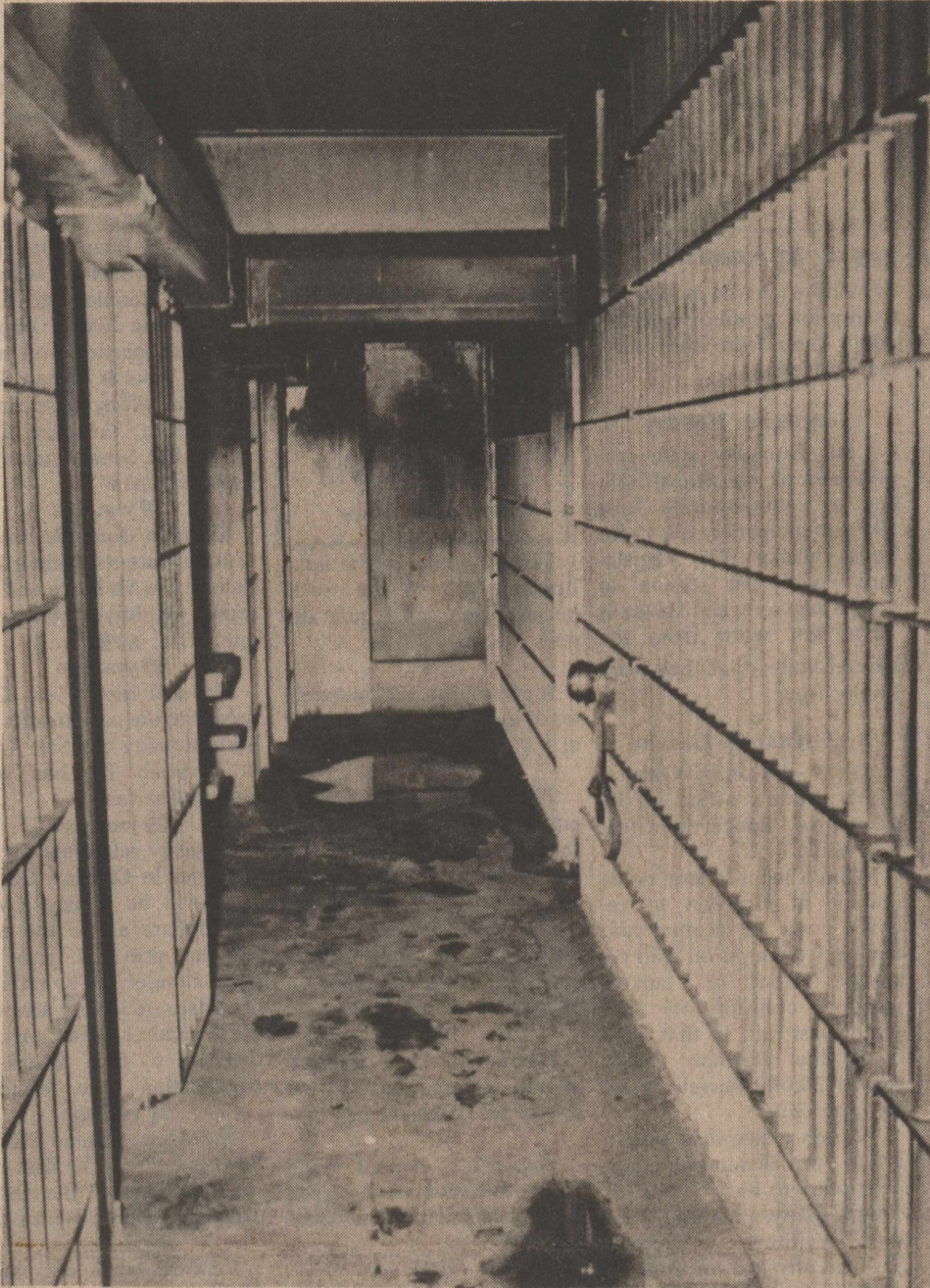
Announcement of his election was made Friday at the Mohair Council of America executive committee meeting in San Angelo. Childress is presently serving his third term as president of the MCA.

## Help asked to finish Census

Testing will be held Thursday at the Civic Center at 10:00 a.m. for helpers to do follow-up enumeration work on the census in Crockett County. Charlotte Judd made the announcement Monday. It will be the final phase of the count here and will go along with the "Were you counted?" campaign which is now underway.

Anyone who thinks they or any member of their family might have been missed in the 1980 Census of Housing and Population, should fill out the "Were you counted?" form printed in

today's newspaper as public service. Cut it out and return it by mail to U.S. Census Office, 116 Fourth St., Pecos, Tex. 79772. The form will then be checked against the master address list for this area so there is no chance of an individual or household being counted twice.

This appeal to the public was made this week by Janet Faulkner, manager of the Pecos area District Census Office, of which Crockett County is a part. Faulkner says the "Were you counted?" campaign is an addi-

tional effort to insure that no one is overlooked during the 1980 Census. The Census Bureau hopes any households missed in previous census operations will respond during the "Were you counted?" campaign.

**Word was received from the census office Tuesday to call the Tax Assessor's office, if there is any doubt about whether a household has been counted. It will be necessary to leave a name and address with the Tax Assessor.**

Faulkner noted that very shortly the Census Bureau will turn over to local officials the population counts for their communities. These preliminary population counts will be subject to a review by local elected officials. The purpose of this Local Review Program is to give city and county officials an opportunity to spot errors while census workers are still in the field. This allows the Census Bureau to recheck any questioned population counts and should contribute significantly to the accuracy and success of the 1980 Census.

Faulkner also pointed out that local officials will see only the population totals for their communities, not the census questionnaires containing personal information, which are kept in complete confidence.

Testing for follow up enumerators was done June 12, at the Civic Center and only two persons took the test. The follow-up enumerators will have high-paying jobs for a term of about 6 weeks. This should interest students and homemakers who need part time work.

## Jail fire injures two men

A fire at the Crockett County Jail which appeared to have been deliberately set during the early hours Thursday, sent two prisoners to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo and ruined the jail.

Sheriff Billy Mills and Mrs. Mills were awakened by smoke around 1:45 a.m. Thursday morning as they slept in their apartment at the jail. On entering the jail Sheriff Mills was almost overcome by heavy black smoke and intense heat, but managed to get to the cell block and unlock it. He then called the fire department and reported two men were trapped on the inside.

Even with air masks, firemen found visibility in the jail about six inches. They found one man, Jack Medina almost immediately upon entering the cell-block. They drug him out and went back in, hosing their way down the cellblock. They found the fire in a stack of polyurethane

mattresses, and extinguished the blaze, meanwhile they found the other prisoner, William Copenhaver, unconscious near a bunk. They managed to drag him out of the heavy smoke, and both men were taken by ambulance to the ICU at Shannon.

## Anderson has new offices

## Survey for elderly is under way

Mrs. Blair will also be the interviewer for Reagan, Schleicher and Sutton counties.

The Concho Valley Council of Governments began a needs assessment survey of the elderly in the CVCOG region earlier this spring. Faye Blair, a resident of Eldorado, is the interviewer who began work in Crockett County last week.

Approximately 1,300 questionnaires will be administered to elderly persons in their homes over a period of six months. Interviewers will each work in one county at a time so that no one county will be involved for the whole six-month period.

The interview will cover such concerns as housing, health care, transportation, employment, income and nutrition.

Results of the interviews will be analyzed and published in statistical form in such a way as to insure that no findings can be identified with any individual or address. A separate report will be prepared for each of the 13 counties.

## Crockett County Hospital "Is it worth it?"

"How come it costs so much to run that place?" "What in the world do you people do with our money over there?" "Can't you run that place with less people?"

Funny thing, I've heard these questions in every small town that has a hospital.

The two men were arrested at the Circle Bar earlier in the night when they were taken off a bus and charged with disorderly conduct and public intoxication. Medina was dismissed from the hospital Monday and is in the Sonora jail charged with criminal mischief. Copenhaver is still hospitalized, but will be released to officers later this week.

Fire Marshall Steve Kenley said the fire developed so fast it was almost like gasoline igniting. He said the heat was so intense it warped the steel at the top of the cell, while producing a highly toxic, heavy black smoke. Kenley said Sheriff Mills risked injury to himself going through the toxic smoke to open the cell block. However, he said the act probably saved the lives of the two prisoners.

The two men were the only persons in the jail at the time of the fire. The entire cell block area had been washed down and disinfected earlier in the afternoon and the mattresses had been stacked on a table to allow the area to dry.

The Sheriff's Department personnel is using the Sonora jail while the local jail is being repaired. Fire and smoke damage was heavy to the entire lower floor of the jail, including offices and it will take several days to get back in working order. Fortunately most of the inside of the structure is heavy steel, otherwise, it might have been a total loss.

Building, equipment, and supply guidelines are set by persons and big government, not directly associated with this hospital.

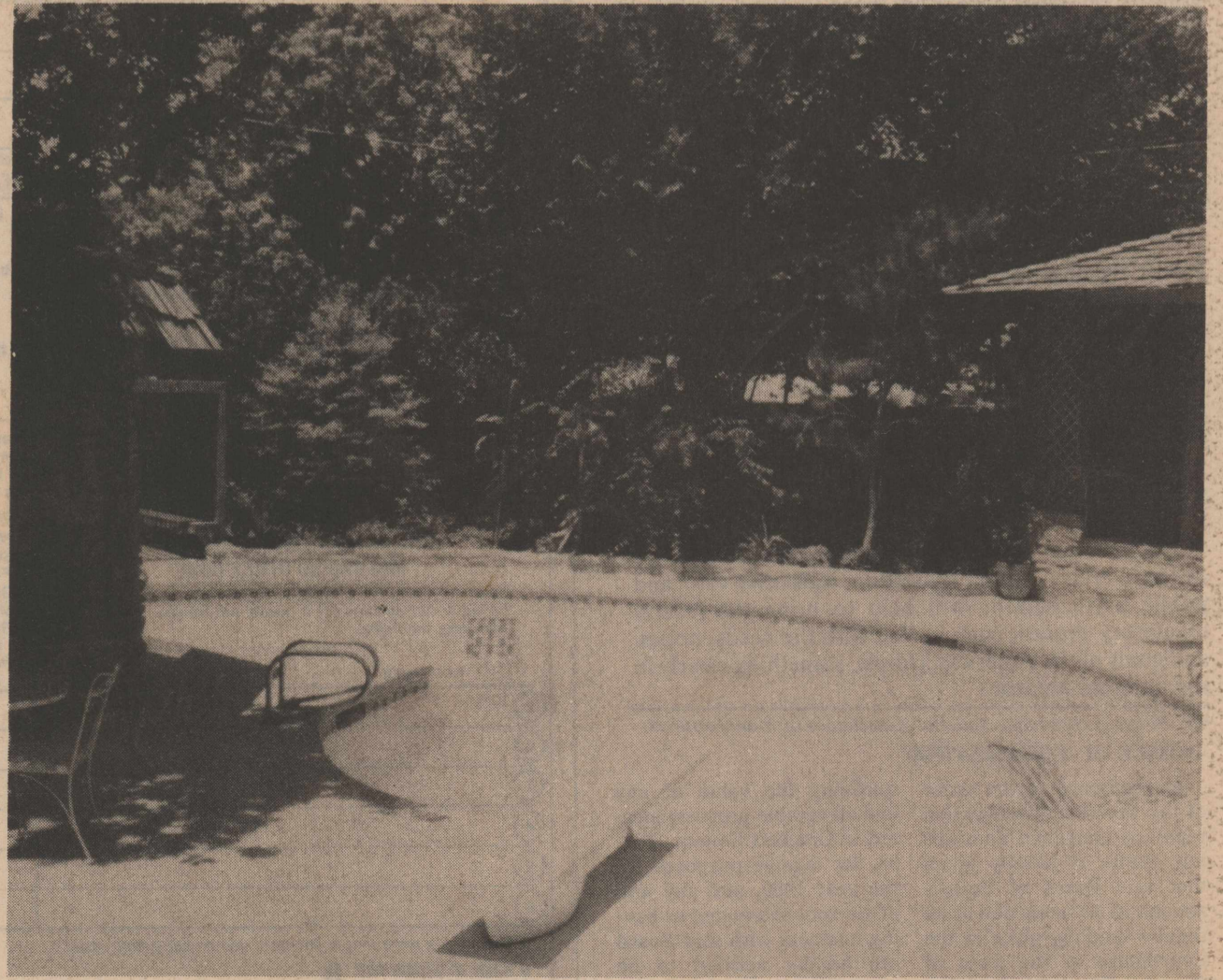

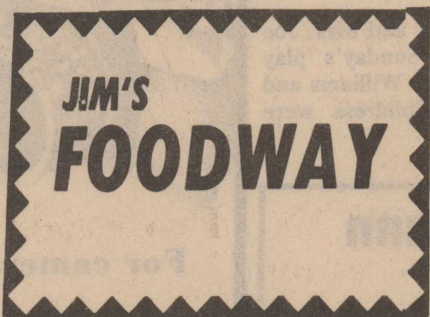

**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Some may ask, "What is the function of Garden Clubs?" "What are the benefits to the individual?" "What do garden clubs in National Council do?"

Mainly our mission is to serve our town, our cities, our states, and our nation by lending knowledge and talent to create a better environment.

Horticulture and conservation are two of the basic programs upon which our organization was formed. These programs are constantly being updated to keep abreast of current trends. Most inspiration for creating design has its beginning in the wonderful world of horticulture where the choice of plant material is inexhaustible.

Again, if any of you are new or old residents of Ozona, and want to be a member of either garden club, please call a member for information that you may want and need.

You may want to try ground layering to have new plants to put out in the fall or spring. Low-branching shrubs like the old-fashioned roses, spirea, pussy willow, forsythia, deutzia, weigla, viburnum and others are easy to propagate. Just bury a section of branch underground, and after it has developed its own root system, use a clean, sharp knife to separate the whole piece from the parent plant.

Select a young, vigorous branch on the lower half of the plant. Gently make a slanting cut about halfway through the stem; make sure you expose at least one inch of inner bark. Remove all the lower leaves on this section of the branch and bury it four to six inches in the ground. Use a forked stick or a stone to keep the branch in place. A longer stem may be pinned down at several locations along the length of the stem to get more than one new plant.

To prune, thin out all spring blooming shrubs now, by cutting the old wood off at ground level. This will leave only the young, healthy branches for next year's blooming season.

Snip off all the long runners on your tree wisterias to encourage abundant bloom next spring. Prune your poinsettias to induce side branching.

Summertime's leisure time is a great opportunity to plan activities as a family--and, for fun, celebrate "National Avoid Boredom Week."

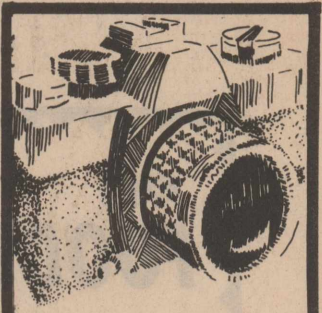

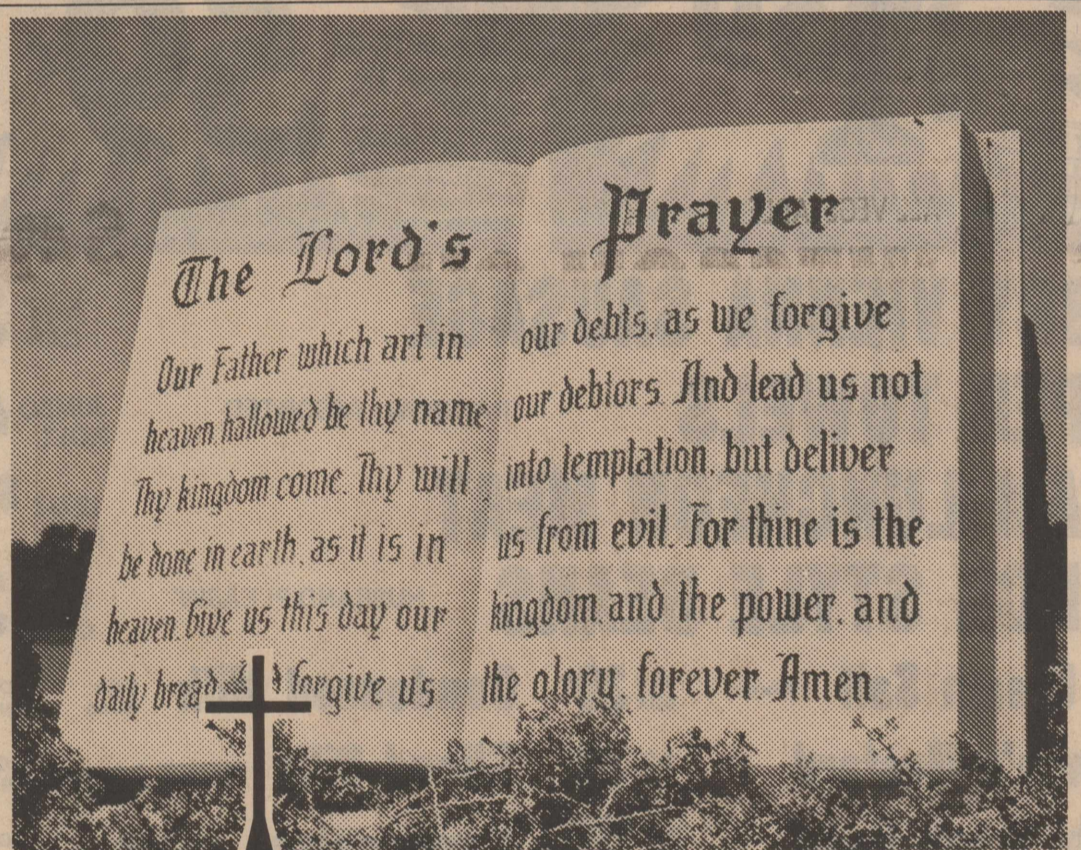

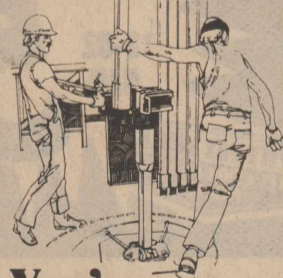

## Lots of hazards in mower use

Some lawn mowers just can't cut it when it comes to safety. But even mowers with safety features can be dangerous if operators are careless, tired or in too much of a hurry. Working within inches of a blade whirling at approximately 230 miles per hour is no time to be careless, the Texas Medical Association (TMA) says.

The United States Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) says good lawn mower design can help prevent accidents that cost about \$253 million and about 77,000 amputated fingers and toes, cuts and broken bones yearly. Among its recommendations, the commission says a walk-behind lawn mower should have a foot guard in back and a deflector shield to shoot debris downward when a grass-catching bag is not being used.

To further prevent injur-

ies, TMA urges mower users to take special care to avoid injuries to hands, feet and legs, which the CPSC says are the most common places hurt. These precautions include shutting off the mower completely before unclogging the discharge chute or blades and making sure that feet and hands are clear of the blade area before starting the motor.

tions include mowing across a slope instead of up and down it. This mowing method will help improve mower control and footing for walk-behind mower operators. Riding mowers should move up and down the slope for better stability.

Footing also can be treacherous on wet grass. Not only does it increase danger, but wet grass is harder to mow, clogs the mower easier than dry grass does and increases the chance of shock for electric mower users.

One of the major hazards electric mower users face is being shocked because a cord is cut even slightly. Mowing the area nearest the electric outlet first and then working away from it, keeping the cord behind at all times, helps decrease this danger.

TMA says injuries to other parts of the body often occur when small objects hidden in the grass suddenly are hurled with deadly force by a mower. An iron bolt hitting a pregnant woman in the stomach, a piece of wire punc-

ture a man's gallbladder and an object cutting a boy's neck artery are just a few of the cases doctors have treated.

Making sure people and pets are far away from the mower is a good way to avoid such accidents. This precaution is necessary because a mower, even with a grass catcher, can sling objects from any side.
