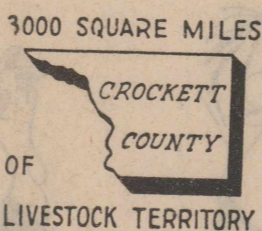

Moew was employed as a repairman with the General Telephone Co. in Ozona and had been a resident here nearly two years.

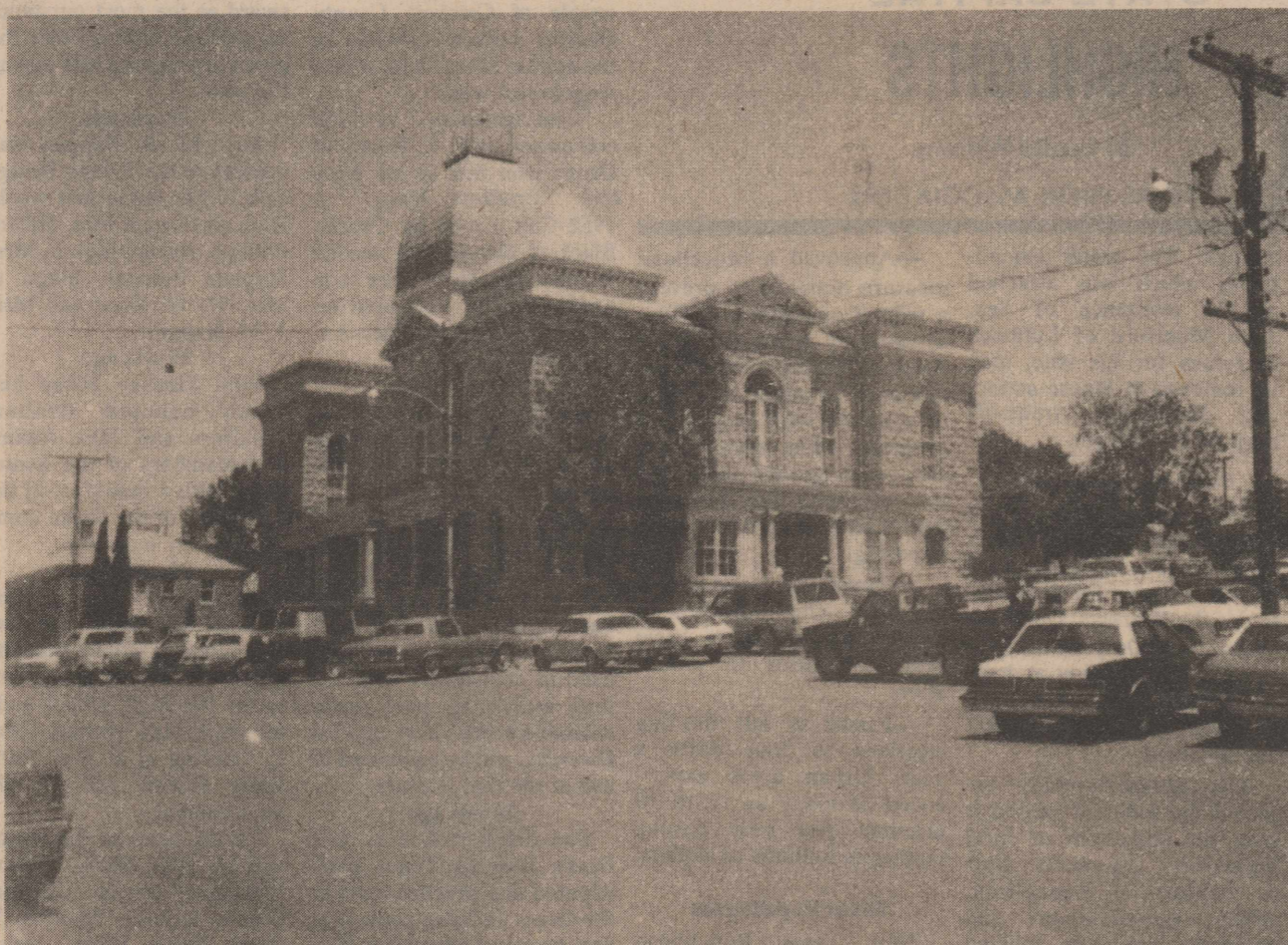
Funeral services will be held in Bandette, Minnesota, Wednesday, it was reported to friends here.

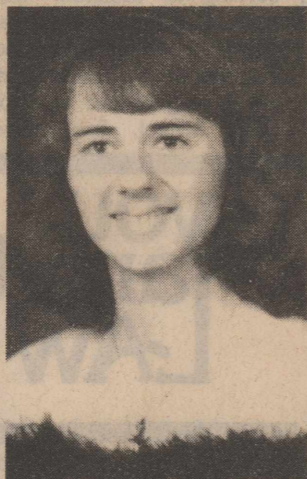

# Couch and Rios top 1983 senior class

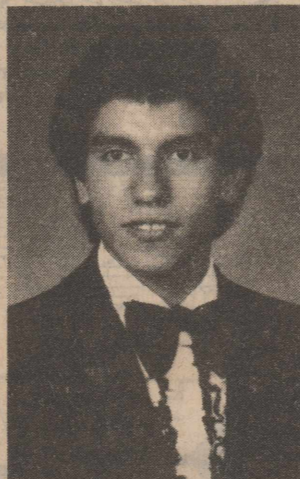

Selection of a jury to hear the capital murder trial of Michael Eugene Sharp, charged with the murder of Brenda Kay Broadway near Kermit on June 11, 1982, got under way here Monday morning in the district courtroom, with District Judge James Clack of the 109th district court, presiding.

A jury panel of 153 persons had been summoned the past week from which it

## Trial brings TV cameras to Ozona

Television cameras provided an unusual sight in Ozona this week as a result of the statewide interest in the ongoing capital murder trial here of Michael Eugene Sharp, on a change of venue from Kermit, Texas, where he is charged with the murder of Brenda Kay Broadway 31, in Kermit, June 11, 1982.

TV stations KVID, Midland, and KRBC, San Angelo and Abilene were present on the opening day of the trial. Pictures of the Ozona court scene and some shots around town were shown on the Midland station at the evening news time Monday night. Included was a shot of the KVID news lady holding a copy of The Ozona Stockman showing the Stockman's front page containing a headline story of the trial opening. The news reporter said that although the local paper had a big headline story on the trial, both the defense and prosecution agreed that a fair trial could be had here.

from Kermit. Prosecuting the case will be District Attorney Mike Fistell, assisted by Winkler County Attorney Steve Taliaferro.

Sharp was convicted and sentenced to life in prison for the murder of Mrs. Broadway's 8-year-old daughter, Christie Michele Elms, whose body, along with that of her mother, was found in a shallow grave about 11 miles southeast of Kermit. Mrs. Broadway and her two daughters, Christie Michele, and 14-year-old Selena Kay Elms, were allegedly kidnapped from a car wash in Kermit at 1:30 a.m. Selena Kay escaped from her captor and ran naked, five miles across a pasture to an oil drilling rig where she reported the attack on her mother and sister.

When several members of the jury panel failed to appear Monday morning at 9 o'clock, Judge Clack dismissed the rest of the panel until 1 p.m. after calling the roll and instructing the veniremen on what to expect. Back at 1 o'clock, the court heard various juror's pleas to be excused from service and before again dismissing the prospective jurors until Tuesday, advised them that the panel would be divided into groups of ten, according to the numbers, for examination each day until the panel is exhausted.

## Four-year-old Ozona boy drowns in Pecos

A four-year-old Ozona boy, Joseph Paul Castaneda Jr., and a 7-yr.-old Iraan lad, Dominick Aguilar, were drowned Saturday afternoon when they stepped into a deep hole while wading in the Pecos river near Pandale. The children were enjoying a weekend outing with members of their families.

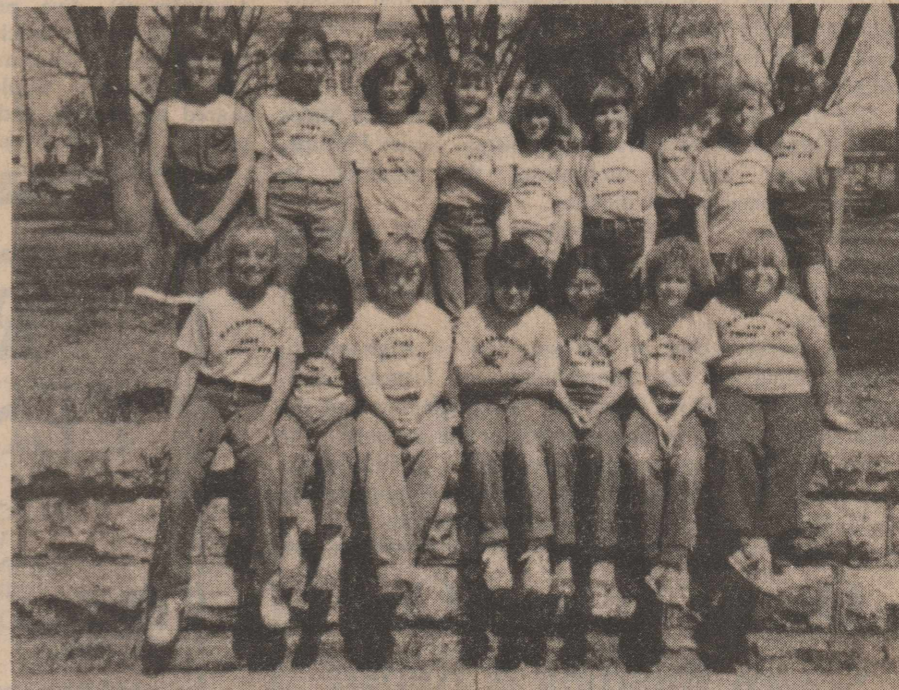
Joseph Paul is the son of Tommie Castaneda of Ozona and Gabriel R. Castaneda of Iraan. The boy lived with his mother in Ozona.

The boys were pronounced dead at the scene by Peace Justice Fred Brockwell of Del Rio. Aguilar's body was transported to James Dennis Funeral Home of Iraan and Castaneda's body was brought to Sizemore Funeral Home of Ozona. Funeral arrangements were pending the first of the week.

The boys were wading in a shallow water near the Everett Store, about 8 miles south of Pandale, when they stepped into a hole estimated to be about 9 feet deep, with sheer cliff-like walls.

The Aguilar child was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Rodriguez of Iraan. Rodriguez recovered the bodies of the two boys from the deep hole. Jim Grigsby of McCamey, who was nearby, assisted in the rescue and administered CPR and artificial respiration but to no avail. The boys had been in the water an estimated 30 minutes before the men pulled them out.

The accident was investigated by Val Verde County Deputy Sheriff Johnnie Burns, assisted by Val Verde County Constable Chuck McNeil.

**RED ATROCITIES RECOUNTED**

Six Afghan freedom fighters, speaking at The Heritage Foundation recently, recounted grisly tales of torture and murder committed by Soviet soldiers occupying their central Asian homeland.

In addition to detailing of Soviet atrocities—some of which they witnessed or experienced—the freedom fighters revealed that troops from Soviet satellites, including Cuba and Bulgaria, are also engaged in the fighting to crush resistance to Communist rule.

The five men and one woman met with President Reagan just one hour before coming to Heritage, and one observer who attended the White House meeting said "as the president listened to their testimonies, it was as though a brick hit him in the chest each time."

Using an interpreter, one of the six, Gol Mohammed, described how Soviet soldiers burned more than one hundred civilians to death in his village of Padkahwab-e Shana, 50 miles from the Afghan capital of Kabul.

One morning last September, said Mohammed, Soviet troops entered his village with helicopter and jet fighter support. Young men from the village, fearing that the Soviets would attempt to force them to join the army of the Moscow-installed Communist government, took refuge in an irrigation canal.

After being discovered by the Soviet soldiers, the Afghans were ordered to come out of the canal. When they refused, the Soviets are said to have poured gasoline into the canal. Mohammed also recounted how Soviet soldiers in masks and goggles poured a yellowish-white liquid and a bag of white powder into the water in the canal. Afterwards, the Soviets fired incendiary bullets into the water, causing a tremendous explosion.

The one woman in the group, 22-year-old Fairda Ahmadi, told how she had been tortured by electric shocks and sleep deprivation during her four-month imprisonment after being arrested at the University of Kabul, where she had been studying medicine. She recounted that a Soviet had taken part in the torture of some of her fellow prisoners, one of whom, she said, had gone mad after being beaten with the severed leg of a fellow prisoner.

Concerning the use of Soviet-bloc troops in the war against the freedom fighters, Ms. Ahmadi said she knew of one village which has an area reserved exclusively for Bulgarian soldiers. Several of the others said that identity cards have been taken from the bodies of Cuban soldiers killed by the freedom fighters, and that this evidence is available for international inspection.

The freedom fighters were brought to the United States by the Committee for a Free Afghanistan. James Phillips, the Heritage analyst monitoring the situation in Afghanistan, arranged the meeting.

Said Phillips, "the heartbreaking stories of witnesses like these give us an idea why the freedom fighters have vowed not to lay down their arms until the Soviets withdraw their troops."

In a recent report on the situation in Afghanistan, Phillips called on the administration to increase U.S. support to the freedom fighters. "Although much of the world seems willing to accept a Soviet *fait accompli*, the Afghan 'revolution' is far from irreversible," Phillips said.

**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS**

**AUSTIN**—In Texas politics, the legislator's vote is often quicker than the eye, and last week two controversial bills—betting on horseracing and worker's compensation insurance for farmworkers—made surprise advances.

Political observers wondered: 1) if an unseen trade-off was involved that caused the House to pass the worker's compensation bill on the same day the Senate passed the pari-mutuel wagering bill, and 2) whether either measure would live to arrive safely at the governor's desk.

An unusual coalition of urban liberals, rural conservatives and minority legislators voted together Tuesday to approve almost simultaneously the two controversial bills which had made little progress in preceding legislatures.

It may have been the slickest bit of political finesse yet this session, but the backscratching could be all for naught, at least for one of the issues. Both bills must clear the "other chamber"; one or both could be defeated as in earlier legislatures.

**Horserace Betting**

The Senate, in approving pari-mutuel wagering, passed the first Texas gambling bill in 50 years, and proponents were encouraged the vote would boost the bill through a stubborn House committee where it was stalled. Eight House committee members had banded together to keep the bill hostage in the 15-member Urban Affairs panel, but a single switch could send the bill sailing to a floor vote.

Under the bill's provisions, horserace betting would first have to be approved by a statewide referendum, and, clearing that ballot, interested counties would hold local-option elections on track betting. Some 14 tracks are now operating in Texas, even though gambling is not legally allowed, and proponents argue that betting will enhance the industry. Over a quarter of a million spectators attended races which totaled over \$5 million in purses last year.

Eight percent of the bets would go to the state (five percent for welfare children and three percent to water development), five percent would go to the track and five percent for prize money. The remainder would be shared by bettors, and proponents say that is not

enough. The water amendment, which was attached at the insistence of Sen. John Montford of Lubbock in return for his vote, may be removed in House action, and Montford's trade-off may be for naught.

**Farmworkers' Comp**

The farmworkers bill would make about 45 percent of Texas' agriculture workers eligible for disability under the Workers' Compensation Act. Only farms and ranches that employ at least 12 persons, or which have an annual payroll of \$50,000 are included.

The House initially rejected the bill, but passed it over the objections of rural legislators' arguments after a coalition of Republican, urban conservatives and minority legislators lobbied the bill.

Although the bill is aimed at large growers and not family farmers, observers wonder whether it will pass the Senate where only 11 rural votes are needed to block passage.

**The Senate**

Slipping through a preliminary vote that same day was another controversial farmworker issue, the "short-handle hoe" bill. Last session the ban on hoes with handles shorter than four feet was passed, largely to protect migrant workers who complained of back injuries. Some growers countered by giving the workers other tools with short handles that weren't covered in the short hoe bill, and the bill which passed second reading last week attempts to close the loophole.

Also in the Senate last week:

—The Senate meeting as a committee approved minor changes in the congressional redistricting plan, taking a small part of Dallas County from Democrat-turned-Republican Phil Gramm's district and replacing it with a part of Fort Worth. Gramm had complained his district was being sabotaged, but that effort is expected to come next week, if at all.

—A Senate committee passed a series of water bills, including three proposed constitutional amendments, which would address the water needs of every area of the state. One amendment would guarantee loans for farm water conservation in irrigation.

**The House**

Last week the House:

—Approved a brucellosis measure designed to prevent a federal quarantine on Texas cattle by giving the Texas Animal Health Commission authority to adopt new rules to conform with the federal program. Most major farm and ranch groups supported the bill, with the Independent Cattlemen's Association opposing.

—Passed legislation allowing local school districts to require passage of a basic skills test prior to graduation.

—Passed a bill limiting elections to four dates a year. Urban areas experienced as many as 12 to 70 elections last year costing taxpayers millions of dollars.

**Texas Republicans**

New Texas Republican Party chairman George Strake plans to use everything from ghetto recruitment centers to organized letter-writing campaigns to bring the GOP back in '84.

Strake said the first two priorities were re-electing President Ronald Reagan and U.S. Sen. John Tower, then going after "every winnable race right down to justice of the peace."

Preventing exit may be treated as converting property—a sort of civil-law theft. However, there may be unpaid rent or a lease violation that affects the landlord's rights. Consult both your lease and municipal codes that control your city's trailer parks.  
Q: Is it legal for a trailer park owner to park trailers in such a way that a large trailer cannot be moved? Isn't the owner of the park responsible for finding us a way out?  
A: A means of entrance and exit are usually implied for leased premises; a landlord has no right to interfere with this means. Generally, a tenant is entitled to remove his property from leased premises at the end of the lease.  
Q: My husband and his ex-wife never went to court but made an out-of-court settlement when they were divorced. Although there was no specified amount he was to pay in child support, he has sent her \$300 each month. Now he has lost his job and we have no income. Is he required to continue sending her the money? Could he be sent to jail?  
A: Whether or not a couple has a court hearing, there must be a formal divorce decree on file, or their marriage is not dissolved.  
The decree should bear some statement concerning child support. If the amount is not specified, he will not be held in contempt for failing to pay \$300. The Decree must be read carefully, however, to determine what general level of support he is required to meet.  
Q: My husband and I married in 1969 and separated two years later after we had two children. We were never divorced. Can I force him to get a divorce and start paying me child support?  
A: You may file for divorce in any county that has jurisdiction. In Texas, you must have been in the state six months and in the county three months. When the Court finds the requirements of the divorce petition have been satisfied, it will rule on whether to dissolve the marriage; how to divide property; and on custody, support, and visitation.  
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# Anti herpes drug offers hope

Between 15 million and 20 million Americans have genital herpes. A related disease, oral herpes, is estimated to affect a fourth of the world's population.

These statistics have intensified the search for a cure for herpes, says the Texas Medical Association. And a researcher at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio is one of the leaders in the quest.

Dr. Kendall Smith, a professor of microbiology, is testing an experimental drug called BIOLF-62. Laboratory tests indicate it can eliminate 100 to 1,000 times more herpes virus than other drugs.

Hopes were high last year when the U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved another anti-herpes drug, acyclovir, for commercial use. The ointment has proved effective in healing the initial outbreak of genital herpes sores but ineffective for additional eruptions.

Though somewhat similar chemically to acyclovir, BIOLF-62 offers more hope than its predecessor. Smith has discovered BIOLF-63 is effective against several herpes viruses, including genital, oral and some forms found in horses.

In addition, BIOLF-62 is about 10 times more water soluble than acyclovir. This means that when applied to the skin, BIOLF-62 has a much better chance of penetrating to deeper tissues where the virus is multiplying. The experimental drug also seems to have fewer toxic effects than most current herpes treatments.

Herpes viruses that enter the body apparently remain for life. They reside in nerve cells and pass through dormant and active stages. Although BIOLF-62 does not

eliminate the virus, the compound prevents infected cell from producing more virus. Applied to the skin of experimental animals within 24 hours of exposure to the virus is dormant, the drug virus, BIOLF-62 has prevented herpes sores. In cases where the virus is dormant, the drug may prevent additional outbreaks if applied soon after the person feels the tingling, itching or burning sensation that precedes a herpes sore.

Up to this point, BIOLF-62 has been tested only on animals. Similar studies on humans will begin when the drug is approved for clinical trials.

## Aggies build smart tractor

Texas A&M University agricultural engineers are developing an automated tractor system that could tell a farmer when to slow down or even shift gears to conserve fuel.

The research conducted by Texas A&M's Agricultural Engineering Department is part of an effort to help farmers improve energy efficiency, reduce their costs and lower consumers' grocery bills.

The researchers are connecting a complex network of sensors to a tractor for measuring such things as fuel flow, forward travel speed and the amount of power that's being produced.

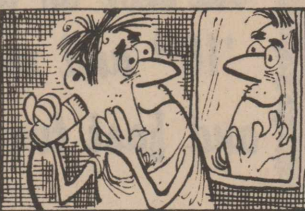
# Early childhood screening given to over 100

More than a hundred 2, 3, and 4-year-old children underwent an Early Childhood Screening Clinic held Tuesday and Wednesday, April 26 and 27 at the Ozona Primary School. The event was well received and considered extremely successful.

Seventy five-year-olds were registered for kindergarten in the fall and on Wednesday 46 three and four-year-olds attended. All children were given free examinations in eyesight and hearing, along with assessments of their large and small motor development, language concepts and communications.

Approximately fifteen volunteers from the community, along with school personnel and Community Center board members helped in administering the various examinations.

The clinic was sponsored by the Ozona Primary School, the Ozona Community Center and Region XV Medical Center in San Angelo. Betsy Sadler, the Early Childhood Consultant and two eye and ear specialists from San Angelo were also on hand to help.

# Swimsuit weather is trimming season

With warmer weather and the bathing-suit season drawing near, countless Texans will be joining the rush to trim down and shape up through exercise.

"But the exercise program you start today could develop into a lifetime health habit if done sensibly," advises Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

To make fitness a habit that is hard to break, start with a physical activity you truly enjoy, says Shirer. That activity might be tennis, swimming, running, dancing, or even walking.

Shirer suggests trying different activities until you find one that is right for you on a regular basis.

Once you have selected an activity, get a friend to join you. Having commitment to someone else can help provide motivation when you're not as eager to exercise.

"The way in which you actually do the physical activity is critical for building the fitness habit," says Shirer. The person who gets muscle aches and injuries or feels exhausted after exercise is unlikely to continue for very long.

You can largely avoid these problems, however, by including a sensible warm-up, training and cooling down period in each exercise session.

According to Shirer, all fitness programs should include five to ten minutes of

warm-up exercises before the activity. Warm-up exercises raise the body temperature and make the muscles and joints move more easily.

A warm-up period decreases the likelihood of straining or pulling a stiff muscle. It also helps you get over the "lead in the feet" syndrome that keeps many people from ever getting started with their exercise.

For the training period, or actual physical activity, plan a reasonable schedule, and always avoid overdoing it, warns Shirer.

A person's circulation, breathing capacity, and muscle mass can improve only so quickly, so let your body set the pace. By setting unrealistic expectations, you may become discouraged about continuing on an exercise routine.

A cooling down period allows the muscles to relax. It gently returns your body to a less active state which helps prevent muscle cramps and sudden dizziness, says Shirer.

Cooling down is accomplished by simply slowing down your activity or doing some stretching exercises for a few minutes.

"Make sure that your physical activities are enjoyable and sensible," says Shirer, "and you will be motivated to make fitness a part of your life."

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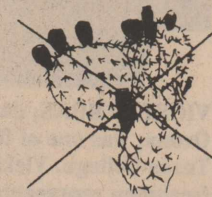
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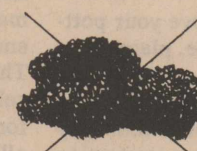
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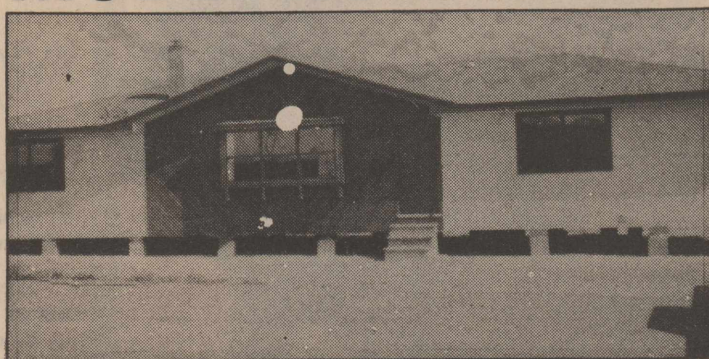
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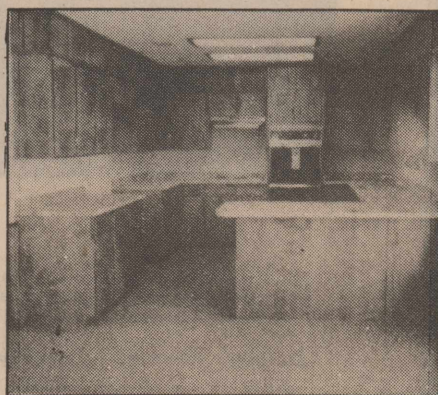
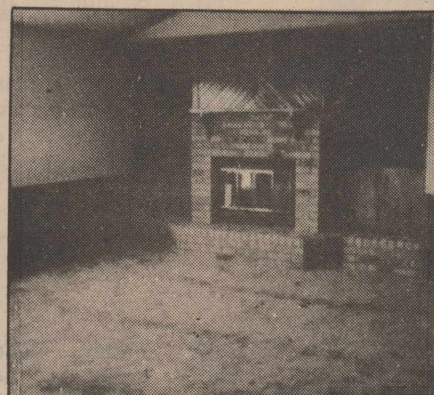
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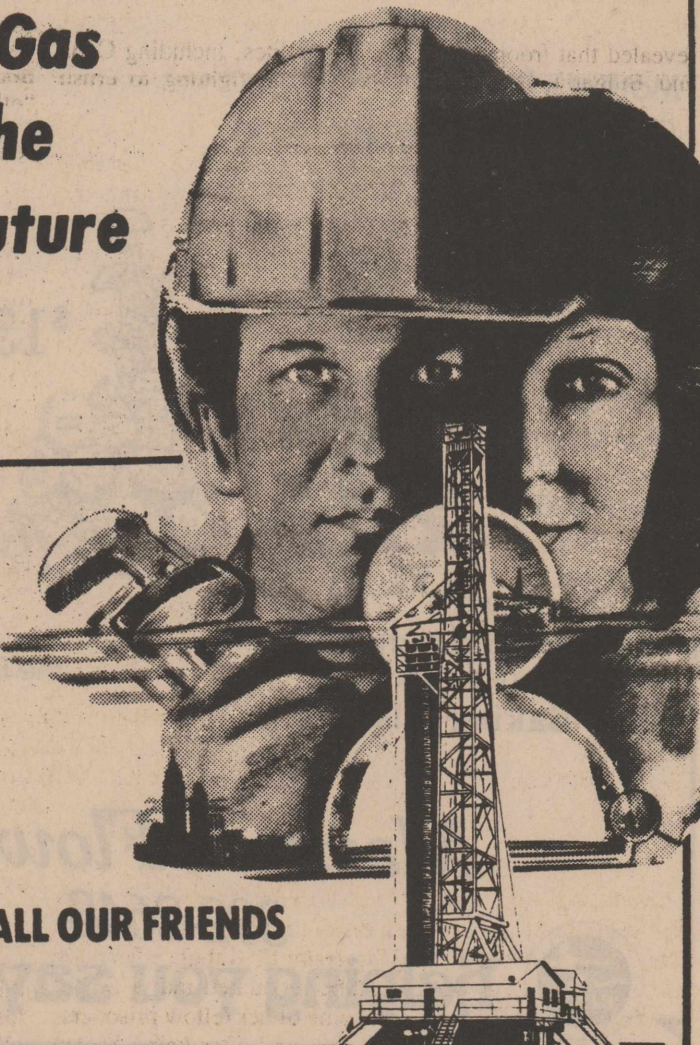
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## Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Due to an unpredictable late spring, mainly due to very little moisture, grass was late coming out, as well as many flowers and blooming shrubs. Even the mesquite are later than usual in their beautiful fresh green leaves display.

If you haven't started planting your gladiola bulbs it isn't too late. Support them with strong stakes when about to bloom.

Divide and reset iris when blooming has finished and before the weather gets so hot.

When you move your potted plants outside, place them in the shade for a few days to become hardened before the sun gets too hot. I find they do better if some protection is furnished from our hot south winds, especially in the afternoon.

Coleus are grown for their colorful leaves. Pinching out the bloom spike just above the first two leaves promotes stockiness and prevents the plant from going to seed.

are petunias, zinnia, phlox, calendula, pinks, snapdragons, verbenia, and ageratum. Don't pinch back main stem of cockscomb, poppy or strawflower. Seedling dahlias may be pinched back until August 1 to induce fall blooming.

Fertilize crepe myrtle now with an application of 5-10-10 or 8-8-8 commercial fertilizer to stimulate plants, causing full clusters of blooms during the summer. Use about 3 cups to a large mature plant and 1 cup to smaller newly set plants. This is one of the most colorful and durable plants for our area, blooming most all summer.

Another good bloomer for us is the geranium in their many varieties and colors. Some that withstand the heat better than others are Delta Queen (red), Tara (red), Red Elite (bright red), Cherie (salmon pink) and Quiz (scarlet).

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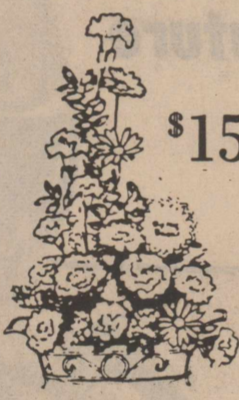
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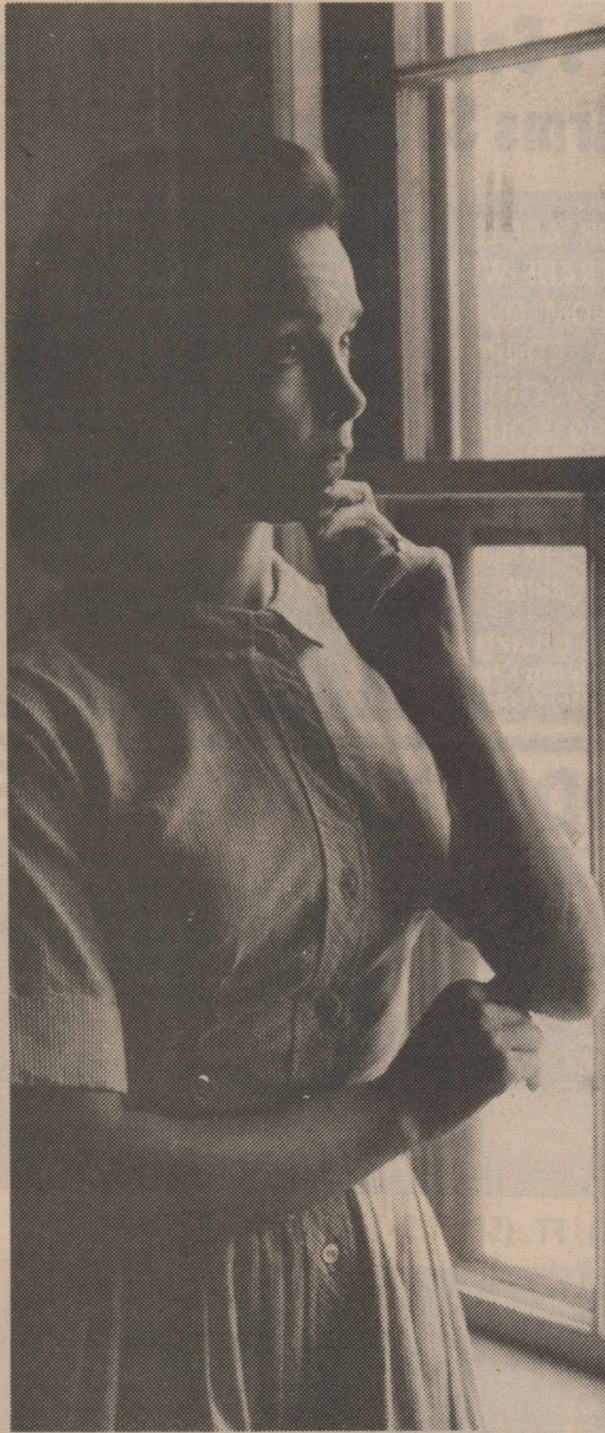

# Brucellosis quarantine Texas cattle threatened

The Texas Farm Bureau is asking the Legislature to approve proposed legislation that would prevent a quarantine by the U.S. Department of Agriculture on Texas cattle because of the animal disease brucellosis.

TFB President S. M. True Jr., in a letter to all 131 state senators and representatives "The Commission's inability to carry out fully its responsibilities in the (state-federal) program mandates that this Department seriously consider action to protect other states from the dissemination of brucellosis from Texas," Lee said in a letter to John Armstrong, chairman of the TAHC.

asked them to support bills dealing with control of brucellosis which causes abortion in cattle.

"Passage of H.B. 701 or S.B. 366 would prevent this quarantine and embargo and give the Texas Animal Health Commission the necessary authority and funding to continue our current effective and affordable brucellosis program," True said.

"At the present time less than two percent of Texas beef and dairy herds are infected with brucellosis," the state farm leader said. "It is time we continue the effort to clean up the disease and protect the 98 percent clean herd owners who support passage of new state legislation," True said.

## Mulches will warm soil in spring gardens

No self-respecting gardener wants to be governed by the whims of Mother Nature. So to get a jump on spring gardening, use mulches to warm the soil and to prolong production.

Black plastic, usually made of polyethylene, is a great mulch, and offers these benefits:

- Reduces evaporation of soil moisture
- Reduces fluctuations in soil moisture
- Retains soil moisture
- Reduces fluctuations in soil temperature
- Provides warmer daytime surface temperature
- Reduces weed growth
- Reduces soil compaction
- Reduces leaching of fertilizer salts
- Prevents soil crusting
- Promotes activity of microorganisms
- Reduces soil rot of fruit
- Increases water use efficiency
- Increases fertilizer use efficiency
- Increases yield and improves quality

A plastic mulch can hasten the maturity of crops as well as control weeds. It absorbs more of the sun's heat than organic mulches and radiates the heat back faster at night. Thus, plants mulched with plastics are less susceptible to frost injury than those mulched with organic mulches such as leaves and compost.

Make black plastic sections for mulching by splitting regular garbage bags on the seams. Heavy duty bags last longer.

Make sure the soil is well supplied with water from rain or irrigation a few days before laying the plastic. Plastic mulch can be laid immediately after planting, but for most transplanted crops, it's easier to apply it first and plant through it. If drip irrigation is to be used, put drip hoses in place on or in the planting bed before covering with plastic.

When applying a plastic mulch, make small furrows with a hoe or shovel 3 to 4 inches deep on each side of the planting bed. The distance between furrows should be slightly less than the width of the plastic. Place the soil from the furrows on the outer edge of the plastic to hold it in place. Then punch or cut holes for transplants. After setting out transplants, mound soil around the plant holes to deep wind from whipping the plastic loose.

For small-seeded crops that are seeded directly in the row, plant seed first and then lay the plastic. After laying the plastic, cut it down the middle and anchor it with soil from small furrows on each side of the planted row.

As far as organic mulches are concerned, they are especially desirable on light,

sandy soils and on cool-season crops. Organic mulches such as leaves, compost, hay and grass clippings keep soil several degrees cooler than bare soil or soil covered with black plastic mulch. They also reduce heat radiation from the soil, increasing the chance of frost damage on a cool night.

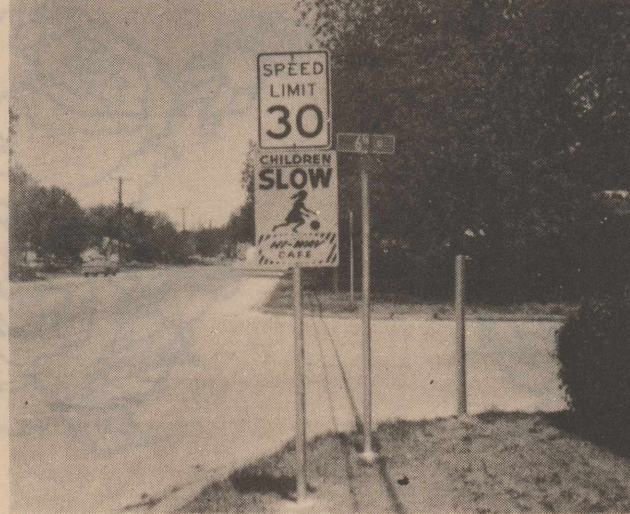
Organic mulches are best applied after soil is warm and as soon as plants are large enough to avoid being buried by the material.

### Taking the green out of the soy bean

Food Protein researchers at Texas A&M University have developed a new way to prevent the green color that characteristically forms in protein extracted from sunflower seeds - the world's second largest source of edible oil and fourth largest source of feed protein.

As a result of the work, protein-rich isolates from sunflower flour used in products such as infant formulas and meat extenders are now white.

"Animals don't mind, but humans just do not want to eat prepared foods that are green," said J. T. Lawhon, a researcher with Texas A&M's Food Protein Research and Development Center. He has been involved in the project for about four years.



## Signs seek to slow down Ave. J traffic

In an attempt to turn Ozona's famed "speedway" street, Avenue J, into a quiet neighborhood street, bristling signs in black and white and in yellow and orange have been erected about every two blocks the length of the street announcing a speed limit of 30 miles per hour with the accompanying colored signs that read, "SLOW--Children playing."

The signs may have already served to slow down some drivers but residents

along the thoroughfare are not too sure the middle of the street is as yet a safe place for kids to romp.

The effectiveness of the slow-down signs may have been reduced somewhat when it is noticed that the bottom part of the threatening signs are occupied by advertising from Ozona businesses, presumably part of the financing. The ads somehow seem to detract from the official look of the traffic signs.

### Crockett extender outpost set

San Andres oil production was extended 5/8-mile southwest in the Todd multipay field of Crockett County with completion of C.F. Lawrence & Associates Inc., Midland, No. 3 Shannon "G", 18 miles east of Iran to pump 11 barrels of 36 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,900-1.

Production was from open hole at 2,084 feet, where 4 1/2-inch casing was set, and 2,138 feet, total depth, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons and fractured with 15,000 gallons.

Location is 1,650 feet from the north and east lines of 1-BB-EL&RR.

R.T. Wilson, Fort Worth, will drill the No. 10 James T. Padgett as a 7/8-mile north and very slightly east outpost to San Andres production in the Clara Couch multipay field of Crockett County 16 miles southeast of Iran.

Location is 2,970 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of 17-S.C. White. Contract depth is 2,200 feet.

### 4-H youth program is strong today

Interest in Texas' 75-year-old 4-H and youth program is as strong today as it was when the idea originated in 1908.

Crockett County boasts a 4-H membership of 240 boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 19, says Billy Reager, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Texas membership for the past year was 187,067 youths. Almost 15,000 volunteer adult leaders of the state assisted with the educational effort.

Most 4-H members are enrolled in some 2,700 organized clubs across Texas. 4-H audiences today are boys and girls from all ethnic, cultural and economic groups, says Billy Reager.

The 4-H program had its beginning in 1908, when Tom Marks of Jack County organized the first boy's "Corn Club." Canning clubs for girls soon followed. Other projects were added as interest grew. Currently, 4-H programs--or their counterparts--are active in many parts of the world.

Today, 4-H members are encouraged to broaden their skills and knowledge through more than 70 project areas, notes the agent. Agriculture and home economics projects are quite popular, but 4-H members also participate in many other projects such as photography, wildlife, aerospace and safety. The variety of projects available makes

4-H an organization for all Texas youth whether they live on a farm or in a metropolitan area.

In addition to traditional project work 4-H offers opportunities for young people to develop individually through many leadership events such as the Texas 4-H Round-Up and Texas 4-H Congress, says Reager.

### ASCS asks producers to expect checks

Wool and mohair producers who have not received their incentive checks should call at the ASCS office, the ASCS bulletin advised this week. The checks were mailed April 8. The service cited the fact that there were 80 mohair checks mailed to producers, totaling \$923,758.02 and 115 wool checks totaling \$1,065,822.32.

The week's bulletin also advised growers who are planning to do aerial spraying this year for brush and weed control to make application by the end of April.

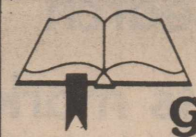

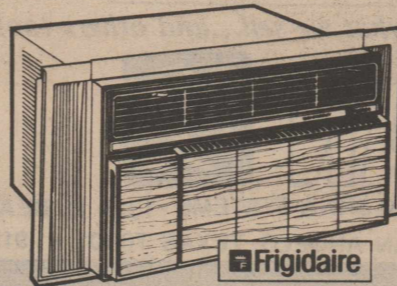
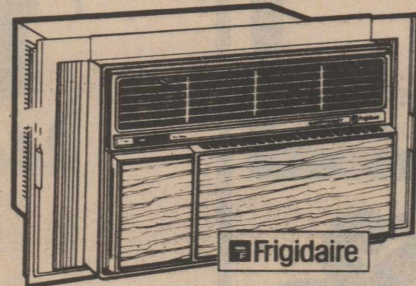

# Confirmer finaled in Crockett Co.

The Ozona, South (Sprawberry) field of Crockett County gained its current second Oil discovery finaled in county

The Superior Oil Co., Midland, No. 1 Shannon Estate "4", Crockett County Cisco oil discovery, 5/8-mile east and slightly north of a depleted Pennsylvanian oil discovery and 1 3/4 miles north and slightly west of a 7,925 foot failure and nine mile north-northeast of Iraan, was finaled to pump 23 barrels of 48 gravity oil, plus 55 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 5.261-1.

producer and a 1,500-foot southeast extension with completion of Wallen Production Co., Midland, No. 5-A Wallen Helbing, five miles south of Ozona, to pump 27 barrels of 29.6 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 6,926-1.

Production was through perforations at 3,144-441 feet, which had been acidized with 7,000 gallons.

Drilled to 3,526 feet, where 4 1/2-inch casing was set, it is plugged back to 3,470 feet.

Location is 2,164 feet from the north and 1,977 feet from the west lines of 8-MN-GC&SF.

The project earlier was reported incorrectly as being plugged and abandoned at 3,070 feet, which should have been attributed to the firm's No. 5 Wallen Helbing. Location for the No. 5 is 2,163 feet from the north and 1,972 feet from the west lines of the same section.

The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,515 feet; Wolfcamp, 5,620 feet; Cisco, 6,515 feet; Fusselman, 6,824 feet; Montoya, 6,904 feet; Simpson, 6,920 feet; and Ellenburger, 7,405 feet.

Drilled to 7,830 feet, where 5-inch casing was set, it is plugged back to 6,575 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 866 feet from the west lines of Mrs. E. P. Elder No. 4.

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# New St. Augustine is good choice of grass

Homeowners putting in new lawns this spring may want to consider a fairly new variety of St. Augustine grass, "Raleigh," says Dr. Richard Duple, turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Raleigh St. Augustine grass is a vigorous, St. Augustine Decline (S.A.D.) resistant variety released by North Carolina State University. It is more cold tolerant and more shade tolerant than "Florata" St. Augustine.

However, Duple emphasizes that Raleigh, unlike Florata, is not resistant to chinch bugs.

As for appearance, an established lawn of Raleigh St. Augustine looks similar to a lawn of common St. Augustine grass. But Raleigh is slightly coarser and faster growing than the common type.

Duple recommends planting Raleigh wherever common St. Augustine grass can be grown. The exception might be along the Gulf Coast and in South Texas where low temperatures are not a problem, but chinch bugs are. In those areas, Florata might still be the better grass for lawns.

In new lawns, Raleigh can be sodded to provide an "instant" lawn, or plugged on about 18-inch spacings to

provide a cover in two or three months, says the specialist. To restore a St. Augustine lawn weakened with S.A.D., Duple suggests plugging 4-inch blocks of Raleigh directly into the lawn on about 1-foot spacings. Raleigh will cover the lawn after one complete growing season.

Raleigh has similar maintenance requirements to those of common St. Augustine grass, adds the specialist. Weekly mowing at a height of about 2 inches, spring and fall fertilization, and watering as needed to prevent severe wilting should produce an attractive lawn of Raleigh St. Augustine.

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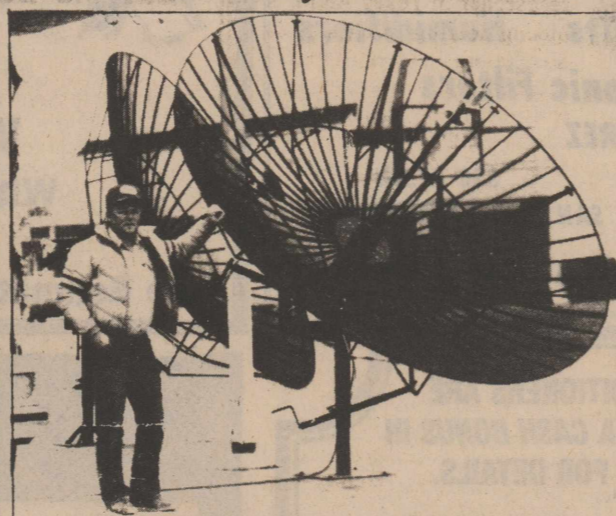

# Interest rates on Land Bank loans lowered

Interest rates on Land Bank variable rate loans will be reduced to 11.00 percent on farm loans and to 11.50 percent on rural residence and farm-related business loans effective May 1, 1983, said Wade A. Moseley, president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora.

In addition, the Land Bank has reduced its Bank closed loan fees to 1 percent on farm loans and to 2 percent on rural residence and farm-related business loans, according to Thomas H. Benson, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas. These reduced fees are effective April 25, 1983.

"The adjustments follow reductions made earlier this year," Benson said. On January 1, 1983, the Bank's

interest rate on farm loans was lowered to 11.25 percent. The interest rate for rural residence and farm-related business loans was lowered to 11.75 percent. Bank closed loan fees subsequently were reduced in February from 4 to 2 percent on farm loans and from 7 to 4 percent on rural residence

and farm-related business loans. The fee reduction was made possible, Benson said, by the decrease in the Bank's cost of funds.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora makes long-term real estate loans in the counties of Crockett, Edwards, Schleicher and Sutton.

### New weight tables are more realistic

New height-weight tables recently released by the insurance industry may encourage people to be more realistic about their weight.

"Too many women look to fashion models as examples of the ideal weight, and this simply contributes to unrealistic weight goals and fad dieting," says Dr. Dymple Cooksey, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The new weight tables show a five to seven percent weight increase in most height categories.

"But people should be less concerned about how much they weigh, and more concerned about how much fat they have," states Cooksey. According to Cooksey, the problem is one of distinguishing "overweight" from "overfat."

Overfat is purely the accumulation of excess fat, which has been linked to heart disease and other risk factors. It is not always easy to tell the difference, particularly when a person is not too much overweight, says Cooksey.

A height-weight table won't tell people how much fat they have either, she adds. That is why a person should consult with a doctor before beginning a weight loss plan.

The new weight tables are based on insurance records and published by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. of New York. They indicate the weight ranges at which people of various heights and builds will be statistically at less risk of premature death.

Cooksey predicts that the tables will be widely circulated in diet books, publications and commercial diet programs as appropriate weight goals for the general public.

"However, most educational programs such as ours will continue to stress good nutrition as a means of weight control rather than achieving the weights found in these tables," says Cooksey.

### Cancer to be cured with heat

A Texas A&M University electrical engineer is working with a leading Houston cancer institute to improve the effectiveness of a tumor treatment technique that uses heat (hyperthermia).

Dr. Walter Kuklinski, a researcher in Texas A&M's bioengineering program, is developing a system that will measure and record the temperatures of tumors undergoing radio frequency hyperthermia treatment.

Previous studies conducted by the Stehlin Foundation for Cancer Research in Houston have shown that elevated temperatures can destroy cancerous tumor cells without affecting nearby normal cells.

Stehlin Foundation physicians currently are using hyperthermia to treat tumors deep within the body that cannot be removed surgically or that haven't responded to chemotherapy.

"Effective hyperthermia treatment of tumors requires precise temperature control," Kuklinski said. "There is only a small range of temperatures where the desired effects of hyperthermia are observed. Temperatures a few degrees lower won't kill the tumor cells and a few degrees higher will destroy normal cells."

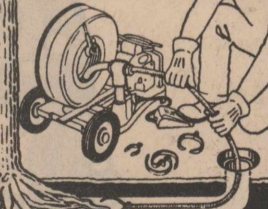

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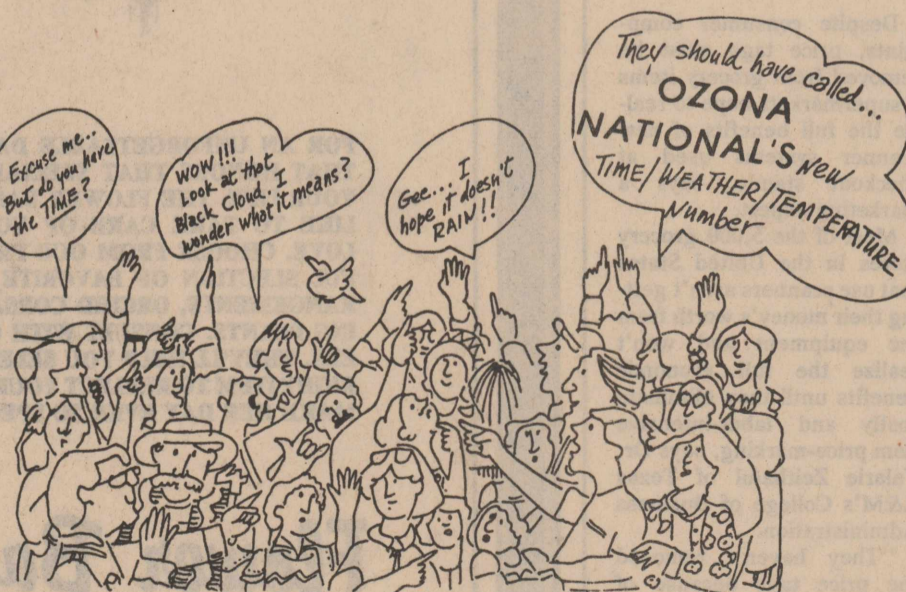
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
