Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest about your case before the ARB hears it. actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You Review by the District Court: After it decides your may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or special appraised value placed on your property
- the unequal appraisal of your property • the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your
- the ownership or property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affected you.

Informal Review: Taxpayers are encouraged to make an appointment with an appraiser to discuss their property value. This may be done by calling (940) 864-3805. They should bring information to substantiate why they feel that their property value is incorrect. The appraiser will discuss their property and may recommend an adjustment to the Appraisal Review Board. If the taxpayer is satisfied with the adjustment, he does

not have to appear before the ARB. Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that review problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date, and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 604 North First, Haskell, Texas.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked

case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive

Tax Payment: If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for filing protests with the ARB* Usual deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more

Special deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was

AUSTIN — When a lawmaker makes a speech in his home district, he usually paints pretty word pictures.

But when El Paso Sen. Eliot Shapleigh spoke to the Texas Associated Press Managing Editor's Association in his hometown recently, he focused on the reality of the situation along the Texas border. The picture is far from pretty.

He said Texas' 22 border counties, from El Paso to Cameron, amount to a thirdworld country. Combined per capita income in those counties, he said, is 33 percent lower than cash poor Mississippi's.

Problems along the border range from low college graduation rates to lack of transportation infrastructure. He didn't even mention the povertyridden colonias scattered up and down the river.

The solution, he said, is a major revision of Texas' tax system.

While careful not to directly advocate a state income tax, the Democratic senator said the state must study ways to better provide for the needs of its citizens.

"The plain fact," he told the editors, "is our tax system is frugally and efficiently starving the Texas dream."

Newly licensed 16 or 17year-olds would not be able to drive after 11 p.m. or before 5 a.m. without an adult in the car. The only exceptions are going to or from school or a medical emergency. That, of course, will play havoc with teenage

But it also should impact teenage drinking and driving and the late-night cruising that often is a destination to trouble.

Though only 5.5 percent of Texas' licensed drivers are teenagers, their age group accounts for nearly 20 percent of the traffic fatalities logged each year in the state.

The sober truth is that the crash rate for 16-year-old drivers is 1.5 times higher than it is for 17-year-olds and three times higher than it is for 18 and 19year-olds, still hardly the most safety minded members of society.

Forty-three other states have some form of graduated licensing law on the books. All have enjoyed reductions in teenage traffic fatalities involving 16-year-olds. Michigan, for instance, saw a 35 percent decline in traffic deaths from that vulnerable age group.

The version passed recently in the House is even stronger than the Senate version. Similar bills have come up before, but never gotten this far down the legislative road.

From The Inside Out

In an interesting review of the dilemma faced by rural towns, and the losses for farm and ranch owners in Texas, Glenn Webb, an attorney in Dallas, whose family owns a farm in Throckmorton, faxed an observation about the situation and some legal management ways of perhaps 'Saving the Family Farm and

In introducing his premise he writes, "As I drive to work every day from my home in the suburbs to my big city office, I am constantly amazed at the vast amount of people with whom I share my daily commute. Thousands of vehicles line up every morning to join me in our pursuit of the American dream we believe will be found in our state's large

"I wonder when my fellow commuters came to Texas, or when their families came to Texas. I wonder if their grandparents were farmers or ranchers like mine, who lived in communities with names like Muleshoe, El Campo or Sunset. My conservative instincts quickly argue that what I am seeing is progress, whereby urban society

has created more jobs and more homes for more people. However, I know that this progress has come at a cost. The cost? The small family farm."

Webb says that having 82% of Texas' population residing in the large urban areas is not the Texas tradition. "Texas heritage was built on farming and ranching communities. Years ago my grandparents, as well as those of many of my fellow commuters, firmly planted their roots in the small towns throughout this great state. These men and women built strong families, strong ranches, and strong communities. However, the sons and daughters of small town Texas have made a vast exodus from their former homes into the

Webb says there is a direct correlation between the loss of a family farm and the loss of our state's small towns. With the loss of farm families he sees a vacuum of leadership within small communities, which has meant fewer leaders to serve on school boards, the city councils, in the churches and on the chambers of commerce. "Each time a small town dies, Texas loses a piece of its heritage," he says.

In conclusion he observes that it was inevitable that our society would move from a rural one to an urban society as software, telecommunications, and fiber optics replaced cotton, cattle and oil.

"However, it is quite possible that this migration has been accelerated due to the heavy hand of the federal estate tax and the lack of solid estate and financial planning by farmers and ranchers. These issues have combined to have a devastating impact on Texas' small towns," the tax attorney said.

Webb says that wildlife is a new resource in the state of Texas: today. "It is quite possible that wildlife will be the lifeline for family farms and ranches and small towns that are savvy enough to capitalize. The new boom of economic activity is all the more reason for today's family farmers and ranchers to plan for the future of their families. Without planning, our state's migration from a rural society to an urban one will only move faster.

Scott threw 207.9 feet; Chokas made 206.5 feet and Schroeder recorded 135 feet.

The list of events includes golf and putting, spelling bee, checkers, horseshoes and washers, dominoes, forty-two, tennis, basketball free throw, racquetball, throwing events, 5K run, walk-for-fitness and swimming. Additional contests are cycling, track and field, bridge, bowling, table tennis and dead lift

USDA announces Farm Storage Loans

Glenn R. Brzozowski, reminds Haskell County farmers of Farm Storage Facility Loans (FSFL) available through the Farm Service Agency (FSA).

"At a time when commercial storage facilities are at maximum capacity and charging premium rates nationwide, on-farm storage provides producers with an attractive alternative," said Brzozowski.

The Farm Service Agency is offering seven-year, low-cost loans to grain producers desiring to build new or upgrade existing storage facilities and related essential, permanently affixed drying or handling equipment. Eligible loan opportunities include, but are not limited to:

•New conventional-type cribs or bins, oxygen-limiting and other upright silo-type structures and flat-type storage structures designed for whole grain storage.

·Perforated floors, safety equipment, quality improvement equipment, electrical equipment and concrete components considered essential for a fully functional storage facility.

•Remodeling existing storage facilities to increase storage capacity.

According to Brzozowski, marketing flexibility is the primary benefit gained from on-farm storage facilities. "Privately owned facilities give producers control over where and when they sell their crops, increasing their opportunity to get the best price for their crop,' said Brzozowski.

Farm storage facility loans must be approved prior to site preparation, equipment purchase or construction and must be secured by a promissory note and security agreement. Special real estate

To Subscribe, Call 940-864-2686 provisions apply for loans exceeding \$50,000.

The maximum loan amount will be 85 percent of the net cost of the applicant's needed storage or handling equipment, not to exceed \$100,000 per borrower. A minimum downpayment to the supplier or contractor is required to bridge the gap between the net cost of the storage facility and the loan

Fixed interest rates on farm storage loans are equivalent to the rate of interest charged on U.S. Treasury Securities of comparable maturity on the date the loan is approved. As of May 2001, the annual interest rate is five percent.

"Although we are in the early stages of 2001 crops, advance planning for storage will mean one less decision to be made at harvest, allowing time to develop progressive, potentially lucrative marketing strategies," said Brzozowski.

Rolling Plains Annual Spring Meeting sponsored by the Texas Tech Ex-Student Association met April 30 at the Haskell Country


The family fun day began with a golf tournament attended by three Tech coaches, Dane Brown, Brian
