City wide cleanup days set

The City of Haskell has announced the dates for the city wide clean up week.

The landfill will be open Sat., April 19 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.; April 21-24 from 8:30 a.m. until 4 p.m.; Fri., April 25, 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.; and Sat., April 26 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Two trailers will be available during the week for use for half day only by residents who do not have their own trailer. Personal trailers and trucks hauling loose trash must be tarped. Bulky items, lumber, tin, etc. must be tied down.

Trailers and loads will be weighed on the scales, but there is no charge for dumping. TCEQ requires that the city records the weight of landfill items.

Chemicals, tires, batteries, anything with Freon, asbestos, roofing materials and paint will not be accepted during clean-up week.

Bulky items will be picked up if they are placed by the dumpster and arrangements are made through City Hall by calling 864-2333.

This service is provided for citizens in the city limits of Haskell only. Those with loads for the landfill may be asked for proof of residence, such as the customer's water bill.

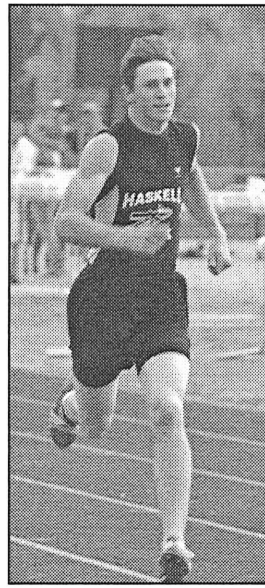

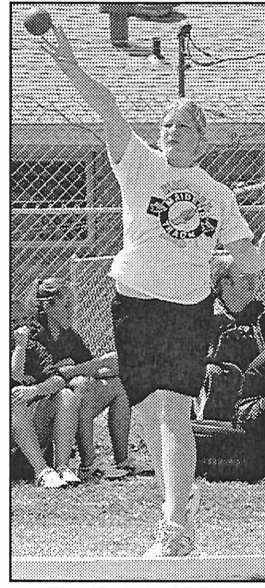

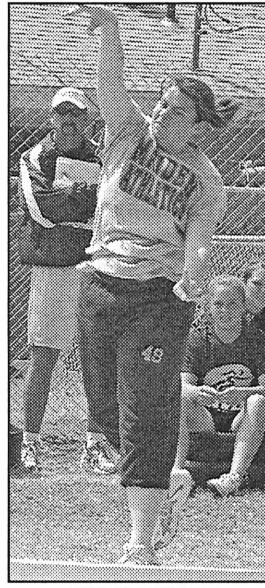

Memory Loss classes set

Last week we began a look at memory loss and possible causes for this loss. Today, we will address action to take if you or a loved one suffers from memory loss.

People who are worried about memory problems should see their health provider. If he or she believes that the problem is serious, then a thorough evaluation may be recommended. A complete medical examination for memory loss may include gathering information about medical history, including use of prescription and over the counter medicines, diet, past medical problems and general health. Because a correct diagnosis depends on recalling these details accurately, the health provider also may ask a family member for information.

Lab tests may help your health provider find any problems. There are also tests of mental abilities: memory, problem solving, counting and language. A brain scan may assist the doctor in ruling out a curable disorder. A scan also may show signs of normal age related changes in the brain. It may be necessary to have

another scan at a later date to see if there have been further changes in the brain.

Many older adults, in fact, people of all ages, wonder how they may try to keep their memory sharp. Some suggestions include developing interests or hobbies and staying involved in activities that stimulate both the mind and body.

Many people find it useful to plan tasks, make 'things to do' lists and use notes, calendars and other memory aids. They also may remember things better by mentally connecting them to other meaningful things, such as a familiar name or song.

Exercise is important to keep your body healthy but it is also important for your mind. The brain needs exercises and challenges so that it can remain active and keep up with your daily life. Try to challenge your brain daily to keep it active and alert. Also, remember that a healthy diet is very important to the body's function and especially to the mind. Although no special diets or nutritional supplements have been shown to specifically address memory problems, a balanced diet helps maintain overall good health.

Some physical and mental

changes occur with age in healthy people.

However, much pain and suffering can be avoided if older adults, their families and their health providers recognize that memory loss is not part of normal aging.

Texas AgriLife Extension Service will be offering 'Master of Memory,' a two part lesson series that will help you understand how your memory works and what may affect your memory. The two part series will be held Tues., April 22 and Tues., April 29. The weekly class will run from 9:30 a.m. to noon. To accommodate those who cannot attend the morning sessions, they will be repeated in the evenings from 5:30 to 8:00 p.m. All sessions will be held at the Haskell Memorial Hospital Education building.

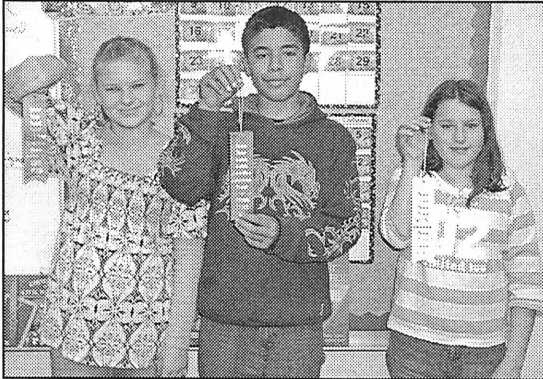

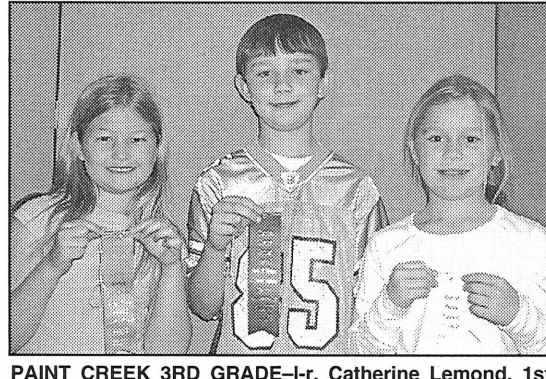
DISTRICT WINNER—Dustin Wyrick, a fifth grade student at Paint Creek, was the second place district poster contest winner.



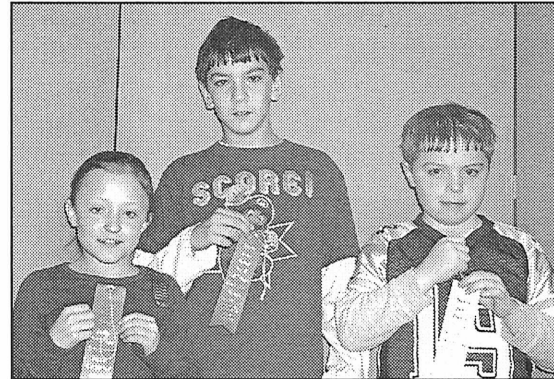

Livestock risk management workshop to be held April 14

Texas cattle and forage producers have faced many frustrating conditions over the past ten years. Drought, bovine spongiform encephalopathy (BSE) incidents, volatile markets, and rising input costs such as fuel and fertilizer have combined to increase risk levels in the cattle industry. Now, with the cost of corn and feedstuffs, producers are yet again faced with unparalleled input costs. Although cattle prices have stayed relatively high, never has the importance for risk management been higher in the cattle industry.

To assist cattlemen with their risk management skills, the Texas AgriLife Extension Service is partnering with the Risk Management Agency of the USDA and the National Cattlemen's Beef Association to offer a one-day Livestock Risk Management Workshop. The objective of this workshop is to provide cattlemen an overview of the current market situation and risk management tools approved by the Risk Management Agency and that

are available through local crop insurance agents as well as other risk management programs of Texas AgriLife Extension Service. The speakers for this workshop include specialists from both agencies and will cover the current market situation and outlook, the use of the Livestock Risk Protection for Feeder Cattle as a tool for cow-calf operators, and an update on the Pasture, Rangeland, and Forage Insurance.

Anyone involved in the cattle industry would benefit by attending this workshop.

The workshop is scheduled April 14 from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the Texas AgriLife Research and Extension Center located 6 miles southwest of Vernon on Highway 70.

10 tips to lower risk for foot problems

1. Wash your feet daily in lukewarm water but don't soak them. Always test bath water temperature with your hand before you put your foot in. Gently dry your feet, particularly between the toes.
2. Inspect your feet daily, including the soles, heels and between the toes. You may need to use a mirror to see the bottom of your feet. Report any skin breaks, blister, cuts, or fissures to your nurse or doctor immediately.
3. Notify your nurse or doctor if you see any changes in the color, temperature or shape of your feet.
4. Look for corns, calluses and ingrown toenails. Don't treat these problems with over-the-counter remedies. See your nurse or doctor.
5. The best time to cut your toenails is after washing your feet when your nails are soft. Cut them straight across and smooth them with an emery board. If your toenails are thick and hard or if you don't see well, have your toenails cut by your foot doctor or someone who knows the proper procedure.
6. Apply lotion to your feet, but avoid putting lotion, cream or oil between the toes.
7. Never walk barefoot—always wear shoes or slippers.
8. Always wear socks or stockings with your shoes: cotton or wool are best.
9. Check the inside of your shoes for foreign objects, worn linings or rough spots.
10. Your shoes should fit well and feel good when you wear them.

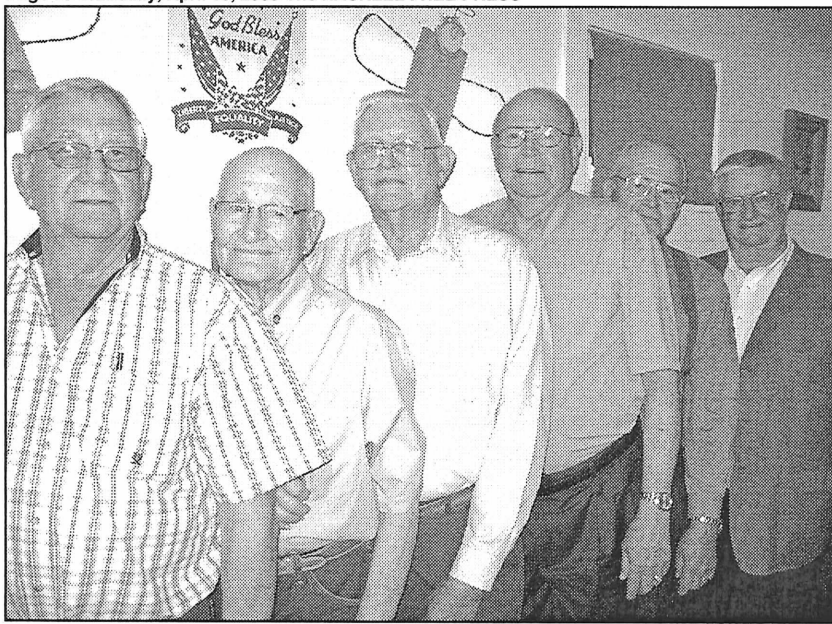

Haskell Pre-K, Head Start to register

Haskell Elementary School will have registration for Prekindergarten and Head Start classes for the 2008-09 school year Fri., April 18 from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. in the Haskell Elementary library.

To be eligible for enrollment in Prekindergarten, a child must be 3 or 4 years of age on Sept. 1, 2008 and must be unable to speak and comprehend the English language; or qualify for free or reduced lunches; or be homeless; or be the child of an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States; or the child of a member of the armed forces of the United States who was injured or killed while serving on active duty; or has ever been in foster care. If you are interested in this program for your child, please be sure to register Fri., April 18.

To qualify for Head Start, a child must be 3 or 4 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2008 and meet income guidelines.

PPCD (Preschool Program for Children with Disabilities) is for children ages 3-5 that may be developmentally delayed in areas such as learning, speech and/or emotional skills. If your child turns 3 during the 2008-09 school year, call the elementary office at 864-2654 at that time to schedule an appointment to have your child screened.

Parents should bring their driver license and income verification (for Head Start) and their child's birth certificate, immunization record and social security card to registration. It is not necessary for your child to attend registration.

It is possible for some children to qualify for more than one of these programs. Call Peggy Adams at 864-2654 if you have any questions.

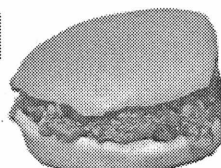

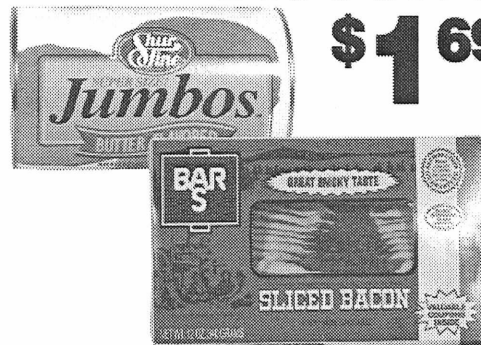
