Austin, Sept. 5 - Gov. Allan Shivers today granted the customary. 30-day constitutional. reprieve to Lester D. Stevens, sentenced to die in the slaying of Joshua Blocher, Bailey County recluse.

The reprieve moved the execution date from Oct. 2 to Nov. 1. Stevens, 52 year old, former Amarillo smelter worker, was convicted last Dec. 6 in district court in Muleshoe. He had been charged jointly with Thomas Clifton Livesay of Amarillo in Judge Collection





In some areas of the Rolling Plains last year, up to jail for 18 months. I wouldn't to 50 per cent of the wheat plants be interested in business followwere affected. In the infested fields, the disease can be detected before harvest in the form of green and white heads on the same plant stool. The grain is shrivelled or is entirely absent. The base of the stems are usually dark in color and the diseased plants may be easily pulled from the soil. The root system often remains in the ground because the plants break at the decay-

Seed treatment is not the entire answer for controlling this disease but is an aid. Since the disease fungus may live in the soil for several years, crop rotation and late planting are practices recommended by Norton as further aids to controlling foot rot and certain seedling blights.

The cost of seed treating materials is small when considered on a bushel or acre basis Norton says several good compounds tained by writing to Raymond are readily available for doing the seed treating job. He urges farmers to follow closely the directions printed on the containers and to use care when doing the treating job because the materials are mostly poisonous.






