As I was getting ready for work this morning, I saw and heard Mrs. Ferrero attempting to explain why young people by a large majority favor Ronald Reagan over Walter Mondale. I was surprised at her lack of perception. She gave every excuse except the real one.

I have had occasion to discuss politics with young working men and women as well as young professionals and I can point out the reason most, if not all are going along with Reagan-Bush ticket. Having a son in the age 30 range, as are most of his friends and acquaintances, I see the trend and their concern for the future. They resent ever-rising social security taxes or self-employment taxes which are one and the same. They like Reagan because he gave them a little more of their own money with the tax relief package. They certainly are not going to vote for someone who promises to raise taxes. Another factor is interest rates. They can't purchase a home, pay higher taxes and make payments at the atrocious rates brought on by the Carter administration. Under Reagan, the prime rate has come down and this gives them some hope they will be able to live as well as the last generation, along with a drop in inflation.

On the whole, they are a conservative lot. You might even say selfish. They are more concerned with what they can do for their own families than making social security payments higher for the older generation. They especially resent the cost of living raises the recipients get built-in. They are smart too, they realize more than most the burden they must shoulder in the future to finance social security, medicare and the supplemental payments to low income individuals. They think it's unfair that they must bear the burden of retirement for those who paid in very little if any social security tax during their working years. Some liberal democrats would be appalled at their lack of compassion. They actually have very little concern for the poor, they are too busy making ends meet for their own families. They are livid when they go to an unemployment office and try to hire someone standing in line to do a day's work and are turned down by able-bodied persons who prefer to live on unemployment. They know how it all came about, they are well-read in history from New Deal to the New Frontier, and they know the present welfare state can be directly attributed to Democratic administrations and Democrat-laden House and Senate majorities. Loeffler makes visit to Ozona

Representative Tom Loeffler, U.S. Congressman from the 21st District of Texas was here Tuesday afternoon, Oct. 16, for a reception for the Reagan-Bush ticket. The reception was held at the Civic Center at 5 p.m. where an enthusiastic crowd greeted the popular congressman from this district.

After visiting with members of the group, all of whom Tom knew on a first-name basis, he spoke on the merits of keeping the Reagan-Bush administration in office for another four years. He drew a comparison between the economy now and its condition four years ago, giving high marks to President Reagan's administration for overcoming almost impossible odds, and restoring the economy to the recovery it enjoys today.

Praising President Reagan for beefing up the national defense, cutting unemployment, getting the economy moving again and lowering interest rates as well as cutting income taxes for working people, Rep. Loeffler mentioned a few facts about the contender. Some of which were, during Mondale's many years in Congress and as vice president of one of the most dismal administrations in the history of the nation, he consistently voted for more spending, cutting the defense budget, higher taxes and

more government intervention in business and the private sector.

Loeffler also took a shot at Lloyd Doggett, Congressman Phil Gramm's opponent for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by Senator John Tower. Loeffler said there is virtually no difference in the political stances of Doggett and Tip O'Neill. The only thing, he said, which makes O'Neill the lesser of the two evils, is the fact that he is from Massachusetts while Doggett is from Texas. Doggett is a member of the Democratic dominated Texas Legislature, which during a special session this summer passed the highest tax bill in the history of the state. Loeffler sent a clear message to West Texas that Gramm is the only hope for a voice in Washington.

Representative Loeffler was introduced by Sandra Childress, whose husband, Pleas, is chairman for Loeffler in Crockett County and could not be present. He was welcomed by Chamber of Commerce President Stan Lambert, who presented him with the Crockett County history book for his personal library. A question and answer period followed Loeffler's remarks and a standing ovation.

Loeffler spoke earlier in the day to the Ozona Womens Forum during its annual guest day.

Dorothy Doll named Volunteer of Year

Mrs. Doll will be an honored guest at the THCA's annual convention during the "Future Dimensions" dinner and dance in the San Antonio Convention Center Nov. 16. During the dinner she will be recognized and presented with a plaque.

Mrs. Doll and her husband, John, along with Care Center activities director Ann McCartney and her husband, Junior, have made plans to attend the affair.

According to Judy Overton, coordinator of THCA public relations, the honor is a "very high award." Only one adult in Texas receives the award annually. This year the judges surprised competition sponsors by having a tie vote. Ms. Overton said the entrants are judged in several categories with one to 20 points given in each category. "It's amazing to have a tie," she said.

Brisk absentee voting stirs election interest

Since absentee voting in the November 6, general election began last Wednesday in the County Clerk's office, a total of 57 voters had cast ballots by noon Tuesday, indicating a great deal of interest in the upcoming election.

The only local race is that for County Commissioner in Precinct 1. Jess C. Marley, who held the post for several terms, is challenging incumbent Sotenes DeHoyos.

Most interest, of course, is in the presidential election where President Ronald Reagan and Vice President George Bush are asking for a second four-year term on the Republican ticket. They are challenged by former vice President under Jimmy Carter, Walter Mondale and his running mate Congressman Geraldine A. Ferraro of New York, who head the ticket for the Democrats. Independents on the ballot are Lyndon H. LaRouche for president and Billy M. Davis, vice president, of whom little is known, at least in Texas.

Another hot race is that of United States Senator, the winner will take the place of longtime Senator John Tower who elected to step down. Phil Gramm of College Station, a former Democrat turned Republican, is being challenged by Democrat Lloyd Doggett. Gramm is presently serving as U.S. Congressman from his district, while Doggett is serving in the Texas Legislature.

Gramm was stripped of his seniority by the Democratic hierarchy after voting against some of their outrageous programs in the Congress. He then returned to his district and ran for the same office as a Republican, winning handily. He had several opponents in the primary in May and again won by a landslide.

Doggett, on the other hand, narrowly squeaked by his opponent Rep. Kent Hance of Lubbock in the primary. Most analysts believe if voters in the rural areas of the state had gotten out the vote, Hance would now be Gramm's opponent. Hance, a conservative democrat, was far ahead in the polls and apathy on the part of most Texans and West Texans in general, gave the big cities and labor unions an opportunity to elect Doggett, an Austin liberal, which they did.

Except for the presidential race, the race for U.S. Senator gives the voters of Texas the most clear-cut choice between a conservative and a liberal senator from their state, who will serve for the next six years.

Tom Loeffler, the popular congressman from the 21st District, is being challenged again by Joe Sullivan, who bills himself as a San Antonio businessman and educator. Sullivan has run for the office unsuccessfully for at least the past ten years.

For Railroad Commissioner, incumbent Mack Wallace, Democrat, has drawn opposition from John Thomas Henderson, Republican.

In the race for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, John I. Hill, who won the spot in the Democratic primary, is being challenged by John L. Bates.

The only other challenged race on the ballot is that of Judge, court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1, where Sam Houston Clinton is the Democratic nominee and Virgil E. Mulanax is on the ballot for the Republicans.

Since Crockett County has been moved from District 70 to District 67, Republican Gerald Geisweid of Mason is the state representative. He will appear on the ballot unopposed.

Brock Jones, who was appointed 112th District Judge by Governor Mark White upon the resignation of District Judge Troy Williams back in the early summer, will be on the ballot in the

Democratic column for the unexpired term. He too, is unopposed.

Other candidates of local interest running without opposition and in the Democratic column are J.W. Johnson, Jr., District Attorney; A.O. Fields, county judge; Tom Cameron, county attorney; Debbie Puckett, District-County clerk; Billy Mills, sheriff; Tom Stokes, tax assessor; Jack Williams, county commissioner, precinct 3; Raymond Davee, Justice of the Peace, and Gene Williams, constable.

Eight proposed amendments to the State constitution will appear on the ballot. They will be discussed in the next week's edition of the Stockman.

All polling places will be open for the election Tuesday, Nov. 6, from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Locations are Precinct 1, courthouse; Precinct 2, Jr. High School; Precinct 3, Civic Center; Precinct 3-6, WTU Power Plant; Precinct 4, Ozona Primary School.

Chamber newsletter indicates improvement in economy

AUSTIN—Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox gigned the Aggies last week, which prompted some Aggies to begin talking about getting another lawyer for the State of Texas.

Mattox, responding to a 1979 sex discrimination lawsuit against Texas A&M University, refused to defend the school because it won't let women march in the Aggie band.

Mattox supports a settlement which would allow women into the band, but some members of the TAMU board of regents and a band alumni group have asked a federal judge to reject the proposal.

They contend that allowing women into the all-male band would either force coed housing, since band members live together, or destroy the esprit de corps that goes back to the turn of the century.

Conspicuously, it puts Mattox on a collision course with regent chairman H. R. "Bum" Bright, also the owner of the Dallas Cowboys. Bright and others feel that Mattox, as the state's lawyer, should defend the university's interest in court. Mattox says that a September federal court ruling gives him the authority to settle a case without the permission of the state agency he is representing.

The attorney general is placing the equal rights provision of the Texas Constitution above Aggie tradition.

The lawsuit was filed in 1979 by a woman student who was not allowed to join the Ross Volunteers, the Corps of Cadets honor guard, because it was an all-male group. Since then, the university has allowed women to join all Corps of Cadets groups, except the band.

Track Gambling Opposed

A bill legalizing horserace gambling in Texas almost made it through the Legislature last session, and its sponsors are hopeful the issue will complete the course in the coming session.

But Gov. Mark White said he would not approve the bill unless several provisions were written into the plan.

He also opposed establishing a state-run lottery, which a number of other state governments use to raise funds.

"I like lotteries least of all," White said, calling it "one of the really consumer frauds that is sponsored by a state."

Revenue Alarms

His voiced opposition stirred anxieties in the minds of supporters of the track-gambling bill. One of the chief arguments for betting is that the state can raise much-needed revenues by taking a share of the gate proceeds.

White answered that any decision about legalized track gambling should be made separate from budget considerations.

Oil Forecast

As these past slim years have underscored so well, oil production in Texas is vital to revenues for state government, but experts indicate the 11-year downward slide in Texas production may be halting.

One University of Texas expert predicts an era of stability by 1990, meaning thousands of jobs and billions in state tax revenues can be saved.

The picture includes oil prices in the \$28-to-\$30-per-barrel range, with about 1,600 new wells being drilled annually.

State Income Tax?

The conservative Texas Research League says personal and corporate state income taxes are on the horizon, the last resort for a state that has steadfastly refused to use it to raise revenues.

The statement in a recent newsletter is based partially on oil industry decline figures.

The author warned that spoken opposition to the tax is no safeguard: in 1961 the Texas House elected a speaker on an anti-sales tax platform, but later that year Texans began paying a sales tax for the first time in history.

Republican Quits

A Republican candidate for state senator in the Austin-San Marcos area announced last week he is quitting the race—for the second time.

Pat McNamara of Austin said he can't raise funds or get enough GOP support for the seat being vacated by liberal Democrat Lloyd Doggett.

McNamara quit in July for the same reasons, but was persuaded to stay in the race by local party supporters.

Though his name will stay on the ballot, the race will likely be won by his Democratic opponent, Gonzalo Barrientos.

The big-money GOP backers reportedly did not want to stir up Democratic activity and greater voter turnout in that area which would undoubtedly help Doggett's bid to defeat Republican Phil Gramm in the U.S. Senate race.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

October lends an air of finality about it. In its hot beginning and chilly nights causes us to expect frost at most anytime. So, don't get caught short of protecting any tender plants you may want to save.

Chrysanthemums and dahlias are at their peak now. An attractive bed of rose-pink colored mums may be seen at the home of Jack Baggett. With proper care, all those cuttings you made early this month can be fine blooming plants by Christmas. And don't forget paper white narcissus. They are easily forced for winter blooms and delightful fragrance. Some start them November 6 and the blooms peak about Christmas Day.

Young trees or shrubs you intend to move this winter should be root-pruned now. Force a spade into the ground all the way around the plant about 18 inches from the trunk. This severs the roots and induces new feeder roots to form closer to the plant. With partially formed new feeder roots, plants suffer less during the process of transplanting. Keep all root-pruned plants well watered until transplanting time in December or January.

In driving around over our city, do notice a few spectacular Chinese tallow trees. They are beautiful here if they get to turn color before an early freeze. As long as you give the tallow tree a sunny spot to grow, it will be easy. It tolerates heat and drought, has no serious pests and is adaptable to most soils. Just sow the seeds, waxy coating and all, into regular potting soil and they will come up super fast. I brought small potted trees from Houston and it made a beautiful tree in a year or two. They are best used as a shade tree, either singly or in groups of three but not in a formal line, because their growth can be a little irregular. They also make fine lawn trees for their filtered shade allows grass to grow underneath.

As Halloween approaches, we see the supermarkets and street vendors increase their supply of pumpkins. Pumpkins are nutritious and contain low calories, potassium, Vitamin A and niacin. Pumpkins keep best if they are stored in a dry place, when they are not piled on top of each other, and are well matured.

If you're making Jack-o-lanterns,

save the seeds and roast them. Pre-heat oven to 375°. Place seeds on a cookie sheet which has been lightly buttered. Place in oven and toast until golden brown. When toasted, cool slightly, then shake and rub lightly to remove husks. Salt to taste.

Preparing Pumpkin

Remove seeds and fiber. Cut pumpkin into quarters. Place on cookie sheet, peeling up. Bake at 350° about 20 minutes until tender when pierced with a fork. Cool. Cut off peeling and any pulp that may have browned during baking. Puree in a blender or beat until smooth on high speed of electric mixer. Freeze in 1 or 2 cup containers until needed.

Pumpkin Bars

4 eggs
1 2/3 cups sugar
1 cup oil
2 cups pumpkin
2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1 teaspoon baking soda
Beat together eggs, sugar, oil and pumpkin. Stir in dry ingredients, spread batter into lightly greased 15x10x1 inch pan. Bake at 350° for 25 minutes. Cool. Frost with Cream Cheese icing. Makes 2 dozen bars.

Cream Cheese Icing

3 ounces cream cheese
1/2 cup margarine
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups powdered sugar
Combine ingredients and beat on high speed until smooth and creamy.
