Lions break more records as they continue to win

Records fell all over the place as the Ozona Lions literally raced to their third track victory in as many weeks in Eldorado Saturday. The Lions smashed six records as they continued to dominate the West Texas Track scene, and win the championship by a large margin. So far in the young season, the Lions have set 13 new records and seem well on their way to another great season.

With thirteen teams entered in the meet, the Lions rolled up 159 points for a clear victory. Sonora was in second place with 67 points, followed by Brady with 65. Menard was in fourth place

with 46 points. Llano was fifth with 39, Eldorado sixth with 34, and Reagan County seventh with 29.

The Lions will be in Sonora, Friday to try for their fourth consecutive victory for the season. Field events will begin at 2:30 with running prelims at 4:00. Finals are scheduled for 6:45.

The team and coaches appreciate the strong support of track fans this year and hope for a good turnout at Sonora. Lion fans in Eldorado, watching Larry Payne, and Richard Garza, along with sophomore Mark Vallejo, set five individual records, gave a standing ovation as the 1600-meter relay team of Robert Flores, Greg

Fierro, Vallejo and Payne topped off the meet with a fine 3:26.8 record performance.

Garza won the 3200 meter run with a time of 4:51.0. Vallejo set records in both hurdle events plus running a leg on the record-setting relay team. He won the high hurdles with a record 14.87 and the intermediate hurdles with another record 39.38. Payne won the 100 meter dash with a record setting 10.75 and set another record in the 200 meter dash with 22.17.

The 440 relay team of Felix Flores, Kelly Buckner, Greg Fierro and Willie Payne placed third in the 400 meter relay with 45.7. Arnold Rios placed fourth in the 3200 meter run with 11:10.5.

Buckner got a second place in the high hurdles with 14.88. Marcelo Hernandez and Gino Tambunga came in second and third in the 800 meter dash with times of

2:08.0 and 2:08.2, respectively.

Felix Flores got a sixth place in the 100 meter dash with 11:37 and Willie Payne was sixth in the 400 meter dash with 54.3. Robert Flores placed fourth in the 400 with 53.7. Greg Fierro came in third in the intermediate hurdles with 41.17. Carlos Borrego placed fifth in the 200 meter dash with 23.6. Terry Crawford placed fourth in the 1600 meter run with 4:53.5.

In field events, Payne placed second in the long jump with a leap of 20'4" and Harvey Huereca won the discus with a toss of 146'10". Marcelo Hernandez tied for third in the high jump with 6' flat, and Huereca placed sixth in pole vault with 11'6".

2 new coaches hired at OHS

Two new head coaches were approved for Ozona High School's new athletic department at the regular monthly meeting of the school board Monday evening.

The new head football coach is Don Abbott, who comes to Ozona from Mason where he has been head football coach for the past three years. Abbott is a former San Angelo Central assistant coach. During his three years at Mason his Mason Punchers were co-champs of their district, district and bi-district champs and last year were runners up to district champion Junction. His record in Mason is 30-12. Abbott will assume his new duties April 1.

Coach John Curry of Van Horn was approved for the position of head boys basketball coach. His Van Horn Eagles have been an annual sight in the basketball playoffs for the past fourteen years and won the state basketball championship last year.

Abbott replaces Don Sessions who resigned in Febru-

ary to enter private business. Curry takes over from Tommy Wilson, who also resigned in February to enter private business.

Abbott is a graduate of San Angelo High School and Howard Payne University. He coached at Lake View before going to San Angelo Central prior to his move to Mason. He, his wife, Dolly, and daughter, Terri, will move to Ozona the last of this month and he will begin his duties April 1.

Curry, a native of Seminole, his wife, Frances, and daughters, Shannon and Cullen, will move to Ozona this summer and he will assume his duties in the fall.

Coach Rip Sewell, who was recently appointed athletic director for Ozona High School, said "I'm real pleased with the selection of these two coaches; they are exactly what our program needs."

Sewell expects next fall's athletic program to be exciting and successful and welcomes Ozona fans to support their teams and help the two new coaches produce championship teams.

For addition to administration building-

School board oks specifications

The Crockett County School Board met Monday evening and approved specifications on the addition to the Administration Building as submitted by Louis Drake, architect, and plan to begin advertising for bids immediately. The bids will be accepted until 7:00 p.m. on April 21, 1982, and opened at 7:30 p.m. on the same evening. The Board, of course, reserved the right to refuse any or all bids.

The Textbook Committee report, as submitted by the Superintendent, was approved by the board.

Don Abbott of Mason was elected Head Football Coach/Teacher for Ozona High School. Coach Abbott and his wife Dolly, who was hired as an elementary teacher, plan to move to Ozona on April 1, 1982.

The Board also selected John Curry as the new Head Basketball Coach/Teacher for Ozona High School. Coach Curry and his family plan to move to Ozona this summer.

The position of Assistant Superintendent was created by the Board for the School District. The duties to be assigned as previously developed and altered as needed. Garland Davis of Austin, Texas was appointed Assistant Superintendent of the School District, assuming this position on June 1, 1982. Mr. Davis currently is serving as Administrative Assistant to the State Commissioner of Education, with previous experience as a teacher, elementary principal, high school principal and superintendent. He has a Bachelors and Masters Degrees from West Texas State University; with undergraduate majors in English/Speech and the Master Degree in School Administration.

Teacher contracts were renewed for the 1982-1983 school year. The principals of each of the four schools met with the Board making their recommendations. All teachers presented were renewed.

The Board also authorized additions to the curriculum in Junior High and High School. Plans are to add a Computer Science course (and the necessary equipment) to the High School curriculum. An Art program will include a beginning and advanced course in High School as well as an elective Art course in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades was approved.

Also approved was a change in the High School schedule which will permit an athletic period to be installed during the seventh period. The details and organizing of this activity to be done by the Administration. Using the last period as an athletic period will allow students to use this period to meet the requirements in Physical Education as well as permit the students to begin their athletic participation an hour earlier.

The Board decided to retain the Austin law firm of Doyal, Henslie, Hairston and Ryan who specialize in school law. This is to be done on a year to year basis. The Board also studied a

new contract "form" as proposed by the Superintendent and to be approved pending final legal approval as well as approval by the School Board President.

In other actions, the Board decided to sell, by bid, two 16-passenger 1974 Ford buses and one 1971 Dodge Van. Advertisements for bids to begin as soon as possible on these vehicles. The bid should be submitted by 7:00 p.m., April 21, 1982, and opened at 7:45 p.m. on the same evening.

The Board set teacher salaries at \$2,500.00 above the State scale for 1982-1983. The school district was \$2,000.00 above State scale for 1981-1982.

The Board also approved a bid for a new roof for the Library building by Herb Stephens Installation for \$10,458.24.

The Superintendent was given authority to proceed with steps to purchase two new buses through the State Agency, requesting one 59 passenger Chevrolet bus and one 35-passenger Chevrolet bus. It is hoped that an August delivery can be possible.

Natural causes ruled in death

Mrs. Gladine Kost, 63, was pronounced dead at her home here by Justice of the Peace A. O. Fields around 8:00 p.m. Monday night. Mrs. Kost apparently died of natural causes and had been dead approximately six hours when she was found in the bathroom of her home.

A friend of Mrs. Kost's became worried when she was unable to get her on the telephone and found her house locked without lights. Officials gained entry through a window of the home and made the discovery.

Funeral services for Mrs. Kost will be held Wednesday (today), afternoon at 3:00

p.m. at Ozona United Methodist Church, with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Sizemore Funeral Home.

Mrs. Kost was born Oct. 3, 1918 in Big Spring, the daughter of Fleet and Effie Gladine Powell Coates. She had resided in Ozona all her life, attended Ozona schools and was a graduate of Ozona High School.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Dick (Shirley) Kirby; two granddaughters, Karen and Kristy Kirby; two brothers, Bud Coates and Roy Coates, all of Ozona, and one sister, Mrs. Phillip (Joy) Schneemann of Fort Stockton.

MAKE IT MORE DIFFICULT FOR SOVIET SPIES

With the expulsion of Soviet Major General Vasily Chitov from the United States on charges of espionage, one would think the guardians of the Fourth Estate would cool their heels awhile before renewing their taunts of the Reagan administration's plans to make it somewhat easier for government officials to keep documents under wraps when national security is involved.

The changes proposed by the administration primarily involve those grey areas in which the classify/don't classify decision involves a flip of a coin. The Reagan administration would require government officials to classify documents as secret even "if there is reasonable doubt . . . about the need to classify information."

Though at first blush this might seem an arbitrary standard, it is no more so than that employed by the Carter administration, which ordered government officials in 1978 to "determine whether the public interest in disclosure outweighs the damage to national security that might reasonably be expected from disclosure."

The point is that the Reagan administration rules — despite the often irrational criticism in the nation's press — seem no less reasonable than previous rules. They might make it a bit more difficult for journalists to lay their hands on certain documents, but nobody ever said being a journalist was supposed to be easy.

More important, despite what some of my fellow typewriter jockeys would have you think, espionage is indeed a serious and continuing problem.

U.S. intelligence experts estimate that about 250 of the approximately 600 "diplomats" employed at the Soviet Embassy in Washington are involved in intelligence-gathering, still more at the Soviet mission to the U.N. Now understand — all of this is not illegal spying. Under current law, they have virtually the same freedom of information as Dan Rather. They walk in and ask for a report and an obliging bureaucrat hands it to them. In fact, that is exactly what has been going on at the General Accounting Office, where the former Soviet naval attaché is reported to have walked away with at least five classified or secret reports over the last couple of years, including documents on weapons systems and U.S. military readiness.

For a penetrating look at the world of Soviet espionage, I invite your attention to the March issue of *Reader's Digest*, where you will find a condensation of John Barron's upcoming spy thriller, *The Inheritor*.

Barron, author of an earlier best-seller, *KGB: The Secret Work of Soviet Secret Agents*, here takes us into the home of former Soviet agent Rudi Herrmann, following Herrmann's KGB odyssey across two continents: from Czechoslovakia to West Germany to Canada and eventually the U.S.

Yet it was not Rudi who the Soviet spymasters really were cultivating, because they knew Rudi, the immigrant with the heavy European accent, would never quite fit in. Instead, it was Rudi's son, Peter — "the inheritor" — who the KGB would groom to become a superagent.

The suspenseful and dramatic true-life story of Rudi and Peter Herrmann offers the kind of insight into the Soviet character that should give us pause before we complain too loudly about the Reagan administration's intelligence-tightening plans. While the administration must take care to avoid excesses, the Soviets don't need their job made any easier.

Mounting tensions in the world economy

Since early 1980, most of the industrial world has been in a recession. The United States and Canada are now in a slow-down. Western Europe has been particularly hard hit. This leaves Japan and Australia alone among the major industrial countries that have maintained relatively strong growth rates. The overall outlook for the industrial world, particularly Western Europe, is one of slow growth, rising unemployment and political difficulties.

The 1980-81 downturn in Western Europe was caused primarily by the delayed effects of the 1979 OPEC shock, the tight monetary policies that were instituted in response to energy price increases and escalating U.S. interest rates. The energy price shock led to a sharp falling-off in demand and production during the second half of 1980. The United States delayed, but did not avoid, the slide into recession by shifting to an expansionary monetary policy and by removing credit controls in mid-1980. Most of Europe did not enjoy a comparable recovery.

The European recession was led by West Germany, where the central bank went over to tight money in late 1979. In Japan, monetary policies were also restrictive, but the recession was less severe because the downward float of the yen enabled industrialists to respond to falling domestic demand by shifting to export markets. In Europe, on the other hand, central banks have consistently attempted to support exchange rates as an anti-inflation move, but the result has been to aggravate the economic downturn.

Budget policy also remains a major problem for Europe. During the recovery of 1976-1979, many European countries resorted to heavy government spending—in the face of high structural unemployment—in order to take up the slack in industries saddled with excess capacity after the 1973-74 rise in energy prices.

The result has been a mounting problem of heavy budgetary burdens. The public sector now averages about 50 per cent of the gross national product in Europe. Deficits as a share of GNP are reaching record levels, leading to a serious "crowding out" of private investment as governments have increasingly cut into capital markets to finance their borrowing requirements.

Will the current international recession be as severe as the 1974-75 downturn? Not likely, because there are several major differences between the two periods.

In 1974-75, price levels were driven up by OPEC developments, commodity price shocks and, in the United States, by removal of wage-price controls. Today, world energy prices are declining and inflation rates are decelerating.

In 1974, the recession was led by reduction of inventories, which had been overbuilt in the preceding boom. Today, inventories are at one of their lowest levels in several years.

In 1974-75, the recession hit all the major industrial countries at the same time. Today, both the stronger performance of Japan and Australia and the partial recoveries in the United States and Canada in late 1980 and 1981 should mitigate the threat of an internationally synchronized recession. Furthermore, the United States is now entering the most acute phase of its downturn while, throughout much of Western Europe, the recession shows signs of having "bottomed out," suggesting an eventual international recovery.

On the other hand, the current slowdown in Western Europe may be one of the longest of the postwar period. Growth rates have been slow since 1980 and the 1982 recovery promises to be weak, meaning that Europe will undergo three consecutive years of stagnation. Recent events in Poland add to the uncertainty of a sustained recovery.

All this has had adverse political effects in Europe. Many countries have recently undergone changes in government. In others, the political leadership is shaky, confronted with unstable parliamentary coalitions and widespread public dissatisfaction. There is an increased danger of a return to protectionism, and the European monetary system will be strained by the increasing divergence between countries relying on tight money and those attempting to stimulate their economies.

These economic and political circumstances are increasing tensions between the United States and its NATO allies over matters of trade, investment and defense.

Three developments are essential to reducing these tensions:

- continued reductions in government spending on both sides of the Atlantic in order to reduce the public sector's drag on private investment;
- continued support for free trade so that economic recovery is supported by increased exports; and
- the avoidance of economic restrictions on international investments that are far more important to Europe than to the United States.

Debra Says

With our spring-like temperatures, it's time to gear up for your spring vegetable garden. Gardening books are available at the Extension Office. Two important steps in gardening are getting the right varieties and planting at the right time.

Billy Reager is our garden and lawn specialist and can be very helpful with garden, lawn, and plant questions. Since such warm-season crops as tomatoes, peppers, corn, eggplants, beans, squash, cucumber, okra, watermelon, sweet potatoes, pumpkins and cantaloupes are sensitive to cold temperatures and can be killed by even the lightest frost, gardeners must be aware of the average date of the last frost for their particular areas.

According to the National Weather Service, the average dates of last frosts for our area is March 28-29. This date is an average which only means there is a 50% chance a frost may occur at a later date.

Mr. Reager recommends to wait until the soil has warmed before planting seeds of warm-season crops. Soil temperature at planting depth should be in the upper 60's or into the 70's to insure a good stand.

Some vegetable crops are cold-hardy and can tolerate light frosts or freezes. These include beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, peas, lettuce, onions, parsley, radishes, spinach, cauliflower, collards, mustard, kale and turnips. These can be planted in late winter or early spring.

Plant some warm-season crops in late spring as they will produce more high-quality produce. During the hot summer such heat-tolerant crops as southern beans, okra, eggplant, sweet potatoes, squash and small-fruited tomatoes do best.

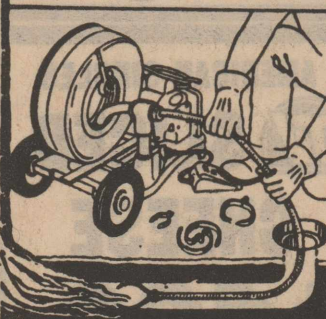

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Don't let the beautiful days of last week entice you into planting tender annuals that will not withstand a freeze. Remember Easter is sometime off and we very often have one if not before, so be prepared to cover if necessary. Many wait until Good Friday, April 9, or after Easter.

Cuttings may be rooted readily in an adequately drained box filled with sand or vermiculite, and covered with polyethylene plastic film. Also, they can be placed under a bell jar and kept moist.

Leaf cuttings of African violets, Rex begonias, Peperomias, Pickaback plants and others that can be propagated in this way, if inserted now, will give young plants that can be grown into nice, sizeable specimens by fall.

Plants that are not to be repotted will benefit from top-dressing with fresh, rich soil after as much as possible of the old surface soil has been removed as can be without doing too much damage to the roots.

You should take pride in your house plants when they are healthy, and attractive, and remain that way. If one of them should droop and die, we feel we have some how been negligent. Many of us are doomed to failure because of selecting prima donna varieties whose survival depends upon extra-special care and super growing conditions. To name several that usually respond to moderate care and there are others; Hay Carnosa (wax-plant), Cissus phombifolia (grape ivy), Plectranthus australis (Swedish ivy), Draecena marginata (madagascar dragon tree), Draecena deremensis (a sturdy plant), Philodendron selloum is a

good natured charmer, Dieffenbachia amoena, Chlorophytum (spider plant), Sansevieria (snake plant), Aechmea fasciata-a decorative bromeliad.

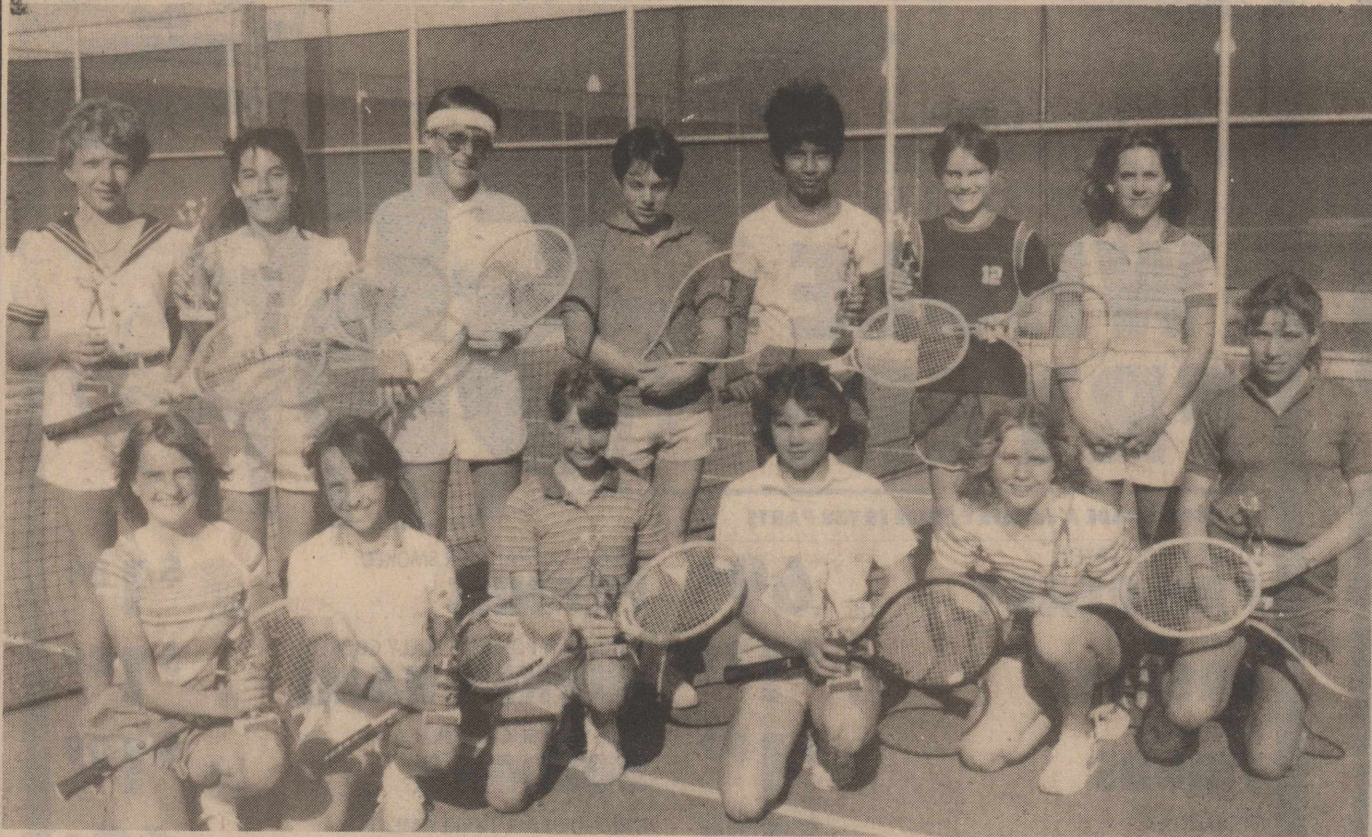

THE THRILL OF HAVING A GRAND CHAMPION

The thrill of having the Grand Champion lamb at the Houston Stock Show has probably died down for Bobbie and Marty Acton, but the memories will always be vivid in their minds.

The raising of a lamb is time consuming and takes patience and an extreme amount of effort. Most people believe that if one lamb can bring in so much money,

then why not go out and buy a whole pen full. Well, it is not that easy. Bobbie explained the steps in raising the lamb from birth up to the point when she won Grand Champion.

The lamb was born in February of 1981, and was chosen out of 100 other lambs. From then, the work really begins. It had to be fed and exercised daily. It also had to be placed on a blocking table where it stands for an hour a day while being watched. Bobbie explained that she had to practice showing it before the competition.

Bobbie's hectic week began Monday, March 1, at 3:00 a.m. when she and the other participants from Ozona left for Houston. After arriving in Houston, Bobbie had to get her lamb entered and weighed. After weighing, her lamb was entered in the medium weight class.

On Tuesday, the day before the showing, everyone inspected their sheep. The tension must have been creeping up for Bobbie and others because the action was about to begin.

When Wednesday rolled around, the show started at 8:00 a.m., but Bobbie, like others, was tending to her lamb long before 8:00 a.m. She was informed that the lamb had to be placed on the blocking table so that the wool on the lower part of the lamb's legs could be fluffed, corded out, and trimmed. When asked why this procedure was taken, Bobbie said that it made the lamb look better. After being taken off the table, the show began.

The contestants lined up in three lines. The judge went through and picked out thirty lambs. Numbering from 30 on down, he reached a decision on the top ten. The top ten lambs had to walk around the ring so that the judge could get a better view. By this time, Bobbie said that the excitement was building up. When the judge reached the last three, Bobbie explained that her lamb got away from her, but she quickly got it back. Finally, it was narrowed down to the last two and before Bobbie knew it, she had won the semi-finals.

On Thursday, which was the very big day, Bobbie said that she went through the same procedures in getting her lamb ready. She also explained that she went through the same routine of showing her lamb that she had done the day before. The judge went through and felt and talked about each lamb. He said that Bobbie's lamb handled like a dream. He also stated that he would go through and shake everyone's hand and not to get excited until he shook your hand a second time. Before Bobbie could realize what was happening, the judge was shaking her hand and kissing her cheek and mobs of people were hugging her, while tears of joy were rolling down her face.

After all of the excitement, pictures, interviews, and T.V. appearances were made, everyone celebrated that night at the Fisherman's Wharf in Houston.

The selling of the stock

began at 2:00 p.m. on Friday. Before taking the lamb to the sale, Bobbie stated that she took her sheep to a beauty salon for sheep. She also said that it looked better after it went to the salon. Bobbie was first to sell her lamb. She said that during the auctioning of her lamb, she kept thinking get higher, higher. Finally her lamb sold for \$63,000 to the "Big 5" which broke a record for being the highest price paid for a lamb at the Houston show.

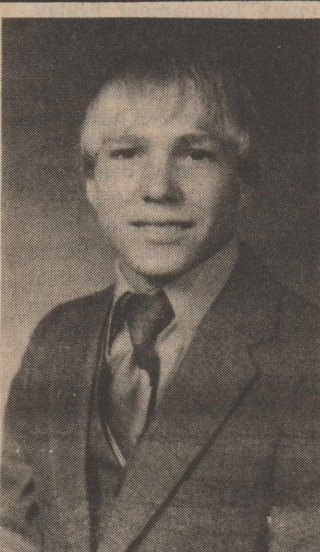
Her lamb also broke two other records which included being the first cross-bred lamb to win Grand Champion at a major show and the first medium weight lamb to win in Houston.

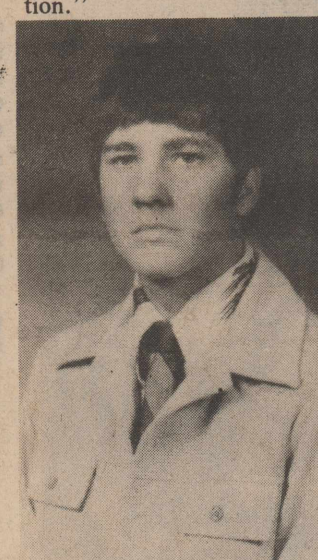

When asked about her future plans, Kathy stated, "I plan to work over the summer and go to Schreiner College in Kerrville, Texas. My major will be banking and business administration."

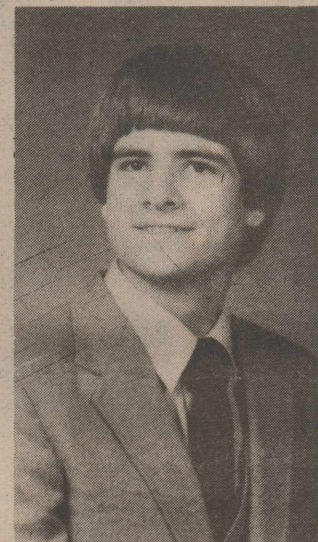


DUGAN O'BRYANT

The staff at the hospital asks that residents please observe these hours in order that the patients may be better served.

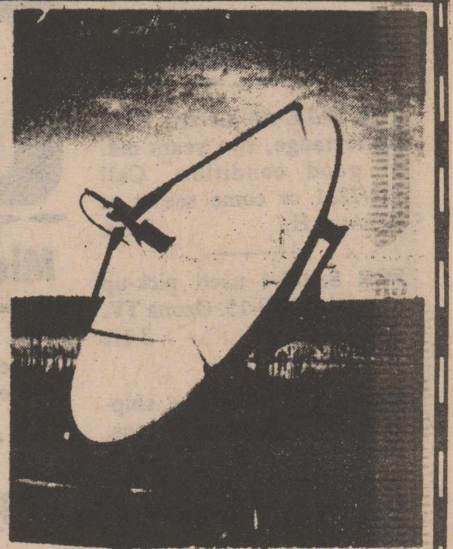

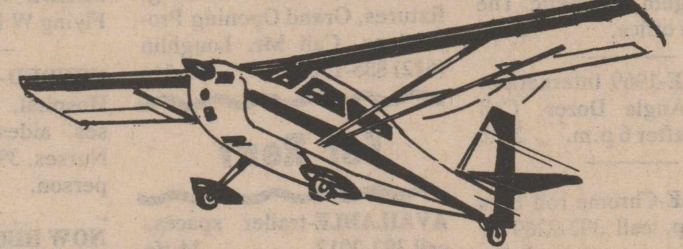

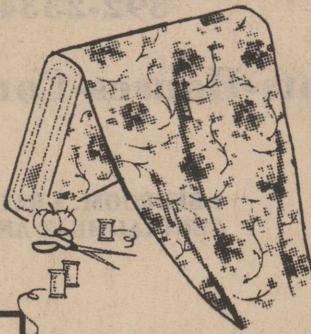
