Do you ever leave the house without a coat in cold weather because you know you won't have to get out of the car? When you go from your house into your garage, then turn on the heater and drive around on errands, do you really need to bother carrying a coat?

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What would you do if your vehicle broke down and you were stranded by the side of the road for a while? What if you were the one in an accident and you couldn't stay in your vehicle? You'd be stuck outside without a coat, and that could lead to hypothermia, a potentially deadly condition.

Dr. Paul Pepe, UT Southwestern's chairman of emergency medicine, says when you leave the house in cold weather, you should always be prepared to spend an hour outdoors in the cold. No matter how short your errand is, you should have a coat with you. That also applies to any children you bring along with you, even if you don't plan to take them out of the car.

It's also a good idea to keep a winter survival kit in the trunk of your car, including extra blankets, water and a flashlight. You may never use these items, but if you do need them, they could save your life.




John Deere pioneer retires

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

Historic land dispute secures ownership rights to 4,662 acres AUSTIN-More than a thousand Texas land owners probably weren't paying a whole lot of attention last week to the presidential campaigning in Iowa or the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling upholding Texas' congressional redistricting plan. They were more concerned about keeping their property.

The land owners had been fighting to save their rights to 4,662 acres in Upshur County, acreage worth millions of dollars in mineral rights. Three men had filed a vacancy application with the state, hoping to prove that the land in question still belonged to Texas, not the folks who had been keeping deeds in their safe deposit boxes for years.

But last week, after reviewing the proceedings of a Dec. 17 hearing, Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson ruled that the land owners had a valid claim on their acreage.

Had the vacancy claimants been successful-they can still appeal to the courts-they stood to collect a finder's fee from the state amounting to one-sixteenth of the mineral rights to the land. That would add up to millions of dollars.

The case was settled, at least from the General Land Office's viewpoint, on the basis of history. Patterson's title experts reviewed the disputed land all the way back to the 1830s, when one William King first owned it. The conclusion was that the land did not belong to the state, though some sloppy surveying had been done.

This has been the most significant land dispute in Texas for six decades, but 10 other vacancy cases for various tracts around the state still are pending.

January Garden Checklist

by Brandon Anderson Haskell Co. Extension Agent

•The life of the flowering pot plant received as a Christmas gift can be prolonged with proper care. Keep the plant out of range of heating ducts and away from heating units. Keep in a cool room at night, preferably at 60 to 65 degrees F.

•Now is an excellent time to transplant mature or established trees and shrubs.

•Be sure to prune back the top of established trees and shrubs before moving. Remove about one-third to one-half of the top to compensate for roots lost in digging.

•Plan your flower and vegetable garden now before the rush of spring planting.

•Sow seeds in flats or containers

in protected structures to establish growth before hot weather arrives. Petunias, begonias, and slowgrowing transplants should be sown in early January.

Warm-temperature plants, such as tomatoes, peppers, marigolds, and periwinkles should be sown later in January or February.

•Put a light application of fertilizer on established pansy plants. Use onehalf pound of ammonium sulfate per 100 square feet of bed area. Repeat the application every 4 to 6 weeks. Dried blood meal or cottonseed meal are also excellent sources of fertilizer for pansies. Be sure to water well after applying fertilizers.

•Prepare beds and garden area for spring planting.

•Select and order gladiolus corms. for February and March planting. Plant at two-week intervals to prolong flowering period.

•Check junipers and other narrowleaf evergreens for bagworms in pouches; if left on the plants, the worms can start their cycle again by emerging from the pouches in the spring and feeding on the foliage. Removing the pouches by hand and burning them is an excellent means of reducing the potential damage next spring.

•Rose pruning in South Texas may be done in January. Remember that climbers and other once-blooming roses are best pruned after the spring flowers have faded.

e Government to be Ag tocus of 2004 Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman has announced that e Government initiatives would be a special focus of the U.S. Department

of Agriculture in 2004. "E Government is an important part of President Bush's Management Agenda to improve the operations of government," Veneman said during remarks via satellite to the American Farm Bureau Federation's annual meeting. "The computer has already taken its place next to the plowshare and tractor as indispensable to farmers. USDA's e Government initiatives will standardize processes and provide tools to unleash the fuller potential of information technology. Our goal is to operate more efficiently in order to be more responsive to the needs of American agriculture and consumers."

Veneman said that visitors to the



USDA website, www.usda.gov, will begin to see a new design, which is the first phase in efforts to make the website more powerful and improve access to USDA information and science.

"The new look will be followed by improved functionality," Veneman said. "We will continue adding features for users, culminating in August with the launch of 'MyUSDA.gov' to provide a customized version of the USDA homepage for individual users based on their unique needs.'

Other features that users will see soon include a "customer statement." Customer statements will put a whole range of USDA services and programs into a single report at the fingertips of agricultural producers. For instance, farmers would be able to view their contracts in various conservation programs, payments under commodity programs and information on loans and crop insurance.


Veneman said that farmers and ranchers will even be able to crossreference that data with interactive maps of their operations using





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

Weather Whys

Mist and Drizzle

Q: What's the difference between mist and drizzle?

A: The real difference is only a slight one, says Andrew Odins of Texas A&M University. "Mist is composed of tiny droplets of water, so tiny they are suspended in the atmosphere," Odins explains. "Mist reduces visibility, but not as much as fog, which it closely resembles. Technically speaking, during mist, visibility is one-half mile or more. Drizzle, on the other hand, is fairly uniform precipitation and is composed of small water drops that fall to the ground. The only real difference between drizzle and actual rain is that the droplets in drizzle are much smaller.'

drops in drizzle compared to those in mist.

A: Much larger, says Odins. "Drizzle contains drops that are .02 inch or smaller." Odins says. "There are even levels of drizzle - light drizzle (meaning visibility is about one-half mile); medium drizzle (visibility less than one-half mile) and heavy drizzle (visibility less than one-fourth mile). Mist is thinner than fog and the drops are so tiny that many float in the air, reducing visibility to between one-half mile and up to 1.2 miles. For purposes of measuring, the U.S. Weather Service does not regard fog, dew or frost as precipitation. There is also such a thing as arctic mist, which is a mist, of ice crystals and is a very light type of ice fog."


Byrd's hobbies and interests include snowboarding, golfing, basketball and baseball. He also enjoys travel, movies and leading worship for students.
