loan he can buy his cotton back, or sell his equity in the cotton any time before July 31, 1953. This is the same as it has been in the past, only equity trans-fers will not be mailed to pro-ducers. You will come to the PM A office to get them when you sell your equity. Cotton placed under the loan in 1952, can be bought back in the county at any time before July 31, 1953, because the loan documents will either be at the bank where you obtained the loan or at the local PMA office.

Fees Explained

Some questions have been asked regarding fees allowed Loan Cerks who execute the loan documents for you. If you put one bale in the loan on one loan document the clerk is allowed 25c, if you put more than one bale on one note but less than seven bales, the clerk is allowed to charge 25c for the first bale and 15c for each additional bale to six bales or a total of \$1.00 for the 6 bales. If you put eight bales on the loan document (which is all that will go on one note) the fee is \$1.00 for the first six and 10c for each additional bale or a total of \$1.20 for a note containing 8 bales.

If any farmer in Bailey County is paying more than this amount to get his cotton loan document prepared, please contact the PMA Office as soon as possible that action may be taken to get this overcharging stopped.







Moisture Supply In Next Few Weeks To Influence 1953 Farming

Weather, during the months ing by more than two million just ahead, will have a tremendous effect upon Texas agriculture in 1953. Most of the state must have above normal rainfall before producers can begin to plan for 1953 and next year's production. Scattered rains have been beneficial but general and heavy rains are

According to C. H. Bates, farm management specialist for the Agricultural Extension Service, the demand for products from the farms and ranches of the state will continue high during 1953—especially the first half. Employment is at a record high level and total income of individuals is expected to rise slightly above 1952 levels. Government spending for defense, he adds, is scheduled to be higher during the first six months of next year and the increasing population rate is another favorable factor. The present population of the nation is estimated to be 157 million and is increas-
