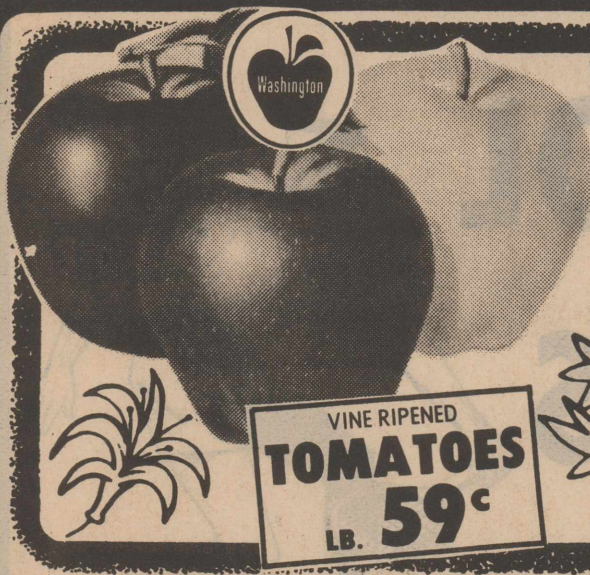

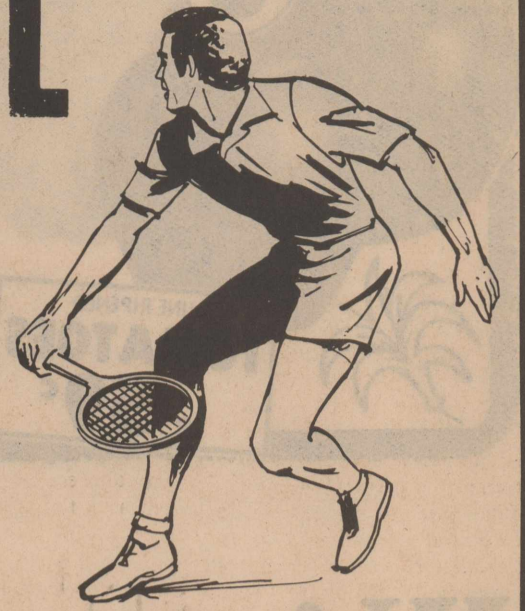

# Poisonings increase in spring and summer

"The child is screaming and coughing. Mother runs to the garage and finds the child coughing, gagging, and having difficulty breathing and falls unconscious to the floor from a pan where his dad was washing greasy car parts with gasoline. An unusual occurrence?" "No," says Michael Ellis, director of the Texas State Poison Center. "Spring and summer always brings us an increase in the number of ingestions of gasoline and other petroleum distillates." During 1980 the Poison Center was contacted over 19,000 times for a poisoning emergency and some 11,000 times for general information about preventing poisoning. "The poison inquiries are primarily about children," Ellis said, "in fact, about 70% of all our calls involve the child who is 5 years old or younger. This is the prime age for small objects found down low to go directly in the mouth." And what about our child who drank the gasoline? "Gasoline and other petroleum distillates such as furniture polishes, lamp oils, lighter fluid, etc. present us with considerable problems," Ellis noted. "If these products get into the lung of the child, the lung can be coated with the liquid and asphyxiation and death over a several day period occurs all too frequently." And there isn't much we can do about the situation.

## Indirect energy, a hidden waste

Consumers' "indirect energy" use may add up to a significant "hidden energy" waste. "Indirect energy" is a difficult-to-measure item, but families must consider it or pay the price for limited energy resources in the future, one specialist cautions. "Indirect energy" consumption is basically energy used to produce goods and services, Bonnie Piernot, a family resource management specialist, explains. "All products available in today's marketplace require energy for manufacturing, packaging and delivery. It is this 'hidden' energy use that few families have thought of as possible to cut back on or control," she continues.

## Adult 4-H camp offered

quently in the young child, luckily true 'poisonings' do not occur nearly as frequently. "Rushing the patient to the hospital emergency room after they have ingested a foreign substance, is not the best approach to the problem," said Ellis. "About 85% of the time the patient can be treated at home and does not require medical attention. Call the Poison Center first, and let them help you determine whether medical attention is necessary. In this way the patient

is traumatized to a minimal degree if no medical attention is required." Since a poisoning emergency occurs whenever you are least expecting it, the telephone number of the Poison Center is a very important number to keep handy. In Galveston, the telephone number is 1-713-765-1420. It is answered 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Keep the number handy, remember, children act fast, so do poisons.

## Supplemental committee budgets come under fire

Funding for Congress' supplemental committee staffs, usually a quick and simple procedure, has come under heavy opposition from many congressmen who are opposed to empire building in the House committees. "If these supplemental committee budgets were to come to the House for a vote today, many would be defeated. These committees are again asking for hefty increases for their supplemental staff. It is unjustifiable for Congress to continually spend more on themselves while everyone else in America is being asked to sacrifice," according to Congressman Jim Collins (R-Texas). Collins is one of the opposition movement's leaders. Others joining him in demanding that committee staff funding be decreased are the House Minority Whip and many conservative Democrats.

Supplemental committee staffs alone cost the American taxpayers over \$42 million for just last year. These temporary staffers presently outnumber permanent committee staff 1200 to 750. Permanent committee budgets are funded separately. "Look at the reality of Congress' internal funding. My committee, Energy and Commerce, was authorized \$3.75 million last year. This year it is asking for \$4.7 million—a 28% increase in just one year. A 10% cut in their authorizations here means they still get 15% more than in 1980," Collins said. He also noted that Energy and Commerce had a total staff of 156 in 1980 up from only 56 total in 1973. They are asking for 21 more staff members in 1981. "I also find it interesting that 45 staff members on just this one committee are making over \$40,000 a year, 21 of the staff are making over \$50,000 a year. "The American people are tired of sacrificing and paying higher taxes so that the Congress can just keep building empires. The time is now for Congress to make some sacrifices for the good of the country and the best place to start is in the committee staff budgets," Collins said.

# V.A. attempting to collect debts

The Veterans Administration yesterday sent letters to the heads of 50 federal agencies requesting their help in collecting almost \$37 million from more than 66,000 of their employees who owe that amount to VA. The agencies, ranging from the largest to some of the smallest in the federal government, were asked to "appoint a senior agency official to coordinate the collection activity" with VA. The name of the debtors and the amounts they owe the Veterans Administration will be furnished each agency in the near future. The agencies notified of the employees' indebtedness to VA include the General Accounting Office, the Department of Education, the Civil Rights Commission, Federal Election, Federal Home Loan Bank Board, the National Science Foundation and the Office of Personnel Management. They range in size from the Defense Department to the Railroad Retirement Board and include the Postal Service, and the Departments of Agriculture, Com-

merce, Energy, Health and Human Services, Housing and Urban Development, Interior, Justice, Labor, State, Transportation and Treasury. VA began collecting the list of government employed debtors early this year by matching its computer records with those maintained by the Office of Personnel Management. The result is a list of civilian employees with outstanding debts from overpayments of VA benefits and defaulted education and home loans. The VA letter to agency heads said, "In compliance with standard federal collection practices we have reminded debtors...of the outstanding debt owed the Veterans Administration, the basis for the indebtedness and their appeal rights." It said, "VA is willing to work with employees who dispute the amount of the debt or need to establish a repayment plan," but "your support is needed to assure that debtors who fail to cooperate are counseled on the

need to meet their obligations." VA's government-wide collection effort is patterned on the agency's continuing surveillance of debts owed by its own employees, a campaign kept current by periodic computer checks. 



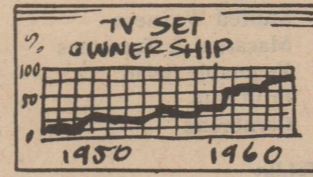

Livestock producers in this area are urged to check animals for screwworms and submit suspected samples to the fly laboratory at Mission.

A confirmed screwworm case was found recently in Sonora. "We are asking for cooperation of all livestock producers in this area to be on a special watch for screwworms. We want to be sure there are no more screwworms as a result of this outbreak," Dr. John Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, Austin, said.

The Sonora case is the second confirmation of screwworms in Texas this year; another case was found in El Paso in March.

A 25-mile square area around Sonora is being "hot-spotted" with sterile screwworm flies. This will continue for a month to six weeks. In addition, the area is being treated with pellets which contain an insecticide, insect attractant, and feeding material. The system is known

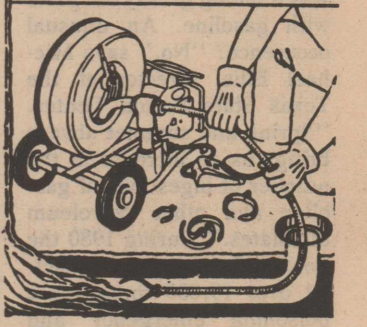
as the SWASS treatment, meaning Screwworm Adult Suppression System.

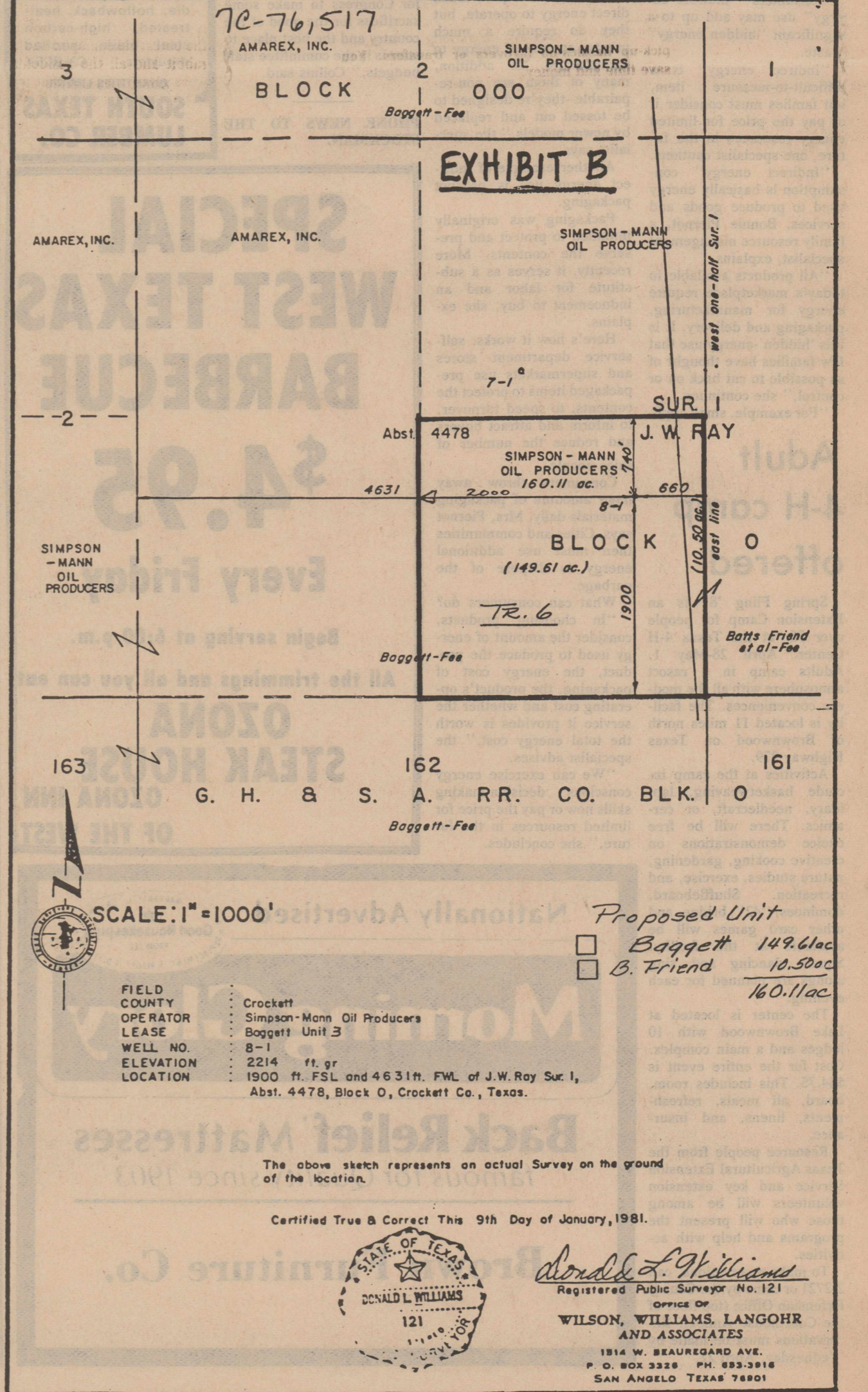
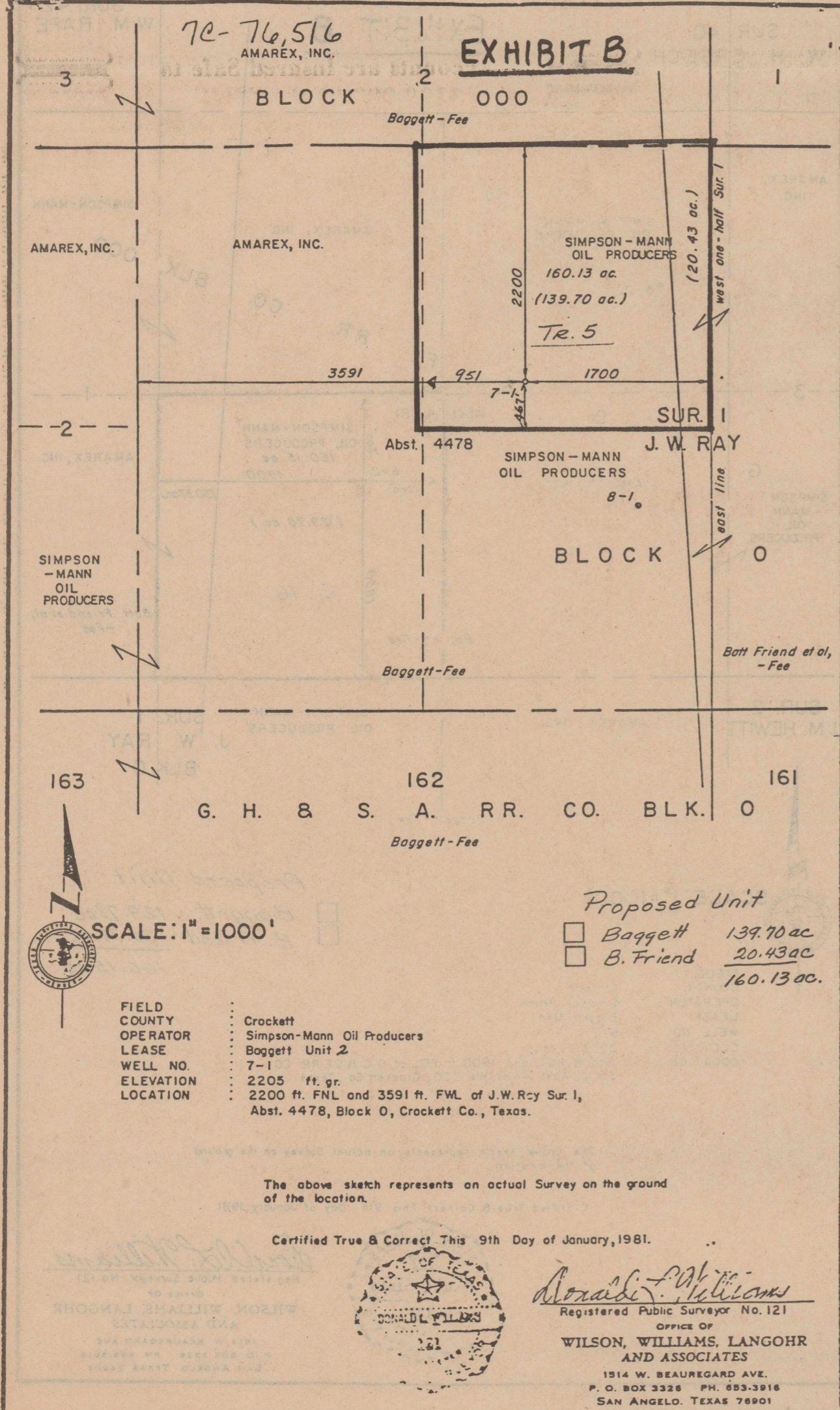

## Shallow wildcats set

Two wildcats were scheduled in Crockett County and a confirmer and an extender were finalized.

Regal Development Inc., Eldorado, will drill two 2,100-foot wildcats, 12 miles north of Ozona.

The No. 1-14 University, 3/4-mile east-northeast of the current two-well Wamoco (yates gas) field, is 467 feet from the north and 2,078.8 feet from the west lines of 14-42-University Lands. Ground elevation is 2,556.8 feet.

The No. 2-14 University, 5/8-mile east-northeast of Yates gas, is 467 feet from the north and 878.8 feet from the west lines of the same section.

The Wamoco field produces at 1,185 feet and formerly produced oil from the Canyon.

The Pikes Peak Draw (Canyon) field gained its eighth producer and a 3/8-mile north and the same distance east-northeast extension with completion of Harrison Interests Ltd., Houston, No. 4 Joe F. Bean "C", 17 miles northwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4,800,000 cubic feet of gas daily.

Production was through perforations at 6,458-7,117 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons and fractured with 30,000 gal-

lons. It was drilled as a wildcat to 8,040 feet.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of 27-UV-GC&SF.

Pennsylvanian production was extended 7/8-mile northeast in the Howards Creek (Pennsylvanian, Canyon and Clearfork gas) field with completion of Sabine Production Co. No. 1 University "32-2", 20 miles southwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,900,000 cubic feet of gas daily.

Production was through perforations at 8,463-733 feet, which had been acidized with 14,000 gallons.

Location is 1,757 feet from the north and 720 feet from the east lines of 2-32-University Lands.

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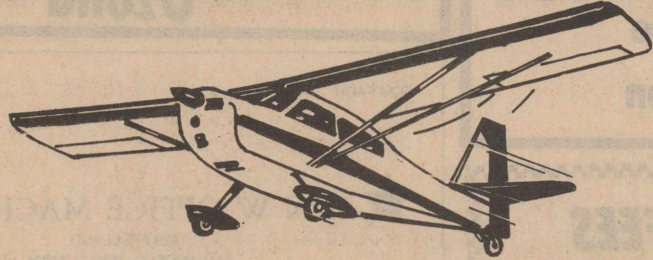

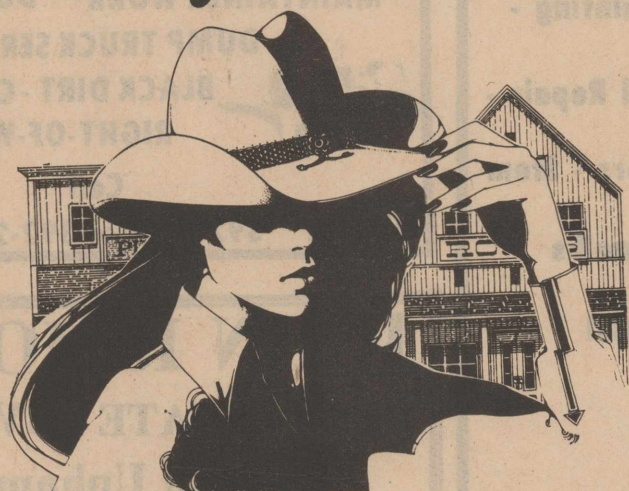

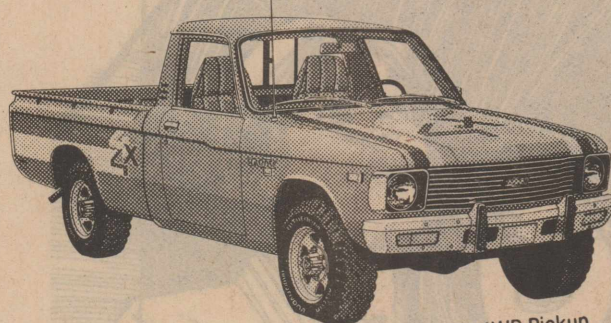
