





Suggestions for healthier holiday foods

fun, family and lots of food. Texas AgriLife Extension Service experts have some suggestions on how to alter recipes and make food choices for healthier holiday eating.

The sugar, fat or salt content can be reduced without a said Dr. Mary Bielamowicz, AgriLife Extension nutrition specialist in College Station.

"If a recipe calls for a cup of sugar, use two-thirds of a cup," she said. "If it calls for a half-cup of oil, shortening or other fat, use one-third cup. And if a recipe says to use one-half teaspoon of salt, use one-quarter teaspoon or omit the salt entirely.'

calling for all-purpose flour, method is baking, she said. Bielamowicz said.

"In most instances, you can replace one-quarter to one-half you see in holiday recipes with whole-wheat flour," she said. "Or you can substitute oat bran or oatmeal for one-fourth of the all-purpose flour used."

Modifying more warned. So try out the new recipe before serving it to friends and family.

"Most changes in flavor or texture are typically not too significant and are well worth the tradeoff of a much healthier dish with less fat and fewer calories," she said.

"Holiday meals don't have to be high in fat or calories to be tasty," said Dr. Connie Sheppard, AgriLife Extension

The holidays are a time for agent for family and consumer sciences in Bexar County. "But low in fat doesn't always mean low in calories, so you have to consider both."

Reduced or non-fat cheese, milk, cream cheese, cottage cheese, yogurt or mayonnaise of almost any holiday recipe can be substituted for higherfat counterparts, she said. And noticeable difference in taste, evaporated milk can be used as a substitute for cream.

Sheppard also suggested steaming or roasting vegetables and using low-fat margarine or sprays on them instead of butter.

"You can also substitute mashed potato recipes to reduce both fat and calorie content," she said.

AgriLife Extension offices, which are in almost every county in the state, typically have information on ways to prepare more healthful foods, including foods for people with diabetes or other health problems. Many Extension offices can set up food demonstrations for small groups at community centers. churches, schools or other public venues.



Governor to create hurricane recovery panel

AUSTIN-In the space of three months last summer, the

Texas coast suffered punishing blows from three hurricanes: Dolly, Gustav and Ike. Because of the resulting

breadth and depth of disaster in coastal counties, Gov. Rick Perry on Nov. 20 announced the creation of the Governor's Recovery and Renewal.

experts who will create a plan to assist communities in recovery.

Perry also directed the Texas Department of Transportation removal in Southeast Texas.

"Two months after Ike's landfall, Texans are still outside of padlocked trailers," Gov. Perry said. "Mounds of debris are piled up in coastal communities, creating health hazards while Washington remains mum about whether it will provide the same level of resources it did for Louisiana after Hurricane Katrina.

"These situations clearly demonstrate that the federal government's recovery system is broken. I am confident this new commission will find solutions to these challenges as well as create a plan to speed recovery and accelerate

economic development." Job one is to address residents whose homes were destroyed by the hurricanes.

Bangs test still required

Selling or buying cattle? cattle brucellosis, or "Bang's" test is still required for changing ownership of adult cattle in Texas, says Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas' state veterinarian. For many years, Texas ranchers and livestock health officials worked to eradicate cattle brucellosis. a bacterial disease that can cause cows to abort, deliver weak calves, or produce less

"We have enjoyed Class 'Free' status for cattle brucellosis since February 2008, but testing is still required at livestock markets, special sales and private treaty sales, for at least two years," said Dr. Hillman. "This testing requirement is part of the national brucellosis program standard, and it assures that a state is clearly free of the disease and that we can quickly identify and deal with reintroduced or yet undetected infection." Slaughter testing surveillance will continue across the country for an School and sophomore at indefinite period, to ensure Austin College in Sherman, that the disease is completely eradicated from cattle herds in

Dr. Hillman noted that cattle which are sexually intact and 18 months of age or older must be tested prior to sale. The test requires a small blood sample from the animal, collected by an accredited veterinarian, or TAHC or USDA personnel. A chute-side test is conducted at livestock markets on sale days, with State-Federal laboratory.

For private treaty or special sales, an accredited, private veterinary practitioner can a residence in Haskell County. submit the blood sample to the State-Federal laboratory, shipping the blood sample to the laboratory, testing of recorded on the document that will accompany the animal to the sale.


