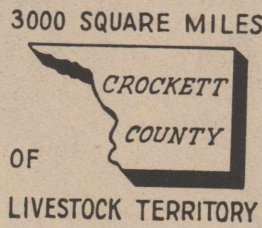

G. Aikman services in San Angelo

Funeral services for Gordon G. Aikman, 72, were held at 2:00 p.m. Friday in College Hills Baptist Church in San Angelo with burial in Fairmount Cemetery.

Mr. Aikman died at 10:15 a.m. Tuesday in Angelo Community Hospital.

He was born June 7, 1907 in Jenks, Okla. and married Joanne Darrow June 7, 1934 in Oklahoma City. She died May 16, 1979.

The Aikmans moved to Ozona in 1944 and owned and operated Ozona Drug for 25 years. They moved to San Angelo after retiring 13 years ago.

Survivors include two brothers, Claude E. Aikman of San Angelo, A.H. Aikman of Tecumseh, Okla.; two sisters, Mrs. James K. Tackitt of Wewoka, Okla. and Mrs. F.R. Barnett of San Angelo.

Health Fair tomorrow

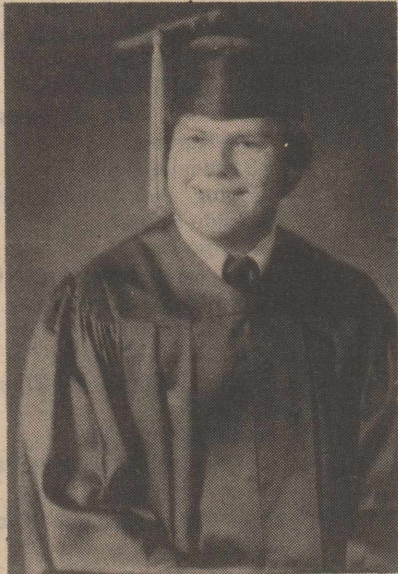
The annual Health Fair will get underway tomorrow at the Civic Center at 10:00 a.m. and continue through 6:00 p.m.

Sponsored by the Crockett County Family Living Committee and the Texas Department of Health, persons who are blood relatives of diabetics, parents of large babies or are overweight are urged to take the screening test.

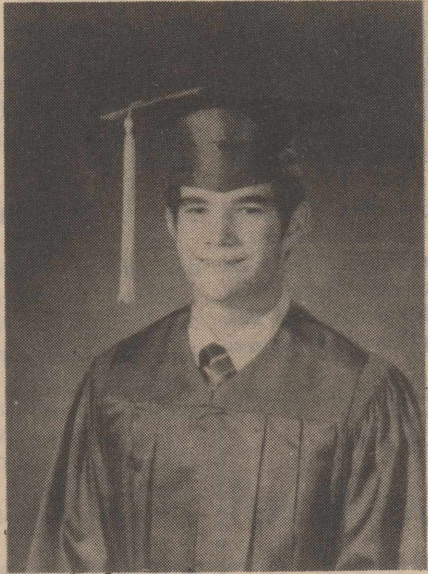
Adults between the ages of 30 and 45 are encouraged to be screened for high blood pressure. If further follow-up screening is needed, the individual will be referred to his or her private physician.

Lectures on health are scheduled throughout the day and the public is invited.

Run-off slated June 7—

Primary voters number over 1,000 here Sat.

A total of 1036 voters cast ballots in the Democratic and Republican primaries here Saturday. Of that number 233 voted absentee. For the first time in 20 years voters were able to vote in a Republican Primary here. A total of 27 votes were cast in the Republican Primary which was held at the Joe Couch home on Circle Drive. The remainder of the votes went to the Democrats with a full slate of candidates.

Drawing the most interest locally were the only contested races, the race for District Attorney, 112th District; and the Precinct 1, race for Crockett County Commissioner. Bill Mason led the ticket in the District Attorney's race in Crockett County with 596 votes, followed by J. Franklin Urias with 241, and Jack Schulze with 125. Mason also led throughout the district, but failed to get a clear majority and will be in the June 7, run-off election with Jack Schulze of Big Lake. District-wide Mason polled 3,072; Schulze 1988, and Urias, 1777.

In the race for Commissioner, Prec. 1, incumbent Sostenes DeHoyos led the ticket with 244 votes. He will face Frank (Pancho) McMul-

lan in the June 7 run-off, who polled 208 votes for the second spot. Other opponents were Felipe F. Castro

who got 59 votes and Joe E. Everett with 4 votes. All other local Democratic candidates were unopposed.

Weekend rains dent drought

If the drought was not broken here over the weekend, it was badly bent, and Monday morning a total of 1.70 inches of rainfall had been recorded in the official gauge at the water district office for the month of May.

April showers failed to materialize and a disappointing .02 of an inch was the total rainfall for that month. Shortly after midnight Thursday, May 1, a slow but steady rain amounted to .08 of an inch. Showers came again Friday night and another .30 of an inch was recorded. Rain showers all day Saturday amounted to 1.28 of an inch and another .04 of an inch was added early Sunday morning.

A heavy downpour about noon Saturday sent draws running and flooded streets in the area of the Village Shopping Center, but for the most part the rainfall was a

slow, gentle rain. Apparently this part of West Texas benefitted from the general weekend rains. Most ranch gauges reported from 1.50 inches to 2.50 inches, in all parts of the county.

After the long, dry spell and late spring freeze, vegetation was in critical shape. However, Monday, under sunny skies, it looked like the entire town had been painted with the green of the artist's brush.

The rainfall picture for Crockett County had been dismal after a total of 1 inch was recorded in January. The rainfall for February amounted to .59 of an inch and the March total was down from that with .45 of an inch recorded. April was the driest in years, and drought had become a fact and not just conversation before last weekend's bountiful rainfall.

For district and county clerk, David H. Weant got 703 votes. Tommy Stokes was returned as tax assessor-collector with 750 votes. Billy Mills polled 811 votes to be returned as sheriff. Tom Cameron got 712 votes for county attorney, and Gene Williams got 657 for constable. Jack Williams, running unopposed for County Commissioner, Precinct 3, received 189 votes. All these candidates will be returned to office Jan. 1, 1981, since they have no opposition in the general election in November.

Susan McBee, in her bid for re-election as State Representative, District 70, handily won over her opponent, Mike V. Gonzales. She, also, will have no opponent in November.

On the Democratic ballot in the presidential preference balloting, Jimmy Carter polled the most votes with a total of 304. The uncommitted box beat Edward Kennedy, 263 to 233. Jerry Brown polled 30 votes.

In the Republican presidential primary Ronald Reagan carried the vote with 21, followed by George Bush with 5 and there was 1 uncommitted vote.

Joe Sullivan polled 473 votes to 334 for Marilyn Jones for U.S. Representative, 21st District. Sullivan also won in the rest of the district and will face incumbent Republican Tom Loeffler, who had no opposition in the primary, in the general election in November. Loeffler got 23 votes in the Republican Primary here.

John Poerner got 571 votes for Democratic nominee for Railroad Commissioner, to 189 for his opponent Buddy Temple. However, he lost statewide and Temple will face Republican Henry Glover in the November election. Glover won out over two opponents. James E. Nugent won over Jim Hightower for the unexpired term of Railroad Commissioner, and will face H.J. (Doc) Blanchard, Republican, in November.

Local voters went along with voters statewide in the elections for the various justices and judges.

Joe Couch was elected Republican County chairman with no opposition. Steve Kenley, was the write-in choice for the Democrats. He received 165 votes to 32 for Carmen Flores.

The last day to register to be eligible to vote in the June 7, Democratic run-off is May 8, before 5 p.m. in the tax office. Absentee voting starts May 28.

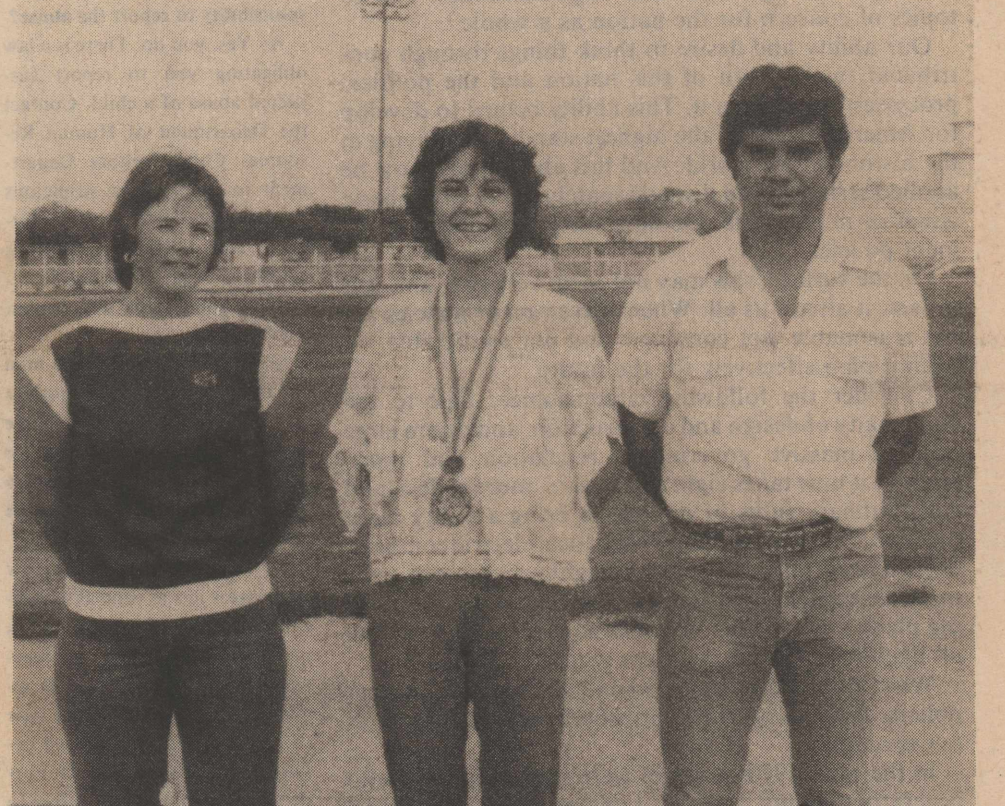

However, with larger classes the last few years and standing room only for spectators, the school board decided to hold the annual event in Lion Stadium. The audience will sit in the west stands and exercises will be set up on the field below. The exercises will begin at 8:00 p.m.

Baccalaureate will be held in the high school auditorium May 18, at 8:00 p.m. The program will be announced next week.

Sheriff warns of itinerant crime

Sheriff Billy Mills warned Ozonans to take precautions with their valuables this week. Almost all criminals apprehended here are just passing through and come from all over the nation, according to Sheriff Mills. Many will steal almost anything. The sheriff's binoculars were stolen from his official car parked near the jail recently.

The Dale Bebee home was burglarized of over \$7,000 worth of jewelry Monday in broad open daylight. The home at 301 Eleventh St. was unlocked at the time and the theft occurred between 8:30 and 4:30. There was never over thirty minutes when a family member was not in the house during that time.

Officers are also investigating another gas field theft eight miles south of McCamey which occurred over the weekend, along with a break-in at Carlisle Motors sometime Saturday night where a .357 rifle was stolen. Vandals also struck at the I-10 Gulf station and wrecked a rest room during the weekend activities.

A woman tourist at the Circle Bar claimed she was robbed by three black males shortly after midnight Tuesday. She said a billfold with \$1,000 was taken from her. Police apprehended three men, but the woman was unable to make positive identification. However, officers

recovered the billfold and the money.

The spring migrating season seems to be underway and I-10 seems to be a favorite route. Sheriff Mills cautioned residents to lock doors and take keys out of parked cars. This could cut the itinerant crime rate in half. He also suggested any suspicious characters be reported to the Sheriff's Department.

Census 80 nearing end here

According to Janet Faulkner, head of the Census '80 office in Pecos, census takers should be finished picking up forms which were mailed March 28, within a week in this area.

Several extra census takers have been hired and trained since the first of the year for Crockett County, and most forms have already been picked up.

The Pecos office will be open until the middle of July. The last part of May the census will be evaluated in this district and a final follow-up conducted.

Predictable Federal Policies

Americans have always prided themselves on their ability to think things through. As a people, we tackle problems and challenges with enthusiasm. This pioneering spirit ranges from day-to-day aspects of each of our lives, through local and regional issues, and to topics of concern for the nation as a whole.

Our ability and desire to think things through contributed to the birth of this nation and the political processes that govern it. This ability helped to develop for Americans one of the highest standards of living in the history of the world. And this ability must now be applied seriously and dispassionately to one of the basic issues of modern life: the need for predictable government policies.

On the surface, this may not seem very relevant. But in fact, it affects us all. When government policies are not reasonable, not consistent and not predictable, we cannot plan effectively for the future.

Consider the following circumstance: Due to the complexity of design and construction, and due in large part to massive government regulation and interference, it now takes eight to 12 years, more or less, and extraordinary sums of money, to bring a utility plant "on line." In other words, if your local electric company determined today that your neighborhood will need more electricity, and if it decided to build a new generating plant to serve you, it would be a decade or more in all likelihood before the plant would be operational.

What happens to such planning when government policies flicker with the political breeze? Let's stay with our example.

In the early 1970s, utilities were encouraged to build generating plants that used oil as their major fuel because the government believed that oil was more environmentally acceptable. And so, behaving in what was at the time perceived to be the national interest, utility executives set out to build generating stations that burned oil.

What happened? Look around in the world of the early 1980s and you'll see that utility company executives are being urged to build plants that use coal as their major fuel source. Moreover, they're being urged to convert oil-burning plants to coal as well. The cost: billions of dollars. Ultimately these dollars will be paid by the consumer in the form of higher utility rates.

It is as if an individual family that set out to save money for a child's education could look forward to a world in which they might well be told that only people who didn't save for a child's education could send a child to college. Next year, the rule would be different. And the following year, who knows?

To some degree, the American political process encourages such shortsighted thinking. Politicians are elected for relatively short terms—two years, four years, or six. But the issues at the core of the American economy require long-term thinking. What will this nation need in two years? In five years? In 10 years? As concerned citizens, we must see that our officials are thinking in long-term as well as short-term modes. Each time a policy is proposed and articulated, we must ask ourselves about how such a policy will affect us a few years down the road. We must also ask what the policy was last year and the year before.

It is true that no one can predict the future. But we can and should use our best judgment to develop policies that will be workable beyond just the present moment. The alternative to such thinking must certainly be continued confusion, reduced productivity, and waste of consumer dollars by the hundreds of millions. In the larger sense, too, we are looking at a problem of time: America needs longer and longer lead time to develop, discuss, implement and evaluate policies and to build factories and develop productive capabilities.

As a nation, we have long since passed our creative adolescence, in which changing one's mind might be viewed as a normal, daily occurrence. We live in a world in which it is necessary to scrutinize, to consider and to evaluate our politicians based on their ability to handle complex problems with long-term as well as short-term policies and programs.

Consistent, sensible policies are in everyone's interest, and thus in the interest of our nation.

Q: I suspect that a neighbor's child is being physically abused by his parents. Do I have a responsibility to report the abuse?

A: Yes, you do. There is a law obligating you to report suspected abuse of a child. Contact the Department of Human Resources Child Welfare Department to report your suspicions or call the Child Abuse Hotline. The tollfree number is 1-800-252-5400. Information regarding your name will remain confidential.

Q: I've been living with a man for three years, and we consider ourselves married although we never got a marriage license or had a wedding. If we decide to split up, do we have to go to court and get a divorce?

A: Because a common law marriage is just as valid as a traditional marriage, a divorce is necessary in both types of marriages. Accordingly, any property or children from either type of marriage must be divided between the husband and wife. Furthermore, neither party is free to re-marry until the common law marriage is dissolved. The law defines a common law marriage as one where the partners agree to marry, hold themselves out as being married, and live together. Contrary to popular belief, there is no minimum number of months or years a couple must live together to have a legal common law marriage.

Q: Can a finance company look to a woman for payment of a debt which her ex-husband agreed to assume in their divorce settlement. Both parties had signed at the time of the loan. Will the woman be liable if the husband never pays?

A: When a husband and wife sign a note to a creditor, they are jointly liable to the creditor, even if they later divorce and assign that community debt to the husband. If a creditor successfully sues the husband for payment, but is unable to collect the judgment, the creditor can then seek a judgment against the former wife.

Q: I am an artist. Do I need a license to sell my works? How do I pay taxes on paintings I sell? Can I sell them alongside a public road or intersection?

A: Yes, you will need a sales tax permit from the State Comptroller. In most instances, when you apply, a bond will be required based on your estimate of yearly sales. This permit will authorize you to buy your supplies without paying a sales tax, since you will be reselling and collecting the tax for the payment to the State. As to selling your works along a public road or intersection, you will need to check the local ordinances. There is no state law prohibiting the sale of such items along the road, but you may not go on to the roadway to solicit or sell.

Q: Under my mother's will, I am to receive her home and ad-

joining lot. When she dies, will I be required to pay inheritance taxes on this property?

A: On death, both the State of Texas and the federal government levy a death tax. In 1979, no federal estate taxes will be payable if an estate does not exceed \$147,000; in 1980, the amount will be \$161,000. On the same estate, Texas levies no inheritance tax if the children of the deceased take no more than \$200,000. Therefore, the answer depends upon the value of the home and lot and the value of the other assets in your mother's estate.

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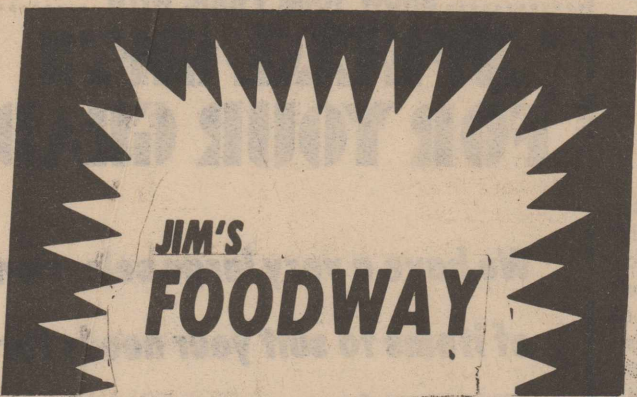

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Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Due to an unpredictable late spring, mainly due to very little moisture, grass was late coming out as well as many flowers and blooming shrubs. Even the mesquite are later than usual in their beautiful fresh green leaves.

If you haven't started planting your Gladiola bulbs it isn't too late. Support those that are about to bloom with strong stakes.

Divide and reset iris when blooming has finished and before weather gets so hot.

If lawns haven't been fertilized, they should be now with commercial plant food. Follow instructions as given for the best results.

When you move your potted plants outside, place them in the shade for a few days to become hardened before the sun gets too hot. I find they do much better if some protection from our hot south winds, especially in afternoon, is given.

Continue your spraying program or insects and disease.

Coleus are grown for their colorful leaves. Pinching out the bloom spike just above the first two leaves promotes stockiness and prevents the plant from going to seed.

Other annuals that respond to pinching back tips are, petunia, zinnia, calendula, phlox, pinks, snapdragon, verbena and ageratum. Don't pinch back main stem of cockscomb, poppy or strawflower. Seedling dahlias may be pinched back until August 1 to induce fall blooming.

Fertilize crepe myrtle now with an application of 5-10-10 or 8-8-8 commercial fertilizer to stimulate plants, causing full clusters of bloom during the summer. Use about 3 cups to a large mature plant and 1 cup to smaller newly set plants. This is one of the most colorful and durable plants for our area, blooming most all summer. Everyone should plant a group or at least one in their landscape.

There is an excellent article in the May Better Homes and Gardens that may give you an idea for show-off gardens with potted plants and how to cope with a slope as we have here in Ozona. With so many beautiful natives in and around Ozona you will find they take less care and water than others that are used.

The FFA Chapter of Ozona High School was the main work force, and continue to maintain the trail. Chapter members cleared a foot trail, which had been laid out by the Soil Conservation Service. They lined the trails

with limestone rocks and prepared steel identification plates. The SCS labeled selected plants along the foot path and prepared a numbered list. Plant identification sheets are available in a metal box at the start of the trail.

It has become an important area for FFA students today, as it is their outdoor classroom for plant and grass judging.

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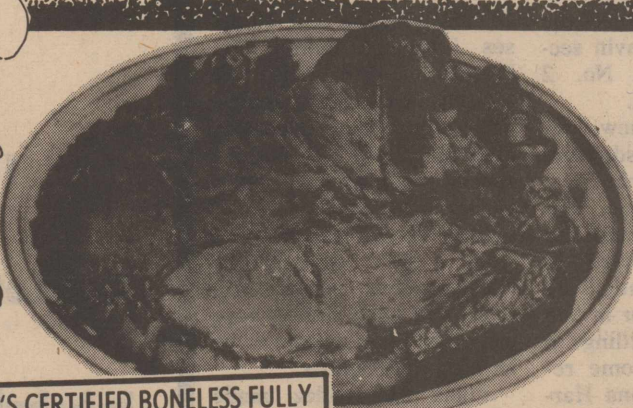

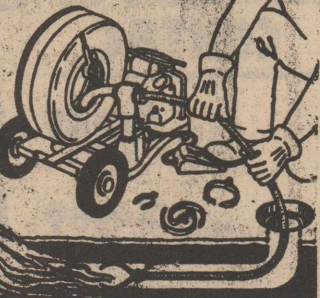

The beautiful month of May is National Mental-Health Month. In a national survey of families, 73 percent of the family members (parents and teenagers) felt that mental health would be improved if people were more concerned about others and less concerned about their own problems.

Dr. Karl Menninger, the famous psychiatrist, once gave a lecture on mental health and was answering questions from the audience. "What would you advise a person to do," asked one man, "if that person felt a nervous breakdown coming on?" he replied, "Lock up your house, go across the railway tracks, find someone in need and do something to help that person."

Although few, if any, of us may be on the verge of a nervous breakdown and still fewer can even find railway tracks to cross, Menninger's advice still rings true.

Much human energy is being spent worrying about how inflation or the energy crisis or the rising food prices are affecting families. When worry engulfs a person, it is easy to forget about the human concerns of those in the family. Children, regardless of the country's economics, still need par-

ents. They need parents who somehow can find the time and energy to be concerned about them.

Children need their parents to help them understand life, the changes that are occurring within their bodies and among their friends. Children, at least most of them, need a parent who can listen to their concerns and help them interpret what is happening. As we worry about what this summer will bring or what the next paycheck won't bring, maybe we can remember Menninger's advice.

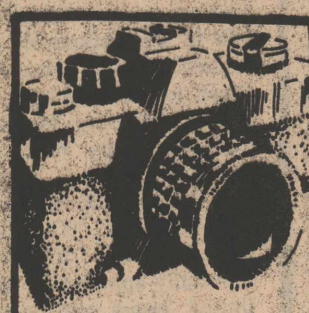

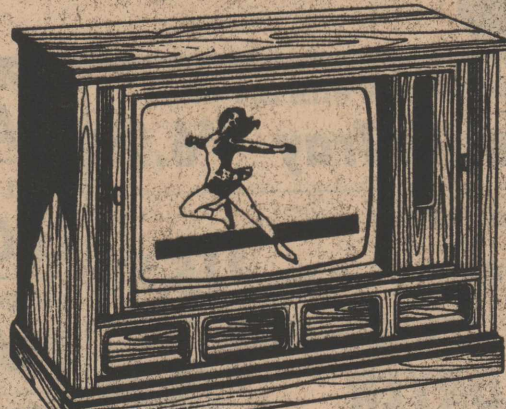

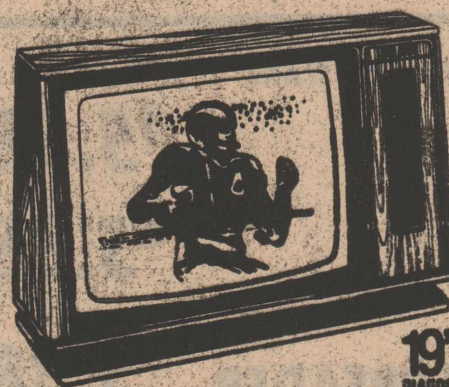

Soil Stewardship Week to be observed here

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District will join in the nationwide celebration of Soil Stewardship Week to take place on May 11-18, according to an announcement by W.R. Baggett, Jr.

The theme of this year's celebration is "The Judgment of Nature." It's focus is especially appropriate as the United States considers the current condition of its soil, water and related resources, said Baggett.

"Through nature, we are linked with the past and committed to the future." It is said in the 16-page

"Judgment of Nature" reference booklet, which presents thoughts for consideration not only during Soil Stewardship Week, but throughout the year. Nature is defined in the publication as the continuing system of life created by God.

"Nature is neither fixed nor static; it is a continuing process and inherently dynamic...it rewards care and constructive attention, even as it penalizes negligence and deliberate damage," the booklet states.

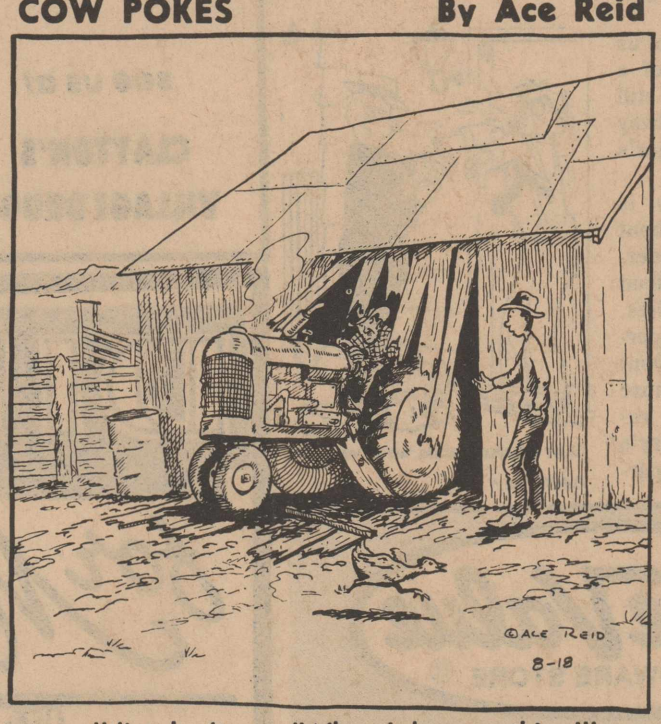
"The loss of some 3 million acres of productive agricultural land each year

through urbanization and other uses, the decline in productivity of the topsoil as the result of destructive erosion, and continuing pollution of the nation's waters is serious cause for everyone's concern," the sponsors believe.

Participation in Soil Stewardship Week activities offers an opportunity to reflect on the nation's natural resource problems and consider actions to resolve them or reduce their impact.

The National Association of Conservation Districts has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week in the United States since 1955, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 soil and water conservation districts. Gen. Tele. offers \$35 mil. raise

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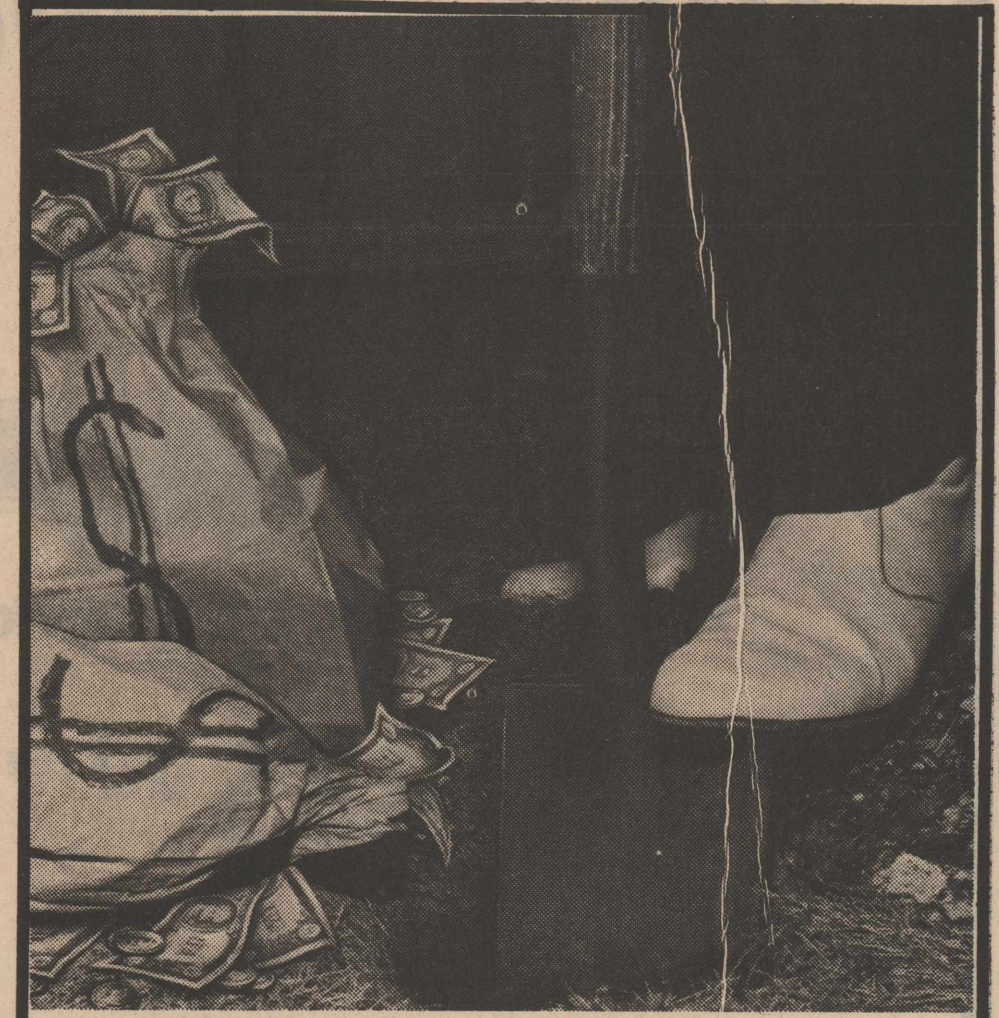
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
