AUSTIN — Texas' child support program has improved greatly since the Legislature placed it on probation and demanded a complete overhaul nearly two years ago.

The 75th Legislature placed the division under Sunset Review in 1997 and the commission in 1999 recommended a two-year probationary period for the program that collects and distributes child support payments in Texas.

The review shows that this year the division exceeded its established goals in five key areas and has improved customer service, upgraded its technology and hired new managers. In 2000, the division collected \$1.02 billion and established paternity for 48,481 children. Just two years ago the division collected only \$757 million and established paternity for 40,173 children.

Computer systems that caused major problems in 1997 and 1998 have been fixed and now operate smoothly, but improvements still are needed, the report found. The report also found that problems still exist in the volume of undistributed payments but the attorney general's office plans to have a new automated system in place by January 2001 to identify and release several categories of the payment holds.

Customer service also has improved over the last two years, according to the report. The 76th Legislature approved an additional 114 staff members to man phone lines and now 95 percent of incoming customer calls are answered, up from only about 15 percent in 1998.

Bush supports black college aid Gov. George W. Bush last week announced his support of a plan * to improve Texas' two historically black state-funded universities, Texas Southern University in Houston and Prairie View A&M University in Hempstead:

The governor wrote a letter to the U.S. Department of Education, which also has signed off on the Priority Plan.

"I am committed to ensuring that minority students in Texas, who choose to pursue a university education, must have the very best opportunities made available to them by our state's higher education system. I endorse the Priority Plan that we have jointly produced and believe that it provides a blueprint for achieving academic excellence," Gov. Bush said.

Officials from the governor's office, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, TSU, Prairie View and community leaders worked 18 months developing the Priority Plan, which still must earn funding in the coming legislative session under both colleges' appropriations requests.

Under the plan, TSU would receive more academic support for first-year students, improved housing and childcare, and a new science building and other renovations.

Prairie View would receive a summer academic support pro-

gram and a new student development center and new nursing, architecture and juvenile justice facilities. Both colleges also would receive new advanced degree programs and expansion of current programs.

Texas Exile earns conviction

Texas Exile, a crime-control initiative using existing laws to find and punish criminals who illegally carry weapons, added another conviction to its list.

Aaron Robinson, 35, was sentenced to 92 months in federal prison Nov. 16 after a federal court found him guilty of possessing a loaded .38 caliber revolver last March in Fort Worth. Robinson already had three state felony convictions for kidnapping, theft and aggravated assault and a state misdemeanor for unauthorized possession of a weapon.

Texas Exile is funded by a grant from the Governor's Criminal Justice Division that pays for eight prosecutors stationed throughout Texas. Since its inception in 1999, the program has netted 181 convictions and has confiscated more than 850 guns.

From The Inside Out

"Tis the season" to deck the halls, and don't we love it?

Tinsel, stars, angels, popcorn strings, paper chains, candles. With whatever resources we have to use and whatever circumstances we find ourselves in, at this time of the year, we decorate our surroundings to express the beauty and spirit of

Although, from time to time through the years, the ways we trim and "deck" our halls change, there are some traditional symbols that we continue to love and use.

Some of our favorite traditions are rooted in the biblical story, others have come from myths, legends and even secular practices. Yet all blend to make our spirits bright.

In some ancient Asian cultures, bells were used to announce joyful as well as sad occasions. The practice was transplanted after the birth of Christ to nations in the West to celebrate his birth. In Spain, bells sound at midnight on Christmas Eve to announce Jesus'

Several legends recount the origins of lighting candles at Christmas. Martin Luther, whom many credit with decorating the first Christmas tree, is said to have added lighted candles to the branches of the evergreen to represent the Star of Bethlehem. Another legend concerns a lonely child who, lost on Christmas Eve, found his way home because of the candle in his mother's window. Still another legend is that Mary and Joseph found shelter on Christmas Eve by following a lighted candle in the stable window.

Tradition has it that a candy maker in Indiana chose hard candy, symbol of the solid rock of God's promise to us, to make the candy cane. The red stripes of the candy cane symbolized the blood shed by Jesus. The cane turned one way is the letter "J" for Jesus; turned upside down, it represents the staff of Christ, the Good Shepherd.

The word "carol" is Old French and derives from the Latin choraula. Carols originally were songs of celebration for pre-Christian festivals throughout Europe. Many of today's popular Christmas carols are religious words put to secular festival tunes. Saint Francis of Assisi is credited with introducing carols to church worship. The first U.S. carol. "Jesus is Born," was written in 1649 by the Rev. John deBrebeur. Singing carols commemorates the angels singing on the night Christ was born.

Sending printed greetings to mark the new year dates back to ancient Egypt and Rome, when greetings were carved on wood. The first Christmas card, however, was printed in 1843 in England for Sir Henry Cole, who was too busy to send letters to his business associates and who wanted to help expand the use of Britain's new postal system. A thousand of the cards were printed and sold for one shilling each. An old French word meaning

"crib," the first Christmas creche is credited to Saint Francis of Assisi (1181-1226), who got permission from the pope to erect a manger using dolls outside his church for a re-enactment of Christ's humble birth. Children brought gifts and Francis and his fellow clergy sang Christmas carols, which some believe was the first act of caroling. Today, creches or nativity scenes have become a staple of Christmas decorations in Christian churches, homes and yards.

Holly has traditionally represented the crown of thorns worn by Christ when he was crucified; the berries symbolizing drops of blood. In many Christmas songs holly is spoken of as the male counterpart of ivy, the female partner. In some traditions, whichever plant was first brought into a home would determine which gender would rule over the house in the coming year.

The use of mistletoe for winter celebration derives from pagan practices. Scandinavian legends say that an evil spirit, Loki, was forbidden from killing his enemy, Baldur, with anything "which sprang from earth, fire, water or air." He was able to conquer Baldur by shooting him with a dart made of mistletoe (the plant that is a parasite that grows on other trees' branches). It was later associated with fertility by the Druids and with romance, hence the practice of kissing under the mistletoe.

Poinsettias are native to Mexico, where they were considered symbols of the Star of Bethlehem. Mexican legend says that a boy had no gift to give to the baby Jesus, so he took all he had--a bundle of twigs-to the manger. His friends laughed, but when he laid the twigs at the foot of the manger, they had bloomed into beautiful red flowers. Poinsettias get their name from the first U.S. ambassador to Mexico. Joel Poinsett. He was a botanist, and brought the plants back to the states in 1828.

"Yule" was a pre-Christian winter festival (some scholars say the word 'jolly" has its origin in the word "yule"). A yule log, preferably cut from a fruit-bearing tree, is a symbol of good cheer and good fortune. Tradition stipulates that the oldest and youngest members of a group--representing the old year and the new year--carry the log to the fireplace. In the pre-Civil War United States, African-American slaves soaked the yule log in water because many slave owners gave slaves a holiday for as long as the log would burn.

From the simplest constructionpaper, crayon drawing to the most opulent grandeur or sophisticated elegance, whatever our tastes and resources dictate in the way of celebrating and decorating for it, the splendor of Christmas continues to speak to our hearts in a way no other holiday on earth ever can.





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
