

PICTURE OF THE PAST-With a distinct flavor of realism, a colorful depiction of a street scene in downtown Rule in 1908 has been painted on the exterior wall of one

of the buildings there. Artist Larry LeFevre of Rule has been working for months with painstaking skill to authentically capture the essence of that bygone era.

Bringing history to life in Rule, a large mural being painted on the exterior of a downtown building authentically recalls "the way it was" in the small rural town almost a hundred years ago.

A product of the artistic talent and work of Rule farmer/painter Larry LeFevre, the idea for the mural began last year when he was contacted by Rule banker, Patrick Pace about doing something in the city.

After talking to the City Council and obtaining permission, he began the painting process last August. However, he had to stop before completion when the weather became too unsettled.

Wanting to be historically accurate, LeFevre found a picture post card made in downtown Rule in 1908. Using the postcard scene for the larger middle section of the mural. he did some research and found two other pictures which showed the end portions of the same street. When

completed, the whole street scene will be an authentic depiction, even down to duplicating the printing on the store signs shown in the two small pictures.

Although donating his work, he said he has received some donated funds for the good quality exterior acrylic enamel paint he uses for the large mural.

Asked about his background as an artist, LeFevre, the son of Delbert and Joyce LeFevre of Sagerton, said he liked to draw and paint pictures since he was a little kid. However, he never planned to make art a career, and became a professional painter only six or seven years ago.

After finishing college, he coached and taught school. In 1977 he and his wife Susan, who is also from a farm family, the daughter of A. D. and Tomi May of Rule, came back to this area. She is a teacher with Haskell CISD.

Starting out by doing small pictures on canvas, LeFevre began to do

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander recently delivered \$271.3 million in monthly sales tax payments to Texas cities, counties, transit departments and special purpose taxing districts. Sales tax allocations to local governments are down 2.4 percent compared to the \$278.2 million paid in March 2001. So far this year, local sales tax allocations are down 0.2 percent compared to the first three months of

March sales tax rebates include local sales tax collected in January and reported to the Comptroller in February. The state's share of sales tax collected during this period was \$1.2 billion, down 1.5 percent compared to a year ago.

Rylander sent March sales tax rebates of \$181.9 million to 1,115 Texas cities, down 1.8 percent compared to, March 2001. Texas counties received March sales tax rebates of \$15.9 million went to 121 Texas counties, up 3.7 percent compared to one year ago.

Haskell County had a 30.17 percent increase for March, 2002 of \$20,243.23 in comparison to \$15,551.13 for March 2001. 2002 payments to date of \$82,943.32 reflect a 1.29 percent increase over 2001 payments to date of \$81,881.71.

The City of Haskell had a 32.40 percent increase for March, 2002 of \$19.339.91 in comparison to \$14,606.17 for March, 2001. 2002 payments to date of \$77,191.36 reflect a 1.73 percent increase over 2001 payments to date of \$75,876.49.


The City of O'Brien had a 55.42 percent decrease for March, 2002 of \$22.99 in comparison to \$51.58 for March, 2001. 2002 payments to date of \$250.86 reflect a 6.43 percent

decrease over 2001 payments to date of \$268.11.

The City of Rochester had a -22.94 percent decrease for March, 2002 of \$224.51 in comparison to \$291.35 for March, 2001. 2002 payments to date of \$1,553.93 reflect a 3.01 percent decrease over 2001 payments to date of \$1,602.28.

The City of Rule had a 5.97 percent increase for March, 2002 of \$638.00 in comparison to \$602.03 for March, 2001. 2002 payments to date of \$3,359.14 reflect a 7.06 percent decrease over 2001 payments to date of \$3,614.43.

The City of Weinert collected \$17.82 for March. 2002 in comparison to \$0.00 for March. 2001. 2002 payments to date of \$588.03 reflect a 12.99 percent increase over 2001 payments to date of \$520.40.


**Louis Frank Wilson**



# New program to benefit family caregivers

The new federally funded National Family Caregiver Support Program will be a valuable benefit to family caregivers throughout the Big Country, says Robert E. Campbell, Caregiver Coordinator of West Central Texas Council of Goverments.

An estimated one in four Americans, or about 54 million people, care for one or more spouse, parent, sibling, grandparent or other relative providing care for older individuals or grandchildren. The Federal Government has recognized the importance of their untiring contribution to the long-term care system. In November 2000, the Older Americans Act was amended and a new program, the "National Family Caregiver Support Program" was born. The sole purpose of this legislation is to provide supportive services to the family caregiver. The targeted population is those individuals caring for persons over 60 years old and grandparents or relatives under 60 who are the primary caregiver for children under 19 years old. Here is how the NFCSP can support them:

\*Provide information about available services.

\*Provide assistance in gaining access to supportive services.

\*Provide counseling, organization of support groups, and caregiver training to assist in making decisions and solving problems relating to their caregiving roles.

\*Provide respite care to enable caregivers to be temporarily relieved from their caregiving responsibili-

\*Provide supplemental services, on a limited bases, to supplement the care provided by caregivers.

Anyone among the targeted population who could benefit from these services is encouraged to contact the West Central Texas Council of Governments, Area Agency on Aging, Caregiver Coordinator at (915) 672-8544 or (800) 928-2262.

Another election is coming up in November that most Texans haven't heard about yet: the State Board of Education will be voting on textbooks for the school children of the state.

The stakes are high: Parents and concerned citizens worry about the impact the texts will have on children (pick a heated social issue and someone likely has an opinion about it) and publishers are vying for \$570 million in textbook sales.

The battles used to get even stormier before 1995, when legislation took away the education board's power to require textual changes in books before approving them for classroom use. Now all the board can do is approve or reject a particular battle.

This year it will have more than 200 titles to consider.

#### Older isn't always better...

The old saying that "you're not getting older, you just getting better" isn't always the case. A good example is evident in glancing over the Department of Public Safety's Texas Ten Most Wanted Fugitives list.

Of the nine wanted persons currently on the list (No. 10, wanted killer Wayne Owen Stubblefield, was arrested in Coryell County recently and has not been replaced,) seven are Baby Boomers born between 1951 and 1960. The eighth person on the list just barely missed the Boomer generation, having been born in 1966. (Demographers say the post-World War II baby boom ended in 1964.)

At 50, wanted murderer Margie Trevino Ortez, last known to be in the Dallas area, is the senior member of the Top Ten list. She'll celebrate her 51st birthday on May

The ages of the other wanted felons are 50, 49, 48 (two), 45 and 41. The only two "kids" on the wanted list are 36 and 25.

#### North Texas squeaker...

No one won or lost in the March 12 primary by only one vote, but District 104 state Rep. Domingo Garcia of Dallas came close.

The recount he requested showed he lost his House seat by 41 votes, not the 38 votes counted on election night.

Garcia requested the recount after the initial tally showed him losing to challenger Roberto Alonzo.

The next step, if Garcia chooses to take it, is a court challenge. If he decides to do that, he has 30 days from the election to file suit.

Assuming no judicial reversal of the election results, Alonzo will face Republican Joe Hernandez in the general election.

#### Remembering the Alamo...

It's been 42 years since the last blockbuster Alamo movie was shot in Texas— John Wayne's 1960 epic filmed at the late Happy Shahan's ranch near Brackettville.

But director-actor Howard, who wasn't even playing Opie yet in 1960, is considering Texas as the location of a 21st century Hollywood retelling of the 1836 siege in San Antonio.

Howard and a couple of producers had lunch last week with Gov. Rick Perry and Film Commission head Tom Copeland to discuss the project and the possibility of filming in the Lone Star

Nearly 200,000 children in Texas are reported as abused or neglected every year. It's a tragic fact; take it personally.

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month, and this year's statewide theme is "Neglect: Take It Personally." It's a time to focus on ways not only to protect children but also to prevent abuse from even occurring. This is your opportunity to make a difference in young lives. The Haskell County child Welfare Board is hoping to create an awareness of child abuse and neglect, and help educate people in our community on how to prevent it. During the month of April, Haskell County schools will participate in a different activity each week to promote awareness of Child Abuse Prevention Month.

Neglect is the most frequent form of child abuse. Children die simply because they're put in situations where they are not supervised. Last year, from January through December, 2001, Child Protective Services carried out thirty-two investigations in Haskell County and removed six children. There are a total of thirteen children who are in care in Haskell County. We all know that law enforcement cannot prevent all crime. We cannot expect the state's Child Protective Services to stop all child abuse and neglect. We all have to recognize neglect and take it personally.

Parents are not alone. Information and support is available to make communities strong and safe. The Web site www.itsuptoyou.org contains a wealth of information on how to prevent child abuse, where to go to get help with parenting skills, and what to do i you suspect a child is in danger. Additionally, volunteers from Haskell County Child Welfare Board are in the community sharing information from Child Abuse Prevention Kits. Contact your local Child Protective Services office to get more information It's up to all of us to prevent child abuse. We must take it personally.

# announces new NAP regulations

Federal regulations published recently set the stage for better risk protection for growers of noninsurable crops, but leave only a short time for producers to take advantage of the benefits 'available for crop losses in 2001 and 2002. Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices stand ready to accept applications from producers for coverage available through the Noninsured Assistance Program

Crops eligible for NAP coverage are those for which crop insurance is not available including fruits and vegetables, aquaculture, pecans, turfgrass and forage crops.

"The new regulations governing NAP give producers the opportunity to purchase affordable protection against crop losses," says John Fuston, State Executive Director for FSA in Texas. "It's critical that producers file their 2001 and 2002 applications for coverage and pay their service fees by April 18, 2002. Like crop insurance, once an application period closes, the opportunity to obtain coverage is gone," he says.

NAP coverage requires a service fee of \$100 per crop, per producer with a \$300 cap per county. Out-ofpocket expenses for any producer

duction occurs in more than three counties. Service fees may be waived for eligible limited resource produc-

"The new, streamlined program has already begun to benefit Texas growers. To date Texas has dispersed more than \$212,00 for NAP crop losses incurred in 2001," Fuston says.

Under the previous NAP program, coverage was only available when catastrophic losses occurred in a widespread area. New provisions allow for individual coverage tailored to meet a producer's specific needs and allow for a customized crop protection plan. With the elimination of area crop loss provisions, each qualifying individual loss can be addressed based on its own merits.

"Because FSA has the ability to protect against individual losses, response time is quicker and payment to the producer will be at the end of the growing season," says Fuston.

As outlined in the regulations, maintaining eligibility for 2001 and 2002 crops requires producers who otherwise would be late in filing the application apply and pay service fees within 30 days of publication of the rule. NAP continues to require will not to exceed \$900, even if pro-reporting of crop acreage, yields and

production as a condition of eligibiiity. In addition, producers are required to report losses the earlier of 15 days after damaging weather occurs or the date loss becomes appar-

"Good record-keeping by producers is becoming increasingly more important. This is especially true for NAP because accurate records ensure producers receive the best coverage available under the program," says

Fuston explained, if producers timely filed a notice of loss for the 2001 crop year they may be eligible for NAP benefits. However, if this notice of loss was not filed within 15 calendar days of the disaster or the loss became apparent, then the producer is not eligible for 2001.

In addition to filing applications for coverage and paying fees within the next 30 days, NAP crop producers have the opportunity to certify their 2000 crop production to both support their proven yields and submit 2001 crop production records to substantiate loss claims.

"The window of opportunity for NAP coverage for 2001 and 2002 is now down to less than 30 days. So I would encourage interested producers who timely submitted notices of loss on 2001 crops to apply for coverage by April 18, 2002, and encourage 2002 NAP producers to heed this deadline as well," Fuston states.





# Boll weevil program given nod

The Texas Department of Agriculture has announced that cotton producers in the Rolling Plains Central Boll Weevil Eradication Zone have voted to continue a boll weevil eradication program in the 22-county zone. Final results were 1,734 voting "for" and 200 voting "against" continuing as eradication program.

Producers also voted to maintain Woody Anderson of Mitchell County as the Rolling Plains Central representative on the statewide board of directors for the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Inc. Anderson is a cotton producer who has farmed in Mitchell County since

TDA issued 3,753 ballots to cotton producers in the zone who were eligible to vote in the referendum. Some 1,934 ballots were postmarked by the March 11 deadline and counted. More than 89 percent of these ballots were in favor of continuing the program.

Growers in the Rolling Plains Central Zone initially approved a boll weevil eradication program on Dec. 1. 1994, and a maximum assessment of \$10 per land acre to fund it. The current assessment rate is not affected by the vote to continue the

eradication program in the zone.

On Feb. 19, 2002, the Rolling Plains Central Zone was declared functionally eradicated of boll weevils, the second area in Texas to receive the designation. "Functionally eradicated" means no evidence of reproducing boll weevils has been found in cotton fields in the
