lawmakers killed Teias' contract after drivers complained about the cost. The state then established another testing program.

methamphetamine, also known as speed, could be sentenced to prison for life under a proposal by U.S. Rep. Pete Sessions, R-Dallas. The freshman congressman said

On the Island of Brevity, the natives hated people who talked too much. They spoke in as few words as possible and expected everyone else to do the same.

One year, famine struck the neighboring island of Ontoolong, and the people sent a representative to Brevity to ask for help. The envoy arrived and launched into a description of the havoc brought by the famine, the suffering of the Ontoolong people, and the implications that the disaster had for all area islanders. He spoke for two hours, and many in the Brevity delegation fell asleep. When the envoy finally finished his plea, the leader of Brevity said he couldn't remember the beginning of the envoy's speech and was hazy about the details that followed. The envoy was sent back empty-handed with a request that someone else be sent to explain the situation.

Ontoolong immediately sent another envoy, urging him to be as brief as possible in his plea for aid. The new envoy appeared before the Brevity delegation, holding empty rice bags in his hand. He spok only three sentences: "My people are starving. These bags are empty. Please fill them." Then he sat down.

The head of the Brevity delegation immediately ordered the bags filled. Then he took the envoy aside and said: "There was no need to point out that the bags were empty. We could see that. And it wasn't necessary to ask us to fill them. We would have done it anyway. If you come again, remember, don't talk so much.

So, hopefully having learned from the above anecdote, (adapted from a Leadership monthly bulletin), about the importance of getting to the critical point in any presentation, I will only add that "from the inside out", I am pleased indeed to be back here with my column in my new work as staff writer for the Haskell Free Press.

to evaluate the impact of the recent reforms on juvenile crime rates, I expect to see improvement in the future. Punishment is a limited deterrent, however. We owe our children more. Intervention and

prevention I am absolutely convinced that

intervention and prevention play a vital role in our efforts to reduce juvenile crime. There are many excellent local programs across the state. Some provide supervised after

designed to keep children away form gangs, and still others teach nonviolent conflict resolution. My Juvenile Crime Intervention Division is working with the Texas

Association of Counties and the Texas Municipal League to catalog these productive programs. We will make this information available to local law enforcement and community organizations by the Internet and in print. Visit our web site at http://www.oag.state.tx.us for more information on criminal iustice issues. Resources for youth We support public-private

partnerships such as TYC **Industries and Project Reintegration** of Offenders (RIO). These programs help juvenile offenders develop job skills and make the transition back into society. Among other uses, the juveniles' earnings help pay restitution to crime victims and child support payments, if any are owed. Last winter, our Juvenile Crime

Intervention division organized a Youth Resources Fair at the Texas Youth Commission's residential facility in Giddings. Our purpose was to make incarcerated youth aware about the many state and local programs designed to help them keep their lives on track after release, including dealing with drug problems, acquiring job skills, and continuing their education. We believe that many young

offenders are willing to turn their lives around but lack practical information about how to overcome obstacles like addiction or inadequate education. So we provide them with information about how to attain a General Equivalency Diploma (GED) or learn a skill through a trade school. Innovative solutions


The best prevention is the earliest prevention. Our Child Support Program has two awardwinning programs, Volunteers in Paternity (VIP) and Paternity and Parenthood (PAPA), that benefit of these programs is to ensure that every child has the support of two parents. Every child needs the security and sense of identity that comes from having a legal father. And no child should unnecessarily experience the sting of poverty. Under Texas law, a child bor


Texas children from birth. The goal

out of wedlock has no legal father until paternity is established. Through VIP, we have formed partnerships with birthing facilities across the state, to encourage unwed fathers to sign Acknowledgment of Paternity forms at the hospital when their babies are born. The forms are sent to us, and we use them to support paternity establishment proceedings. The PAPA program's primary


goal is to teach students the legal and financial obligations that come with parenthood. The program explains that the law requires both parents to support their children regardless of how young the parents are and regardless of the relationship between the child's parents. We've developed a standard PAPA curriculum which we have made available to all junior high and high schools in Texas. The PAPA Curriculum can be found of Web site, http://www.oag.state.tx.us. Together, we can do it!

We face an unacceptable situation, but not an overwhelming one. We don't have to have more gangs, drive-by shootings, guns in schools or throwaway children. 

Our storytime and reading program grows larger every year. We had the summer school students plus the forty-two children that signed up early.




