Democrats take spots in leadership mix The new leadership in the Capitol

has surprised some by being surprisingly...Democratic. That's Democratic with an uppercase D, as in Democrats.

In the Senate, Republicans got the chairs of the really heavy hitting committees: Senate Finance (Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo); State Affairs (Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant); Business and Commerce (Sen. Troy Fraser, R-Horseshoe Bay); and Health and Human Services (Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound). But Democrats were appointed by Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst to chair International Relations (Sen. Eddie Lucio, D-Harlingen) and the new Government Organization Committee (Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston).

On the west side of the Capitol, House Speaker Tom Craddick, R-Midland, has said he intends to spread responsibilities around, with new faces in key spots. The new Government Organization Committee, charged with hunting down duplicate services in state agencies, will be headed by Rep. David Swinford, R-Amarillo.

The 7 Percent Solution ...

Gov. Rick Perry has given state agencies until Feb. 6 to come up with ways to cut 7 percent from their current budgets. First line of cuts is trending toward travel and hiring freezes, an action Texas A&M University announced early on.

The next round takes agencies from a 93 percent budget to a 0 percent budget for next fiscal year. In other words, rather than starting out with a recommended budget, legislators will begin at zero with each agency and add from there.

Remembering the Alamo ... It's no coincidence that the 103-

year-old Texas State Historical Association has its annual meeting

the first week of March. As someone once said, that period includes the High Holy Days of Texas-the day Texas declared its independence from Mexico (March 2, also Sam Houston's birthday) and the day the Alamo fell (March 6).

A group of history-minded Texans are now pushing another document they went signed, House Bill 294 by Rep. John Davis (R-Houston) and its companion, Senate Bill 250 by Sen. Gonzalo Barrientos (D-Austin.) The bills are simple.

The law they would create would not cost the state anything or raise taxes. Neither would the proposed measures solve the state's fiscal woes, but they would designate March as Texas History Month.

"They will assure that the heritage and pride we all share as Texans will be celebrated well into the future by generations to come," said Charlie Yates, director of the Texian Legacy Association and one of the prime Movers behind the proposed bills.

Yates is hoping the bills can get the support of two-thirds of both houses, which would transform them into law immediately.

"There is an outside chance we could have the first Texas History Month this coming March," Yates said.

Yates is on the board of another non-profit organization, Celebrate Texas, which has been working to revitalize Texas' annual celebration of its version of July 4-March 2.

What's going on inside the Capitol this legislative session is as contemporary as it gets, but it's all happening in one of the more historical structures in Texas. 

Haskell CISD Comments

The future of public school finance is uncertain at this time. Senate Education Chairwoman Florence Shapiro submitted a bill that would end the current school finance law we know as "Robin Hood" on September 1, 2005.

If passed, the legislation would require lawmakers to design a new funding formula by the 2005 session. Supporters said the work could be done in a special legislative session before then.

As leaders of the education committees in their respective chambers, Shapiro and Grusendorf (Chairman of the House Education Committee) are expected to have little trouble pushing the legislation through, particularly since Gov. Rick

Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Tom Craddick have called for abolition of the "Robin Hood" system.

The share-the-wealth "Robin Hood" law, which the Legislature passed in 1993 under pressure from the Texas Supreme Court, is designed to maintain funding equity among school districts. Before the system was installed, some school districts were able to spend thousands of dollars more per year on each student than other districts.

The senator said it is unlikely the system can be changed in the current legislative session because of the nearly \$10 billion revenue gap projected over the next two years. An overriding goal of a new system would be to increase the state share of funding for schools, she said.

In the current school year, the state share of funding is projected to drop to less than 41 percent, as the local share-primarily property tax revenues-climbs to more than 59 percent, according to the Legislative Budget Board. That stands in sharp contrast to three years ago, when state aid made up more than 47 percent of state and local funds for education.

As far as designing a new finance system, the senator said she is open to a variety of options-but she opposes a state income tax as a new source of revenue.

The most unpopular part of the finance law is the provision that requires high-property-wealth school districts to share their property tax revenues with low-wealth districts.

In the current, two-year budget cycle, 118 wealthy districts are giving up an estimated \$1.5 billion in property taxes to their poorer counterparts. Over the next two years, they will need to surrender as much as \$2.5 billion.

Shapiro, Grusendorf and other Republican lawmakers have also expressed interest in a comprehensive "adequacy" study to determine the cost of meeting educational standards set by the state.

By specifying how much it costs to help the typical student achieve state standards, the Legislature could get a better handle on school revenue needs. Maryland and other states have used such studies to revamp their education funding systems in recent years.

No one knows the exact structure of future school funding laws, but everyone agrees there will be significant changes. Whatever happens in the next few months and years will have long term implications on our public school system.

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

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
