Governor warns new clean air rules would 'cripple' Texas

AUSTIN-Gov. Rick Perry on Nov. 24 urged the U.S. **Environmental Protection** Agency not to pass a proposed framework that would toughen regulations on greenhouse gas emissions.

Examples of greenhouse gases are carbon dioxide, ozone and methane.

Perry said the EPA is planning to reinterpret the federal Clean Air Act in ways that would "cripple the Texas economy.'

Concerned that the EPA will take action before President George W. Bush's term of office ends in January, Perry and a group of other governors scheduled a Dec. 2 meeting with president-elect Barack Obama to discuss regulatory concerns.

Perry on Nov. 24 proposed:

•Making alternative energy technologies less expensive to encourage commercial use.

•Removing barriers to innovation and competition.

·Modernizing the national energy grid to support wind and solar energy transmission.

 Facilitating investments in the development of carbon appointed members, Sens. capture and sequestration technologies.

·Removing barriers generation that would reduce carbon emissions.

• Encouraging competitiveness, innovation and growth in alternative energy sources.

Filing of early bills continues

Jan. 13 is the start date for the 81st session of the Texas Legislature and March 13 is the deadline for the filing of major bills, so there is plenty of time for every Texan's state rep and senator to attempt to make new laws or repeal or amend existing ones.

As of Nov. 30, Texas lawmakers had filed more than the coming session. Here are a couple of bills that were filed Thanksgiving week.

SB 321 by Elliot Shapleigh, D-El Paso, would require the filing and posting on school board candidates' expenditures.

The Texas Constitution requires the Legislature to pass a state budget that does not exceed the projected growth of the state economy.

In mid-November, the 10-member Legislative Budget Board unanimously adopted a rate of 9.14 percent for fiscal 2010-11.

The rate reflects the estimated growth rate in the state economy from the 2008-2009 biennium to the 2010-2011 biennium as projected by the Texas Comptroller.

The LBB is required to meet and set the constitutional spending limit prior to every legislative session. It is cochaired by Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Tom Craddick, and includes certain automatic appointed

winter heating bills

Cutting home heating costs this winter will involve more than just turning down the thermostat

According to the Energy Information Administration, an arm of the U.S. Department of Energy, heating costs are expected to increase this winter between 10 to 30 percent.

Consumers can cut back by making sure that heat is not escaping through walls, the roof, windows or other areas of the house.

A few suggestions to make sure the heat stays in the house to significantly reduce energy costs include:

·Roof replacement: If it's time to replace a roof, homeowners may want to consider using fiberglass instead of the more traditional asphalt or tile. It can prevent up to 40 percent of heat loss and has a life of 50 years compared to 20 or 25 for asphalt.

•Attic insulation: If a roof replacement isn't due or is too pricey, attic insulation may be an economical alternative. It is estimated that most homes are under insulated and properly insulation and sealing a home can save up to 10 percent on heating and cooling bills.

·Insulated exterior walls: An application of foam insulation to the exterior walls works best on older frame houses. Holes are drilled in the walls, the foam insulation is sprayed in and then holes are sealed.

·Weather stripping: The **Environmental Protection** Agency says that the average home has leaks equivalent to leaving a window open all year. To help prevent heated or cooled air from escaping, home owners should caulk, spray foam or weather strip around doors, windows, and areas where telephone wires come into the home.

·Seal duct joints: Heated air from forced air heating systems can escape through leaky joints in ductwork throughout a house. Home owners can seal exposed duct work in the basement and attic using a mastic duct sealer on duct work joints and seams. It works better than duct tape and is available at hardware and home improvement stores

•Thermostat: Lowering the thermostat a few degrees when going to bed or when nobody is home can still shave dollars off a heating bill. Even lowering it a few degrees before guests arrive can help as a house full of people generates a lot of body heat. For every degree above 68 degrees, a heating unit energy. Even better, install a programmable thermostat that lowers the heat when it isn't needed.

ARE YOUR BENEFICIARY DESIGNATIONS **UP TO DATE?**

Who have you designated as beneficiaries for your insurance olicies and retirement accounts? If you can't remember, you're not alone. But it's worth checking. If you make the wrong decision, it could affect who inherits those assets. In some cases, it could also change the taxes your beneficiaries will pay and the value they'll receive. What are they?

When you designate a beneficiary for an account, you are aming the person you want to inherit that account.

Your designation determines who will inherit the assets in the account, regardless of what your will might say. Generally, the assets will bypass probate and go straight to the person or institution you named. You can designate a person or group of persons, a charity, a



Bill Alcorn has been named superintendent of the school district.

The school board contracted with Region XIV Educational Service Center to conduct the search for a new superintendent after Buck Gilcrease resigned

The process began in late September, as representatives from the Service Center held meetings on each campus, as well as a community-wide meeting. Feedback from these meetings was used to prepare a profile to be given to the board, indicating what the district desired in a superintendent.

A job notice was drawn up and applications were taken from across the state until the end of October. At this point the list was narrowed to seven applicants to be interviewed by the school board. Interviews were held Nov. 11-13 at which time Alcorn was named lone finalist.

By law, a waiting period of twenty-one days is required after naming a finalist, before they can officially be hired. This gives both parties a "rethinking" period and a chance to change their minds if desired. The board is expected to offer Alcorn a contract at their Dec. 11 meeting.

Alcorn now lives at Holly Lake Ranch in East Texas. He and his wife have five grown children. He has thirty years experience in education, with the last twelve as a superintendent.

Alcorn is fifty-three years old and graduated from Graford High School. He earned his Bachelor's Degree in 1978, his Master's Degree in Education Administration in 1985, his Mid-Management Certification in 1989 and his Superintendent's Certification in 1999, all from Tarleton State University.


