

Annual fireworks display to explode New Year's Eve in Jud community

The fourth annual W. E. Hollingsworth Memorial Fireworks display, sponsored by the Haskell County Historical Commission, will be held Tues., Dec. 31. The event will begin at 9:00 p.m. Jim Hollingsworth and assistants will set off another large load of fireworks on the Hollingsworth farm between Rule and Rochester, located five miles west of Hwy. 6 at the Intersection of FM 2407 and County Road 146. The fireworks will be on the west side of County Road 146 on thirty acres of land prepared for the event. Parking along FM 2407 for a mile east of County Road 146 will provide a prime view of the fireworks display.

Funeral services for George Alvis Mullino, 68, of Rochester were held Sun., Dec. 15 at Rochester First Baptist Church under the direction of Smith Funeral Home of Knox City. Burial was in Rochester Cemetery.

Mr. Mullino died Wed., Dec. 11 in an Abilene hospital.

Born Dec. 28, 1933, he was the son of Ermine and Felix Mullino of Rochester. He was a 1951 graduate of Rochester High School where he was a Star Greenhand and received his Lone Star Farmer degree. He attended Texas A&M where he was a member of the Aggie band. He com-

pleted his Bachelor of Science degree in Agricultural Education at Texas Tech University in 1955. While at Tech he was a member of Alpha Zeta fraternity. Following graduation he taught agriculture for two years at O'Brien High School.

He married Sharon Sue Reid, Aug. 9, 1953. They farmed and ranched in Rochester for almost 50 years. George had the heart of a servant and gave much to his community and to the area. From 1960 until 2001, he owned and operated Rochester Cotton Warehouse. He was on the board of directors of the Farmer's Gin Company and was instrumental in the organization of Producer's Grain and Supply, Lone Star Peanut Company, Western Pipe and Pivot Company and Home State Bank, all of Rochester. He was a member of Rochester First Baptist Church, a deacon and men's Sunday school teacher.

He served 19 years as a trustee of Rochester I.S.D., 14 years as board president. He was particularly supportive of the RHS band program. He was appointed to the Texas Ag Finance Authority Board and the Texas Water Board by Gov. Ann Richards. He was a member of the Haskell County Appraisal Board, Haskell

County Livestock Association, Small Business Administration Board, Rochester Roping Club, Rochester Cemetery Association and Haskell County FHA board. Whatever church, school, community or county project got underway, he could always be counted on to help make it successful.

Merry Christmas to unwind and relieve stress.

• Organize yourself by keeping only one "to do" list. Don't have multiple lists on the refrigerator or in your work environment, this creates clutter and chaos that can trigger stress: not be required quoing only

from holiday tasks by taking a long walk, soaking in a hot bath or reading a book.

• Know your boundaries. Don't get so caught up in holiday chores and preparations that you don't have time to do things that you enjoy.

• Use the holidays to catch up with family and friends. Instead of turning on the television, take this time to share old memories and make new ones with your loved ones.

• Cut down on the time and expense of shopping by assigning gifts. Have all of your family members draw one name from a hat so that everyone still gets a gift without your pocketbook paying the

price.

• Be thoughtful when gift-giving by creating your own gift. For instance, write a personal letter to someone about all of their good qualities, or frame your loved one's favorite poem or song nib out because

After leaving their donations of canned goods for the local food bank, the group departed for their homes with a deeper appreciation of the true meaning of Christmas



Placebo study produces odd results

There's some truth to the joke in which the psychiatrist tells the patient over the phone to take two placebos and call me in the morning," says Dr. Janet Tekell.

Tekell, assistant professor of psychiatry at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas, and colleagues found in a study of the antidepressant Prozac that placebos do work sometimes for some people. The study showed that while both Prozac and a placebo caused the same type response in some overlapping brain areas, there were other areas where the responses

But don't throw away your Prozac yet. "While we know placebos work for a while for some people, we know from other studies that their effect is not long lasting and doesn't work for everyone," Tekell says. Mental health professionals speculate that for some patients just the fact that a physician recognizes their problem and offers help may be placebo in itself, she says.

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

Hunters should take precautions to prevent disease

taking to the woods and fields to hunt deer, doves and other animals; and they are not alone. All manner of critters that can carry diseases are out as well, say officials with the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

Hunters, along with campers and hikers, are at risk of exposure to diseases transmitted by ticks, fleas and mosquitoes. Many of these diseases begin with flu-like symptoms such as fever, chills, headache and body aches that can worsen quickly.

West Nile virus is a mosquitoborne illness new to Texas. "Both public health officials and the public are learning about a new virus that appeared on the East Coast just three years ago and in Texas this summer," said Texas Commissioner of Health Eduardo Sanchez, M.D.

The virus, which can cause encephalitis, is spread by mosquitoes. Encephalitis is an inflammation of the brain that may be caused by one of several mosquito-borne viruses. Symptoms include intense headache, high fever, nausea, muscle tenderness, partial unconsciousness and even coma. In rare instances, death may occur.

Another potential danger is Lyme disease, the most frequently diagnosed tick-borne problem in the United States. Lyme disease may result in skin lesions or rashes, which, if left untreated, may result in severe damage to the joints, heart and nervous system. Rocky Mountain spotted fever also is spread by infected ticks. It can create a measles-like rash and is fatal if not treated quickly. Exposure to bacteria that cause tularemia, yet another tickborne disease, also can occur by handling wild rabbit carcasses.

To protect against insect bites: Use insect repellent containing DEET. Follow directions carefully.

Stay on trails and avoid areas of overgrown brush and tall grasses.

Wear protective clothing such as a hat, long-sleeved shirt and long pants tucked into boots or socks. Wear light-colored clothes to easily

In areas with ticks, check your body carefully for them every few

To Subscribe, Call 940-864-2686 hours. Ticks are small, easy to miss and will attach to any part of the body from head to toe, so look carefully.

Plague, common in wild rodent populations of West Texas, is transmitted to people by fleas or by direct contact with infected animals such as prairie dogs, squirrels, cats, rats and mice. This disease sometimes includes the presence of painful, swollen lymph nodes. Unless treated quickly, death may

Infected rodents such as rats and mice also spread hantavirus infection to people. A rodent may have the virus in its droppings, urine and saliva. The virus also may be spread through dust particles in the air.

"You can become infected by inhaling dust that contains the virus," said Guy Moore, a wildlife biologist with TDH's Zoonosis Control Division. "Cleaning cabins, sheds or barns without a mask can increase your chances of coming in contact with hantavirus."

Hantavirus infection may lead to extreme difficulty breathing and can be fatal. Patients are given supportive treatment, but antibiotics will not cure a hantavirus infection.

Hunters also need to be aware that deer can share the bacterium that causes anthrax in people, and feral hogs can carry brucellosis. Precautions include wearing latex gloves when field dressing animals or handling any wild animal carcass.

Rabies is a viral infection of the nervous system that may affect almost any warm-blooded animal. "It is impossible to tell by looking at an animal whether it is infected with the rabies virus, so avoid contact with any wild animals," Moore said.

Rabies occurs in many wild animal populations in Texas, especially skunks, bats, raccoons, coyotes and foxes. Humans usually are infected through a bite by a rabid animal, which is why you should always consult a doctor if an animal bites you. Rabies is almost always fatal once symptoms begin, but timely preventive treatment can be lifesaving.

"Do not try to help injured animals or touch dead ones," Moore said. "If you need assistance, contact a game warden, park employee or animal control or law enforcement

DON'T INVEST EVERYTHING IN THE STOCK MARKET

Did you know there are at least two categories of savings that should never be invested in stocks or stock mutual funds? Many investors have recently learned an unfortunate lesson about the stock market: it's not the right place for all of your money at all times.

Historically, it's true that the stock market has provided superior returns over long periods. But those returns come at a price-volatility. On the road to achieving those superior returns, there are many ups and downs. And if you need to withdraw your savings during one of the market downturns, you might not recover your investment.

Rule #1. Generally, you shouldn't invest funds in the stock market that you will need during the next two to three years. For example, if you need to withdraw money to pay your ongoing living expenses in retirement, the money you'll need in the next few years should be in stable investments such as money market funds, bank CDs, or bonds with maturities matched to your needs. That eliminates the risk that you'll need the money when the stock market is severely depressed, as

This lesson applies to college savings funds or any other savings set aside for a definite purpose. If you have 15 years before your child goes to college, by all means invest in stocks. But if your child is a junior in high school, you should be protecting the value of those college

Rule #2. It's generally advisable to keep at least three to six months' living expenses in an emergency fund. Your emergency fund is to provide the money you might need for crises such as job loss, illness, major car repairs, uninsured dental work, etc. If you need to draw on these savings, you probably can't afford to wait until the market

By all means, invest your other savings in stocks, bonds, real estate, or whatever fits your goals. But keep these two categories of savings in safe, stable investments, and that means out to the stock market.

Comptroller projects multibillion dollar budget deficit

AUSTIN-If you think balancing your checkbook is hard, imagine what it must be like dealing with a bank account of \$14.4 billion. That was the cash Texas had on hand at the end of the fiscal year, according to a recent report from the comptroller's office.

A look at the figures for August only shows \$5.1 billion in state spending with total revenue of \$7.2 billion.

Those numbers look pretty good, but tax collections were down 3.1 percent. The most notable decrease was in income from oil and gas production. Oil production tax receipts were down 23.5 percent, with natural gas production tax income down 60.6 percent.

Other tax categories with decreases from the previous fiscal year were the hotel and motel tax (-6.4 percent), utility taxes (-8.4 percent), cigarette and tobacco taxes (-7.6 percent), franchise tax (-1.3 percent) and sales tax (-1 percent.)

Still to come is the comptroller's official revenue estimate. Right now the projected deficit is ranging from \$5 billion to as high as \$12 billion.

Tips to mind your weight during holidays The holidays can be a tough time

for those who are watching their weight. Smorgasbords served up at family gatherings and office parties can lead even the most determined dieter to yield to temptation.

One slip shouldn't mean the end to your efforts, however. In fact, an occasional indulgence can actually help in dieting, according to a Texas Woman's University professor and a nutritionist with the university's Wellness Center.

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"An unrelentingly severe diet makes people resentful, hungry and often just plain miserable," said Dr. Sally Stabb, associate professor of psychology and philosophy at TWU. "It's OK to allow yourself some leeway on the weekends, or one day a week or for one of your holiday meals.

Stabb said the holidays can bring increased pressure to eat, as social rituals and celebrations almost always involve eating.

"During the holidays, many people have multiple rounds of visiting friends and familyespecially if they have step, blended or divorced families in which a number of sets of relatives must be visited," she said. In these situations, Stabb said, people can easily find themselves at a luncheon followed by a dinner, "all with the expectant eyes and smiles of family or friends looking on. So we feel obligated to eat in order not to be considered rude."

That may help explain why most Americans gain 4 pounds during the holidays.

Melissa Hendricks, facilities manager and nutritionist with the TWU Wellness Center, stressed the importance of exercise in warding off those extra pounds.

"An occasional splurge is not bad," she said. "In order to lose weight, it's more important to exercise regularly than to skip


Hendricks said people should make every effort to stay active during the holidays and stick as closely as possible to their regular exercise program. However, she said, people shouldn't worry if their entire program won't fit into their holiday schedule.

"Any exercise you do is good. It doesn't matter if you can't fit in a whole hour."

For those who also are counting calories, Hendricks said it's important to cut back on liquid calories.

'We tend to compensate for eating, but not for drinking," she said. Those who choose low-calorie foods often continue to drink high-calorie beverages such as sodas or alcoholic beverages at holiday gatherings, she

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

Choose the right toy to help keep children safe and interested

How many parents have been disappointed Christmas morning to find their child playing with gift wrap and not the gifts? Keeping some simple toy selection rules in mind can help ensure preschool children will enjoy their gifts more than the boxes.

"First, parents need to make sure all toys they buy their children are safe," said Dr. Jo Ann Engelbrecht, professor of family sciences at Texas Woman's University in Denton. "The toy shouldn't have any small parts the child can put in his or her mouth."

Equally important, the toy should be durable. Pieces of broken toy pose just as great a choking hazard.

"Toys that can be used for a variety of things will be used more than a toy that has a single use," Dr. Engelbrecht said. "Open-ended" toys let children be creative and use their imagination. A toddler can use a large ball for playing catch, kicking in the back yard or as a stool for spinning in a circle.

"Something as simple and inexpensive as a beach ball can hold a child's attention much longer than an expensive toy," Dr. Engelbrecht said. "Markers, newsprint, colored papers, blocks and Play Dough are all things that can keep children entertained for hours and spark their imaginations."

Durable books made out of plastic or cardboard, puppets and puzzles are other items that entertain children. And keeping a child challenged is important in keeping a child interested in a toy.

"If a puzzle is too easy, the child will do it once and not use it again, similar to teenagers who find a video game too easy and play it once and then opt for something more challenging," Dr. Engelbrecht said.

Toy packaging gives recommended ages for the product. But. Dr. Engelbrecht notes, sometimes the recommendations are off. Look carefully at the toy, examine it and determine if it might be too challenging for your childwhich also will cause it to be discarded—or not challenging enough. "Based on his or her personality, is it something that your child would be interested in?" Dr. Engelbrecht added.

Gift givers need to think about what they are going to buy before heading to the toy store. "Have you seen Toys 'R' Us? It's overwhelming.

"If you go toy shopping without any idea of what you're looking for, you're more likely to make a mistake," Dr. Engelbrecht said. "Look in catalogs and online to get ideas first.

Many online retailers offer an additional service to buyers: customer product reviews. It's another tool gift givers can use to gauge whether or not a toy will work for his or her preschooler.

Fo someone purchasing a toy for a friend's relative's child, call the parents and make sure the child doesn't already have the toy and that the parents are fine with the proposed gift. The drum set from Uncle Bob might not be as big a hit with Mom and Dad as it is with Junior.

On Christmas morning, let the child open all his or her gifts but then put some of them aside. "If a child has too many choices, he or she will be overwhelmed and won't know which toy to play with," Dr. Englebrecht said.

"Rotate the toys," she said. Let the child play with a few for several days or weeks, then pull some others out of the closet and put the toys they have been playing with up. By doing this, it's like discovering new toys every rotation.

Finally, Dr. Englebrecht stresses that parents need to play with their little ones. "Children need and learn from human interaction. Don't let videos, electronic games and television become babysitters."

Elementary students to appear on TEA video

TEA's production crew was on the Haskell Elementary campus, Wed., Dec. 18 to film the students at work

on their light and optical systems lessons in Paula Everett's elementary science lab. Activities included first graders discovering what makes a

magnifier, and fifth graders exploring


reflection and refraction.

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As each holiday season passes, parents of young children ponder when is the right time to tell their youngsters that there really isn't a Santa Claus. However, children tend know instinctively when it's time to stop believing-whenever their fantasy world starts to fade into more reality-based thinking.

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"Some children as young as five years old will discover on their own there is no Santa. Others will hold on to the belief until about nine years of age," said Dr. Karen Petty, assistant professor of child development at Texas Woman's University.

In a young child's world, anything is possible and there is on distinction between fantasy and reality. "Their play is their world. Everything is play and imagination. But as a child develops, he or she becomes more aware of the real world," Dr. Petty

"It's when you become logical that you lose some of your magic," she said. "By the third grade, the logic is beginning to override the magic. So, in time, a child will discover the truth about Santa on his or her own." But some children may not acknowledge the discovery for fear that admitting there is no Santa could mean no gifts.

Even in the "magical" world of a child, he or she can deduce that adults who no longer believe in Santa Claus receive fewer gifts. The child might pretend to believe after discovering Santa doesn't exist out of fear of receiving fewer or no gifts.

Making Santa part of a family culture or family ritual can ease those fears. "There are many aspects to the holidays, with religion and spirituality being the most prominent. But the holidays are also a time of family and fun.

"Santa represents the spirit of giving and fun and parents can use him to teach their children about giving," Dr. Petty said. Incorporating Santa into family holiday culture, even when children know he doesn't exist, keeps some of that childhood magic alive and reinforces lessons on giving.

'If you don't believe, then he doesn't exist. But if you choose to believe, he becomes part of your family's holiday traditions," Dr. Petty

Still, many parents may fret when their child make the discovery rather than simply give them a one-word answer.

"When a child asks if there's a Santa, a parent can respond with something like, "That's a good question' or 'Well, what do you think?" Dr. Petty said. Helping guide the child to the answer not only helps them develop reasoning skills, it gives the parent and child a chance to discuss the importance of what Santa represents and how he fits into family holiday traditions.

Although some children may be disappointed to learn there is no Santa, Dr. Petty said she's never met a child or adult who was bitter toward his or her parents for perpetuating the Santa myth.
