Days. When Graves was 16 , he split 2,000 post oak rails to buy the 2 -yearold horse, that was foaled in 1876 near Jacksboro near Jacksboro. He later traded Hub forgot the saddle pony with whom he'd developed that perfect understanding known only to a good horseman and a good horse. The teenager then got a job at the ranch where Hub had wound up, and he worked with him over the years. Wire fences had stopped the common herding of cattle, and old separate ranches, missed swapping separate ranches, missed swapping yarns with their old buddies. To supply a renewal of fellowship for the cattle country, a cowboy reunion with horse races and other attractions was announced to be held in 1896 . The cowboy reunion was held in Seymour for the first two years, and in 1898 it was moved to Haskell, and a $\$ 150.00$ prize for the best cutting horse. Sam heard about the contest and got permission from Bud Arnett, of the 8 Ranch near Guthrie, to take ol

Every effort had been made to publicize the big event in Haskell. Both the Kansas City Star and the Dallas News told of the cowboy convention, and special railroad rates were provided from everywhere in Texas. Spectators came from all directions, even though Haskell was
some 50 miles from the nearest railhead. Estimates of the crowd ran as high as 15,000 .
In the delightfully written and illustrated prose-poem, "Hub, Champion Cutting Horse," Robert H. Williams describes the event. "For two days the bands played and horses raced and broncs bucked and ropers roped. You never saw so
many bets won and lost. The four many bets won and lost. The four
hundred-foot-long grandstand set up hundred-foot-long grandstand set up
on the-bald prairie was creaking under it load. Folks lined the mileong race track with wagons, buggies and saddlehorses."
The rules of the spectacular cutting horse contest permitted each of the twelve entrees to spend five
minutes, during which time he was minutes, during which time he was

Many cowboys who were dmiringly following every movement of the old horse, stood up in their seats, entranced by his inbelievable skill." A yell came from the grandstand when Sam and Hub brought in the seventh heifer, and hats went into air ust before time expired. The $\$ 150.00$ prize money was awarded to Sam Graves and Old Hub, the horse who had come back almost from the grave to thrill this great ong of horse lovers.
After the reunion, Hub was taken
ck to the 8 Ranch, and Sam turned back to the 8 Ranch, and Sam turned
over half of the prize money to Bud Arnett to insure that the grand old cowhorse would always have plenty of oats and no longer waste away to he skin and bones.
Thanks to the love of a cowboy for his horse and belief in his horse's potential, the legendary twenty-two year old cowpony that had been
turned out into the cedar breaks to die, rode his final day of triumph in Haskell.
Although Sam Graves lived 50 years beyond that event and remained active at his ranch almost to the day of his death in 1949, his life story is inseparably bound up with the story of his horse Hub and the contest they won together at the Co.
