Funeral services for Mendoza are pending at Sizemore Funeral Home. He was born May 6, 1963 in Alpine.

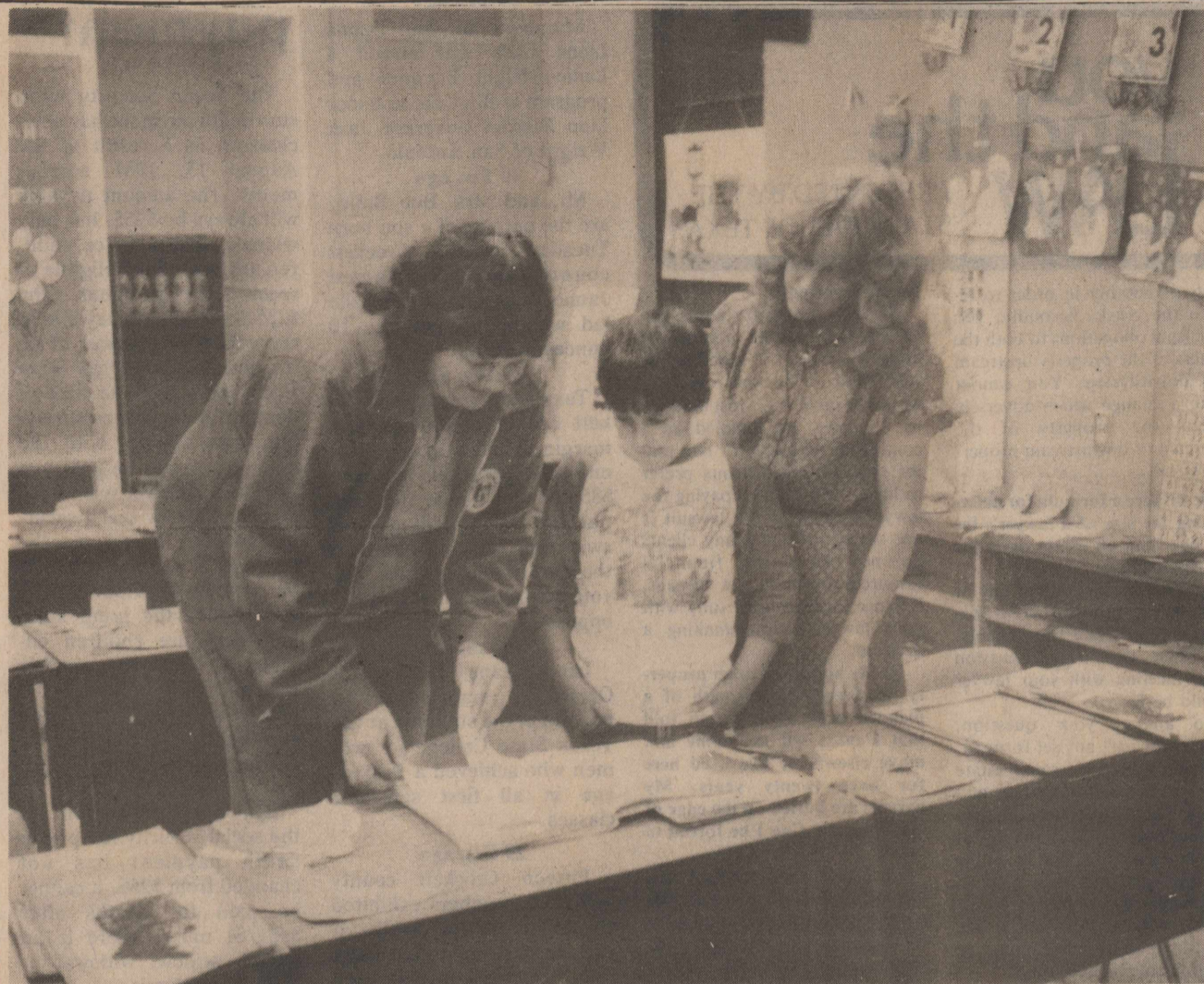
Daniel services pending

Commissioners Court in lengthy meeting

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met in regular meeting Monday, and gave their all-out support to a group of Hospital Board members, who appeared before the court to ask for help in bringing another physician to Ozona to practice.

Board members meeting with the court were Beth Boyd, Charles Huffman, and Dan Pullen. Hospital administrator Glen Rumley was spokesman for the group. Rumley told the court that both Ozona physicians, hospital board members and the administrative staff, had planned an intensive recruitment effort to secure another physician.

Judge Johnny Jones, speaking for the court, gave the group the unqualified support of the court in their effort.

County Agent Billy Reagor came to give his report and received plaudits from the court on his 4-H livestock group's recent success at the Houston Livestock Show.

Garland Young gave the youth center report. He asked to bring silverware and china up to an inventory of 300 in each category. He also reported the Civic Center board agreed, in their last meeting, to award Young a \$100 per month vehicle allowance.

Commissioner Chuey Castro took exception to the practice of giving car allowances to any county employee who asks, but after some discussion, the court voted to give Young a \$75 per month car allowance.

Paul Shacklette gave the road department report and reported most work done by the department this month had been in Farmers Field and was almost completed.

While the court was waiting to open bids for road equipment, three members of the Fire Department, Jim Marks, Dee Keilers and Bob Falkner, met with the court on specifications for the new fire truck.

The department had apparently done a thorough job of research on the new vehicle, and the court agreed to let bids for the truck and

chassis. Bids will be opened at the April court meeting. Several heavy equipment company representatives were present for the opening of the bids for the rubber-tire loader. Judge Jones opened the bids at 11 o'clock. After discussing the bids and hearing from two of the representatives, the court voted to purchase the equipment from Holt Machinery of San Antonio, a Caterpillar dealer, for a purchase price of \$48,740. This was not the low bid, but the court felt the equipment was the best buy for the money. Only one bid was received for the two dump beds, Western Trailer and Equipment of San An-

Lions dominate Junction meet

Ozona's Lions dominated the running events at Junction last week and easily won their second track meet in as many weeks. The Lions scored 173 points for the championship, while runners-up Menard and Llano only scored 78 points. The Lions won nine of the 15 events in the 11-team meet, and broke three records in the bitter cold weather and high winds that made track conditions almost unbearable.

Larry Payne and Richard Garza were double winners, but the highlight of the day came when Mark Valjejo upset Junction great Bob Hurley in the 300 meter hurdles. Lion fans responded with a great roar of approval for the young sophomore Lion.

The Lions will be hoping to make it three in a row when they enter the Eldorado meet Saturday. The prelims begin at 9:00 a.m., along with the field events, and the finals start at 2:00 p.m. Both the varsity and junior varsity will compete.

The Lion junior varsity finished fourth in the meet at Junction, with 40 points. Many JV members ran on the Varsity because of the absence of several members. Both coaches and team members expressed appreciation to all the fans who braved the weather to support the Lions in Junction. The win places the Lions in the favorite role to capture the Eldorado meet this weekend.

The 440-relay team of Fe-

lo bid them in at \$3,412 each, and the bid was accepted.

County Attorney Tom Cameron met with the court to ask that Frank White be certified an investigator for the county attorney's office. He said White was a qualified law enforcement officer and had agreed to accept the position with no salary. Cameron said the influx of people into Ozona, had created a pressing court caseload and an investigator was necessary. The court agreed, on the condition, the county be out only the expense of bonding White.

Some discussion was held with Cameron about filing suit on past due accounts at Crockett County Hospital. Cameron agreed to take action as soon as he discussed the situation with Hospital Administrator Glen Rumley. The court adjourned for lunch and re-convened in the law library at 1:00 o'clock to finish the agenda.

Richard Garza won first and set a record in the 3200-meter run with 10:31. He also picked up a first in the 1600-meter with a time of 4:57. Lionel Munoz was not far behind Garza in the two events, winning second in the 3200 with 10:32 and in the 1600 with 4:58.

Willie Payne came in first in the 200-meter run with 23.9, and picked up a third in the 100, with 11.5. Greg Fierro got a fourth place in the 300-meter hurdles with 43.0.

Valjejo, while winning the exciting 300 hurdles, also picked up a third place in the 110 hurdles. Marcelo Hernandez picked up a first place in the 800-meter run with 2:07.6, and a fifth in the high jump with 5'8".

Kelly Buckner was second in the 110-hurdles with 15.2, and Zeke Martinez managed a fifth with 17.0. Robert Flores was fourth in the 400 with a time of 54.2, and sixth in the 200. Carlos Borrego placed fourth in the 200 with a time of 24.6.

Santiago Lopez placed third in the shot, and Harvey Huereca placed fourth in the discus.

Acton wins stock show superbowl

Bobbie Acton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Acton took Grand Champion with her lamb last week at the Houston Livestock Show. The lamb sold at auction for \$63,000 to the "Big 5". This broke last year's world record by \$3,000.

Acton's Finewool Cross Lamb won the middle weight class and was later named Grand Champion of the show. The lamb was bred by Earl Acton.

Trebble West, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wesley West won Champion Heavy Weight Finewool. Her 128 pound lamb sold for \$100 per pound-\$12,000. The lamb was bred by Wesley West.

Crockett County 4-H members placed 17 of 29 lambs in the county by local ranchmen. Crockett County placed third in the County Group of 10 class.

Other members placing lambs were: Ira Childress, third light finewool sold for \$15.00 pound; Jena Allen, fifth heavy finewool sold for \$12.00 pound; Mike Couch, sixth place light weight crossbred; Bonnie Cameron, tenth light finewool; Capp Covington, twelfth middle weight finewool; Jody Everett, thirteenth light finewool; Julie Reagor, thirteenth middle crossbred; Tressa Crawford, fifteenth light crossbred; Will Mason, sixteenth middle finewool; Tammie Arrott, sixteenth heavy finewool; Will Seahorn, eighteenth light crossbred; Vickie Reagor, twenty-second middle finewool; Cody Sutton, twenty-second middle weight crossbred; Andy Stokes, twenty-third light crossbred; and Tammie Reagor, twenty-fifth middle finewool.

Court revokes probations

District Attorney Bill Mason told the Stockman today that numerous criminal hearings have been held within the last two weeks here in Ozona.

Danny Rivera of Ozona was sentenced to five years in the Texas Department of Corrections for a 1977 burglary committed here in Ozona. Mr. Rivera's probation for that burglary was revoked on a motion by the District Attorney's office.

Hector Etheridge, also of Ozona, was sentenced to a period of three years for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon May 23, 1979 and his probation was also revoked on a motion from the District Attorney's office. Both Rivera and Etheridge will serve the full length of their original sentence confined in the TDC at Huntsville.

Reuben DeLaCruise and Efrin DeLaCruise both pleaded guilty to theft over the value of \$200.00 and each received a two (2) year sentence in the TDC. Both defendants were working for Joe Bean at the time they committed the theft of Mr. Bean's pick-up truck.

Ruben Mendoza, of Ozona, pleaded guilty to burglary of a local business and was sentenced to five (5)

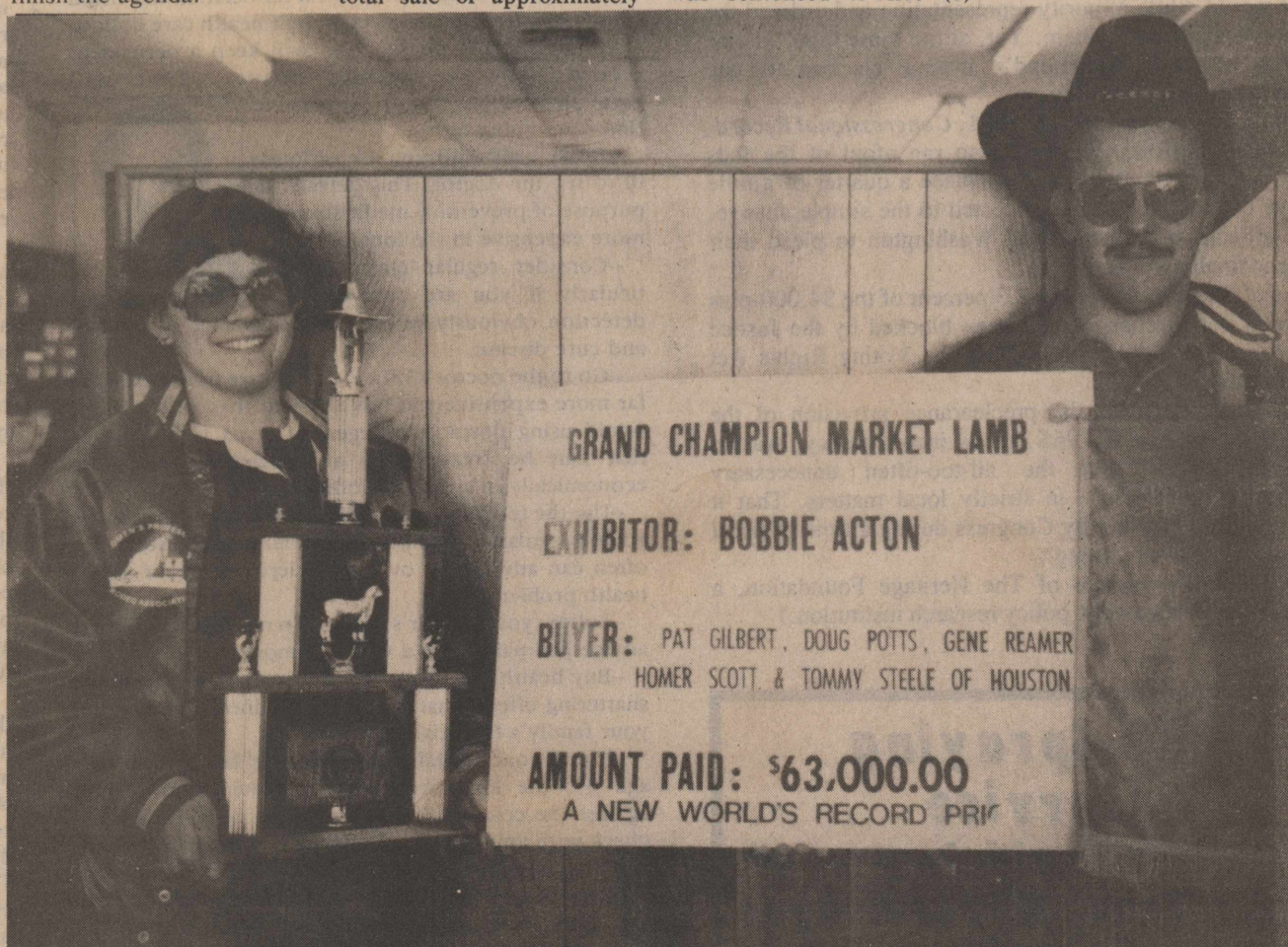
years probation including restitution for that offense. It was learned on the morning of the writing of this news release, Mendoza came to the end of his life in a stolen pick-up truck.

Mason further states that an Ozona youth offender was placed on probation by the Court for delinquent conduct. The youth had been arrested by Ozona deputies for burglary of a local fur-buyer's storage shed. The Court also ordered the youth to make full restitution to the victim, participate in controlled public service work, pay probation fees, and report regularly to the juvenile probation officer. One other youth was involved but has not yet come to trial.

In addition, several other probation revocations are presently pending and the Crockett County Grand Jury is continuing certain investigations. Mr. Mason commended the Crockett County Sheriff's Department for a job well done.

Debra Says

The 4-H sewing projects are in the process of organizing. There are still some 4-H members who do not have sewing leaders to help them. If you sew and would like to assist a small group of youths, please give me a call. Numerous articles are written on the relation of food additives and hyperactive children. According to a new report by the American Council on Science and Health, artificial food colors and flavors are not significant causes of hyperactivity in children. The report takes issue with a theory developed by a California pediatric allergist, Dr. Ben Feingold, who discussed it in two widely-publicized books.

The studies show "on the basis of these investigations, we can conclude that this theory, and the restricted diet based on it, are not the answer to childhood hyperactivity. With spring around the corner you may want to clean closets and update your spring clothes. One of spring's favorite themes is nautical. Middy tops, sailor colors, red, white, and blue striped boatneck tops are coordinated with pleated skirts.

Spring colors range from brights-lemon yellows, crisp white, turquoise green, exotic blue and ceromonal reds-to darks-ruby red and cinnamon, to pastels-sky blue, mist grey, sea green, and shell pink. Neutral colors-sage dust, banana, khaki, cornsilk, ivory, and bronze powder continue to be popular.

HONEY GLAZED BARS
1 cup sugar
2 cups flour, sifted
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon soda
1/4 cup cooking oil
1 egg, beaten
1 1/2 cups pecans, finely chopped
1/4 cup honey
Mix sugar, flour, soda and cinnamon. Add honey, oil, beaten egg and chopped pecans. Mix with electric mixer until ingredients are blended. Spread on greased 10 1/2 x 15 1/2 inch cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 12 minutes. Spread glaze on cookies while hot and cut. Makes 24 (2 1/2") cookies.
Glaze-1 cup powdered sugar, sifted; 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 1 1/2 tablespoons water, 1 tablespoon mayonnaise.
Mix sifted powdered sugar, vanilla, water and mayonnaise with electric mixer until well blended. Spread on hot Honey Glazed Bars.

PECAN ORANGE BREAKFAST RING
2 (12 oz.) cans refrigerated buttermilk biscuits
1/2 cup dark brown sugar
3 tablespoons grated orange rind
1 stick butter or margarine (Microwave 45 seconds on High to melt)
1 (3 oz.) pkg. cream cheese, softened by 10 seconds on High
1/2 cup powdered sugar
2 tablespoons orange juice
2 cup chopped pecans
Combine brown sugar, orange rind and melted margarine or butter. Separate biscuits and coat with butter-sugar mixture. Stand biscuits on sides, overlapping edges in a 9-inch microwave tube pan. Microwave on High for 4 minutes.
Remove ring from pan and invert on serving platter. Combine cream cheese and powdered sugar, mixing until smooth. Add orange juice and pecans, stirring well, spoon mixture over top while ring is hot. Serve bread warm.

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Again when the strong and unwelcome March winds hit us full blast, they discourage gardening, but let a beautiful calm day arrive and the windy days are forgotten.

Soon the flowering fruit trees, shrubs, and rebuds will be ready to put on their spring show, so we are hoping no freeze will prevent that this year.
After dust storms, if you will wash shrub foliage with a strong spray of water, you may prevent the appearance of red spider and other insects. Avoid insect spray as long as possible.

Continue to water shrubs, trees and grass if the dry weather continues, especially if a freeze is forecast.

Most established lawns get their initial spring mowing this month. Cut the grass as short as possible and rake up the clippings. Also, rake out any dead grass killed over the winter. This will allow easier movement of air, fertilizer, and water into the root zone. After mowing, apply a complete fertilizer such as 8-8-8 at the rate of 25 pounds per 1000 square feet of lawn area. In addition make an application of iron sulfate (copperas) or chelated iron if grass looks yellow. Keep grass well watered if no rain comes our way.

Wisterias will be starting to bloom soon and are one of the early favorites. This graceful vine has only a few cultural requirements if you are planting new one's. They need sunny or partially shaded location, a very light feeding each spring with a complete fertilizer. Since Wisteria needs strong support, it does best trained on an arbor where it can spread out without endangering other plants. Or you might have an old tree trunk to

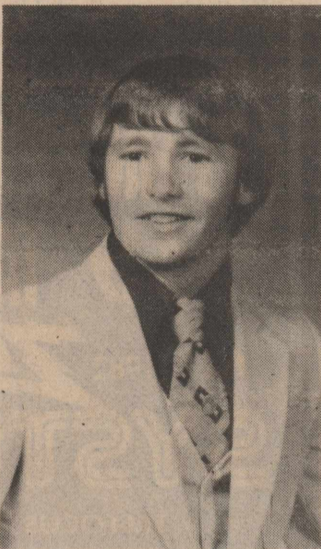
The state contest will be held in San Antonio on April 1 through the 3rd. The boys projects will be on display before they travel to state, and we want to wish them all luck in their state competition.

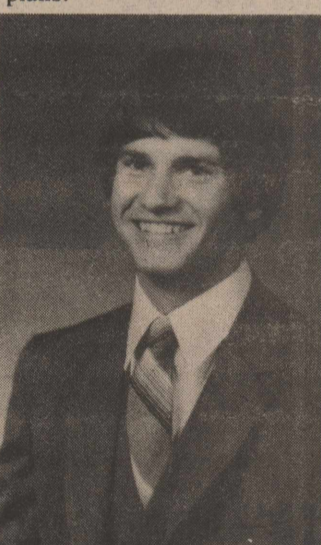


VARLYN ALDRIDGE

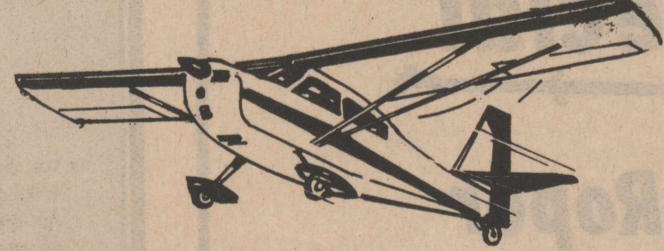

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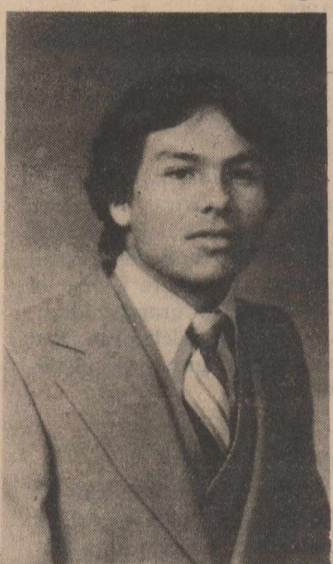

PBPA energy report

President Reagan has decided not to propose the decontrolling of natural gas prices during this politically volatile election year. After much discussion with allies and opposition from opponents the President announced Tuesday that his long-awaited decontrol bill would not be the best thing to do right now, citing a number of other bills that should be considered first. Higher gas prices and a windfall tax were other reasons, according to industry sources.

The world oil glut continues to drive down prices. Saudi Arabia says it will not reduce its production to 7.5 million barrels a day from the current 8.5 million. Analysts say the Saudis won't cut production because other countries might step in to fill the void and lose part of their market share. Some people think the Saudis would cut production in exchange for a lowering of the \$34 benchmark price. A special emergency OPEC meeting may be called in mid-March.

Liberals politicians and environmentalists have jumped on Interior Secretary James Watt's plan to ban drilling and mining on 80 million Federal Wilderness Area acres, but allow drilling on 40 million acres that are proposed as wilderness area. Watt says his department should have sole control over the 40 million acres.

In the Permian Basin our rig count for last week was 455. One year ago it was 398.
