Democratic primary ballots delayed—

School board election Saturday at courthouse

Polls will open at 8:00 a.m. Saturday for selection of three members to the Crockett County School Board of Trustees. Voters will cast ballots in the law library on the first floor of the courthouse, rather than in the district courtroom on the second floor as first announced. Polls will close at 7 p.m.

There are eight candidates for the three places. R.J. Everett, Jr. is the only board member to file for re-election. Other candidates are Joe Couch, Henry Sellers, Dick Webster, Fred Buie, Cecil Buckner, Suzie Everett and George Ybarra.

Sonny Henderson and Gene Perry are members who declined to file for re-election. Henderson served many terms on the board and Perry served one term.

Absentee voting closed Tuesday in the clerk's office where approximately 65 persons had voted absentee as of 1:00 p.m. Poll watchers say this denotes a great deal of interest in the election or many people plan to leave town Easter weekend.

Steve Kenley is election judge, assisted by David Weant. Clerks will be Isabel Maldonado, Juanita Gutierrez, Mildred Fields, Lib Applewhite, Doris Hood and Jan Kenley.

Absentee voting in the May 5, Democratic Primary was scheduled to begin April 14. However, a lawsuit over the Democratic nominee for U.S. Representative from this district has held up the printing of the ballots in the 21st District. Marilyn Jones was successful in having Joe Sullivan's name removed from the ballot. A judge found for Ms. Jones in litigation claiming Sullivan's petition did not give the petitioner's hometowns. Sullivan can appeal, but no word has been received on that issue.

Providing the ballots can be printed in time, absentee in the primary will start April 14. No word has been received on a Republican Primary.

In state and local races John Poerner is asking for his first elected term as Railroad Commissioner. He

is opposed by Buddy Temple. For an unexpired term, Jim Hightower and James Nugent are opposing each other as Railroad Commissioner.

For Associate Justice, Supreme Court of Texas, Jim Wallace is opposed by five candidates. The Court of Criminal Appeals race has drawn eight candidates.

For the Democratic nominee for U.S. Representative from the 21st District, as of now, the only name to appear on the ballot is Marilyn Jones. If Sullivan should win his appeal, he would also be on the ballot against Mrs. Jones. At any rate, the winner of this contest will face Republican incumbent Tom Loeffler in November and chances of Loeffler's defeat are highly unlikely.

William E. Ward is running unopposed for the Democratic nominee for Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

The refreshing showers of last week were most welcome and now we hope for more in April to start vegetation on its way to beautify our country.

A busy month both indoors and out will make your garden a success.

April brings no let up in garden work for usually there is more to be done now than in any previous month.

Doubtless there will be very few bluebonnets and other native flowers along West Texas highways this spring, but they are beautiful in some of our yards.

Consider planting some of the new hybrid Morning Glories to cover your fences and trellises, to climb over walls or from hanging baskets. They are the most colorful and easily grown of all the annual vines. They prosper in garden loam of moderate fertility and produce flowers most abundantly in soil that is not too high in nitrogen. They will tolerate hot, dry areas. If all the sunny spots in your garden are taken by other plants, plant some Morning Glory seeds in a pot for your patio. If you soak them in warm water for 2 hours or nick the coating, they will show leaves in a few days after planting. Leave only the most vigorous plant and train it with string or wire around a support plunged to the bottom of the pot. Early Call Rose, thrives in the hottest driest spot in the garden. The huge deep rose trumpets bloom profusely all summer. Pearly Gates is the best white and Heavenly Blue is still very popular.

All dead and diseased leaves on iris should be removed if you haven't already done so. The soil should be stirred lightly to help retain water, but don't disturb the roots. An insect spray now will help prevent damage to blooms later.

Don't be alarmed if evergreens such as abelia, live oaks, photinia and others are shedding their leaves. The mature leaves are being replaced with new ones. Watch for aphids.

Gift pots of Easter lilies keep longer if they are placed in a cool room at night. Keep plants moist, but not wet. After the flowers fade, cut back the plant 3 or 4 inches and transplant outdoors. They will continue growing outside, but the annual flowering date will be later than the forced plants.

Members please take note of the April Garden meeting on the 14th rather than the 7th as printed in the yearbook. This is a workshop in preparation for the flower show April 22.

Want top-quality eggs? Buy those that have been refrigerated, and keep them refrigerated.

Store them in covered cartons-even though the refrigerator has special compartments for them. Covered cartons keep them from picking up refrigerator odors.

Store them broad-end-up to prevent movement of the air cell toward the egg yolk and faster deterioration.

Don't wash them before storage, since washing will remove the protective organic matter that seals the shell pores.

Commercially, eggs are washed, but then they're dipped in oil so they'll be more aesthetically acceptable to the consumer.

Store leftover raw yolks or white in the refrigerator-covered. But be sure it's no longer than two to four days.

In storing yolks, cover them with oil or water, and use them within a day or two. You can freeze egg whites and use them later without much loss in volume, if you plan to whip them-but they'll be slightly less stable due to some breakdown of the thick white.

Also, freezing the whites won't drastically affect the product you plan to use them in even if the product depends on beaten egg whites for its structure.

Make Easter breakfast a "spectacular start" for a very special day.

Add your own creativity to a sound nutritional basic plan, and make breakfast memories they'll remember a long time.

Breakfast should provide about one-fourth of the day's caloric and protein needs-that's easy when you rely on the basic four food groups.

Include something from the meat group, milk group, breads-cereals group and the fruits-vegetables group.

Start breakfast with a bowl of fresh fruits-top that with a scoop of sherbet, frozen ice milk or frozen yogurt.

Put a rabbit face on that with raisins, add toothpick ears, and you've got instant delight-for young and old alike.

Or, your family might like a broiled grapefruit half flavored with cranberry or orange juice.

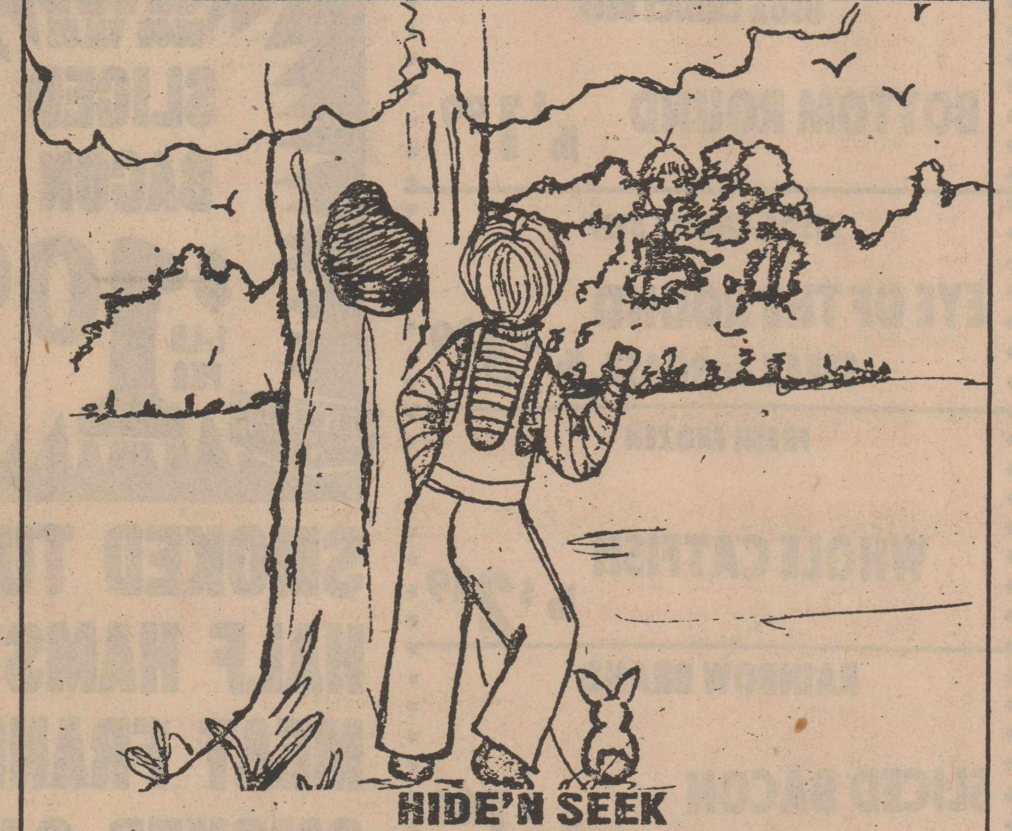
League meets for program
