

Legislation passes, speaker survives challenges

AUSTIN-The 140 day regular session of the 80th Texas Legislature ended on May 28.

The House and Senate completed the essential task of settling on a budget-\$153 billion -covering fiscal years 2008-2009.

The state budget for 2008-2009 includes a set-aside of \$7.5 billion for property tax relief in 2010-2011.

Commanding the bulk of attention, however, was House Speaker Tom Craddick's battle to withstand challenges to his authority in the final days of the

Members from both major parties political parliamentary precedents and House rules in attempts to be recognized on the House floor so they could move to conduct a vote to vacate the chair.

Had such a motion been recognized and a vote taken, Craddick, R-Midland, might have been forced to step down. Then members could have elected another speaker to serve out the remainder of the session.

Three days before the session's end, Parliamentarian Denise Davis and Deputy Parliamentarian Chris Griesel, who had advised Craddick all session long, abruptly resigned their posts.

A short time later, Craddick appointed former state Reps. Terry Keel and Ron Wilson as parliamentarian and deputy parliamentarian, respectively. The pair guided Craddick through a maze of questions from the

Craddick, Keel and Wilson ran down the clock, repeatedly responding to members with rulings that it is the speaker's absolute right to choose to recognize or not recognize a member to make a motion. In effect. "You will not be recognized to make that motion." was the pat response. Attempts to be recognized subsided as lawmakers saw the opportunity to pass legislation slipping away.

Craddick said he plans to run for a fourth term as speaker, but he will face competition. The list of House members who have expressed a desire to succeed Craddick includes Republican Reps. Fred Hill of Richardson. Jim Keffer of Eastland, Jim Pitts

of Waxahachie, Robert Talton of Pasadena and Brian McCall of Plano, and Democratic Reps. Senfronia Thompson and Speaker Pro Tempore Sylvester Turner, both of Houston.

The 81st Legislature will convene in January 2009. Craddick and challengers will have 18 months to get promises of support from colleagues.

Major legislation gains

Despite time lost in efforts to unseat Craddick, legislators still managed to push through and pass about 1,500 bills. Here are the effects of a few of them:

•A water plan benefiting Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and other thirsty metro areas and giving rural areas some control over interbasin water transfers.

·A \$425 minimum pay increase for public school teachers and a set of standards that if met can qualify a teacher for an additional raise.

•Funding for the Childrens Health Insurance Program will give coverage to an additional 127,000 children.

•Enhanced felony charges possible for owners of dogs that attack other people.

•Elective Bible education classes for schools that have enough students who express an interest in taking them.

•A toll road bill that puts a twoyear hold on construction of the Trans Texas Corridor project but allows the planning to continue, while granting local and regional toll authorities control over their own road projects. •Random steroid testing of

Texas high school athletes.

•A requirement for all public schools to have at least one automated external defibrillator on campus.

•More than \$200 million for additional law enforcement officers and technology to aid in border and homeland security operations.

•Constitutional amendment letting voters decide in November if the Legislature should be required to record each member's vote on final passage of substantive bills.

·Constitutional amendment letting voters decide in November if the state of Texas should borrow \$3 billion for cancer research over the next decade.

Deadline for the governor to veto bills is June 17.

E-mail scams

The Internal Revenue Service has alerted taxpayers to the latest versions of an e-mail scam intended to fool people into believing they are under investigation by the agency's Criminal Investigation division.

The e-mail purporting to be from IRS Criminal Investigation falsely states that the person is under a criminal probe for submitting a false tax return to the California Franchise Board. The e-mail seeks to entice people to click on a link or open an attachment to learn more information about the complaint against them. The IRS warned people that the e-mail link and attachment is a Trojan Horse that can take over the person's computer hard drive and allow someone to have remote access to the computer. The IRS urged people not to

click the link in the e-mail or open the attachment.

Similar e-mail variations suggest a customer has filed a complaint against a company and the IRS can act as an arbitrator. The latest versions appear aimed at business taxpayers as well as individual taxpayers.

The IRS does not send out unsolicited e-mails or ask for detailed personal and financial information. Additionally, the IRS never asks people for the PIN numbers, passwords or similar secret access information for their credit card, bank or other financial accounts.

"Everyone should beware of these scam artists," said Kevin M. Acting IKS
"Always Brown, Commissioner. exercise caution when you receive unsolicited e-mails or emails from senders you don't know."

Recipients of questionable emails claiming to come from the IRS should not open any attachments or click on any links contained in the e-mails. Instead. they should forward the e-mails to phishing@irs.gov (the instructions may be found on IRS.gov by entering the term "phishing" in the search box).

The IRS also sees other e-mail scams that involve tricking victims into revealing private personal and financial information over the Internet is known as "phishing" for information.

The IRS and the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration work with the U.S. Computer Emergency Readiness Team (US-CERT) and various Internet service providers and international CERT teams to have the phishing sites taken offline as soon as they are reported. Since the establishment of the

mail box last year, the IRS has received more than 17,700 emails from taxpayers reporting more than 240 separate phishing incidents. To date, investigations by TIGTA have identified host sites in at least 27 different countries, as well as in the United States. Other fraudulent e-mail scams

try to entice taxpayers to click their way to a fake IRS Web site and ask for bank account numbers. Another widespread email tells taxpayers the IRS is holding a refund (often \$63.80) for them and seeks financial account information. Still another email claims the IRS's 'anti-fraud commission' is investigating their tax returns. More information is available







Grilling season safety tips listed

Memorial Day weekend starts the summer season of outdoor barbecue cookouts and picnics for many people, but unsafe food preparation or handling can spoil the fun, says Dr. Vickie Vaclavik, a registered dietitian at UT Southwestern Medical Center.

Dr. Vaclavik suggests these tips for safe, healthy cookouts:

•Make sure grilled meats are cooked to at least 145 degrees and poultry to at least 160 degrees. Keep an inexpensive meat thermometer for your grill to monitor temperatures.

•Foods spoils fast when outdoor temperatures rise into the 80s, 90s and 100s, so be sure to not leave out dairy products, cold cuts and raw meat for longer than one hour.

•Pack plenty of ice in coolers to store raw and/or leftover foods.

·Leftovers should be refrigerated within an hour of cooking during hot weather.

•Wash your hands or use hand sanitizer after you've handled raw meat or food.

Is angina dangerous?

The pain is not dangerous but it is a serious warning sign of

How is angina diagnosed and treated?

Angina is diagnosed on the basis of symptoms, physical examinations, and tests such as an exercise stress test or coronary angiography, a special x-ray study of the heart's circulation. Many people can control angina by making life-style changes that lower the heart's workload and reduce stress. Rest and the use of nitroglycerin usually relieves an attack within minutes.

The heart's demand for oxygen also can be modified with drugs. Beta blockers, for example, reduce blood pressure and slow down the heart rate, thus reducing the heart's need for

oxygen. What can I do myself?

Decrease the risk of an angina attack by identifying and controlling factors that trigger chest pain. For example, yoga, meditation, and other stress-reduction techniques may reduce




