

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

To include vehicle borne improvised explosive devices (VBIED's) as well as allconventional, chemical, biological, and nuclear explosives. They also go out with the Route Clearance missions driving slowly down predetermined routes looking for any signs of an IED. When a hazard is located the EOD team, that is with the route clearance detachment, takes control of the situation and alleviates all explosive hazards to prevent any injury or damage to all coalition forces (CF) and civilians.

During his 12 1/2 year career in the Marine Corps, MSgt. Messenger has received three good conduct medals, an Army commendation medal, three Navy Achievement medals, outstanding voluntary service medal, two national defense medals, four overseas deployment ribbons, recruiting ribbon, two meritorious unit citations, Iraqi campaign medal, and global war on terrorism.





Highway department releases Trans-Texas Corridor impact study

AUSTIN-The Texas Department of Transportation and Federal Highway Administration on Nov. 13 released a 1,072-page "draft environmental impact statement" for the proposed Trans-Texas Corridor/Interstate 69 project.

The draft statement examines a 650-mile long area stretching from far south Texas to extreme northeast Texas that someday could include a matrix of new roads, rail and utilities.

Existing highways will be considered first when it comes to choosing where the project might be routed, TxDOT suggested.

The draft statement combines nearly three years of work with local officials and input from citizens, TxDOT said.

But there is more left to do. Opportunities for the public to be involved will be unprecedented over the next several months, TxDOT said.

State offers Clean Bus rebates

The state's environmental agency is accepting applications from school districts to reimburse costs for installing emissionreducing equipment on school

In promoting the "Texas Clean School Bus" rebate program, the Texas Commission Environmental Quality said:

•More than 36,000 buses carrying an estimated 1.3 million students drive Texas roads every school day.

•More than one-third of these buses are more than 10 years old. Most older buses emit more pollution than most newer

•Exposure to diesel exhaust from school buses can aggravate respiratory problems, asthma and

In some cases, an \$800 retrofit can reduce emissions by 70 to 80 said Commissioner Larry R. Soward.

All public school districts and charter schools in Texas that operate one or more dieselpowered school buses or a transportation system provided by a countywide district are eligible to be reimbursed for costs of approved retrofits.

Non-agricultural employment grew by 24,200 jobs in October. Employers have added 206,400 jobs over the past 12 months for an annual growth rate of 2 percent, the Texas Workforce Commission reported Nov. 15.

The national unemployment rate is at 4.7 percent.

Office Supply Scams

Several businesses recently complained to the Office of the Attorney General about invoices they received for office supplies that were never ordered, including paper, toner cartridges and other office products.

Business owners should be aware that scam artists often send fraudulent billing invoices to companies of all sizes, hoping that the accounting department will simply pay the bill. Crooks count on the business's failure to confirm that a purchase order was issued or that goods actually arrived.

Office supply schemes can take multiple forms. In one variation, the scam artist simply sends an invoice without ever delivering any products. Other thieves send merchandise that the business did not order and charge a price that dramatically exceeds invoices are unpaid scammers try to intimate the businesses with threatening telephone calls and

Most office supply scammers are based in other states, so Texas businesses can only communicate with them by telephone or e-mail. Businesses that attempt to question the invoices are often met with vague statements claiming that "someone" at the company ordered the supplies.

By law, businesses that receive unordered merchandise are under no obligation to pay to return the

unwanted products. Generally, these items can be considered a gift. Otherwise, the retailer that sent the merchandise must pay to what the same supplies would retrieve it within a reasonable cost at a local retailer. If the period of time at no expense to the business. A scam artist will seldom bother to do so.

> Businesses should consider alerting all employees about office supply scams, not just those who work in accounting and billing departments. Some scammers are known to dial random numbers throughout a business until they find an unsuspecting employee who will "accept" the unordered merchandise. According to some reports, employees have also been persuaded to fill out sweepstakes forms without realizing that the fine print committed their company to buy unwanted, overpriced supplies.

Cotton Market Weekly

Cotton futures on the New York Board of Trade finished Thursday at their lowest level in more than a month on speculative fund sales and long position liquidations. Analysts said gains were limited in the market this week due to weak demand and larger production numbers in last week's supply and demand report. The industry is closely watching crop developments in Texas.

According to the latest crop production estimate released by USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service, for the second time in the last three years Texas will produce a crop in excess of eight million bales. At 8.1 million bales, the November 2007 Crop Production report pegs the Lone Star State's cotton harvest as the second largest on record.

A majority of the Texas production increase is projected to come from the High Plains. There, cotton producers now are expected to harvest 5.3 million bales of the state's 8.1 million bale projection. Gins there now are working at full capacity and above average yields and quality are being reported.

"The best way to describe the 2007 High Plains cotton crop is to paraphrase one of the oldest sayings there is in agriculture 'Big crops get bigger,'" said a West Texas market observer. "So far, the 2007 Texas cotton crop, which has grown in each of the last three USDA Crop Production reports, is doing its best to guarantee that a new generation of agriculture producers and analysts believe in the validity of that saying," he added.

The harvest season is drawing to a close in South Texas. Farmers have been cutting and shredding stalks in preparation for the winter. Ginning also is drawing to a close, with only a few gins in the Upper Coastal Bend still processing cotton.

Elsewhere in the country, lower-than-average yields continue to be reported from drought-stricken fields in Alabama and Georgia, with production ranging from 250 to 500 pounds per acre in most Alabama fields. Producers also have been disappointed with the quality of their crops attributing the shorter than average staple length to a lack of water during the growing season.

Final picking activities have been completed in the Memphis Territory. Many small gins have finished processing for the season, while larger plants still have backlogs of cotton to press. Ginning, therefore, will continue for several more weeks. A vast majority of fields already have been prepared for winter, and an extended period of cold, wet weather would be welcome to help improve water table supplies and to kill overwintering insects.

In other news, net export sales of 146,200 bales in the week ended Nov. 8 were down 41 percent from the previous week and 27 percent from the fourweek average. Major buyers were Mexico, Turkey, China and Pakistan. Sales of 9,700 bales for delivery in 2008-09 were for Mexico and South Korea.

Export shipments of 177,100 bales were two percent more than the prior week, but eight percent below the four-week average. Primary destinations were Turkey, Mexico, China and Indonesia. Sales were lower in the spot

cotton market as online trading by producers in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas totaled 14,117 bales in the week ended Nov.15 compared to 49,080 bales the previous week. Average prices received by producers ranged from 57.41 to 60.41 cents per pound versus 60.13 to 61.31 cents per pound one week earlier.
