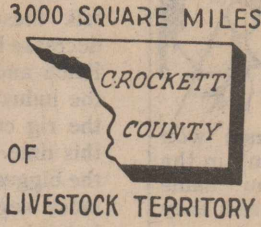

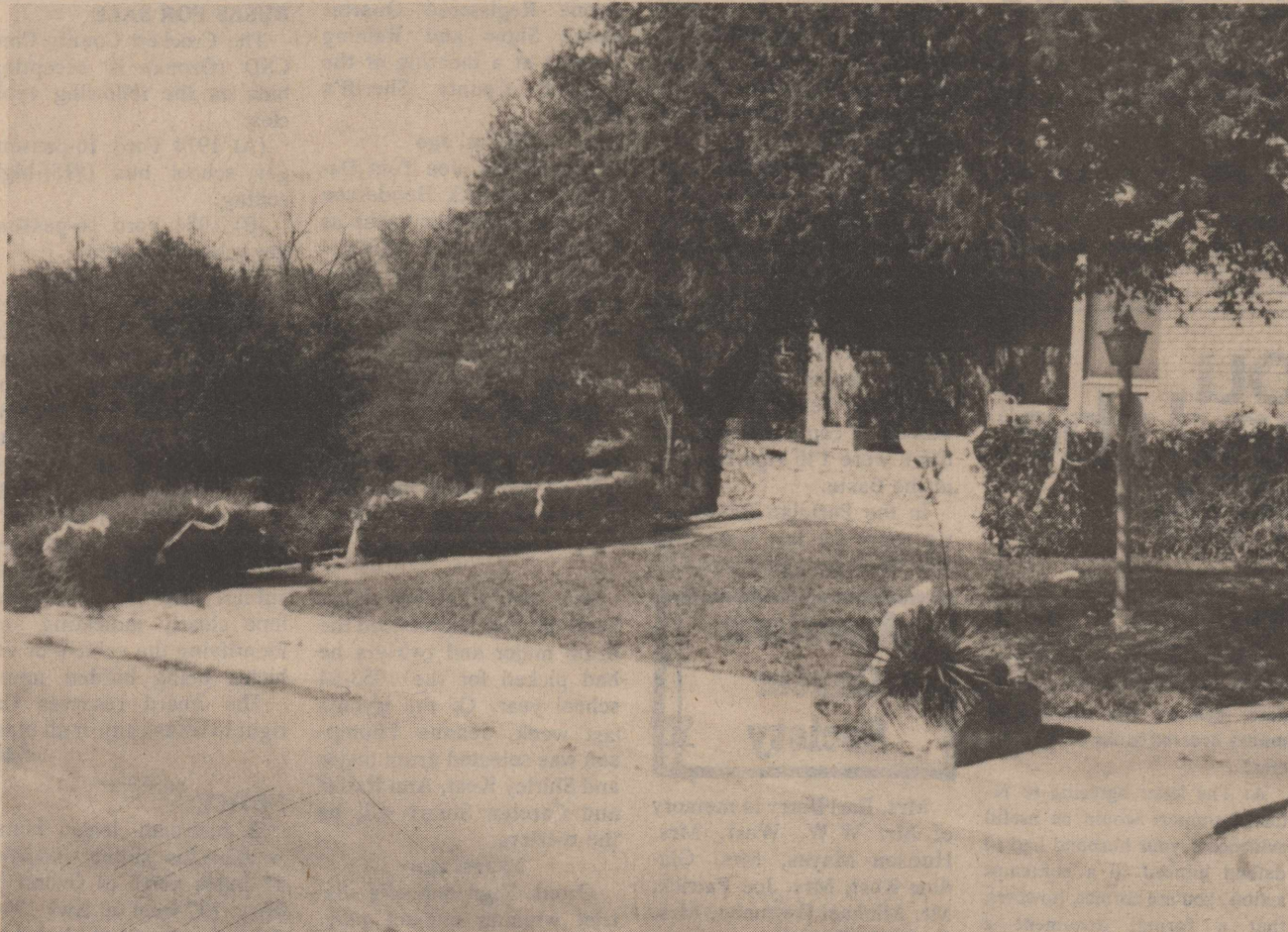
## Cameron appointed to board

## Lions breeze through to win 30th Annual Relays

It was no contest on a windy, dusty field Friday as the Ozona Lions hosted the 30th Annual Ozona Relays and won 14 out of the 15 events. The Lions smashed six records on their way to piling up 300 points for their 14th straight meet victory. McCamey was a distant second with 79 points, followed

by Coahoma for third with 61½ points, Crane with 44½ points, Iran with 24 points, and the Ozona JV came in for sixth with 17 points scored. The meet was highlighted by a visit from longtime Ozona School Superintendent L.B.T. Sikes, who was made honorary referee for the event. Another highlight was

the election of the track queen and track beau. Elsa Fierro is this year's track queen with Lana Cole and Vicky Vargas, her attendants. Richard Garza was selected for track beau by the girls track team. The presentations were made Friday afternoon prior to the running finals.

Richard Garza continued his brilliant track career by winning the 3200 meter run with a record-breaking 10:15.9 and the 1600 meter, where he also broke a record with 4:44.04.

Both relay teams captured first place and set new records. The 440 team of Felix Flores, Larry Payne, David Badillo and Willie Payne turned in a record-setting performance with 44.19. The 1600 relay team of Larry Payne, Marcelo Hernandez, Mark Vallejo and Greg Fierro, turned in a record-setting 3:27.01.

Larry Payne starred in the 440, broke the record and won with a sizzling 49.27. He also came in second in the long jump with a leap of 19'.

Mark Vallejo was the other record-setter. He won first place in the 300 hurdles with a time of 39.21. He won first in the intermediate hurdles with 15.24, and came in third in the long jump with 18'11".

David Badillo was another first place winner with a 12' mark in the pole vault. He came in third in the 400 with 52.30.

Willie Payne also chalked up two first-place wins for the Lions. He won first in the 100-meter dash and first in the 200-meter, with times of 11.39 and 23.67 respectively.

Marcelo Hernandez got two first places and a second. He won the 800-meter with 2:01.48 and the high jump with 6' flat. His second place came in the 400-meter with a time of 52.21.

Harvey Huereca won first place in the shot put and the discus, came in third in the pole vault and fourth in the high jump. This added to the Lions' points and for the first time this year, put the Lions ahead in field events.

Other Lions adding points were Arnold Rios, third in the 3200-meter; Al Ramirez

fifth in the pole vault and sixth in the 3200-meter; David Delgado, second in the 800-meter dash; Fabian Delgado, third in the 800; Greg Fierro, second in the 300-hurdles and third in the intermediate hurdles; Robert Flores, second in the 100-meter dash and third in the 200. Carlos Borrego, fourth in the 100 and 200 dashes; Ernie Borrego, fourth in the hurdles and sixth in the long jump; Terry Crawford, second in the 1600 meter run and Jack Thompson, third; Cat Villarreal, second in the shot and fifth in the discus; Santiago Lopez, third in the shot; David Tijerina, second in the discus.

The Lions will be in Kermit for another meet Friday, and be heavy favorites to win. The meet starts at 2:30 and the finals will be held at 7:00 p.m.

The District Meet will be held in Ozona, April 22, with afternoon and night finals.

## Mitchell wins in school election

Gary Buck Mitchell won a spot on the Crockett County School Board in the election Saturday for two trustees, and two other candidates are facing a run-off for the other spot April 28.

Mitchell tallied 280 votes to secure a place on the board. Terry Lee and Robert Flores each polled 252 votes to qualify for a run-off.

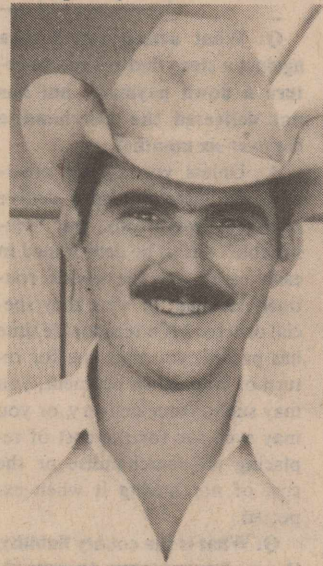
The school board was called into session Monday night at 7:00 p.m. to accept the election results as canvassed by election officials. Mitchell was certified the uncontested winner of one spot and a run-off election between Robert Flores and Terry Lee was called to fill the remaining vacancy. The run-off election was set for April 28.

Voting in the run-off will take place at the law library in the courthouse, Wednesday, April 28. Absentee voting will be held at the school administration office at 797 Ave. D, beginning Tuesday, April 13, provided ballots are delivered in time, and continue through Friday, April 23. All absentee voting will be done during the hours of 8 a.m. until noon and 1 p.m. through 4 p.m.

The board appointed Steve Kenley as election judge for the April 28, election, and Mae Lay as judge for absentee. The two names were drawn for places on the ballots. Terry Lee drew the first spot on the ballot with Flores' name next.

Voters who have not met the registration requirements will not be eligible to vote in the special school board election, as the law requires a voter be registered at least 30 days prior to casting ballots in any election. Several voters who registered recently and will be eligible to vote in the Democratic Primary, will not be eligible to vote in the school board election.

New members of the school board do not take office until May.

Bob Childress received 194 votes; Rudy Martinez, 164; Reid Holmsley, 158, and Jim House, 150.

A total of 629 voters braved high blustery winds to cast ballots at the courthouse Saturday, while 119 voted absentee, bringing the total number of voters to 748.

With the incumbents, Joe Bean and Sam Perner, declining to run for re-election, the field of candidates was quite large. Seven men filed for the two places for three-year terms.

Mitchell, local rancher and father of three, is an Ozona native and a graduate of Ozona High School. He will be one of the youngest school board members to take office.

Terry Lee, an employee of Texaco, Inc., is the father of two school students and has actively campaigned for the position.

Robert Flores, local Shamrock Station owner, is a native Ozonan and has three children in the school system.

## Sims announces for State Senator

Citing his lifelong association with West Texas and his desire to contribute to the area's continued growth and well-being, Bill Sims of San Angelo has authorized the Stockman to announce his candidacy for the Texas Senate, 25th District.

The seat is held by Senator W.E. (Pete) Snelson, now a candidate for State Land Commissioner.

Sims, 50-year-old native of Paint Rock, said his work and travel as executive secretary of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association for the past 16 years has provided him with a thorough knowledge of the needs of all the 38 counties in the senatorial district.

"The 25th District encompasses a large part of Texas geographically, so it is very important that we work now to meet our present needs and to plan ahead to meet future needs," he said.

Sims, a member of the Advisory Committee on Pollution of the Texas Water Resources Commission, be-

lieves water supply and conservation is an important issue to all residents of the district. "We have the land necessary to support future growth, but we need to seriously work toward development of our water supply and conservation of our present supply," he stated. "If elected, this will be one of my primary efforts in behalf of the district and the State."

"The petroleum industry and agribusiness remain two primary contributors to the economy of the 25th District, and I plan to do everything possible to keep both these industries growing," he said.

With a great amount of federal responsibility being returned to individual states, Sims believes the State Legislature will be faced with new responsibilities for establishment and administration of new programs. "Establishment of these programs to meet the needs of Texans is a serious responsibility for the Legislature,"

Prior to his appointment he was Judge of the 41st District Court in El Paso for almost 15 years. In 1981, an El Paso Bar Association survey rated Schulte the top State District Court Judge in El Paso.

Judge Schulte graduated from Ysleta High School in El Paso where he served as

president of the student body and vice-president of the El Paso Inter-School Council.

He enlisted in the Air Force in World War II, served overseas, and was discharged a sergeant. Returning to college, he earned his BA degree at the College of Mines in El Paso (UTEP), and thereafter obtained his law degree at the University of Texas in Austin. While at the University, he was Justice of the Tom Clark Chapter of the Phi Alpha Delta Legal Fraternity and a Distinguished Military Graduate, Air Force ROTC.

## BILLION DOLLAR BOY SCOUTS

President Reagan's pitch for voluntarism has run into some big league "Doubting Thomases" who argue, quite correctly I think, that you can't expect the private sector to fully make up for the cuts being made in government social programs.

One study by the Urban Institute, commissioned by Independent Sector — an umbrella group of charitable and other non-profit organizations — actually predicts that the Reagan Revolution will clobber the charities financially just when they are being called upon to expand their activities.

The prospects would appear dim indeed, were it not for several interesting facts the doomsayers ignore — namely: that many government social programs have been a huge waste of time and money (and, therefore, need not be replaced by charitable substitutes), and that the charitable sector is capable of operating at just a fraction of the cost of government, relying, as it does, on sweat and elbow grease instead of money.

This point was driven home in a most dramatic fashion in a recent study conducted by The Foundation for Private Sector Initiative.

The study took a look at the Boy Scouts of America — a rather typical non-government social program that relies almost entirely on volunteer labor, rather than paid administrators, and whose meetings are held in living rooms and rec rooms and church and synagogue basements across the country, none of which, presumably, cost the U.S. Treasury a cent. (With a little imagination one can think of dozens of "critical" government-funded programs — from Head Start to day care — that could be operated similarly.)

The study showed that if bureaucrats donned green uniforms and tried to organize hikes, cookouts and camping trips, it would cost taxpayers nearly \$7 billion annually.

The study compared the cost of the Boy Scouts as a largely volunteer organization with the hypothetical cost of exactly the same program run by the government. One of the biggest areas of cost savings is in salaries. The study took the average amount of hours worked per year for each type of leader, multiplied this by the number of each type of leader nationally, assigned each job a reasonable rate of pay (none of it exceeding \$7 per hour) and presto — the total annual cost of a government-run program would be \$4,534,932,800, in salaries alone.

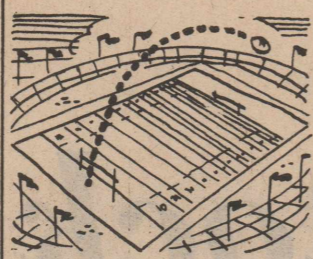
A side-by-side comparison of the cost of a voluntary agency versus a government agency tells the story most effectively:

Salaries .....	\$4,534,932,800	0-
Administration, overhead, pension funds, and fringe benefits .....	1,360,479,600	0-
Plant and equipment .....	968,435,040	0-
National office operations .....	19,000,000	19,000,000
Total costs .....	6,882,847,440	19,000,000

As Congress and the administration continue to flesh out the logistics of returning more control to state and local governments and the private sector they would do well to remember organizations like the Boy Scouts and Salvation Army — organizations that have demonstrated not only that the private sector can do it cheaper, but also that concerned citizens can indeed provide needed services without federal intervention.

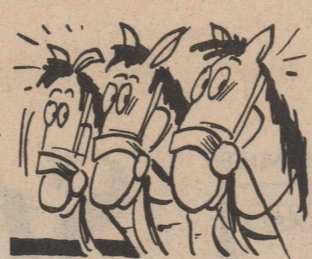

Q: What action can I take against a store that refuses to return a down payment, but has not delivered the merchandise for over six months?

A: Unless you agreed otherwise, the merchant must deliver in a reasonable time, but "reasonable" has to be determined in each case. Are the goods routinely stocked, or were they special ordered? If a reasonable time has passed, you may sue for return of your down payment, you may sue to force delivery, or you may even sue for the cost of replacing the merchandise or the cost of not having it when expected.

Q: What is the county liability, if any, for property damage resulting from extreme water runoff from a county road?

A: Under the doctrine of sovereign immunity, a governmental unit is not liable for property damage that results from negligence of the county or its employees. The property owner may sue for relief in only two situations. If the water creates a nuisance that interferes with use of the property, he may sue to force the county to correct the road. Second, if actual damage is caused by unreasonable interference with his property, he may sue for depreciated market value, costs of repair, or damage to crops and land.

Q: Several years ago I sold a piece of property, financing it myself. Soon the amount owed me on the property will be completely paid off. Can you tell me what I need to do to close out the deal?

A: You may notify the buyer the amount and date due of the final payment and to what address it should be sent.

It will be to the buyer's advantage—and therefore it should be at his expense—to have you give a Release at that time. This would remove any liens you may have retained on the property, and the Release will be filed in the Deed of Trust records.

Again, it is in the buyer's interest, not yours, to arrange for a receipt and a release if needed.

Q: During the football season, the TV announcers say "Any recreation or reproduction of this game without the expressed consent of the National Football League is prohibited". Does this mean I cannot tape record any of the game on my home video recorder?

A: A United States District Court recently held that "non-commercial home use recording of material broadcast over the public airwaves does not constitute copyright infringement." This case, however, is now on appeal, so the issue is still unresolved. In addition, the ruling applied only to video taping publicly available broadcasts. We have not yet had any decisions on home video taping of cable or pay TV broadcasts.

Q: At the time of divorce, my husband agreed to send his former wife \$250 a month child support. Now, three years later, an employee cutback forced him to take a job that pays much less. In a letter, his former wife agreed to reduce support to \$150. My question is: is the former wife's agreement letter a legal document, or can she, at some later date, demand the amount of money ordered in the divorce decree?

A: The letter agreeing to reduced support would be useful evidence if your husband had to defend himself in a contempt action. You are correct, however, that a formal document—a Modification of the Prior Order—must be entered in the Court's file to set support at the new level.

## BPBA Energy Report

There's a lot of news and talk these days about the decrease in activity in the Oil Patch and what it means to the industry. While it's true the rig count is down from this time last year, 1981 was the biggest year on record for most segments of the oil industry.

First of all, there is a traditional slump that occurs during the first quarter of each year, except the record-breaking 1981. The weather and certain financial considerations account for the 1st quarter slowdown.

Second, there is the worldwide oil glut that has forced down oil and gasoline prices. This, in turn, has made investing in production less attractive because drilling and operating costs continue to go up as the price for oil goes down.

Other factors include continued high interest rates and what some people say was the building of too many rigs last year.

For comparison purposes, oil was \$7.50 a barrel in 1975 and we had 267 rigs running in the Permian Basin that same year. Ten years ago, oil was \$3.40 cents a barrel and there were 145 rigs running in the Basin.

In the Permian Basin our rig count for last week was 392. One year ago it was 425.

## Error in SS number delays tax refund

To avoid federal tax refund delays persons who changed their names last year, such as newlyweds, should report the new name to their local Social Security Administration (SSA) office. The name and number on tax returns must match those of the SSA, the Internal Revenue Service said. Incorrect Social Security numbers and addresses slow up processing of tax returns and can delay federal tax refunds.

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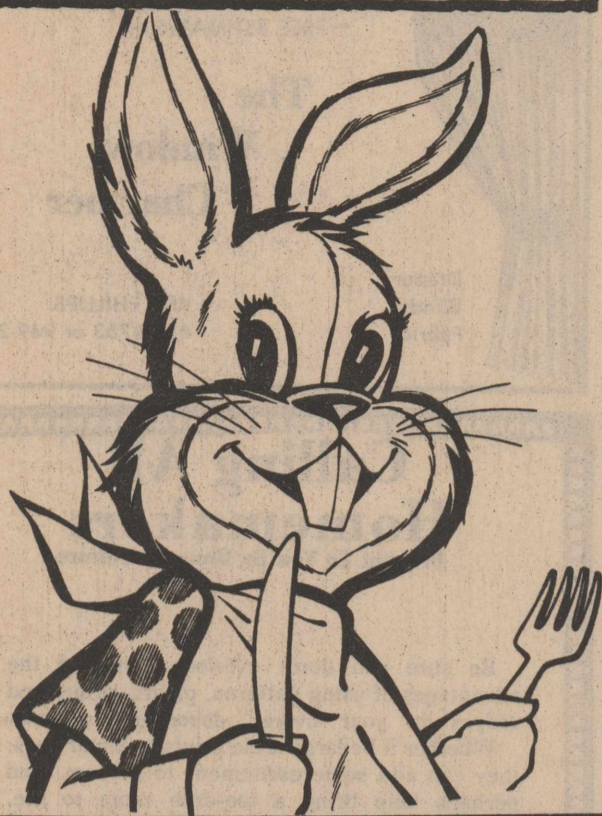

**Tips for Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Since our area has been dry for sometime now, I hope we can enjoy the old saying of "April Showers Bring May Flowers," for a good soaking rain would certainly be most welcome.

April brings no let up in garden work for usually there is more to be done now than in any previous month.

If you want a quick colorful cover for your fences and trellises consider planting hybrid morning glories. Also they make attractive hanging baskets under trees or the patio. They are the most colorful and easily grown of all the annual vines. Plant in garden loam of moderate fertility and they will produce flowers most abundantly in soil that is not too high in nitrogen. They will tolerate hot, dry areas. If you soak them in warm water for 2 hours or nick the coating, they will show leaves in a few days after planting. Leave only the most vigorous plants. Early Call Rose, thrives in the hottest driest spot in the garden and the huge deep rose trumpets bloom profusely all summer. Pearly Gates is the best white and Heavenly Blue is still very popular.

All dead and diseased leaves on iris should be removed if you haven't done so already. The soil should be stirred lightly to help retain water, but don't disturb the roots. An insect spray now will help prevent damage to blooms later.

If your peonies are putting on buds and you want to enter them in the April 22 flower show keep the ones you want disbudded for specimens. Also keep watered if no rain. Gift pots of Easter lilies keep longer if they are placed in a cool room at night. Keep plants moist but not wet. After the flowers fade, cut back the plant 3 or 4 inches and transplant out doors. They will continue growing outside, but the annual flowering date will be later than the forced plants.

Members please take note of the April 12, garden club meeting at the Civic Center for workshop in preparation for flower show, and bring sack lunch.

Sixty to 80 million Americans are overweight. Overweight is an epidemic. Fad diets are becoming a big business in our nation. Americans spend billions of dollars on fad diets, pills, supplements and books in hopes of losing enough weight to become attractive, healthier, sexier, and younger looking. Losing weight quickly can be harmful to your health. Safe diet plans recommend to lose not over 2 pounds each week.

A fad diet is any diet concept that remains unproven scientifically to successfully and harmlessly lose weight. One type of fad diet used by many people today is the "crash diet." This is called the "yo-yo syndrome" because one quickly takes off the weight, returns to old food habits and regains the weight. Some people are successful at losing weight in a short time but seldom are able to keep off extra pounds over the long run.

The low-carbohydrate diet is another fad approach to losing weight quickly. Dieters, may go into Ketosis, an abnormal condition which can lead to coma or death.

Another area concern in fad dieting is the use of megadoses of vitamins to improve health. Large amounts of fat-soluble vitamins A and D become stored in the body and can be toxic.

Often times, arthritis patients follow fad diets in an attempt to relieve pain. The American Arthritis Association says there is no cure for the disease and that some diets may be harmful to the individual. Some common fad diets used by arthritis patients are: honey and vinegar, large amounts of vitamins, modified crash diets, and eating only fresh fruit.

Arthritis patients are recommended to eat a balanced diet and maintain a normal weight.

One way to recognize a fad diet is by comparing the diet with the basic four food groups. The nutrition specialists recommend and we have 2 servings of milk, 2 meat, 4 fruits and vegetables, and 4 breads and cereals each day. If any diet eliminates one of the groups or recommends an excessive amount of one of the groups it is not healthy.

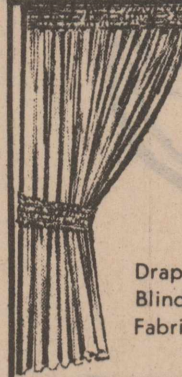

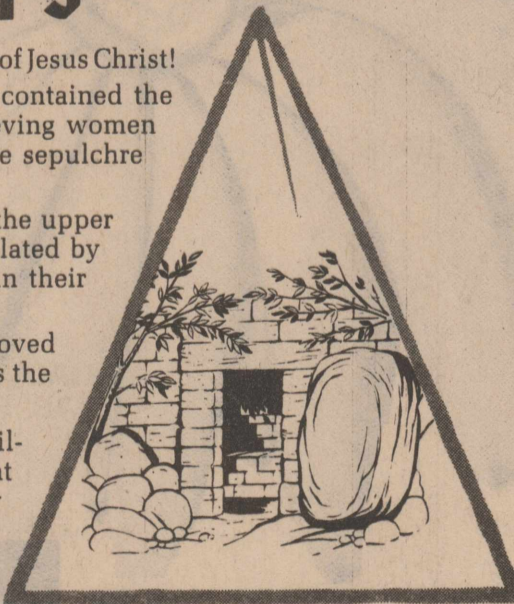

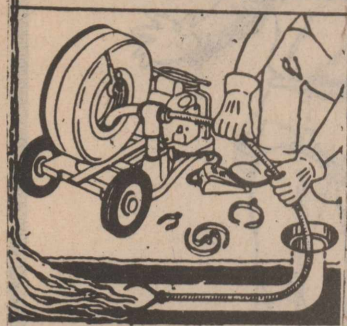

Anyone interested in receiving assistance through cost shares should make an application through the ASCS office. The application will be reviewed by the County Committee in the May 4, meeting. In order to receive cost shares for aerial spraying an approved chemical must be used. The farmer or rancher must agree in writing to defer the area from grazing for three consecutive months following the

spraying.

There are still some funds available for other conservation practices such as water development, cross fence and mechanical shrub control.

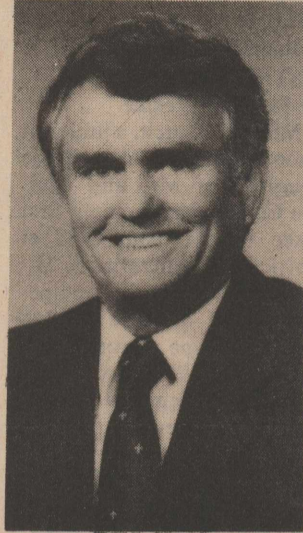

One such Italian dish, risotto—made with rice base, broth, seasoning and meat or fish—is ideal to serve to a large number of people.

This food is fairly economical if you choose fish, since just one and one-half pounds of fish serves six people, she points out.

In addition, fish has the advantage of being high in protein and low in saturated fats, Hegen says.

### FISH RISOTTO

- 1 1/2 pounds cooked fish
- 1 cup long grain rice (not instant)
- 1/2 cup sliced green onions and tops
- 1/4 cup cooking oil
- 1 can (10 3/4 ounces) chicken broth
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- Dash of pepper
- 1/2 package (10 ounces) frozen peas, thawed
- 1/2 cup sliced, pitted ripe olives
- 1 jar (2 ounces) chopped pimientos

Flake the fish that has been baked, broiled or poached and set aside. Heat rice and green onions in oil in large skillet or Dutch oven, stirring constantly. Add and cook over low heat for 15 minutes or until rice is tender. Add fish and remaining ingredients. Cover and cook over low heat five minutes or until mixture is heated throughout. Makes six servings.
