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

Statewide committee cracks down on insurance fraud AUSTIN-The insurance industry says fraudulent claims are getting to be a pain in the neck in Texas.

To combat the problem of phony claims, including fake neck injuries from minor traffic accidents, the industry has formed a group called the Texas Committee on Insurance Fraud, according to the Insurance Council of Texas.

"The smell of money is luring more and more people to fake injuries, set fire to their homes, stage car accidents and even stage their own death to illegally obtain money from insurances companies," said Craig Sparks, chairman of the new organization.

The task force plans to lobby for tougher insurance fraud penalties in the next regular session of the <sup>11</sup>Legislature. The committee also fintends to push for stronger " prosecution of people, groups or even companies caught perpetrating an insurance fraud.

For its part, the Texas Department of Insurance has started funding special prosecutors for district attorneys in the major metropolitan areas. Dallas County DA Bill Hill recently became the first prosecutor in the state to take on an attorney whose sole responsibility will be insurance fraud cases.

The reason why all this matters: higher claims paid translate into higher premiums.

**Education/tax bill** goes to House...

Over the weekend, the House Select Committee on Public School

valuation, raises the state portion of the sales tax to 6.75 percent and expands sales tax to previously exempt items such as newspapers and bottled water, and imposes a business payroll tax of 1.25 percent or \$500 per full-time employee.

The measure also would legalize and tax video slot machines at seven existing horse and dog tracks and three Indian reservations. 

Ag producers warned to watch for signs of labs

by Brandon Anderson Haskell Co. Extension Agent As a farmer, rancher or landowner in Haskell County it is our responsibility to be on the look out for signs and clues to drug or meth activity.

Everyday household items that, when found together, warn landowners of the possibility that a meth lab may have been on their land. For instance, if you come upon a used blister pack of cold medicine, empty starting fluid cans, an empty bottle of fuel line deicer and several unwrapped lithium batteries all in the same area in a field or along a roadside, you could very well be looking at the remnants of a "meth lab.'

Here are a few other warning signs and products to look for:

•Coffee filters, paper towels and napkins where they don't belongnear outbuildings, in open pasture, along creek beds.

•Foam coolers and containers suitable for transporting stolen anhydrous ammonia. Seemingly discarded propane bottles with green corrosion on the brass valve-a dead giveaway it's been used to store anhydrous.

•Empty blister packs of pseudoephedrine decongestants.

•Lithium batteries, whole or unwrapped.

May is named National Electrical Safety month

The month of May has been dedicated as National Electrical Safety Month by the Electrical Safety Foundation International to educate the public about the importance of using electrical products safely in the home, school and workplace.

With awareness being the key to electrical safety, some safety tips about hazards that are easily overlooked are offered.

Outlets:

\*Install safety covers on all unused outlets to protect children.

\*Install additional outlets where you need them instead of relying on extension cords or overloading power strips.

Power Cords:

\*Do not place power cords in high-traffic areas or under carpets, rugs or furniture, and never nail or staple them to the wall or baseboard.

\*Extension cords should only be used on a temporary basis; unplug and safely store them after every use.

\*Never alter a three-prong plug to make it fit into a two-prong outlet.

\*Properly use extension cords only for their intended use, indoor or outdoor, and meet or exceed the power needs of the appliance or tool being used.

**GFCIs and AFCIs:** 

\*Make sure your home includes ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs), which prevent accidental electrocution by automatically shutting off the circuit when they sense "leaks" of current.

\*Test your GFCIs monthly and after every major electrical storm.

\*Check to ensure arc fault circuit interrupters (AFCIs) are installed in your home. These help prevent fires by sensing where electricity is creating a hazard by arcing, or jumping a gap.

While it may seem unnecessary to follow these guidelines, the latest available national electrical disaster statistics illustrate that the effort is well worth it. Between 1994 and 1998, an annual average of 165,380 electrical related home structure fires accounted for an annual average of 910 deaths, nearly 7,000 injuries and almost \$1.7 billion in property damage.





The primary purpose of the luncheon was to develop a list of



While there are several noncontrollable risk factors such as: advancing age, positive family history, race (black population, white), sex (men/ women), prior stroke and history of diabetes, cardiac or renal disease, there are some factors which can be controlled. They are: hypertension, obesity, use of oral contraceptives, smoking, high cholesterol. If your mother's doctor has prescribed an antihypertensive (Blood Pressure) medicine, a reducing diet or low cholesterol diet and advised against smoking, following his directions is the best approach to doing your part to prevent another stroke.

Home Care is appropriate for the patient recovering from a stroke. Important in treatment and management of a stroke is an early rehabilitation program including physical therapy, speech therapy and occupational therapy. Other helpful services are skilled nurse visits and home health aide visits.

Remember the warning signs of a stoke are: Sudden, temporary weakness or numbness on one side of the body;

Temporary loss of speech, or slurred speech; Unexplained dizziness, unsteadiness, or falls; Temporary loss of vision or blurred vision; or Change in level of consciousness.





#### IT'S A NEW TAX DAY FOR DIVIDENDS

Under the new tax law, qualified dividends are taxed at a lower (in some cases considerably lower) tax rate than ordinary income. Because of the new maximum 15% rate on dividends, investors should be alert to the opportunities in owning dividend-paying stock. In fact, if you're in the two lowest income brackets, the tax on dividends drops to 5%.

In order for dividends to be taxed at the new lower rates, they must be considered qualified dividends, and they must also pass a holding period test. Generally, in order to overcome the holding period hurdle, you must hold the underlying stock for at least 61 days during the 121 day period surrounding the ex-dividend date. So don't think that you can simply trade in and out of stocks to receive qualified dividends, since the holding period test will certainly trip you up.

Not all dividends are created equal. Dividends paid by foreign stocks won't qualify unless certain standards are met. Most preferred dividends won't qualify, since they are really debt payments as opposed to dividend payments. Likewise, dividends passed through to you from a mutual fund will only be qualified if additional holding period rules are met by both the fund and the investor. Additionally, dividends paid by an S corporation are normally not considered qualified.

While it might be a bit more difficult to mine qualified dividends from all of the dividend-paying stocks and mutual funds, it's well worth the effort to enjoy reduced taxes on those dividends. If you use the services of a professional investment advisor, make sure to ask for guidance on stocks paying qualified dividends. If you're managing your own investments, invest the time necessary to understand the new tax rules on dividends.




