Winning recipes from Intermediate Divisions, Crockett Co. 4-H Food Show.

Fruits and Vegetables THOUSAND DOLLAR ORANGE SALAD Jennifer Jones

1-3 oz. box orange Jello
1 cup boiling water
1 8-oz. bottle 7-Up
1 cup whipping cream
1 small can crushed pineapple, drained
1 small jar marachino cherries, drained
2 bananas, sliced
1/2 cup nuts, chopped
1 cup coconut
Dissolve Jello in boiling water; add 7-Up. Chill about 45 minutes or until slightly jelled. Whip cream until stiff. Fold whipped cream and remaining ingredients into Jello mixture. Chill until firm.

Main Dish CHICKEN FANCY Whitney Vannoy

8 chicken breasts or 2 cup-up fryers
3 cups finely crushed corn flakes
3 cups finely crushed potato chips
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1/2 teaspoon seasoning salt
1 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup margarine
Preheat oven at 350. Remove the skin from the chicken, wash and dry well. Melt butter, add seasonings. Mix potato chips and cornflakes together in a bowl. Dip chicken, one piece at a time in melted butter mixture, then in crumb coating. Arrange in single layer in large baking pan. Pour any remaining mixture over chicken. Bake one hour at 350 or until tender. Best if served at once to keep the coating crisp.

Breads and Cereals BANANA NUT BREAD Stacy Sesson

1 cup sugar
1/2 cup margarine
2 eggs
3 large ripe bananas
1 teaspoon soda
pinch salt

2 cups plain flour
1 cup chopped pecans (optional)
Cream sugar and margarine, then add eggs. Mix and add mashed bananas. Add sifted dry ingredients. Pour into greased loaf pan, 9x5x2 1/2, and bake in 350 oven for one hour or bake in two smaller loaf pans cutting oven temperature to 325 and baking about 50 minutes. Freezes well.

Nutritious Snacks and Desserts ABBY'S FABULOUS CHOCOLATE CAKE Jennifer Davidson

4 squares unsweetened chocolate
1/2 cup butter for cake
2 cups sifted cake flour
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
1 cup dairy sour cream
2 cups sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
Fluffy White Frosting
1 tablespoon butter for topping
Grease 2 8" round layer-cake pans; flour lightly, tapping out any excess. Combine 3 squares of the chocolate, the 1/2 cup butter, and water in the top of a double boiler; heat over simmering water until chocolate and butter melt; remove from heat. Cool.

Sift flour, soda, and salt into a large bowl. Beat eggs with sour cream until blended in a medium-size bowl; beat in sugar and vanilla; stir in cooled chocolate mixture. Beat into flour mixture; half at a time, just until smooth. Batter will be thin. Pour into prepared pans. Bake in moderate oven (350) 40 minutes, or until centers spring back when lightly pressed with fingertip. Cool in pans on wire racks. Loosen around edges with knife; turn out onto racks.

Make Fluffy White Frosting. Put cake layers together with about one quarter of the frosting on a serving plate; spread remainder on side and top, making deep swirls with spatula. Melt remaining 1 square chocolate with the 1 tablespoon butter in a cup set in hot water or microwave; stir until smooth. Drizzle over top of cake, letting mixture drip down side.

Fluffy White Frosting

4 egg whites
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon cream of tartar
Dash of salt
5 teaspoons cold water
2 teaspoons vanilla
Combine egg whites, sugar, cream of tartar, salt, and water in the top of a large double boiler; beat until blended. Place top over simmering water. Cook, beating constantly with an electric beater, about 7 minutes, or until mixture stands in firm peaks. Remove from water; stir in vanilla.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Here I am still in Houston, but hope to be home by next Stockman. Again it has been cold most of the time since I came, and hear the same from here. Thanks for all the cards that keep me posted but I miss the Stockman.

If you like green plants, perhaps you will like an old favorite, the artillery fern (Pilea). It is a mass of bright succulent green leaves and is a very happy sight, but not a true succulent. Any standard potting soil will do. Perlite, peat and loam in equal portions are excellent. Give this plant good light. An east or west window is best, or a south window in winter. If you grow it out of doors in summer give it a location where it will receive morning sunlight. Feed frequently with a light application of a complete fertilizer. Once a month is fine.

It seems that many of you are having trouble with the creeping, commonly known, brown patch, in your St. Augustine lawn. This is a fungus disease (Phizoctonia solani), that infects most of our lawns. It is always around, but it grows when the

nights are cool and the humidity is high. That's fall and again in spring. It becomes dormant when the temperature gets above 75-80 degrees. It starts out just a patch of brown on a usually green lawn usually growing outward in an irregular circle. The leading edge looks wet and yellowish. Inside, the grass is brown. It won't kill a lawn like chinch bugs or white grubs, but it weakens it so badly that weeds invade, and may take two years or more for your good grass to reestablish. There is a specific fungicide for brown patch which is the active chemical Terrachlor. Its available both in liquid and as a granule. Putting your lawn to bed for winter with a good feeding is an excellent idea, even though the tops of grass are frost singed, the roots are slowly growing underground all winter long. The best way to have a weed-free and lovely lawn is to fertilize lightly four times a year. The fall feeding is probably the most important and the most ignored. Be sure to keep your tree leaves for your compost pile.



Texas can expect worse problems with drop in oil

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Wednesday Texans can expect worse budget problems ahead if the price of oil on world spot markets continues to drop.

Bullock warned Legislators and other state leaders, "I am very fearful that if the price of oil keeps plunging, I'm going to be forced to reduce my estimate of revenues available for the January session of the State Legislature.

"I am told a gallon of gasoline has been selling for less than a gallon of unrefined crude oil on the spot market. This might be good news for consumers, but it will be bad news for Texas state budget writers who are already facing a \$640 million revenue shortage.

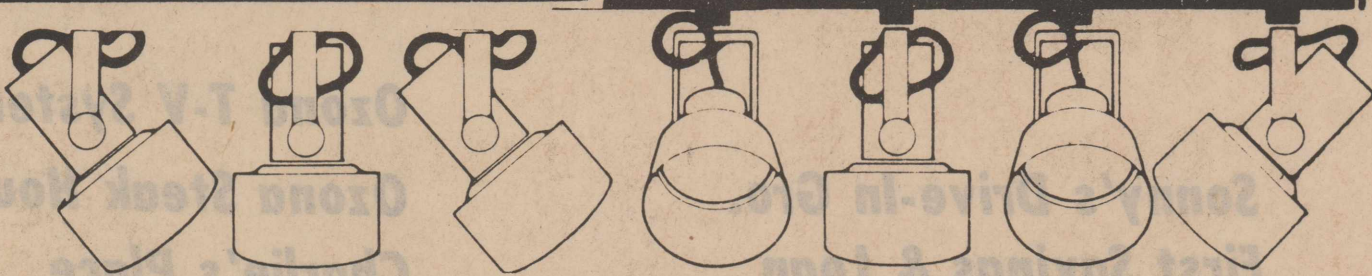

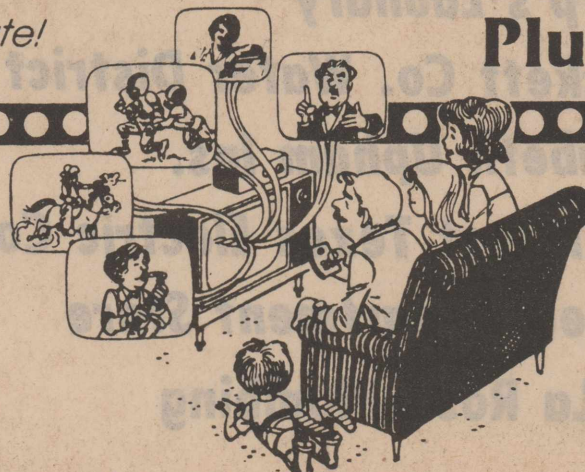

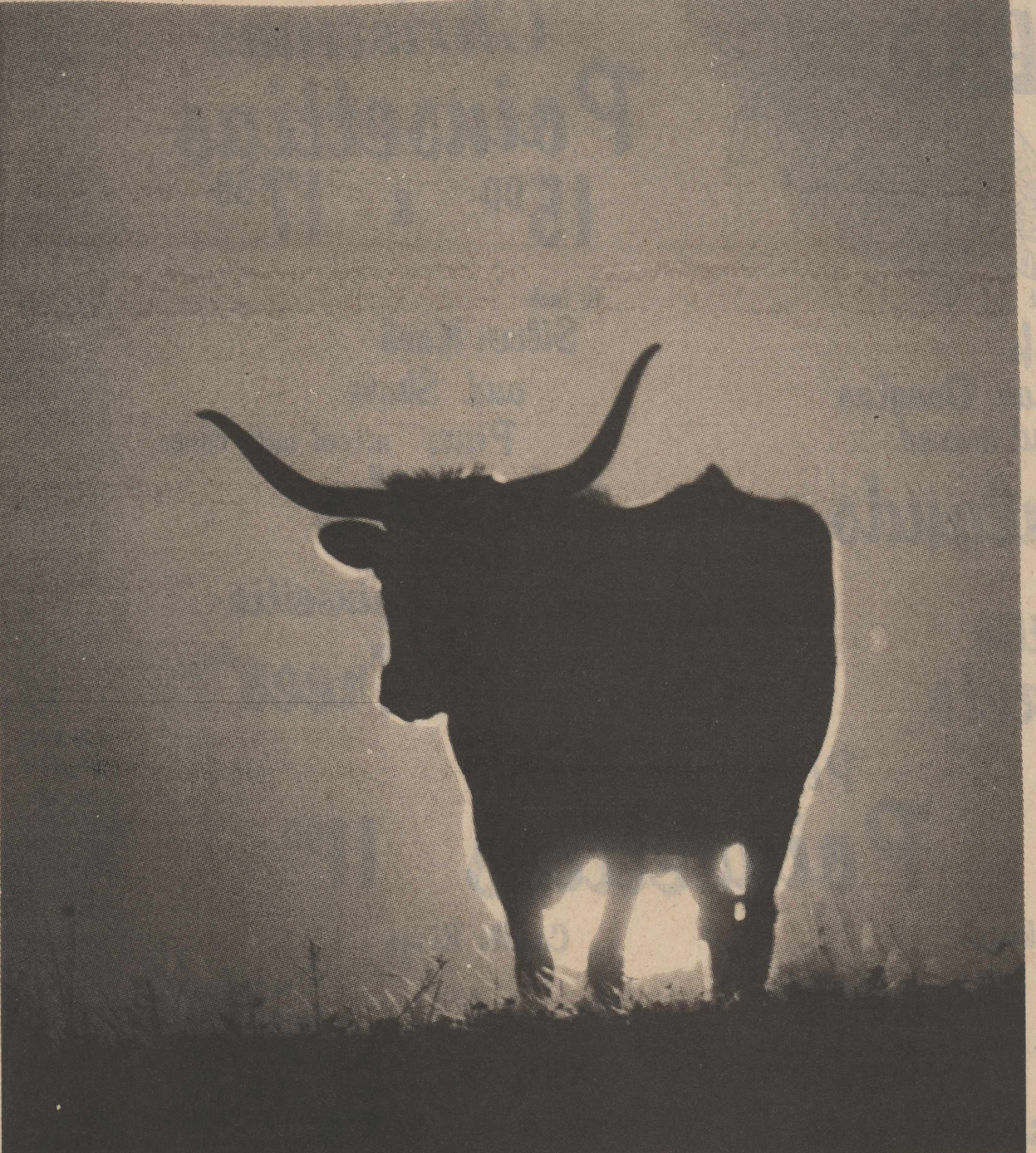

Ozona's namesake is a big problem for Denton, Texas

A news story appearing in the state papers recently told of a problem facing the city of Denton, Texas. The problem is that the area has too much ozone. The overabundance of ozone was a problem that will require correction by the Texas Air Control Board at the behest of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. If the ozone is being blown in from Dallas and Fort Worth, as the Denton folks claim, then that's somebody else's problem, not Denton's.

An overabundance of ozone? It sort of irks us Ozona folks for anyone to find fault with the ozone, because surely our founding fathers had it in mind that the stuff is good for what ails you, or at least a healthful commodity, else why would they have picked a name for Ozona so close in sound to suggest the presence of the element in quantity.

A friend, an Ozona lady recently asked the origin of the name Ozona. She had heard, she said, that some folks opined that the town was named for a bear, the Spanish version of a bear-oso. That seems hardly reasonable since if it had been named after the Spanish word for bear then the form would necessarily have been Osona, o Osono.

No, it had to be descriptive of the high, dry, clean, fresh air in Ozona that inspired the name. Never mind that the scientists have found the stuff objectionable--poison as a matter of fact. The dictionary describes ozone as a gas faintly blue in color and created artificially by discharging an electrical

flash in the air. If you've ever done that you know the characteristic odor created by such a phenomenon. Most of us have seen such a flash and smelled the resulting gas, but I dare say few of us ever knowingly saw ozone gas or smelled it in nature.

It has always been my understanding that ozone is one of the layers of gasses far, far out in space that form a layer around our earth to protect us from certain hostile elements that the universe provides--for one, the ultra violet rays from the sun, at least filtered a bit. But recently scientists have told us the stuff is poisonous.

In justification of our forebears who named our town, the dictionary offers a secondary definition for ozone, after describing it as a slightly blue and odorless gas. The b. definition is "Clean, fresh air." So there. Not a bear, but clean, fresh air. And that's why we still boast "Out in the west, where the air is pure, the climate agreeable and the people friendly. The best place on earth to call home." Ozone poison? Nah. Blow some our way, Denton.
