## Traffic fatality in county

One person was killed and another injured at 3:30 p.m. Monday in a three-vehicle sideswipe collision and roll-over 4.6 miles east of Ozona on Interstate Highway 10.

Jacob Denver Greeson, 57, of Hereford, was pronounced dead at the scene by Peace Justice Raymond Davee. His body was taken to Sizemore Funeral Home.

Florise Glisson Resmondo, 45, of Cortez, Colo., was listed in fair condition with head lacerations and broken ribs at Crockett County Hospital.

According to a Department of Public Safety spokeswoman, Ms. Resmondo was driving east in the right lane of I-10 while towing another car. Greeson was eastbound in a pickup in the left lane of I-10, approaching the two cars from the rear. Ms. Resmondo's car crossed the white stripe partially into the left lane as Greeson was attempting to pass the two cars. The right front of the pickup truck struck the left front fender of the car Ms. Resmondo was driving, sending the car rolling to the right of the roadway.

The pickup flipped over several times, throwing Greeson from the cab. The car in tow broke loose from the car Ms. Resmondo was driving and coasted to a stop south of the roadway, investigators said.

## Friend services held here

Funeral services for Bill Y. (Spot) Friend, 68, were held Tuesday afternoon at 3 p.m. at Ozona United Methodist Church with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Friend, an Ozona native, died at 9:30 a.m. Monday in Colonial Nursing Home in Kerrville.

He had ranched in the Rocksprings area for the past ten years.

Survivors include two daughters, Mitzi Matthews of Sonora, and Nancy Wendland of Kerrville, and several grandchildren.

## Three vandals arrested

Three Ozona High School students were in Crockett County Jail awaiting action by the grand jury Tuesday. They were arrested at the scene Christmas night after vandalism of huge proportions occurred at Ozona Primary School.

Charged with committing a felony are Mark Vallejo, Rick Tambunga and Manuel Perez. They were arrested after Deputy Danny Simmons noticed movement in

side the school where he thought he saw smoke about ten o'clock. He called the fire department and asked for assistance from fellow officers. They approached the building from all sides, and the three were taken into custody after making a run for it through the front doors.

On entering the school, officers found the vandals had gained entry through a large skylight, where they immediately wrecked some

large plants underneath. Every fire extinguisher in the school had been set off and foam was spread all over the floors, walls and desks. Toilet tissue was strewn all over, papers and books were ruined and the inside of the building generally wrecked. There was no fire. The foam from the extinguishers created an illusion of smoke and this is what Simmons saw.

When the three were arrested, they had paint all

over them. Finding no paint in the school, officials immediately went to check other schools in the system. They found more damage at the high school. Entering through a window, the vandals thoroughly wrecked the art room, pouring gallons of paint over expensive art books and desks. They then unrolled dozens of rolls of toilet tissue and scattered it

## Freezing weather causes damage

Although Crockett County missed the ice and snow which hit other parts of Texas, the sub-freezing temperatures took a toll in property damage in the form of broken water pipes and flooded homes, public buildings and automobiles.

The Siberian fronts, which came in waves, first hit Ozona in the early morning hours Sunday, Dec. 18, with some light ice and freezing drizzle. Temperatures were below freezing throughout the week. A warming trend came about 2 p.m. Friday, and the mercury climbed to 45 degrees before the most brutal front of the year blew into Ozona around 3 p.m. and literally put the town in a deep freeze.

Pumpers and plant operators worked around the clock to keep plants and wells operating, and at least one fatal injury was reported in the oilfield. Jim Tuttle, 41, died in the intensive care unit at Shannon Hospital in San Angelo, late Monday from injuries suffered in an oilfield accident Sunday.

The oilfield pumper lie alone in the cold for six to eight hours after being injured in a rig accident. He suffered severe internal head and chest injuries around 11 a.m. while working on a wellhead 14 miles south of Ozona.

Authorities speculate Tuttle was fixing a wellhead that had frozen when a U-joint blew off and hit him in the chest. Tuttle apparently

crawled back to his pickup before becoming unconscious. He was found later by fellow employees.

An ambulance attendant said when he arrived at the scene about 5 p.m., Tuttle was laying unconscious next to the rear wheel on the driver's side of the pickup. The injured man was suffering from hypothermia, and had cerebral fluid and blood leading from his right ear, the attendant said.

After being stabilized at Crockett County Hospital, Tuttle was transferred to Shannon in San Angelo by ambulance, where he remained unconscious. He was removed from the life-support systems late Monday afternoon and died a few hours later.

As the thaw set in Monday afternoon, frozen pipes began to reveal the heavy damage caused by the prolonged cold snap and many residents found they were not covered by insurance depending on the coverage. Employees of the Crockett County Water District were literally covered up with calls about broken pipes Tuesday morning. The only assistance the workers can give is cut the homeowners' water off at the main line, and advise them to get a plumber, which was not easy to do. Fortunately water mains were not damaged by the freeze, and Ozonans were not without water from the district.

The temperatures ranged from 4 below for the low, and

from 19 to 24 above for the high during the freeze. For the first time Ozonans were grateful they missed the precipitation which made roads hazardous just a few miles north of Ozona.

A family of six were overcome by carbon monoxide at the Fraulio Ramirez home in the south part of town Sunday afternoon. The central heat failed and the family tried to keep warm by turning the burners on high in the gas range. Six members of the family were taken to the hospital for treatment. One was released after treatment and the other five hospitalized overnight, except for the youngest child, who was still hospitalized Tuesday.

The mercury had climbed to 60 degrees above zero by 1:30 Tuesday, but forecasters warned another front would strike the area Wednesday and several days of sub-freezing weather were expected.

## Some open Mon.

Although most Ozona businesses were closed tight Monday for the Christmas holiday, several will remain open next Monday, January 2, 1984.

A chamber of commerce survey indicates both large food stores, B & C Automotive, Watson's Department Store, and Foxworth Galbraith will be open for business as usual the Monday following New Years Day.

# Jim's Foodway

## Have A New Year's Party

New Year's is one of the biggest party times of the year. All it takes is a few plans, good food and lots of friends. Why not plan a get-together for New Year's Eve dinner, late evening or a special brunch for New Year's Day.

One of my favorite party foods are Miniature Taco Tarts. These can be made ahead if necessary, and cooked just before serving.

### Miniature Taco Tarts

- 1 lb. lean ground meat
- 1 (1 1/4 oz.) pkg. taco seasoning
- 1 c. finely crushed corn chips
- 1 med. egg
- 1 (4 oz.) can chopped green chili peppers
- 1 c. sour cream
- 2 c. grated Cheddar or Monterey Jack cheese
- Jalapeno Pepper slices

Combine meat, seasoning, chips, egg and 1/4 of green chili peppers. Mix well. Press meat on bottom and up sides of miniature (1 1/4") muffin cups to form shallow shell. Combine sour cream, cheese and remainder of drained green chili pepper. Spoon approximately 1 teaspoon in each meat cup. Top each meat tart with 1 slice of Jalapeno. Bake in 350 oven for 10 to 12 minutes. Serve hot. Makes approximately 3 1/2 dozen.

**Tips for Gardeners**  
From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Greetings to all of you and sincerely hope you had a wonderful Christmas and look forward to a Happy New Year.

Here in Houston it is so cold I feel like it must be near the north pole. I'm hoping it warms up before I get back to Ozona.

The Azaleas are in full bloom along with many other blooming shrubs for everyone to enjoy. To protect your lace fern, properly asparagus plumosus, is not a fern, but is given the common name. It is root-hardy but will freeze back. In order to retain the top cover it from freezes and frost. It is a beautiful vine and well worth having.

If you are having trouble with spider mite or red spider on your beautiful crotons, one thing that helps is to thoroughly spray them with water out-of-doors of course. Follow with several thorough sprayings using Kethane. This should do the trick.

**37th annual 4-H livestock show scheduled January 5, 6, 7**

The 37th Annual Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show and Sale will be January 5, 6 and 7, at the County Show Barn. One-hundred 4-H members will be exhibiting 400 lambs, 100 goats and 7 steers.

A new division has been added to this show, the Commercial Angora Doe Kid class. Some twenty-five 4-H members are feeding 100 doe kids. This division is sponsored by the Livestock and Range Committee and local ranchers. These doe kids will be shown on Thursday beginning at 5:00 p.m. Jack Groff, Sheep and Goat Specialist with Texas Agricultural Extension Service from Kerrville will judge the goats. Following the show Thursday evening he and Dr. George Ahlschwede will hold an Angora Goat Seminar for ranchers. Major points to be covered are selection, mohair grading and marketing and nutrition.

On Friday morning, these goats will be shorn and the hair will be graded and fleeces placed by Jack Groff. Fleeces and goats will be on exhibit during the show and sale. This should be a very interesting and educational experience for 4-H members as well as ranchmen.

Richard Powell, Vocational Agriculture instructor from Alpine will be the judge. All lambs will be shorn on Wednesday and Thursday. Lambs will be weighed in on Thursday. If you don't report all your taxable income this year, the new income reporting laws for businesses make it likely that you'll hear from the IRS.

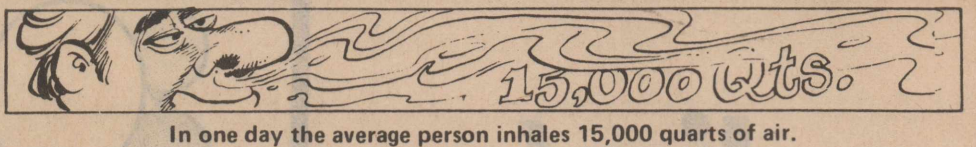
Most people know that banks report to the IRS the amount of interest paid to each customer during the year and that corporations report the amount of dividends paid to each stockholder.

Now the law also requires reporting on transactions such as sales of stock, tax refunds from state and local governments, and transactions through bartering clubs. In fact, most transactions which affect a person's income must now be reported to the IRS.

With the help of computers, the IRS can compare the information it receives to what you report on your tax return. If the information doesn't match, you can expect a letter from the IRS asking you to explain the differences.

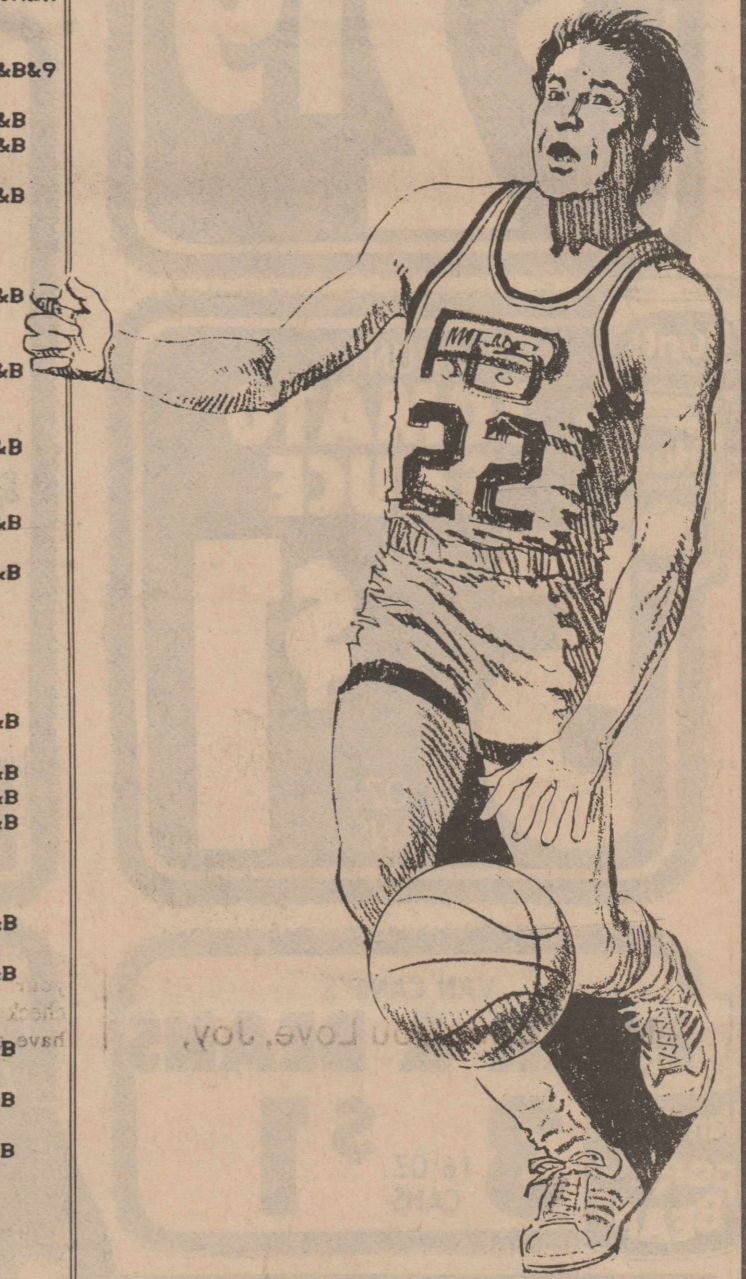

## Judge Williams gains certificate of completion Feed program to aid producers

Reno, NV.--District Judge Troy D. Williams of the 112th Judicial District Court, Ozona, TX has received a Certificate of Completion for The Search and Seizure-Specialty Session, held December 4-9 and the Evidence-Graduate Session, held December 4-16 at The National Judicial College on the campus of the University of Nevada-Reno.

A comprehensive examination of the Fourth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, the Search and Seizure Session drew 34 judges from 17 states including 1 judge from the Marines.

Discussion centered on judicial experience with search warrants, warrantless searches and seizures and special search situations. Color slides used to illustrate leading cases and commentary by an experienced police detective supplemented classroom lectures.

The Evidence-Graduate Session attracted 26 participants from 12 states including four administrative law judges, which met to examine common evidentiary problems facing general jurisdiction courts.

The focus of the session was on the Federal Rules of Evidence, supplemented by a discussion of common law rules of evidence directed toward judges from states which have not implemented the federal rules.

Emphasis was placed on cases commonly heard by these judges, and examples were taken from various court decisions to provide the participants with an understanding of both federal and common law rules of evidence.

Participants enlarged on their classroom experience through a series of problem solving discussions.

The drought feed program passed by Congress will be a real help to the livestock people in the drought-stricken areas of Texas, according to James Wittenburg of Rocksprings, president of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association.

He emphasized, "Senators Tower and Bentsen, along with Congressmen Loeffler and DeLaGarza put in a tremendous amount of time on this problem. Everyone knew what needed to be done, but there always seemed to be a stumbling block."

Damage amounted to over \$4,000 Tuesday, and school officials were still tabulating. District Attorney Bill Mason said he would ask the grand jury to indict the three on the toughest charge he could find.

The school and school vehicles have been vandalized on a regular basis for the past two years, but this is the first time they have actually been caught at the scene.

Since the first meeting was called back in June, 1983, by Peggy Garner, Upton County Judge, it has seemed as though USDA was trying to find ways not to help the drought-stricken ranchers. Then Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower verbally jumped on Secretary of Agriculture Block, and the "talking" war was on. For about two months it looked like the hungry sheep and goats were going to have to eat newspapers instead of feed. Politics, plain and simple, just about had the game "Blocked."

Probably the turning point was the tour of the drought areas of West Texas made by Governor Mark White and Commissioner of Agriculture Hightower. At that time the news media did a great job of informing the world of the terrible situation that existed in West Texas.

Then the Texas congressional delegation took the reins into their own hands by embodying legislation which forced USDA to stop "playing politics."

Thanks to our very able congressional delegation, corn is now moving to the drought areas.

## IRS offers federal tax return checklist

The Internal Revenue Service offers the following time-tested approach to avoiding errors on your federal income tax return.

First: Do you have all your necessary records and forms easily accessible? Do you have plenty of time? (Rushing leads to errors.) Have you received a Wage and Tax Statement (W-2 form) from each employer you worked for during the past year? Do you anticipate any questions or problems? Are you puzzled about any particular law changes? If so, check your instructions. Also, check with IRS--they may have a free publication that

will answer your questions.

Next, before you mail your return, double-check the following: Are all W-2 forms attached? Are all supporting schedules attached to your Form 1040? Is the arithmetic correct? If you rounded off numbers, did you round consistently? Did you use the correct tax table, and did you follow the line across to the correct figure? Is the return signed and dated (by both spouses if a joint return)? Did you use the peel-off label and, if so, is the information correct? Is there a stamp on the pre-addressed, coded envelope? Did you make a copy of the return for your own records?

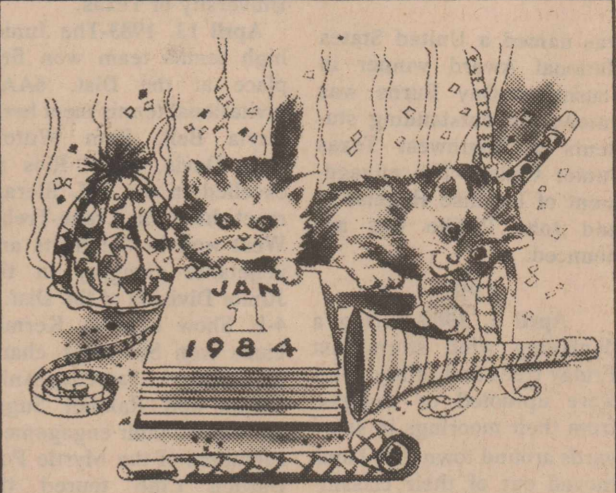

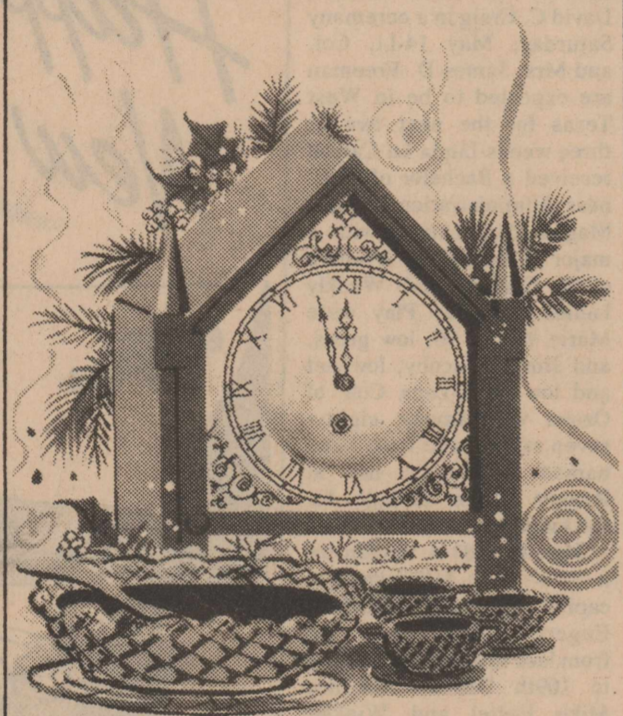

Maybe I can help ease another's pain. If I can put others above myself in 1984-I will not have lived in vain.

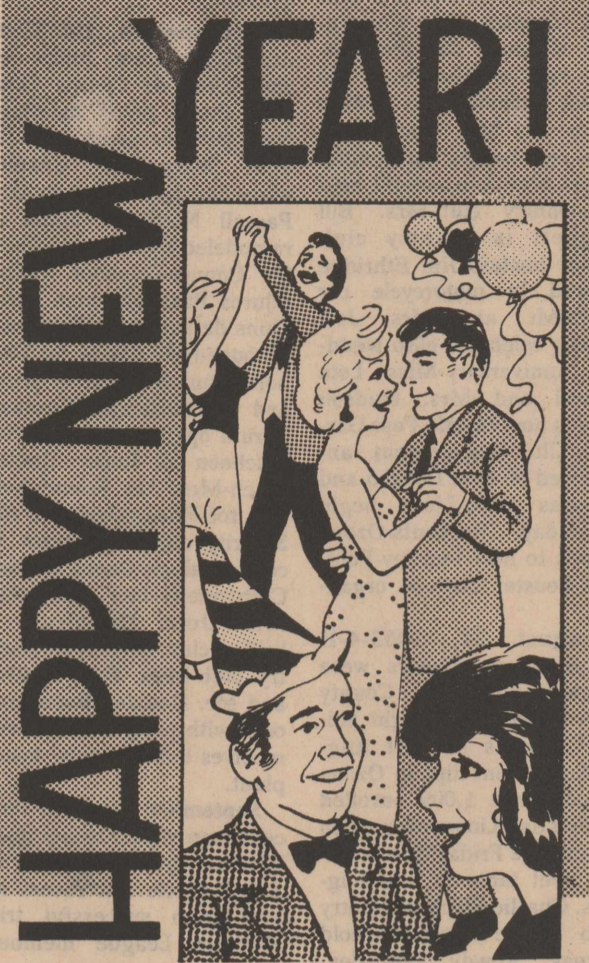

# Livestock reports important

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service is currently gathering information from thousands of farmers and ranchers to be used in developing final 1983 state and county crop estimates and 1984 livestock inventories.

This survey information serves as the basis for determining allotments and payment levels to producers under various commodity

programs, so producers are encouraged to give their full support, says Billy Reagor, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. In turn, producers can use the statistics making production and marketing decisions.

With today's low prices and depressed farm incomes, farmers and ranchers need all the accurate, up-to-date

information they can get to wisely plan their production and marketing operations, notes the agent.

This year's survey carries with it some significant features. After last year's PIK program and drought, the current supply and demand situation facing agriculture makes it imperative that true crop production conditions be known. Also, the cow liquidation caused by last

summer's drought and the effect of the new dairy liquidation legislation requires an accurate picture of the state's livestock inventory this coming year.

Collection and publication of agricultural statistics is a cooperative effort between the Texas and U.S. Departments of Agriculture. This cooperation avoids duplication of effort, saves money and increases the effective-

ness of statistical reports.

Individual farm and ranch information is kept strictly confidential and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans, vegetables and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

# Wildcat scheduled to be drilled in Crockett County

Staley Operating Co., Midland, will drill the No. 1 University 21, an 11,800-foot wildcat in Crockett County, 5/8-mile west-northwest of a 9,596-foot failure, 7/8-mile northeast of an 11,446-foot Ellenburger failure, 5/8-mile north and very slightly west of the current one-well M.A.G. (Pennsylvanian oil) field and 12 miles southeast of Rankin.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 900 feet from the west lines of 21-5-University Lands.

The M.A.G. field produces from 9,406 feet.

Rio-Tex Inc., San Antonio, will drill the No. 1-26 Shannon Estate, a 3,000-foot wildcat in Crockett County, surrounded by deep failures, 5/8-mile south and slightly east of a 2,822-foot failure, 1 3/8 miles south and slightly east of 2,600-foot oil production in the World field and 16 miles south-southwest of Big Lake.

Location is 467 feet from the north and west lines of 26-BB-EL&RR, Abst. 4781.

The failure, the firm's No. 1 Shannon Estate, was abandoned November 22.

Tenneco Oil Co., San Antonio, will drill the No. 2 Tom Mitchell as a 3/8-mile west stepout to the opener and lone producer of the J.M. North (Ellenburger gas) field of Crockett County, 13 miles northwest of Pandale.

The opener, the firm's No. 1X Tom Mitchell, was finalized May 28, 1982 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 16,300,000 cubic feet of gas daily, through perforations at 12,342,429 feet.

Extension office news

After preparing large Christmas dinners and high-calorie snacking food, you may be interested in easy to prepare and lower calorie meals. In the good old days, bone trimmings and greens were especially useful for everyday consumption.

The best soups are still based on homemade stocks. Stock making is the exception to almost any other kind of cooking. Mature vegetables and aged meat create the most flavorful soups. Instead of making every effort to keep juices within the foods, you want to extract all the flavors and juices into the stock. At the onset of cooking, ingredients and the water should be at the same temperature. Bones, especially marrow bones, are especially good for soups. Starchy and greasy foods will cloud the stock.

As stock heats, a heavy scum rises to the surface which can be skimmed off before the first half hour of cooking to keep clear stock. Add whatever seasoning vegetables are called for and simmer stock partially covered to extract all goodness from ingredients—at least two hours, and as long as 12 if raw bones are used. To keep the stock clear, drain it by ladling. Drain through two layers of cheesecloth that have been wrung out in water. Cool uncovered and store tightly covered in refrigerator. Stocks keep 3-4 days refrigerated and longer if frozen.

Soups or stocks may be thickened by adding pasta or precooked cereal (rice); adding egg yolks just prior to serving—allow 1 egg yolk and 1 tablespoon cream per cup soup; adding 2 rice hard-cooked egg yolks per cup soup a few minutes prior to serving; adding 3 tablespoons of raw grated potatoes per cup of soup, 15 minutes prior to serving.

If you choose not to bother with the required methods of making stock, you may want to select time-saving prepared soup combinations.

Mingling canned and frozen soups and what you have on hand in the refrigerator can create good soups. If uncooked vegetables are used, make sure they are tender enough not to spoil the soup texture. Most concentrated soups are likely to be more salty, so test your mix before adding salt.

**Quick Tomato Soup**  
Simmer, covered, 15 minutes:  
2 1/2 cups canned tomatoes  
1/2 cup sliced onion  
1/4 cup chopped celery with leaves

Strain and reserve the tomato stock.

Melt 2 tablespoons butter. Add and stir until blended: 2 tablespoons flour. Add, cook and stir until smooth and boiling: 2 cups Brown Stock, 5/2, or canned bouillon with 1/2 Teaspoon sugar and 1/8 teaspoon paprika. Also in this mixture add the strained tomato stock and season to taste. Add just before serving: 1 tablespoon chopped fresh basil or 1/4 teaspoon anchovy paste or a dollop of whipped cream.

**Quick Vegetable Soup**  
Melt 2 tablespoons butter. Add and stir until blended: 1 1/2 tablespoons flour. Add and stir until smooth: 1 1/2 cups vegetable stock. You may utilize the water in which vegetables, below, have been cooked. Bring to a boil and cook 2 minutes. Lower the heat and add: 1/2 cup cream or stock. Add: 1/2 cup cooked, diced or strained vegetables and 2 tablespoons chopped parsley. Also add a dash of celery salt then season to taste.

Heat thoroughly but do not boil if you have chosen to add the cream.

# Supplemental feeding helps condition herds

A systematic approach to supplemental feeding can help cattlemen maintain the condition of their beef herds while keeping a handle on costs.

Supplemental feeding is necessary since cattle can only store protein and minerals in limited amounts, points out Dr. Dennis Herd, beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. However, he suggests supplementing only if increased performance will more than offset the cost or if it's necessary for humane treatment of cattle.

He offers the following general guidelines:

Allow cows to graze selectively. The forage they actually consume will be slightly more digestible and contain more protein than the average of all forage in the pasture. Overstocking eliminates the potential for selective grazing and greatly increases the need for, and the expense of, supplementation. On the other hand, many pastures must be supplemented, regardless of the amount of forage, for satisfactory animal performance.

Keep up year-round a good salt plus 8-12 percent phosphorus and calcium mineral mix. An exception might be where phosphorus is supplied by protein and energy supplements.

Begin protein supplementation before cows lose a lot of weight and condition. A killing frost is a definite signal to start in the fall. Protein would also be beneficial during drought periods when grass is dry and tough. It's cheaper to save condition in late summer and fall than it is to feed a poor cow back into shape during late winter.

Adequate protein is essential for normal feed or energy intake and digestion. Adding .5 to 1.5 lb. of a 30 to 40 percent protein supplement to low quality forages—those with less than 6 percent crude protein—can increase forage intake as much as 30 to 60 percent and digestion 6 to 12 percent. Such supplementation where forage quantity is plentiful can turn a drastic weight loss into an acceptable loss or maintenance situation.

Energy in 1 to 2 lb. of a high-energy supplement may slightly stimulate digestibility (1 to 3 percent) and intake

(5 to 10 percent) of poor forages. However, levels above 10 to 12 percent of the diet (2-3 lb. per 1,000 lb. of live weight) will generally slightly depress forage digestibility and have a substitution effect on total energy intake.

The best way to handle energy-deficient situations is to manage to stay away from

them. Improve hay quality. Control calving seasons so quality forage is available when cows and calves need it most. Use fertilization and limited supplementation to be sure cows are in good condition starting the winter, thus greatly reducing heavy seasonal supplementation.

If cows are getting too poor, feed higher levels of supplement or get ready to pay the price of a reduced calf crop and lower weaning weights.

This same substitution effect exists where hay is used to supplement pasture. Use 1 to 2 lb. of a high-protein, high-energy supplement to help cattle clean up dead grass in the fall before it rots. Then really haul out hay as the total feed. Don't tease them with a third to half feed of hay as it will depress pasture use. Remember that a pasture is used up long before the last bite is gone.

Look ahead! Try to stay out of situations calling for high levels of supplementation—it's seldom profitable.

This building carries a Texas Historical Marker and the design of the renovation has been approved by the Texas State Historical Commission and accordingly, the physical construction work shall endeavor to comply with the Contract Documents and the State requirements for restoration to an existing Historical Building.

The work consists of, but is not limited to, removal of the existing mechanical and plumbing systems, addition of new HVAC and plumbing systems, new ceilings, some new partitions and generally cleaning and refurbishing existing areas and new finishes.
