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





CHECK YOUR DEPOSIT INSURANCE

The sign at your bank or savings and loan states that your accounts are insured up to \$100,000. Knowing the rules of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) can help you extend your protection beyond this amount.

Generally, the FDIC insures only \$100,000 per person per institution. Thus, if you have more than one account in a single bank, only \$100,000 of the aggregate of your accounts is protected. Amounts over that are uninsured.

To increase your protection, you can simply spread your accounts over a number of different banks. Remember, however, that accounts in different branches of the same bank will be aggregated. Only \$100,000 will be insured if, for example, you have \$40,000 in Branch A and \$90,000 in Branch B.

Because joint accounts are insured apart from separate accounts, you can increase your protection by placing some funds into a joint account. If you and your spouse have a joint account and each of you has a separate account, the three accounts can be insured to a total of \$300,000. As with personal accounts, however, all joint accounts held by the same persons will be aggregated.

Different types of accounts are also aggregated. For example, if you have an \$80,000 certificate of deposit, a \$10,000 checking account, and a \$30,000 savings account all at the same bank, \$20,000 of the total will not be insured. Individual retirement accounts (IRAs), however, are separately insured to \$250,000 as are some trusts.

Finally, the FDIC's protection includes both principal and interest. Once the account grows to \$100,000, any additional interest earned will not be insured.

Review your accounts with your banker to be sure you have the protection you need.







Governor says taxpayers should not bail out Wall Street

AUSTIN-The U.S. House of Representatives passed H.R. 1424, the "Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008" on

It was the House's second attempt in five days to prop up faltering Wall Street financial institutions. President George W. Bush quickly signed the \$700 billion legislation referred to by some as a "bail-out" and to others as a "rescue" plan.

The House vote was 263-171. The Texas delegation cast 17 votes against the bill and 15 for.

On Oct. 1, the U.S. Senate passed the legislation on a vote of 74-25. Sens. Kay Bailey Hutchison and John Cornyn both voted in favor.

On Oct. 1, with Congress edging closer to passing the legislation, Gov. Rick Perry said he did not want taxpayer dollars to bail out Wall Street.

"In a free market economy, government should not be in the business of using taxpayer dollars to bail out corporate America.

"Congress needs to take off its partisan gloves and work together to bring both short and long term stability to the credit markets. They need to stop blaming each other and start thinking about solutions that put the taxpayers of this country first," he said in a prepared statement.

Perry joined with Democratic Gov. Joe Manchin of West Virginia in urging Congress to take action. Manchin is chair of the Democratic Governors Association and Perry is chair of the Republican Governors Association.

Fire safety needed inside and out

Every day somewhere in our state or nation, fires claim lives, destroy homes and reduce valuable natural resources to smoldering ashes.

This year's National Fire Prevention Week (Oct. 5-11) marks another coordinated effort by metropolitan, volunteer and wildland firefighters to focus our attention on the importance of fire prevention in the home, on the job and outdoors.

Though the theme for the national observance is "It's Fire Prevention Week, Prevent Home Fires," wildfire prevention also plays a very key role here in Texas in preventing the loss of homes and other improved property, as well as natural resources, said Bruce Woods, head of the mitigation and prevention department of the Texas Forest

"One only has to look at the first half of this year to see the interrelationship of structural and wildland firefighting. Firefighting resources from around the nation were mobilized to Texas to help reduce home and natural resource losses," Woods said. "Practicing fire safety indoors and out can prevent most structural and wildland fires from occurring and sparing individuals and communities from damage and

Assistant Fire Chief Duane Freeman with the Lufkin Fire Department also expressed the need for fire safety in the home and out.

"While too many home fires still occur due to carelessness, the good news is that many are easily preventable," Freeman said. He enumerated several precautions that can reduce the likelihood of home fire damage or losses.

 Avoid overloading extension cords or electrical outlets. Replace damaged electrical cords and use extension cords for temporary wiring only.

·Never leave food cooking on the stove unattended.

•Store flammable liquids in outbuildings away from gas water heaters and other ignition

smoke detectors installed, replace batteries with each time change and regularly check to make sure that detectors are working. •Keep flammable materials

·Make sure that you have

away from ignition sources, such as space heaters or candles.

Implementing fire safety precautions outdoors is just as important, said Woods. Helpful fire prevention tips he suggested for the outdoors include:

brush piles to be burned to help keep possible flying embers from reaching flammable vegetation. •Dispose of smoking materials

•Establish wide control lines

around burn receptacles and

in vehicle ash trays to help prevent roadside wildfires Crushing smokes and matches

in bare soil to help prevent fires caused by outdoor users. ·Avoid driving or parking in

tall, dry grass. ·Build campfires in open, level spots away from trees and overhanging branches. Keep fires small and extinguish them cold to

the touch before leaving. Both Woods and Freeman agree that it will take a concerted effort by everyone-young and old-to avoid senseless destruction of lives, homes and the natural resources upon which many people and animals depend for their food and shelter.

"Please help your local firefighters protect your lives and property," Freeman said. "Practice good fire prevention both indoors and out. It's far less expensive to prevent fires than it is to replace property damaged or destroyed by fire, and some things just can't be replaced."

program at Western Texas College (WTC) was announced recently with the help of many partnering organizations.

WTC President Mike Dreith announced the start of a lineman training program for the fall of 2009. The program will be based at the Snyder Industrial Park and be supported in part by Big Country Electric Cooperative (BCEC) and the Development Corporation of Snyder (DCOS).


"Electrical linemen are in short supply around the country," said Dreith.

BCEC confirms that national coop stats show a shortage of as many as 10,000 linemen by the year 2010. Texas has even more opportunities because of the construction of huge power line transmission systems from West Texas wind farms to the state's metropolitan areas. Texas is in the midst of a \$5-billion dollar construction project to construct and San Antonio.

The nine-month, two semester academic program will be submitted to the Texas Coordinating Board for approval this fall, according to Dreith. As with most occupational programs, there will be substantial start-up costs. DCOS has agreed, as their part of the partnership, to underwrite the cost of training and land for the site.

'We are grateful to DCOS for their help in starting this program," said Dreith. "We feel certain that this program will not only be an asset to BCEC, but also to the entire community. The training site will be used for the education of prospective linemen and continuing education of veterans."

Fredda Buckner, General Manager of Big County Electric Cooperative, Inc. said, "We are excited to partner with WTC and DCOS to provide this training program. Linemen have a specialized professional craft that is passed on to their apprentices. They are committed to providing quality electric service today and for the future."



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



- •Keep trees and brush away from power lines.

- •Install spark arrester on chimney.
- Keep roof and gutters clean.
- •In rural areas, know where existing water sources can be found, such as ponds, that can be used as a source of water for fire trucks.
- •Stack firewood away from home.



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


