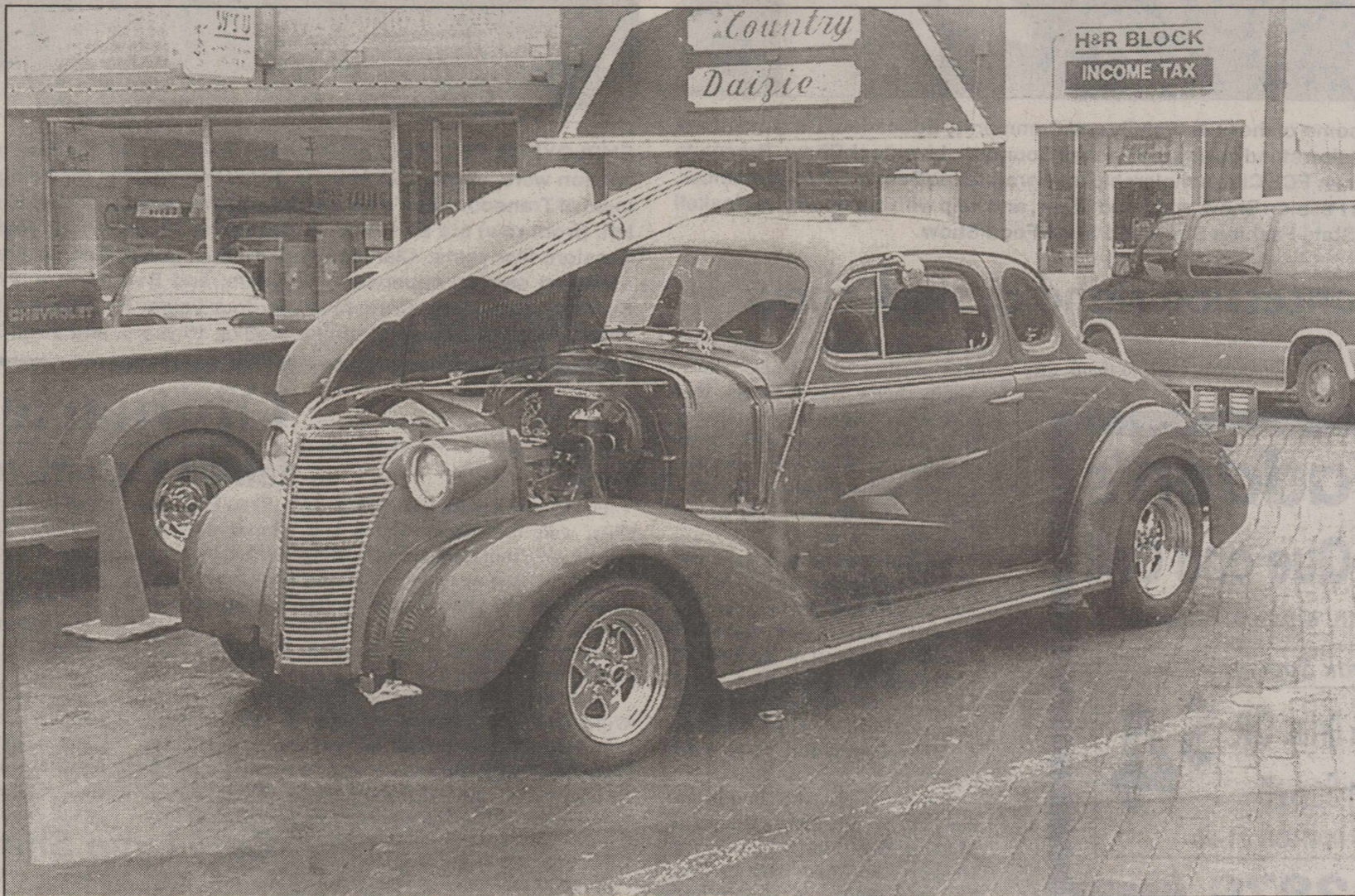

Commissioners' Court

Sheriff's Dept. equipment suffers damage from lightning strike

In the absence of County Judge David Davis, Judge Pro Tem Bill Hester officiated at the regular meeting of the Commissioners Court Mon., Mar. 8.

Sheriff Mills report an emergency situation at the County Jail due to a lightning strike to the jail radio tower Sunday night, causing major damage to the jail's electronics. By Court time Monday morning all transmissions for Haskell County were going through Benjamin. Damaged items were the radio, repeater, two 911 computers, teletype, and the intercom for the prisoner cells. All will have to be replaced or repaired.

The two 911 computers are through West Central Texas Council of Governments who is responsible for them. All other items involved are the county's responsibility. Sheriff Mills had GTE come out at 5:00 a.m. to begin repairs. Other repair personnel were enroute at Court time.

Concern was expressed by the Court over the \$1,000.00 insurance deductible and the coverage not being enough. Sheriff Mills was authorized to get everything back in working order, since all of these electronics are necessary to the service performed by jail personnel 24 hours a day.

Allied Compliance Services representative, LeeNell Roach, met with the Court about the policy of drug testing required by TxDOT. Her company charges a one time fee of \$150.00 plus \$42.00 per drug test, \$25.00 per alcohol test, \$30.00 per on-site visit fee. Other fees are \$75.00 for training and a clinic collection fee. TxDOT policy fee is \$195.00.

Random testing will be scheduled on current commercial licensed employees, and all new employees have to be tested. Tests can be done upon a supervisor's suspicion of illegal activity in an employee. Notice has to be posted in the work place 30 days in advance of setting up this program. A decision was made to table this matter until the Mar. 23 meeting, due to the absence of Judge Davis and Commissioner Kenny Thompson.

Commissioner Billy Wayne Hester, Pct. 1, reported a second fire at the tire shredding plant. The plant has requested the County to haul some sand there to put on the pile of tires.

Debbie Kreger was hired to work at the Experienced Citizen's Center.

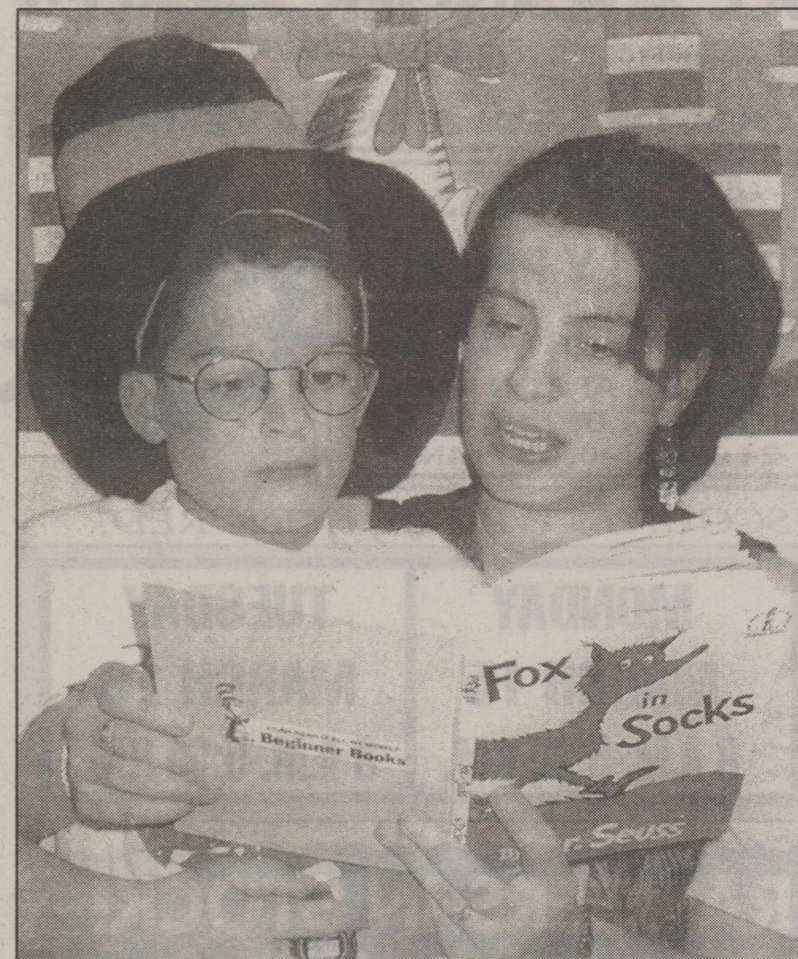

After several ideas were considered it was decided that the Court will have more discussion on this at the Mar. 23 meeting.

Commissioner Bud Turnbow tabled his request to impose a speed limit on a road shared by Pets. 3 and 4.

Commissioner Turnbow will advertise for a new motor grader.

Bill Steele, of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department, asked the Court for help with an electronic problem with a vehicle. The Court took action by suggesting a local mechanic to look at it.

Commissioner's Court is open to the public. Anyone wishing to comment on any of the above matters should attend the Mar. 23 meeting at 10:00 a.m.

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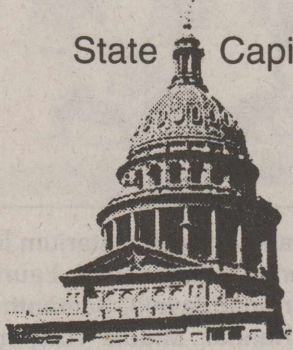

AUSTIN — On March 2, Texas Independence Day, the idea of a George W. Bush presidential candidacy moved a step closer to reality.

In deference to Texas reporters, Gov. Bush barred the national media from a news conference at the Governor's Mansion.

During the conference, Bush announced his authorization to form an "exploratory committee" to start raising funds for a possible presidential candidacy.

"I do have a compelling reason to consider running for president. For my family and every family in America, I want the 21st century to be prosperous. And I don't want anybody being left behind," Bush said.

Meanwhile, last week, a contingency of North Carolina Republicans urged Bush to seek the presidency with North Carolina native Elizabeth Dole as his running mate.

David Wilkins, speaker of the South Carolina House, brought Bush a letter saying most Republicans in the House support his candidacy.

Bush reiterated his intention not to decide whether to run for president until after the Texas Legislature adjourns May 31.

Tax Cut Bill Passes Senate
About 28,000 small businesses in Texas would not have to pay state franchise tax under legislation passed last week by the state Senate.

The \$57 million tax break would be meted out over the next biennium for an average cut of \$2,000 in taxes to qualified businesses whose gross annual receipts total less than \$100,000.

"This tax break might seem small to a multi-million dollar corporation, but for a neighborhood store or a small, home-owned business, even a tax break for a couple of thousand dollars goes a long way," Robert Howden of the National Federation of Independent Business of Texas was quoted by *The Dallas Morning News*.

The bill has moved to the House for consideration.

Teachers Urge Pay Increase
A sign-carrying crowd numbering in the hundreds urged legislators to pass pay increases and better benefits for public school classroom teachers at a March 1 rally on the Capitol steps.

Senate Education Committee Chairman Teel Bivins, R-Ama-

riilo, told the crowd, "I think I can represent to you today that you will see more money in your pockets the next school year."

Bivins said he wants to see to it that those who won seats in the Legislature by campaigning with education as a priority will stick to their pledge.

Texas teachers last year were paid an average of \$32,426, compared with a national teacher salary average of \$38,436.

State to Appeal Prison Decision
Conditions in Texas state prisons have improved over the years, but they're not good enough, U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice of Austin ruled last week.

Justice, who has overseen the prison system since 1979, decided to continue federal supervision of the system's 110 units and 150,000 inmates.

That decision will be challenged by Texas Attorney General John Cornyn, who said he is taking the matter to a higher court.

"All along, we felt the final decision would be made by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans, and that's where we head next," Cornyn said.

Three weeks of hearings on conditions in the prison system were held in January and February.

Algebra Scores Show Weakness
Preliminary results of fall testing are in, Texas Education Commission Mike Moses announced last week.

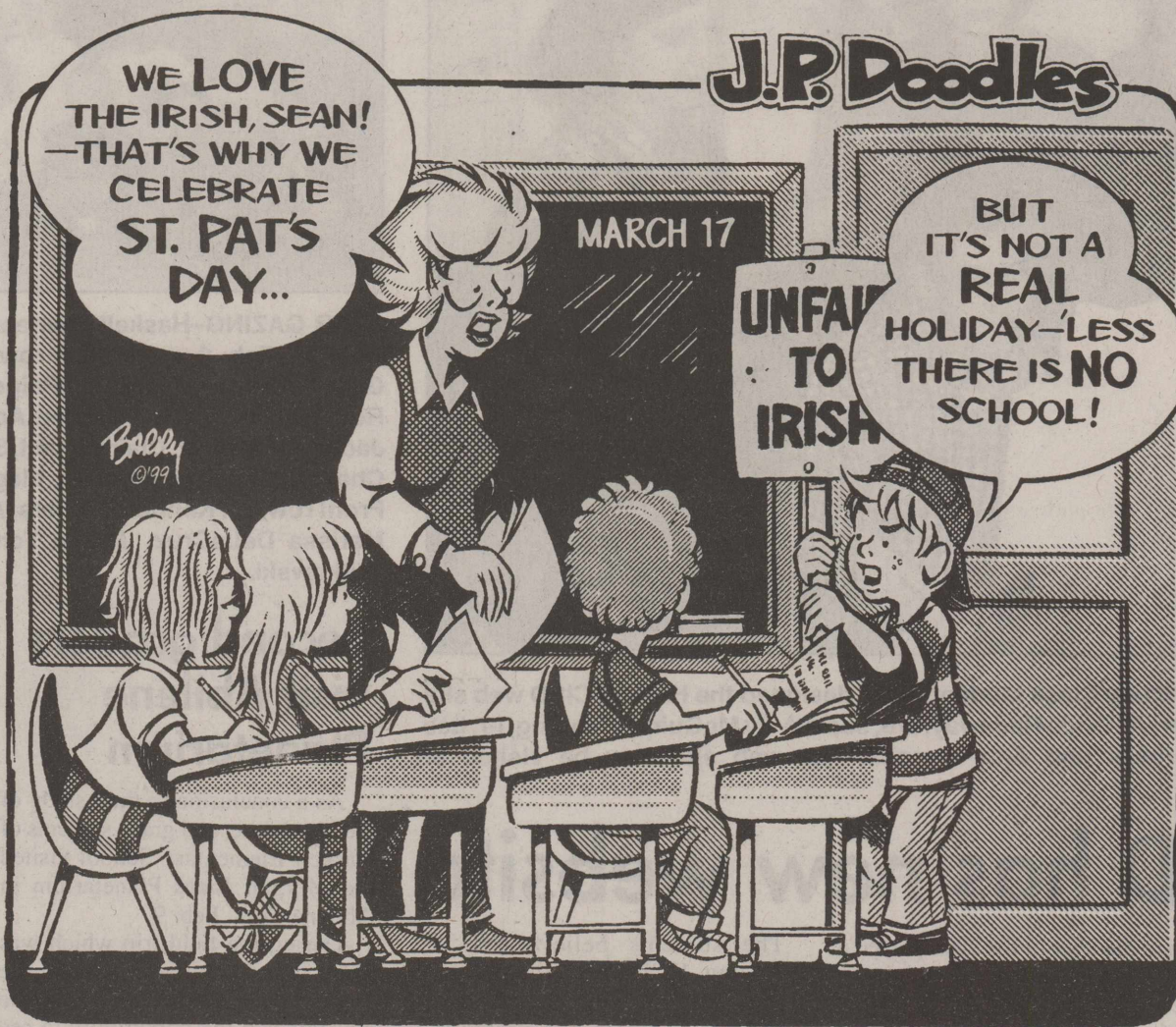
Seventy-seven percent of Texas students who took the state's end-of-course test in biology earned passing grades. A majority of those who took new tests given in English II and U.S. history passed.

Students performed poorly, however, on the Algebra I test, Moses said. Only 31 percent of the 18,375 students who took the test passed.

"Clearly, we continue to have our work cut out for us as far as improving our students' performance in algebra," Moses said.

One way to improve performance, he said, is to have teachers who are certified in math instruction. About 35 percent of teachers teaching Algebra I in middle school lack that certification.

■ The deadline for state lawmakers to file non-emergency legislation is March 12. So far, about 2,200 bills have been filed in the House and 900 in the Senate.

Knowing the truth, Monty and Fred, along with Ruby and Abe Turner, thoroughly enjoyed watching Nelda beam with pleasure about Fred.

Ask the AG

Q: I have tried and tried to get through to the Child Support Division on the phone. I either spend forever on hold, only to get a recorded message telling me to call back, or I get disconnected. When are you going to fix this?

A: I am well aware of the frustrations that child support clients face when they try to reach our offices over the phone.

When I took office, I was amazed to learn that the phone systems in the local child support offices had been programmed to prevent parents from getting through to staff members whose help they needed. The phone system was set up so that unless the caller knew the extension of the person he or she needed to speak to, the call was routed to the Call Center in Austin.

In January, the child support phone system received approximately 1.3 million phone calls. Of those calls, about 200,000 were handled by the automated voice response system.

The 1.1 million other callers, however, wanted to speak to a live person. Only 95,000 calls were able to connect to the call center. Hold time in the queue averaged nine minutes and as a result many people hung up.

Fifty-thousand calls were actually answered by one of the 66 child support staff members assigned to handle calls. This means that less than five percent of the callers wishing to speak to a person were successful, leaving many parents with no way to get help or information.

I plan to start making changes to the system by making sure that calls to local offices are answered at those offices, not in Austin. Also, I intend to instill and reinforce a customer-friendly attitude among child support employees. They are there to help you. We will work to ensure that inquiries are handled more efficiently and at a local level. We are developing statewide goals to measure our performance.

In addition to these internal changes, we will be asking the Legislature to assist us by funding 114 additional staff members to answer phone calls at local offices and regional call centers.

As with any changes, the transition takes time. We ask for your patience as we work to make our office more responsive to the people it serves - the children of Texas and their parents.

Q: I have to pay school tax, county tax, income tax and nothing is left but bills. Child support is excessive if you have a wife and other children. How can you expect me to pay this?

A: While I sympathize with your situation, you must understand that you have both a legal and moral obligation to all of your children, not just the ones in your new family.

State law outlines how much non-custodial parents are required to pay for child support. It is a standard percentage of your income based on the number of children involved. This is not an arbitrary decision meant to punish you.

While I understand that you have a new family to support, you cannot turn your back on the children you pay child support to because your relationship with their mother did not work out. All of your children, not just the ones you live with, need and deserve your support, both financial and emotional.

Legally, you are obligated by court orders to continue your payments. If you stop making payment you may face legal actions such as a mark on your credit report, a suspended drivers license or, worse, jail time.

EQUIP ranking deadlines set March 11 and July 1

The Natural Resources Conservation Service has set the ranking deadlines for the 1999 Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP). The first ranking deadline for the 1999 program year is March 31, 1999 and a second ranking deadline is set July 1, 1999. Applications from individual landowners interested in participating in the EQIP during the 1999 program eligibility during April and those received after March 31 will be ranked after the July 1, 1999 deadline.

Producers who did not qualify for the EQIP program during the March 31 ranking period may request a deferment from their local Farm Services Administration (FSA) office and be eligible to be ranked during the July 1 ranking period. It should be noted that applications received after the July 1 deadline, as a part of EQIP continuous program sign-up provisions, will be held until the 2000 program year ranking period.

Private landowners should be aware that EQIP provides technical, educational and financial assistance to eligible farmers and ranchers to address soil, water and related natural resources concerns on their lands in environmentally beneficial and cost effective manner. EQIP is a voluntary program and is designed to assist farmers and ranchers with placing natural resources conservation practices on their property. Cost share is provided to program participants to achieve the goals of a conservation plan designed with the assistance of local NRCS staff. Cost share practices include placement of appropriate structural or vegetative

practices, such as animal waste management facilities, irrigation management equipment, vegetative buffers and wildlife habitat enhancement, to name a few.

Eligible practices will depend on the location of the farm or ranch on which the practice is to be installed and the major resource concern to be addressed in that particular area. Information on eligible cost share practices and major resource concerns of an area can be secured from your local NRCS field office. Contracts for eligible producers are made for a period of five to ten years and include incentive payments to assist with implementation of land management. It should be noted that program funds target natural resource concerns of farmers, as well as, livestock producers.

To learn more about EQIP or to submit an EQIP contract application, contact your local NRCS field office. Local NRCS field offices are listed in the U. S. government section of the white pages of your phone book under United States Department of Agriculture - Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA - NRCS).

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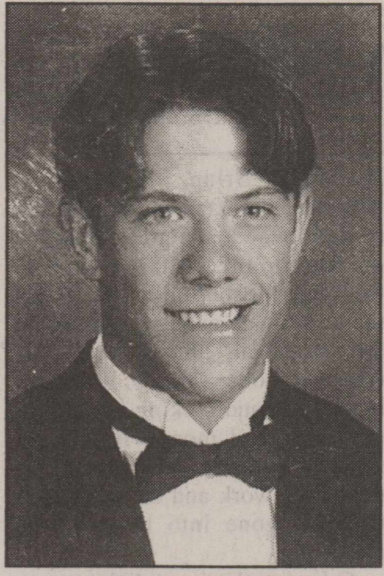

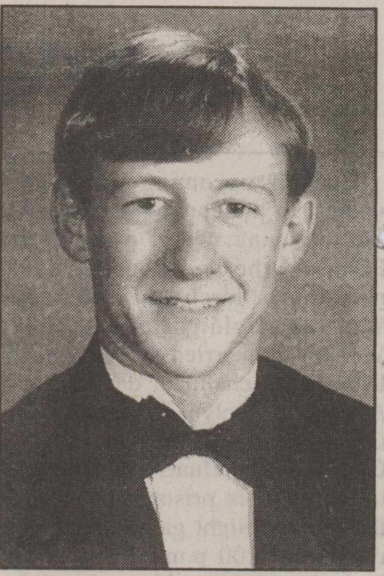

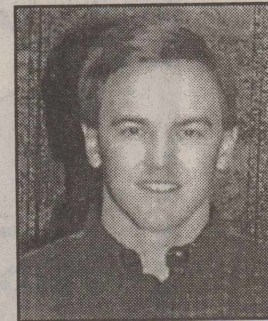
