> Faulkner noted that very shortly the Census Bureau will turn over to local officials the population counts for their communities. These preliminary population counts will be subject to a review by local elected officials. The purpose of this Local Review Program is to give city and county officials an opportunity to spot errors while census workers are still in the field. This allows the Census Bureau to recheck any questioned population counts and should contribute significantly to the accuracy and success of the 1980 Census. Faulkner also pointed out that local officials will see only the population totals for their communities, not the census questionnaires containing personal information, which are kept in complete confidence.

Testing for follow up enumerators was done June 12. at the Civic Center and only two persons took the test. The follow-up enumerators will have high-paying jobs for a term of about 6 weeks. This should interest students and homemakers who need part time work.

Jail fire injures two men

County Jail which appeared to have been deliberately set during the early hours Thursday, sent two prisoners to Shannon Hospital in San An-

gelo and ruined the jail. Sheriff Billy Mills and Mrs. Mills were awakened by smoke around 1:45 a.m. Thursday morning as they slept in their apartment at the jail. On entering the jail Sheriff Mills was almost overcome by heavy black smoke and intense heat, but managed to get to the cell block and unlock it. He then called the fire department and reported two men were trapped on the inside.

Even with air masks, firemen found visibility in the jail about six inches. They found one man, Jack Medina almost immediately upon entering the cell-block. They drug him out and went back in, hosing their way down the cellblock. They found the fire in a stack of polyurethane



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Controlling Regulation

by John W. Fisher

Most Americans by now know of the significant negative effect that federal regulation has on American industry and the lifestyle of the American people. It's well known that the regulatory process drained \$103 billion from the American economy in 1979 alone. And regulation was the fastest growing "industry" in the 1970s—not electronics, not energy, not a consumer product, but regulation.

No one wants to discard all regulation. Americans believe, by and large, that some are necessary to protect the majority of citizens from the excesses of a few, to protect the air, earth, and water. However, regulation sometimes hurts more than it helps.

One company, for example, was required to install "scrubbers" to reduce the emission of visible iron oxide dust into the air. The scrubbers removed 21.2 lbs. of dust per hour, but producing the power to run the scrubbers' electric motor produces 23 lbs. of other pollutants per hour. Clearly, nothing was gained for the consumer. And the steel industry estimates that the engineering control changes to meet the noise standards set by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration would cost \$1.2 million dollars for each affected worker. But that industry says it can provide better protection for only \$42 per employee.

Lost business, plant closings, increased costs, higher prices and declining productivity were not caused by the national commitment to achieve clean air and water. These economic problems have been caused by the bureaucracy's refusal to recognize that regulations have economic costs as well as benefits.

Regulatory reform has been the subject of speeches, nearings, and more than 200 pieces of legislation. Crucial to any successful regulatory reform legislation are five major elements. These include: regulatory analysis, appropriate review, sunset laws, legislative veto, and expanded public participation.

Regulatory Analysis. When a federal agency puts forth a rule that will have a major impact on America's society and economic system, that agency should be required to analyze the need for the rule, the costs, projected effects. and the alternatives, if any. This analysis will allow the public to evaluate various alternatives against each other and to select those that provide the greatest benefit for the required expenditures.

Reviews. Major rules should be subject to review by some disinterested party such as the Congressional Budget Office. This review should be made part of the record, with the final agency action subject to judicial review. Currently, the law presumes that an agency's actions are valid. This places a heavy burden on someone who disagrees with an action or ruling.

Sunset Laws. Sunset laws require that Congress review agencies and programs on a periodic basis. Too often, once agencies and programs are created, there is no legislative control over them. In this regard, a predetermined schedule under which every regulatory program is reviewed once every eight to 10 years makes sense. If the agency or program is no longer needed, or if it duplicates other programs, it should be terminated.

Legislative Veto. One of the functions of a regulatory agency is to provide the details which implement a congressional law. A legislative veto would allow Congress to review and overturn an agency action that fails to meet the original intent of the law or Congress' understanding of the agency's right to operate.

Public Participation. The public needs to be involved to a greater degree in the rule making process. Public participation will help protect the public interest in that it allows citizens to take part in formulating the rules and the regulations that govern them. An outreach program to strengthen awareness of rule making proceedings on the part of the media, trade associations, and individuals, as well as longer periods for providing comments, would allow the public to participate more fully.

The inclusion of these five elements, then—regulatory analysis, review, sunset legislation, legislative veto, and public participation—will help to bring the federal regulatory process back in line with the needs, hopes, and goals of the American people, something clearly in the national interest.

AUSTIN—House Speaker Bill Clayton's hopes for the political future apparently depend on whether he can speedily clear himself of indictments in the Brilab scam before the general election in November.

Clayton was indicted last week on charges of bribery and other charges, along with three other men. Mister speaker expected the indictments and had told reporters weeks ago, that if he were not cleared of charges by around Labor Day, he would step down from the platform which controls the Texas House of representatives.

Following the indictments, Clayton hasn't had the opportunity to say much: U.S. District Judge George Cire issued a gag order to prevent the case from being tried in the press.

Clayton's lawyers indicated that unless the case is thrown out following a series of pre-trial motions, he will not get the speedy trial he desires. Come November, an indicted speaker may well be a political liability to some members seeking re-election in the House.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

Some may ask, "What is the function of Garden Clubs?" "What are the benefits to the individual?" "What do garden clubs in National Council do?"

Mainly our mission is to serve our town, our cities, our states, and our nation by lending knowledge and talent to create a better environment.

Horticulture and conservation are two of the basic programs upon which our organization was formed. These programs are constantly being updated to keep abreast of currant trends. Most inspiration for creating design has its beginning in the wonderful world of horticulture where the choice of plant material is inexhaustable.

Again, if any of you are new or old residents of Ozona, and want to be a member of either garden club, please call a member for information that you may want and need.

You may want to try ground layering to have new plants to put out in the fall or

Low-branching shrubs like the old-fashioned roses, spirea, pussy willow, forsythia, deutzia, weiglla, virburnum and others are easy to propagate. Just bury a section of branch underground, and after it has developed its own root system, use a clean, sharp knife to separate the whole piece from the parent plant.

Select a young, vigorous branch on the lower half of the plant. Gently make a slanting cut about halfway through the stem; make sure you expose at least one inch of inner bark Remove all the lower leaves on this section of the branch and bury it four to six inches in the ground. Use a forked stick or a stone to keep the branch in place. A longer stem may be pinned down at several locations along the length of the stem to get more than one new plant.

To prune, thin out all spring blooming shrubs now, by cutting the old wood off at ground level. This will leave only the young, healthy branches for next year's blooming season.

Snip off all the long runners on your tree wisterias to encourage abundant bloom next spring. Prune your poinsettias to enduce side branching.
