Lions humiliated at hands of Bearcats

The Ozona Lions suffered their worst defeat of recent history last Friday night in Lions Stadium at the hands of the Ballinger Bearcats, 68-0. The Bearcats opened the game with a 65-yard touchdown pass on the initial play of the game, which sparked the team down the road of victory for the sixth consecutive time this season.

The Colorado City Wolves, the district 7-AAA favorite, will host the Lions this Friday in Wolf Stadium at 8:00 p.m. The Lion's greatest job will be to contain returning All-West-Texas quarterback, Doug Chitsey, a 6'3", 180 pound senior. Chitsey's favorite receiver, Don Randle, along with running backs, Sammy Rivera

and David Halton will pose a threat to the Lions. The wolf defense has a full slate of returning lettermen from last year's 4-6-1 team. The offense and defense both, are complimented by 22 seniors.

The Lions will be playing without senior David Delgado, who underwent knee surgery last week following an injury sustained against the Eldorado Eagles.

In the Ballinger-Ozona game, the Bearcats made 28 first quarter points to take a commanding lead over the Lions. Ballinger scored 4 touchdowns and 4 extra points to fire out at the Lions in the early stages of the game.

Bearcat wide receiver, Kirk Francis, carried the ball 5 times for 103

yards and two touchdowns. Todd Copeland also scored two touchdowns for Ballinger and carried the ball 3 times for 105 yards. Ballinger totaled over 265 yards rushing on 40 carries for a 6.6 average gain per carry. The Lions were taken for a loss of 7 yards rushing on 24 carries, but did make 128 passing yards. The Bearcats threw the ball for an astounding 274 yards and earned 21 first downs compared to only 9 for Ozona.

Ballinger completed 14 of 19 passes with only one interception, whereas the Lions passed the ball 35 times and completed only 14, while throwing 4 interceptions.

In other district 7-AAA action last week, the Colorado City Wolves blasted the Coahoma Bulldogs, 34-7 and the Sonora Broncos edged out the Crane Golden Cranes by a score of 17-0. This week as the Lions travel to Colorado City, Ballinger and Sonora will face off in Sonora and Crane will host Coahoma.

A win for Ozona is essential this week if the Lions are to remain in contention for the district title and a position in the 1984 state football playoffs.

School to offer tutoring service

The Ozona Board of Trustees, meeting in regular session on Tuesday, October 9, approved the offering of tutorial services to students in the district's four schools. These sessions began Monday, October 15, and are available for any student whose grade in a subject for a grade reporting period is lower than 70 on a scale of 100. Students whose grade in a subject for a grade reporting period is 70 or higher on a scale of 100 will be allowed to participate in the new tutorial program, provided that their presence does not necessitate the hiring of additional personnel. Student attendance is voluntary.

Tutorial sessions in English Language Arts and mathematics are available to students in Ozona Primary School after the end of the regular instructional day, and tutorials in these two areas will be available to Ozona Intermediate School students

on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 7:30-8:00 a.m.

Ozona High School and Ozona Middle School will offer tutorials in English Language Arts, mathematics, science, and social studies. These services will also be available from 7:30-8:00 a.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday.

In other developments, the Board adopted new school policies in regard to student absences for extracurricular or other school-related activities, student discipline, and student records. They also gave approval for the addition of Ms. Kim Hager to the 1984-85 substitute teacher list.

In a special meeting on Monday, October 8, the Board of Trustees approved a request by Stein Construction Company to extend their present contract on the Ozona Junior High Renovation project until Saturday, November 3.

Superior Oil to drill in Crockett County field

The Superior Oil Co., Midland, will drill the No. 3 Shannon Estate "37", and 8,000-foot project in Crockett County for wildcat tests and as a 3/8-mile west stepout to the Permo-Pennsylvanian detrital opener and lone producer from that pay, a 1/2-mile northwest outpost to the Leonard oil pay and as a 7/8-mile northwest outpost to the two-well Ellenburger oil area, all in the Condo field, 91/2 miles north-northeast of Iraan.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines

of 37-I-GC&SF.

The Leonard oil discovery the firm's No. 2 Shannon Estate "37", was finalized March 21 to flow 372 barrels of 34.7 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 234-1, through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,236-50 feet.

The Permo-Pennsylvanian detrital opener, the firm's No. 1 Shannon Estate "37" (the former Ellenburger opener, was recompleted Nov. 26, 1983, to pump 138 barrels of 43.9 gravity oil, no water, through perforations at 7,143-52 feet.

Absentee voting due to get underway today

Absentee voting for the November 6, general election was due to begin today in the County Clerk's office. However, the ballots had not arrived from the printer as of Tuesday afternoon.

Crockett County had a total of 2758 registered voters as of Oct. 7, who will be eligible to vote in the election. A total of 114 new voters have registered since Sept. 17. Only one race is contested locally, county commissioner, precinct 1. However, the presidential race and the race for U.S. Senator has generated more action this year. Also, there will be eight proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

In the commissioners race, precinct 1, incumbent commissioner Sostenes

DeHoyos, Democrat, has opposition from the former commissioner Jesse Marley, Republican.

W. R. Baggett re-elected to Soil Conservation board Oct. 9

W.R. Baggett Jr. was re-elected to the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors on October 9. Baggett represents Zone 1 of the district.

The purpose of the Crockett SWCD is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies, and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private persons.

As one of five individuals serving on

the district board of directors, Baggett will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In Texas there are 201 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCD's do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

The Crockett County district was organized in 1950.

FLAT TAX DESERVES A CHANCE

When the government first started taxing personal income, the maximum rate was 7 percent. Today, the federal government can take as much as fifty cents of each dollar earned. The system has become so complex that the Internal Revenue Code is now more than 10,000-pages long. And, even though more than half of all 1040 federal income tax forms are professionally prepared — at a cost of more than \$60 billion a year — millions of taxpayers still are under- or over-estimating what they have to dish out to Uncle Sam. Every time Congress passes a new tax bill, as it did in late June, the tax code becomes curiously and curiously.

There are now many who don't pay taxes at all — in many cases simply out of frustration. Recent studies indicate that this "underground economy" — people who trade goods and services or deal only in cash — may approach one-trillion dollars per year.

Congress has largely ignored past proposals for meaningful tax reform, trying to treat the problem with aspirin when major surgery is needed. But the severely "progressive" tax system, which discourages hard work and saving, and encourages the idea that the more one earns, the more Uncle Sam is due, is driving taxpayers to the brink of revolt.

Currently, Congress is studying several proposals to reform the tax system. One such is the 10-percent flat-rate tax proposed by Mark Siljander, a young congressman from Michigan. Derived from the flat-tax model of Nobel laureate economist Milton Friedman, Siljander's plan would require all taxpayers to pay 10 percent of their income in federal taxes, regardless of how much they earn. Most deductions would be eliminated, except those for interest on home mortgages, charitable contributions, and certain retirement savings.

Not only would the flat tax simplify the current, outrageously complex tax system, it would offer relief from an unfair, inefficient graduated income tax. For instance, items such as scholarship and fellowship grants, Social Security and disability payments, alimony, and federal retirement benefits would no longer be considered taxable. Another change would be to double the personal exemption from \$1,000 to \$2,000 and index it to the rate of inflation. These changes would especially benefit taxpayers in the lower- and middle-income brackets.

At the same time, the flat-rate tax will bring those in the upper income brackets back into the same system by removing most of the existing tax shelters.

Most importantly, implementation of the flat-tax rate will foster needed economic growth by increasing the incentives to work, save, and invest. Under the plan, marginal tax rates would be reduced, meaning that with a lower marginal cost per worker, employers could hire more people and pay out higher gross wages. And, by offering amnesty to people now in the economic underground, the flat-rate tax would encourage millions of additional Americans to go "on the books" — generating more revenue.

There are other flat-tax proposals floating around. The Democratic alternative — the so-called Bradley-Gephardt plan — is not really a flat tax at all, calling for three different rates: 14 percent, 26 percent, and 30 percent. Secondly, fringe benefits paid by an employer, such as health insurance, child care, and tuition assistance, as well as Social Security, would be treated as taxable income. Also, the personal exemption under this plan is only \$1,600 for each taxpayer and \$1,000 for dependents.

But the most damaging aspect of the Bradley-Gephardt plan lies in the fact that the tax policy would especially hurt small business. Namely, it would double the small business tax rate, increase the capital-gains tax on small business, and tax fringe benefits, thus increasing the burden on both employee and employer.

On the other hand, a low rate, such as 10 percent, would put the needed pressure on Congress to curb its careless spending and assist the federal government in balancing the budget.

Adoption of a flat-rate income tax such as the Siljander proposal will not be an easy task. But it would sure make life easier each April 15.

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STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Lyndell Williams TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN—The battle between Texas Democrats and Republicans to see which party could register more new voters ended last week, but the winner can't be declared until after Election Day.

The biggest voter registration contest in Texas history will probably result in 700,000 new registrants, bringing the estimated statewide total to 7.5 million voters.

Surveys of each party indicated that neither could count on a significant advantage among new registrants.

Phase Two of the election—the Get-Out-The-Vote effort—is already in full swing.

In taking the voter pulse, analysts concentrated on key strongholds, or consistent precincts, for either party. The theory is that if 1,000 new voters are registered in a precinct that is traditionally strong for either party, the odds favor that party picking up support from the new voters.

In urban areas, San Antonio reported about 33,000 new registrants; Houston, about 17,000; Rio Grande Valley, 26,000; El Paso, 21,000; and Fort Worth, 7,500.

High Court Hispanic

Meanwhile, Governor Mark White continued to break Texas historical barriers with his appointments by naming the state's first Hispanic to the Texas Supreme Court.

Corpus Christi appeals court judge Raul Gonzalez was tapped last week by White to fill the seat previously held by Justice Charles Barrow. Barrow resigned to become dean of Baylor University law school.

A former migrant-farmworker, Gonzalez earned his law degree from the University of Texas and worked in the Houston city attorney's office before becoming an assistant U.S. attorney for South Texas. He was a Brownsville state district judge until 1981, when White's nemesis then-Gov. Bill Clements named Gonzalez to the 13th Court of Appeals.

ANTERLESS DEER PERMITS

Anterless deer permits will be issued November 15, from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. at the courthouse.

—Accused the federal government of playing too much politics in selecting a nuclear waste dump site for Texas and charged their flawed selection process should be scrapped for a new one.

Education Chief

Outgoing Commissioner of Education Raymun Bynum was branded a saboteur of school reform by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby. The incident was noteworthy because Hobby made his remarks to the 15 new state school board members only minutes before Bynum welcomed them at their swearing-in activities.

Hobby told them the state education establishment was trying to sabotage the school reforms approved by the Legislature this summer.

Bynum, who has steadfastly held to his opinions of the shortcomings of those reforms, last month said he would step down as early as possible.

"I think I have been painted as a non-reformist, but I have done more (for reform) than any other com-

missioner" he said. When White heard of Hobby's remarks the next day, he "seconded the motion."

Mattox, Local Prosecutors

Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox is meeting opposition from Texas local prosecutors in his effort to get the authority to prosecute some criminal cases. The Texas Constitution gives him only the power to prosecute civil matters, but he wants to go after Medicaid fraud and organized criminals.

"Ten percent of every dollar spent in the Medicaid program is fraudulent," Mattox said. "We investigate the cases, then we turn them over to local prosecutors, and if we don't continue to help them, the cases don't get prosecuted.

County, District Attorneys

Mattox painted Medicaid fraud as often involving prominent members of a community, who local prosecutors are reluctant to go after for political and other reasons.

But at a recent meeting of the Texas Association of County and District Attorneys, the membership voted unanimously to oppose Mattox's plan. Spokesmen disagreed with the Mattox statement that political considerations determine which cases go to court.

Under the Texas Constitution, prosecutors are in the judicial branch of government, and the attorney general is in the executive branch.

Tips For Gardeners

From the
Ozona Garden Club
by Mrs. Bailey Post

After our late showers over our beautiful county it is greening up again for the first time in months.

If you are planning to plant peonies this fall, they are now available to order or in nurseries. When selecting the location, remember peonies are forever, as they may never need to be transplanted. They need a well-drained soil with plenty of sun and a big hole big enough to accommodate the large tubers. Dig holes 18 inches deep and at least that wide, the bigger the hole the better. Clay subsoil should be discarded after saving the good top soil to mix with peat moss or compost and other good soil you may need. Should there be the least doubt about good drainage, add two inches of gravel in the bottom of the hole before adding several inches of a mixture made equally of top soil and compost (or peat moss), plus a large handful of 5-10-5 fertilizer. Cover this with two inches of fertilizer, free top soil, tramp it down hard and make a fat, firm cone of the soil in the middle of the hole to set the peony roots astride. Set the clamp (right side up) so that the uppermost pink bud is exactly two inches below the ground level. Peonies won't bloom if planted too deep, so measure carefully. Fill in around roots with top soil, working it among the brittle roots with your fingers until no air spaces are left. Firm carefully so not to break the buds off. When soil is up to the bed level, water well and let sink in. If all top soil has been used, finish with a soil-peat moss mixture. Mound soil several inches above ground for protection against frost, leaving during the first winter. Keep watered during the winter, but not soaked enough to cause rot.

If you fertilize in the fall, shrubs and young trees grow better in the spring. Apply after the first killing frost.

Eye care is subject of Tex. 4-H program

A special 4-H program on eye care and safety may reach as many as 70,000 youngsters in Texas' public schools this year.

The program is built around the character, "Seymour Safely," which is used in educational materials, games, activities and puppet shows to hold the children's attention while they learn about their eyes.

"The materials and programs are designed for use with third graders," points out Dr. Lynne Thibodeaux, a 4-H specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, which administers the 4-H program. "Lessons focus on the parts of the eye and their functions, nutrition and health habits for healthy eyes, optical illusions and a visit to the optometrist's office."

Thibodeaux notes the eye care program actually started about two years ago as a cooperative effort between the Texas Optometric Association Auxillary and the state 4-H office.

"At that time some county Extension agents were using various materials on eye care in 4-H projects with great success," the 4-H specialist points out. "However, because of the wealth of eye care information and the need to develop materials for various age levels, a coordinated program was launched, opening school doors to Seymour Safely."

The total budget for the 4-H eye care and safety program has reached about \$18,000, says Thibodeaux, with most of the financial support coming from TOAA. A special grant of \$1,300 also came from the National 4-H Council as part of a \$12,000 nationwide contribution by the American Optometric Association, which has supported 4-H vision education programs for the past nine years.

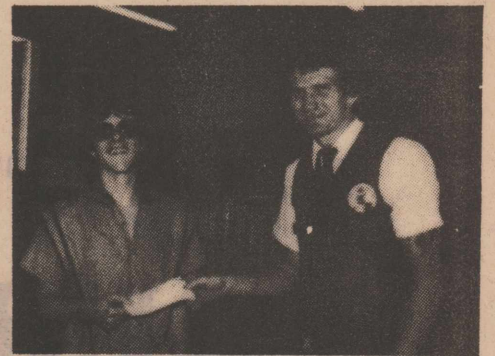

A microwave can be a dieters best friend especially since many diets call for cooking procedures which when done conventionally are time consuming and difficult to achieve. By microwaving, you can prepare light, nutritious meals quickly. If you have to wait an hour to cook conventionally you may find yourself more likely to snack on fattening foods. Your diet can be tailored to individual needs because single servings are easy to prepare. Single serving leftovers are easy to prepare, since food does not dry out or lose flavor when microwaved.

Many vitamins and minerals are retained in microwave cooking, since little or no water is necessary for cooking vegetables. In diets which call for fat-free or salt-free cooking, the natural good tastes of food is significant. A little seasoning goes a long

ways and should be added after cooking, in most cases.

If you are dieting, remember that fad diets don't always work. Any diet that eliminates one type of food at the expense of others can lead to health problems. Even if vitamins or mineral supplements are taken, fad diets may result in nutritional deficiencies. Quick weight loss plans frequently deprive the body of fluids and weight is quickly regained once previous eating habits take over. A sound diet of meat, bread, fruits, vegetables, fats, and milk help the body fight infection and build strong body tissues.

Gramm awarded small-business honor from NFIB

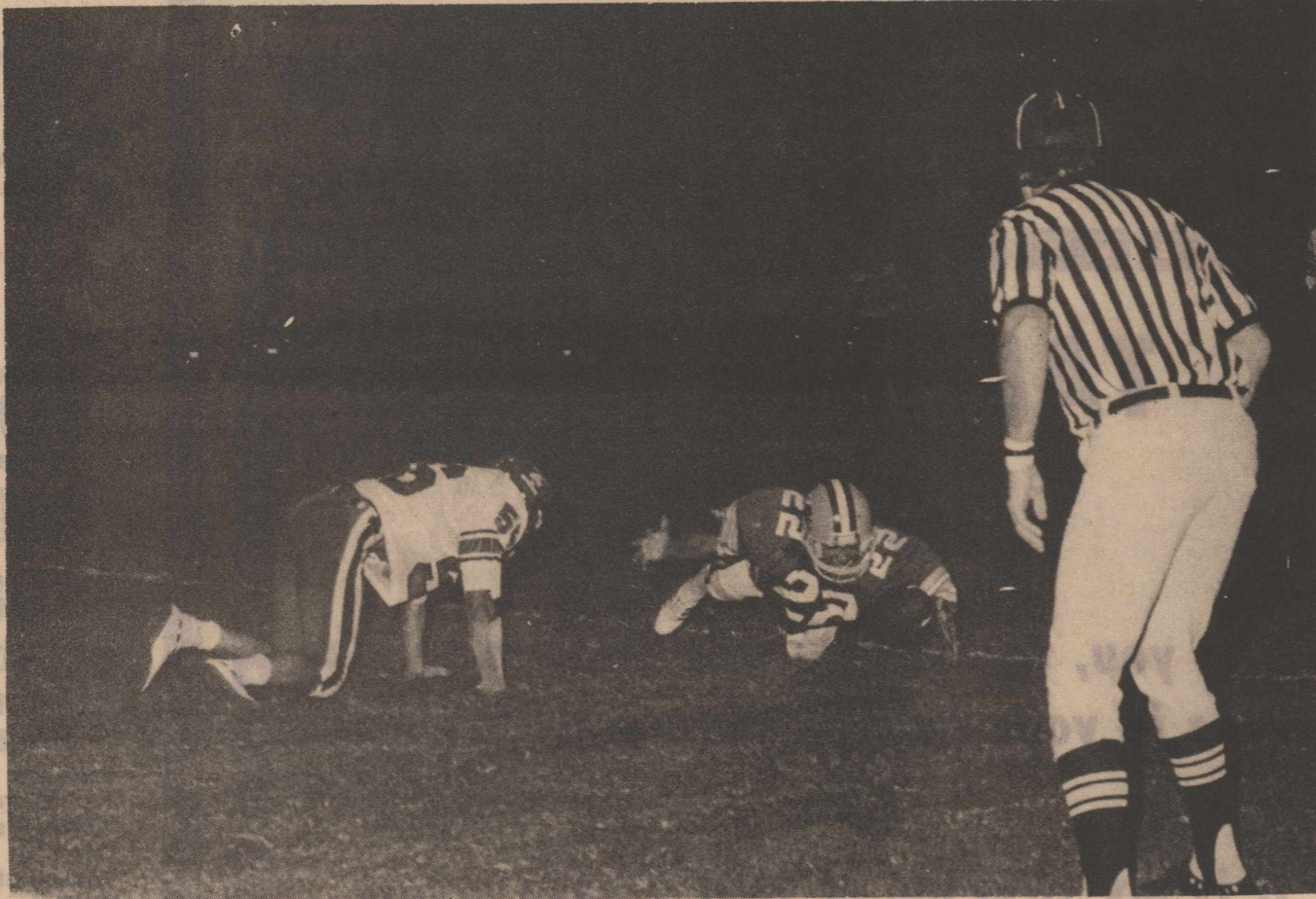

Low Texas death rate continues

Although more Texans died last year-114,714-the death rate continued at an all-time low of 7.3 deaths per 1,000 population because of the state's population increase.

The number of deaths increased by 3,451 from the 111,263 recorded in 1982, reports the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the Texas Department of Health. However, the population grew to 15.7 million as of July 1, 1983, according to the U.S. Census Bureau estimate. The population was set at 15.3 million in 1982.

Heart disease continued to lead as the state's top killer, with 39,849 deaths. This was followed by: Cancer, 23,358; cerebrovascular disease, 8,914; Accidents, 7,275; Bronchitis, Emphysema, Asthma, and Allied Conditions, 3,535; Pneumonia and Influenza, 2,919; Homicide, 2,322; Suicide, 2,066; Diabetes Mellitus, 1,954; and, Certain Conditions Originating in the Perinatal Period, 1,545.

Together, the four leading death causes were responsible for seven out of 10 deaths in 1983. The top 10 killers accounted for almost 82 percent of all deaths to Texans.

Based on provisional, incomplete data, the national causes of death were the same as those in Texas in the first six categories. The bottom four categories differ, however. Nationally, they are: Diabetes Mellitus (ninth in Texas), Chronic Liver Disease and Cirrhosis (tied for 11th in Texas), Suicide (eighth in Texas), and, Atherosclerosis (tied for 11th in Texas).

W.D. Carroll, Chief of the Bureau of Vital Statistics, said the Bureau now maintains some 24.7 million records for the state, including 15.2 million birth records, 5.4 million death certificates, 2.7 million marriage records, and 1.2 million divorce records.

control if needed or travel at normal speed. Calls for ambulance crews are usually coded as Green, Yellow or Red. Code Green calls will use only warning lights. Code yellow and red are handled just a bit differently. Code yellow calls, lights will be used and in some cases, sirens will be used in areas of heavy traffic and intersections. Code Red calls, warning lights and sirens will be used, traffic control and escorts will usually be in service. When transferring a patient to another hospital, usually the doctor on call will advise as to how the speed is handled.

During future regular monthly meetings more operation, treatment and transfer procedures will be discussed to make the public aware of how important it is to have a well-trained, professional group of people associated with E.M.S. in Crockett County.

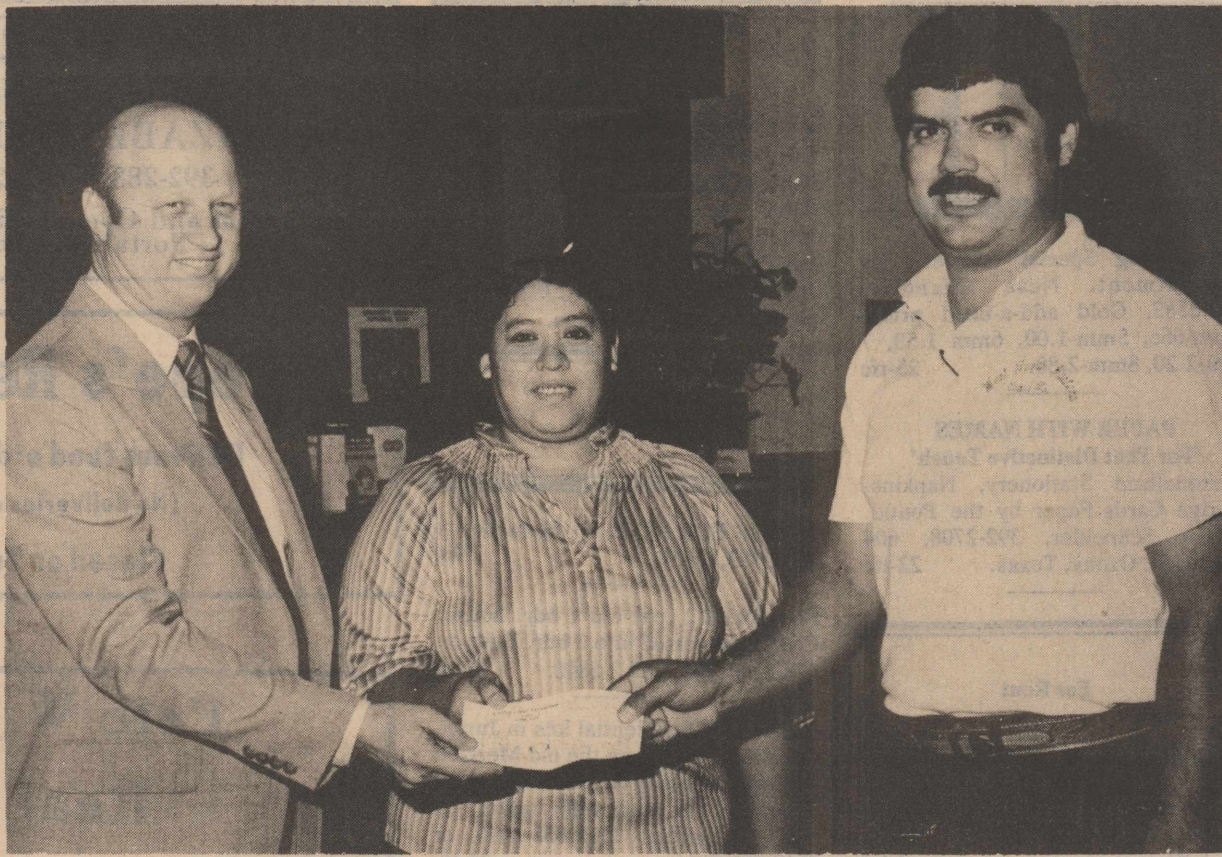
